A BILL

To authorize appropriations for fiscal years 2000 and 2001 for the Coast Guard, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 2 This Act may be cited as the "Coast Guard Authoriza-
- 3 tion Act of 1999".

7 SEC. 101. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- 8 Funds are authorized to be appropriated for necessary
- 9 expenses of the Coast Guard, as follows:
- 10 (1) For the operation and maintenance of the
- 11 Coast Guard—
- 12 (A) for fiscal year 2000, \$3,084,400,000, of
- 13 which—
- (i) \$25,000,000 shall be derived from
- 15 the Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund to carry
- 16 out the purposes of section 1012(a)(5) of the
- 17 Oil Pollution Act of 1990;

1	(ii) not less than \$663,000,000 shall be
2	available for expenses related to drug inter-
3	diction; and
4	(iii) \$5,500,000 shall be available for
5	the commercial fishing vessel safety pro-
6	gram; and
7	(B) for fiscal year 2001, \$3,207,800,000, of
8	which—
9	(i) \$25,000,000 shall be derived from
10	the Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund to carry
11	out the purposes of section 1012(a)(5) of the
12	Oil Pollution Act of 1990;
13	(ii) not less than \$689,500,000 shall be
14	available for expenses related to drug inter-
15	diction; and
16	(iii) \$5,500,000 shall be available for
17	the commercial fishing vessel safety pro-
18	gram.
19	(2) For the acquisition, construction, rebuilding,
20	and improvement of aids to navigation, shore and off-
21	shore facilities, vessels, and aircraft, including equip-
22	ment related thereto—
23	(A) for fiscal year 2000, \$691,300,000, of
24	which—

1	(i) \$20,000,000 shall be derived from
2	the Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund to carry
3	out the purposes of section 1012(a)(5) of the
4	Oil Pollution Act of 1990;
5	(ii) not less than \$280,300,000 shall be
6	available for expenses related to drug inter-
7	diction;
8	(iii) \$100,000,000 shall be available for
9	modernization of the national distress re-
10	sponse system; and
11	(iv) \$3,000,000 shall be available for
12	completion of the design of a replacement
13	vessel for the Coast Guard icebreaker
14	MACKINAW; and
15	(B) for fiscal year 2001, \$792,000,000, of
16	which—
17	(i) \$20,000,000 shall be derived from
18	the Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund to carry
19	out the purposes of section 1012(a)(5) of the
20	Oil Pollution Act of 1990;
21	(ii) not less than \$233,000,000 shall be
22	available for expenses related to drug inter-
23	diction;

1	(iii) \$110,000,000 shall be available for
2	modernization of the national distress re-
3	sponse system; and
4	(iv) \$128,000,000 shall be available for
5	construction or acquisition of a replacement
6	vessel for the Coast Guard icebreaker
7	MACKINAW.
8	(3) For research, development, test, and evalua-
9	tion of technologies, materials, and human factors di-
10	rectly relating to improving the performance of the
11	Coast Guard's mission in support of search and res-
12	cue, aids to navigation, marine safety, marine envi-
13	ronmental protection, enforcement of laws and
14	treaties, ice operations, oceanographic research, and
15	defense readiness—
16	(A) for fiscal year 2000, \$21,700,000; and
17	(B) for fiscal year 2001, \$23,000,000,
18	to remain available until expended, of which
19	\$3,500,000 shall be derived each fiscal year from the
20	Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund to carry out the pur-
21	poses of section 1012(a)(5) of the Oil Pollution Act of
22	1990.
23	(4) For retired pay (including the payment of
24	obligations otherwise chargeable to lapsed appropria-
25	tions for this purpose), payments under the Retired

