# A BILL

- To provide grants and contracts to local educational agencies to initiate, expand, and improve physical education programs for all kindergarten through 12th grade students.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **3** SECTION 1. PHYSICAL EDUCATION FOR PROGRESS.

- 4 Title X of the Elementary and Secondary Education
- 5 Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 8001 et seq.) is amended by add-
- 6 ing at the end the following:

### 1 "PART M—PHYSICAL EDUCATION FOR PROGRESS

#### 2 "SEC. 10999A. SHORT TITLE.

3 "This part may be cited as the 'Physical Education4 for Progress Act'.

#### 5 "SEC. 10999B. PURPOSE.

6 "The purpose of this part is to provide grants and 7 contracts to local educational agencies to enable the local 8 educational agencies to initiate, expand and improve phys-9 ical education programs for all kindergarten through 12th 10 grade students.

#### 11 "SEC. 10999C. FINDINGS.

12 "Congress makes the following findings:

13 "(1) Physical education is essential to the devel-14 opment of growing children.

15 "(2) Physical education helps improve the over16 all health of children by improving their cardio17 vascular endurance, muscular strength and power,
18 and flexibility, and by enhancing weight regulation,
19 bone development, posture, skillful moving, active
20 lifestyle habits, and constructive use of leisure time.

21 "(3) Physical education helps improve the self
22 esteem, interpersonal relationships, responsible be23 havior, and independence of children.

24 "(4) Children who participate in high quality
25 daily physical education programs tend to be more
26 healthy and physically fit.

1	"(5) The percentage of young people who are
2	overweight has more than doubled in the 30 years
3	preceding 1999.
4	"(6) Low levels of activity contribute to the
5	high prevalence of obesity among children in the
6	United States.
7	"(7) Obesity related diseases cost the United
8	States economy more than \$100,000,000,000 every
9	year.
10	"(8) Inactivity and poor diet cause at least
11	300,000 deaths a year in the United States.
12	"(9) Physically fit adults have significantly re-
13	duced risk factors for heart attacks and stroke.
14	((10) Children are not as active as they should
15	be and fewer than $1$ in $4$ children get $20$ minutes
16	of vigorous activity every day of the week.
17	"(11) The Surgeon General's 1996 Report on
18	Physical Activity and Health, and the Centers for
19	Disease Control and Prevention, recommend daily
20	physical education for all students in kindergarten
21	through grade 12.
22	"(12) Twelve years after Congress passed
23	House Concurrent Resolution 97, 100th Congress,
24	agreed to December 11, 1987, encouraging State
25	and local governments and local educational agencies

to provide high quality daily physical education pro grams for all children in kindergarten through grade
 12, little progress has been made.

"(13) Every student in our Nation's schools, 4 5 from kindergarten through grade 12, should have 6 the opportunity to participate in quality physical 7 education. It is the unique role of quality physical 8 education programs to develop the health-related fit-9 ness, physical competence, and cognitive under-10 standing about physical activity for all students so 11 that the students can adopt healthy and physically 12 active lifestyles.

#### 13 "SEC. 10999D. PROGRAM AUTHORIZED.

14 "The Secretary is authorized to award grants to, and 15 enter into contracts with, local educational agencies to pay 16 the Federal share of the costs of initiating, expanding, and 17 improving physical education programs for kindergarten 18 through grade 12 students by—

19 "(1) providing equipment and support to enable
20 students to actively participate in physical education
21 activities;

"(2) developing or enhancing physical education
curricula to meet national goals for physical education developed by the Secretary in consultation

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Education; and
"(3) providing funds for staff and teacher
training and education.
"SEC. 10999E. APPLICATIONS; PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS.
"(a) Applications.—Each local educational agency
desiring a grant under this part shall submit to the Sec-
retary an application that contains a plan to initiate, ex-
pand, or improve physical education programs in the
schools served by the agency to meet the minimum pro-
gram requirements described in subsection (b).
"(b) Program Requirements.—The program re-
quirements referred to in subsection (a) are as follows:
"(1) Physical education programs shall facili-
tate achievement of the goals for physical education,
and the curriculum of the programs shall provide—
"(A) elementary school, middle school, and
secondary school students with not less than
150 minutes per week of instructional physical
education and, if practicable, daily instructional
physical education;
"(B) fitness education and assessment to
help children understand, improve, or maintain
their physical well-being;

