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## A BILL

To amend the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to make grants to improve security at

schools, including the placement and use of metal detectors.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
 2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 *This Act may be cited as the “Secure Our Schools Act”.*

5 **SEC. 2. MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM FOR SCHOOL**  
 6 **SECURITY.**

7 *Title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets*  
 8 *Act of 1968 is amended by inserting after part Z the fol-*  
 9 *lowing new part:*

10 **“PART AA—MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM FOR**  
 11 **SCHOOL SECURITY**

12 **“SEC. 2701. PROGRAM AUTHORIZED.**

13 *“(a) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General is author-*  
 14 *ized to make grants to States, units of local government,*  
 15 *and Indian tribes to provide improved security, including*  
 16 *the placement and use of metal detectors and other deterrent*  
 17 *measures, at schools and on school grounds.*

18 *“(b) USES OF FUNDS.—Grants awarded under this*  
 19 *section shall be distributed directly to the State, unit of*  
 20 *local government, or Indian tribe, and shall be used to im-*  
 21 *prove security at schools and on school grounds in the juris-*  
 22 *isdiction of the grantee through one or more of the following:*

23 *“(1) Placement and use of metal detectors, locks,*  
 24 *lighting, and other deterrent measures.*

1           “(2) *Security assessments.*

2           “(3) *Security training of personnel and students.*

3           “(4) *Coordination with local law enforcement.*

4           “(5) *Any other measure that, in the determina-*  
5           *tion of the Attorney General, may provide a signifi-*  
6           *cant improvement in security.*

7           “(c) *PREFERENTIAL CONSIDERATION.—In awarding*  
8           *grants under this part, the Attorney General shall give pref-*  
9           *erential consideration, if feasible, to an application from*  
10          *a jurisdiction that has a demonstrated need for improved*  
11          *security, has a demonstrated need for financial assistance,*  
12          *and has evidenced the ability to make the improvements*  
13          *for which the grant amounts are sought.*

14          “(d) *MATCHING FUNDS.—*

15                 “(1) *The portion of the costs of a program pro-*  
16                 *vided by a grant under subsection (a) may not exceed*  
17                 *50 percent.*

18                 “(2) *Any funds appropriated by Congress for the*  
19                 *activities of any agency of an Indian tribal govern-*  
20                 *ment or the Bureau of Indian Affairs performing law*  
21                 *enforcement functions on any Indian lands may be*  
22                 *used to provide the non-Federal share of a matching*  
23                 *requirement funded under this subsection.*

24                 “(3) *The Attorney General may provide, in the*  
25                 *guidelines implementing this section, for the require-*

1        *ment of paragraph (1) to be waived or altered in the*  
2        *case of a recipient with a financial need for such a*  
3        *waiver or alteration.*

4        *“(e) EQUITABLE DISTRIBUTION.—In awarding grants*  
5        *under this part, the Attorney General shall ensure, to the*  
6        *extent practicable, an equitable geographic distribution*  
7        *among the regions of the United States and among urban,*  
8        *suburban, and rural areas.*

9        *“(f) ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS.—The Attorney General*  
10       *may reserve not more than 2 percent from amounts appro-*  
11       *priated to carry out this Act for administrative costs.*

12       **“SEC. 2702. APPLICATIONS.**

13       *“(a) IN GENERAL.—To request a grant under this*  
14       *part, the chief executive of a State, unit of local government,*  
15       *or Indian tribe shall submit an application to the Attorney*  
16       *General at such time, in such manner, and accompanied*  
17       *by such information as the Attorney General may require.*  
18       *Each application shall—*

19                *“(1) include a detailed explanation of—*

20                        *“(A) the intended uses of funds provided*  
21                        *under the grant; and*

22                        *“(B) how the activities funded under the*  
23                        *grant will meet the purpose of this part; and*

24                *“(2) be accompanied by an assurance that the*  
25        *application was prepared after consultation with in-*

1        *dividuals not limited to law enforcement officers (such*  
2        *as school violence researchers, child psychologists, so-*  
3        *cial workers, teachers, principals, and other school*  
4        *personnel) to ensure that the improvements to be*  
5        *funded under the grant are—*

6                *“(A) consistent with a comprehensive ap-*  
7                *proach to preventing school violence; and*

8                *“(B) individualized to the needs of each*  
9                *school at which those improvements are to be*  
10              *made.*

11        *“(b) GUIDELINES.—Not later than 90 days after the*  
12        *date of the enactment of this part, the Attorney General*  
13        *shall promulgate guidelines to implement this section (in-*  
14        *cluding the information that must be included and the re-*  
15        *quirements that the States, units of local government, and*  
16        *Indian tribes must meet) in submitting the applications re-*  
17        *quired under this section.*

18        **“SEC. 2703. ANNUAL REPORT TO CONGRESS.**

19              *“Not later than November 30th of each year, the Attor-*  
20        *ney General shall submit a report to the Congress regarding*  
21        *the activities carried out under this part. Each such report*  
22        *shall include, for the preceding fiscal year, the number of*  
23        *grants funded under this part, the amount of funds pro-*  
24        *vided under those grants, and the activities for which those*  
25        *funds were used.*

1 **“SEC. 2704. DEFINITIONS.**

2 *“For purposes of this part—*

3 *“(1) the term ‘school’ means a public elementary*  
4 *or secondary school;*

5 *“(2) the term ‘unit of local government’ means a*  
6 *county, municipality, town, township, village, parish,*  
7 *borough, or other unit of general government below*  
8 *the State level; and*

9 *“(3) the term ‘Indian tribe’ has the same mean-*  
10 *ing as in section 4(e) of the Indian Self-Determina-*  
11 *tion and Education Assistance Act (25 U.S.C.*  
12 *450b(e)).*

13 **“SEC. 2705. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

14 *“There are authorized to be appropriated to carry out*  
15 *this part the following amounts:*

16 *“(1) \$60,000,000 for fiscal year 2001.*

17 *“(2) \$60,000,000 for fiscal year 2002.*

18 *“(3) \$60,000,000 for fiscal year 2003.”.*



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