1	Serviceman's Family Protection and Survivor Benefit
2	Plans, and payments for medical care of retired per-
3	sonnel and their dependents under chapter 55 of title
4	10, United States Code—
5	(A) for fiscal year 2000, \$730,000,000; and
6	(B) for fiscal year 2001, \$785,000,000.
7	(5) For alteration or removal of bridges over
8	navigable waters of the United States constituting ob-
9	structions to navigation, and for personnel and ad-
10	ministrative costs associated with the Bridge Alter-
11	ation Program—
12	(A) for fiscal year 2000, \$11,000,000; and
13	(B) for fiscal year 2001, \$11,000,000,
14	to remain available until expended.
15	(6) For environmental compliance and restora-
16	tion at Coast Guard facilities (other than parts and
17	equipment associated with operations and mainte-
18	nance)—
19	(A) for fiscal year 2000, \$19,500,000; and
20	(B) for fiscal year 2001, \$21,000,000,
21	to remain available until expended.

1	SEC. 102. AUTHORIZED LEVELS OF MILITARY STRENGTH
2	AND TRAINING.
3	(a) Active Duty Strength.—The Coast Guard is
4	authorized an end-of-year strength for active duty personnel
5	of—
6	(1) 40,000 as of September 30, 2000; and
7	(2) 44,000 as of September 30, 2001.
8	(b) Military Training Student Loads.—The Coast
9	Guard is authorized average military training student
10	loads as follows:
11	(1) For recruit and special training—
12	(A) for fiscal year 2000, 1,500 student
13	years; and
14	(B) for fiscal year 2001, 1,500 student
15	years.
16	(2) For flight training—
17	(A) for fiscal year 2000, 100 student years;
18	and
19	(B) for fiscal year 2001, 100 student years.
20	(3) For professional training in military and ci-
21	vilian institutions—
22	(A) for fiscal year 2000, 300 student years;
23	and
24	(B) for fiscal year 2001, 300 student years.
25	(4) For officer acquisition—

1	(A) for fiscal year 2000, 1,000 student
2	years; and
3	(B) for fiscal year 2001, 1,000 student
4	years.
5	TITLE II—MISCELLANEOUS
6	SEC. 201. VESSEL NOT A SHOT.
7	Notwithstanding section 27 of the Merchant Marine
8	Act, 1920 (46 App. U.S.C. 883), section 8 of the Act of June
9	19, 1886 (46 App. U.S.C. 289), and section 12106 of title
10	46, United States Code, the Secretary of Transportation
11	may issue a certificate of documentation with appropriate
12	endorsement for employment in the coastwise trade for the
13	vessel NOT A SHOT (United States official number
14	911064).
15	SEC. 202. COSTS OF CLEAN-UP OF CAPE MAY LIGHTHOUSE.
16	Of amounts authorized by this Act for fiscal year 2000
17	for environmental compliance and restoration of Coast
18	Guard facilities, \$99,000 shall be available to reimburse the
19	owner of the former Coast Guard lighthouse facility at Cape
20	May, New Jersey, for costs incurred for clean-up of lead
21	contaminated soil at that facility.

1	SEC. 203. CLARIFICATION OF COAST GUARD AUTHORITY TO
2	CONTROL VESSELS IN TERRITORIAL WATERS
3	OF THE UNITED STATES.
4	The Ports and Waterways Safety Act (33 U.S.C. 1221
5	et seq.) is amended by adding at the end the following:
6	"SEC. 15. ENTRY OF VESSELS INTO TERRITORIAL SEA; DI-
7	RECTION OF VESSELS BY COAST GUARD.
8	"(a) Notification of Coast Guard.—Under regula-
9	tions prescribed by the Secretary, a commercial vessel enter-
10	ing the territorial sea of the United States shall notify the
11	Secretary not later than 24 hours before that entry and pro-
12	vide the following information:
13	"(1) The name of the vessel.
14	"(2) The port or place of destination in the
15	United States.
16	"(3) The time of entry into the territorial sea.
17	"(4) Any information requested by the Secretary
18	to demonstrate compliance with applicable inter-
19	national agreements to which the United States is a
20	party.
21	"(5) If the vessel is carrying dangerous cargo, a
22	description of that cargo.
23	"(6) A description of any hazardous conditions
24	on the vessel.
25	"(7) Any other information requested by the Sec-
26	retary.

