RESOLUTION

Condemning acts of police brutality and use of excessive force throughout the country.

Whereas police brutality and the use of excessive force constitute one of the most serious and divisive human rights issues in the United States;

- Whereas a small percentage of police, through acts of brutality and the use of excessive force, have given the vast majority of police who abide by the law a bad reputation;
- Whereas police brutality and the use of excessive force have led to public mistrust of the police, particularly in communities of racial minorities;
- Whereas police brutality and the use of excessive force have resulted in the torture and death of innocent people;
- Whereas police brutality and the use of excessive force have caused tension between the police and the public;
- Whereas the House of Representatives finds that the behavior of police officers who engage in unjustified shootings, beatings, fatal chokings, and any other excessive treatment is inconsistent with the Constitution; and
- Whereas the House of Representatives finds that the rule of law in the United States is undermined when a few police officers engage in a pattern of conduct inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States: Now, therefore, be it
 - 1 Resolved, That the House of Representatives—
 - (1) advocates sound and unbiased law enforce ment practices;
 - 4 (2) commends those police officers who risk
- 5 their lives in service of all individuals, to whom the
