To increase burdensharing for the United States military presence in the Persian Gulf region.

Mr. DEFAZIO (for himself and Mr. FRANK of Massachusetts) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on International Relations, and in addition to the Committee on Armed Services, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

### A BILL

To increase burdensharing for the United States military presence in the Persian Gulf region.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 3 SECTION. 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Persian Gulf Security

5 Cost Fairness Act".

#### 6 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

7 It is the sense of the Congress that—

1 (1) the several key oil-producing countries that 2 relied on the United States for their military protec-3 tion in 1990 and 1991, including during the Persian 4 Gulf conflict, and continue to depend on the United 5 States for their security and stability, should share 6 in the responsibility for that stability and security 7 commensurate with their national capabilities; and 8 (2) the countries of the Gulf Cooperation Coun-9 cil (Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, 10 and the United Arab Emirates) have the economic 11 capability to contribute more toward their own secu-12 rity and stability and therefore these countries 13 should contribute commensurate with that capa-14 bility. 15 SEC. 3. EFFORTS TO INCREASE BURDENSHARING BY COUN-16 TRIES IN THE PERSIAN GULF REGION BENE-17 FITTING FROM UNITED STATES MILITARY 18 PRESENCE. 19 The President shall seek to have each country in the 20 Persian Gulf region to which the United States extends 21 military protection (either through security agreements,

basing arrangements, or mutual participation in multi-

national military organizations or operations) take one or

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more of the following actions:

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1 (1) For any country in which United States 2 military personnel are assigned to permanent duty 3 ashore, increase its financial contributions to the 4 payment of the nonpersonnel costs incurred by the 5 United States government for stationing United 6 States military personnel in that country, with the 7 goal of achieving by September 30, 2003, 75 percent 8 of such costs. An increase in financial contributions 9 by any country under this paragraph may include 10 the elimination of taxes, fees, or other charges levied 11 on the United States military personnel, equipment, or facilities stationed in that country. 12

(2) Increase its annual budgetary outlays for
national defense as a percentage of its gross domestic product by 10 percent or at least to a level commensurate to that of the United States by September 30, 2001.

18 (3) Increase its annual budgetary outlays for
19 foreign assistance (to promote democratization, eco20 nomic stabilization, transparency arrangements, de21 fense economic conversion, respect for the rule of
22 law, and internationally recognized human rights) by
23 10 percent or at least to a level commensurate to
24 that of the United States by September 30, 2001.

(4) Increase the amount of military assets (in cluding personnel, equipment, logistics, support and
 other resources) that it contributes, or would be pre pared to contribute, to military activities in the Per sian Gulf region.

## 6 SEC. 4. AUTHORITIES TO ENCOURAGE ACTIONS BY UNITED 7 STATES ALLIES.

8 In seeking the actions described in section 3 with re-9 spect to any country, or in response to a failure by any 10 country to undertake one or more of such actions, the 11 President may take any of the following measures to the 12 extent otherwise authorized by law:

(1) Reduce the end strength level of members
of the Armed Forces assigned to permanent or parttime duty in the Persian Gulf region.

16 (2) Impose on those countries fees or other
17 charges similar to those that such countries impose
18 on United States forces stationed in such countries.

(3) Suspend, modify, or terminate any bilateral
security agreement the United States has with that
country, consistent with the terms of such agreement.

23 (4) Reduce (through rescission, impoundment,
24 or other appropriate procedures as authorized by

1	law) any United States bilateral assistance appro-
2	priated for that country.
3	(5) Take any other action the President deter-
4	mines to be appropriate as authorized by law.
5	SEC. 5. REPORT ON PROGRESS IN INCREASING ALLIED
6	BURDENSHARING.
7	Not later than March 1, 2001, the Secretary of De-
8	fense shall submit to Congress a report on—
9	(1) steps taken by other countries to complete
10	the actions described in section 3;
11	(2) all measure taken by the President, includ-
12	ing those authorized in section 4, to achieve the ac-
13	tions described in section 3;
14	(3) the difference between the amount allocated
15	by other countries for each of the actions described
16	in section 3 during the period beginning on October
17	1, 2000, and ending on September 30, 2001, and
18	during the period beginning on October 1, 2001, and
19	ending on September 30, 2002; and
20	(4) the budgetary savings to the United States
21	that are expected to accrue as a result of the steps
22	described under paragraph (1).

# 1SEC. 6. REVIEW AND REPORT ON NATIONAL SECURITY2BASES FOR FORWARD DEPLOYMENT AND3BURDENSHARING RELATIONSHIPS.

4 (a) REVIEW.—In order to ensure the best allocation
5 of budgetary resources, the President shall undertake a
6 review of the status of elements of the United States
7 Armed Forces that are permanently stationed outside the
8 United States. The review shall include an assessment of
9 the following:

10 (1) The requirements that are to be found in
11 agreements between the United States and the allies
12 of the United States in the Persian Gulf region.

(2) The national security interests that support
permanent stationing of elements of the United
States Armed Forces outside the United States.

16 (3) The stationing costs associated with for17 ward deployment of elements of the United States
18 Armed Forces.

(4) The alternatives available to forward deployment (such as material prepositioning, enhanced
airlift and sealift, or joint training operations) to
meet such requirements or national security interests, with such alternatives identified and described
in detail.

(5) The costs and force structure configurations
 associated with such alternatives to forward deploy ment.

4 (6) The financial contributions that allies of the 5 United States in the Persian Gulf region make to 6 common defense efforts (to promote democratiza-7 tion, economic stabilization, transparency arrange-8 ments, defense economic conversion, respect for the 9 rule of law, and internationally recognized human 10 rights).

(7) The contributions that allies of the United
States in the Persian Gulf region make to meeting
the stationing costs associated with the forward deployment of elements of the United States Armed
Forces.

16 (8) The annual expenditures of the United
17 States and its allies in the Persian Gulf region on
18 national defense, and the relative percentages of
19 each country's gross domestic product constituted by
20 those expenditures.

(b) REPORT.—The President shall submit to Congress a report on the review under subsection (a). The
report shall be submitted not later than March 1, 2001,
in classified and unclassified form.

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