1	"(b) Denial of Entry.—The Secretary may deny
2	entry of a vessel into the territorial sea of the United States
3	if—
4	"(1) the Secretary has not received notification
5	for the vessel in accordance with subsection (a); or
6	"(2) the vessel is not in compliance with any
7	other applicable law relating to marine safety, secu-
8	rity, or environmental protection.
9	"(c) Direction of Vessel.—The Secretary may di-
10	rect the operation of any vessel in the navigable waters of
11	the United States as necessary during hazardous cir-
12	cumstances, including the absence of a pilot required by
13	State or Federal law, weather, casualty, vessel traffic, or
14	the poor condition of the vessel.".
15	SEC. 204. COAST GUARD SEARCH AND RESCUE FOR LAKE
16	MICHIGAN.
17	(a) In General.—
18	(1) Requirements.—Notwithstanding any
19	other law, the Secretary of Transportation—
20	(A) shall continue to operate and maintain
21	the seasonal Coast Guard air search and rescue
22	facility located in Muskegon, Michigan, until at
23	least September 30, 2001; and
24	(B) shall establish a new seasonal Coast
25	Guard air search and rescue facility for South-

1	ern Lake Michigan to serve the Chicago metro-
2	politan area and the surrounding environment,
3	and operate that facility until at least September
4	30, 2001.
5	In establishing the facility under subparagraph (B),
6	the Secretary shall study Illinois sites in the Chicago
7	metropolitan area, including Waukegan, Illinois.
8	(2) Authorization of appropriations.—In
9	addition to the other amounts authorized by this Act,
10	there are authorized to be appropriated to the Sec-
11	retary of Transportation—
12	(A) for operation and maintenance of the
13	Coast Guard air search and rescue facility in
14	Muskegon, Michigan—
15	(i) \$3,252,000 for fiscal year 2000; and
16	(ii) \$3,252,000 for fiscal year 2001;
17	(B) for acquisition, construction, and im-
18	provement of facilities and equipment for the
19	Coast Guard air search and rescue facility for
20	Southern Lake Michigan established under para-
21	graph (1)(B)—
22	(i) \$8,100,000 for fiscal year 2000; and
23	(ii) \$13,000,000 for fiscal year 2001;
24	and

1	(C) for operation and maintenance of the
2	Coast Guard air search and rescue facility for
3	Southern Lake Michigan established under para-
4	graph (1)(B)—
5	(i) \$5,505,000 for fiscal year 2000; and
6	(ii) \$4,060,000 for fiscal year 2001.
7	(3) Limitation on closing or downsizing
8	OTHER FACILITIES.—The Secretary of Transportation
9	may not close or downsize any Coast Guard facility
10	for the purpose of accommodating the capability re-
11	quired pursuant to paragraphs (1) and (2).
12	(b) Study of Search and Rescue Capabilities
13	FOR LAKE MICHIGAN.—Not later that 1 year after the date
14	of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Transpor-
15	tation shall study, determine, and report to the Congress
16	the overall aircraft and vessel search and rescue capability
17	for Lake Michigan, including—
18	(1) the capability of all Federal, State, and local
19	government and nongovernment entities that perform
20	search and rescue functions for Lake Michigan; and
21	(2) the adequacy of that overall capability.
22	(c) Plan for Search and Rescue Response for
23	CHICAGO, Illinois.—Not later than 6 months after the
24	date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Transpor-
25	tation shall prepare, submit to the Congress, and begin im-

- 1 plementing a comprehensive plan for aircraft and vessel
- 2 search and rescue response for Lake Michigan in the vicin-
- 3 ity of Chicago, Illinois.
- 4 (d) Use of Helicopters for Drug Interdic-
- 5 TION.—During the portion of each year when the seasonal
- 6 facilities required under subsection (a)(1) are not in oper-
- 7 ation, the Secretary of Transportation shall use helicopters
- 8 assigned to those facilities for drug interdiction.