1	"(C) instruction in a variety of motor skills
2	designed to enhance the physical, mental, and
3	social or emotional development of every child;
4	"(D) development of cognitive concepts
5	about motor skill and physical fitness that sup-
6	port a lifelong healthy lifestyle;
7	"(E) opportunities to develop social and
8	cooperative skills and gain a multicultural per-
9	spective through physical activity participation;
10	"(F) involvement for all children in activi-
11	ties that provide appropriate amounts and
12	kinds of physical activity; and
13	"(G) instruction in healthy eating habits
14	and good nutrition.
15	((2) Teachers of physical education shall have
16	baccalaureate degrees qualifying the teachers as
17	physical education specialists.
18	"(3) Teachers of physical education shall be af-
19	forded the opportunity for professional development
20	to stay abreast of the latest research, issues, and
21	trends in the field of physical education.
22	"(c) Special Rule.—For the purpose of this part,
23	extracurricular activities such as team sports and Reserve
24	Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) program activities shall

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not be considered as part of the curriculum of a physical
 education program assisted under this part.

#### 3 "SEC. 10999F. PROPORTIONALITY.

4 "The Secretary shall ensure that grants awarded and
5 contracts entered into under this part shall be equitably
6 distributed between local educational agencies serving
7 urban and rural areas, and between local educational
8 agencies serving large and small numbers of students.

# 9 "SEC. 10999G. PRIVATE SCHOOL STUDENTS AND HOME-10 SCHOOLED STUDENTS.

11 "An application for funds under this part, consistent 12 with the number of home-schooled children or children en-13 rolled in private elementary schools, middle schools, and 14 secondary schools located in the school district of a local 15 educational agency, may provide for the participation of 16 such children and their teachers in the activities assisted 17 under this part.

#### 18 "SEC. 10999H. REPORT REQUIRED FOR CONTINUED FUND-

19 ING.

20 "As a condition to continue to receive grant or con-21 tract funding after the first year of a multiyear grant or 22 contract under this part, the administrator of the grant 23 or contract for the local educational agency shall submit 24 to the Secretary an annual report that describes the activi-25 ties conducted during the preceding year and demonstrates that progress has been made toward achieving
 program requirements described in section 10999E(b).

#### 3 "SEC. 10999I. REPORT TO CONGRESS.

4 "The Secretary shall submit a report to Congress not 5 later than June 1, 2003, that describes the programs as-6 sisted under this part, documents the success of such pro-7 grams in improving physical fitness, and makes such rec-8 ommendations as the Secretary determines appropriate for 9 the continuation and improvement of the programs as-10 sisted under this part.

#### 11 "SEC. 10999J. ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS.

12 "Not more than 7 percent of the grant or contract
13 funds made available to a local educational agency under
14 this part for any fiscal year may be used for administra15 tive costs.

16 "SEC. 10999K. FEDERAL SHARE; SUPPLEMENT NOT SUP17 PLANT.

18 "(a) FEDERAL SHARE.—The Federal share under19 this part may not exceed—

20 "(1) 90 percent of the total cost of a project for
21 the first year for which the project receives assist22 ance under this part; and

23 "(2) 75 percent of such cost for the second and
24 each subsequent such year.

"(b) SUPPLEMENT NOT SUPPLANT.—Funds made
 available under this part shall be used to supplement and
 not supplant other Federal, State and local funds available
 for physical education activities.

#### 5 "SEC. 10999L. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

6 "There are authorized to be appropriated
7 \$30,000,000 for fiscal year 2000, \$70,000,000 for fiscal
8 year 2001, and \$100,000,000 for each of the fiscal years
9 2002 through 2004, to carry out this part. Such funds
10 shall remain available until expended.".

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
