Mr. Akaka (for himself and Mr. Graham) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources

A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Interior to conduct a theme study on the peopling of America, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Peopling of America
- 5 Theme Study Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.
- 7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—
- 8 (1) an important facet of the history of the
- 9 United States is the story of how the United States
- was populated;

1	(2) the migration, immigration, and settlement
2	of the population of the United States—
3	(A) is broadly termed the "peopling of
4	America''; and
5	(B) is characterized by—
6	(i) the movement of groups of people
7	across external and internal boundaries of
8	the United States and territories of the
9	United States; and
10	(ii) the interactions of those groups
11	with each other and with other popu-
12	lations;
13	(3) each of those groups has made unique, im-
14	portant contributions to American history, culture,
15	art, and life;
16	(4) the spiritual, intellectual, cultural, political,
17	and economic vitality of the United States is a result
18	of the pluralism and diversity of the American popu-
19	lation;
20	(5) the success of the United States in embrac-
21	ing and accommodating diversity has strengthened
22	the national fabric and unified the United States in
23	its values, institutions, experiences, goals, and ac-
24	complishments;

- (6)(A) the National Park Service's official the-matic framework, revised in 1996, responds to the requirement of section 1209 of the Civil War Sites Study Act of 1990 (16 U.S.C. 1a-5 note; Public Law 101–628), that "the Secretary shall ensure that the full diversity of American history and prehistory are represented" in the identification and interpreta-tion of historic properties by the National Park Service; and
 - (B) the thematic framework recognizes that "people are the primary agents of change" and establishes the theme of human population movement and change—or "peopling places"—as a primary thematic category for interpretation and preservation; and
 - (7) although there are approximately 70,000 listings on the National Register of Historic Places, sites associated with the exploration and settlement of the United States by a broad range of cultures are not well represented.
 - (b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are—
 - (1) to foster a much-needed understanding of the diversity and contribution of the breadth of groups who have peopled the United States; and

1	(2) to strengthen the ability of the National
2	Park Service to include groups and events otherwise
3	not recognized in the peopling of the United States.
4	SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.
5	In this Act:
6	(1) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
7	the Secretary of the Interior.
8	(2) Theme study.—The term "theme study"
9	means the national historic landmark theme study
10	required under section 4.
11	SEC. 4. THEME STUDY.
12	(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall prepare and
13	submit to Congress a national historic landmark theme
14	study on the peopling of America.
15	(b) Purpose.—The purpose of the theme study shall
16	be to identify regions, areas, districts, communities, sites,
17	buildings, structures, objects, organizations, societies, and
18	cultures that—
19	(1) best illustrate and commemorate key events
20	or decisions affecting the peopling of America; and
21	(2) can provide a basis for the preservation and
22	interpretation of the peopling of America that has
23	shaped the culture and society of the United States.
24	(e) Identification and Designation of Poten-
25	TIAL NEW NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARKS —

1	(1) In general.—The theme study shall iden-
2	tify and recommend for designation new national
3	historic landmarks.
4	(2) List of appropriate sites.—The theme
5	study shall—
6	(A) include a list in order of importance or
7	merit of the most appropriate sites for national
8	historic landmark designation; and
9	(B) encourage the nomination of other
10	properties to the National Register of Historic
11	Places by assisting members of the public in
12	evaluating sites within their communities and in
13	surrounding areas.
14	(3) Designation.—On the basis of the theme
15	study, the Secretary shall designate new national
16	historic landmarks.
17	(d) National Park System.—
18	(1) Identification of sites within cur-
19	RENT UNITS.—The theme study shall identify appro-
20	priate sites within units of the National Park Sys-
21	tem at which the peopling of America may be inter-
22	preted.
23	(2) Identification of New Sites.—On the
24	basis of the theme study, the Secretary shall rec-
25	ommend to Congress sites for which studies for po-

1	tential inclusion in the National Park System should
2	be authorized.
3	(e) CONTINUING AUTHORITY.—After the date of sub-
4	mission to Congress of the theme study, the Secretary
5	shall, on a continuing basis, as appropriate to interpret
6	the peopling of America—
7	(1) evaluate, identify, and designate new na-
8	tional historic landmarks; and
9	(2) evaluate, identify, and recommend to Con-
10	gress sites for which studies for potential inclusion
11	in the National Park System should be authorized.
12	(f) Public Education and Research.—
13	(1) Linkages.—
14	(A) ESTABLISHMENT.—On the basis of the
15	theme study, the Secretary may identify appro-
16	priate means for establishing linkages—
17	(i) between—
18	(I) regions, areas, districts, com-
19	munities, sites, buildings, structures,
20	objects, organizations, societies, and
21	cultures identified under subsections
22	(b) and (d); and
23	(II) groups of people; and
24	(ii) between—

1	(I) regions, areas, districts, com-
2	munities, sites, buildings, structures,
3	objects, organizations, societies, and
4	cultures identified under subsection
5	(b); and
6	(II) units of the National Park
7	System identified under subsection
8	(d).
9	(B) Purpose.—The purpose of the link-
10	ages shall be to maximize opportunities for pub-
11	lic education and scholarly research on the peo-
12	pling of America.
13	(2) Cooperative arrangements.—On the
14	basis of the theme study, the Secretary shall, subject
15	to the availability of funds, enter into cooperative ar-
16	rangements with State and local governments, edu-
17	cational institutions, local historical organizations,
18	communities, and other appropriate entities to pre-
19	serve and interpret key sites in the peopling of
20	America.
21	(3) Educational initiatives.—
22	(A) IN GENERAL.—The documentation in
23	the theme study shall be used for broad edu-
24	cational initiatives such as—
25	(i) popular publications;

1	(ii) curriculum material such as the
2	Teaching with Historic Places program;
3	(iii) heritage tourism products such as
4	the National Register of Historic Places
5	Travel Itineraries program; and
6	(iv) oral history and ethnographic pro-
7	grams.
8	(B) Cooperative programs.—On the
9	basis of the theme study, the Secretary shall
10	implement cooperative programs to encourage
11	the preservation and interpretation of the peo-
12	pling of America.
13	SEC. 5. COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.
14	The Secretary may enter into cooperative agreements
15	with educational institutions, professional associations, or
16	other entities knowledgeable about the peopling of
17	America—
18	(1) to prepare the theme study;
19	(2) to ensure that the theme study is prepared
20	in accordance with generally accepted scholarly
21	standards; and
22	(3) to promote cooperative arrangements and
23	programs relating to the peopling of America.

1 SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- There are authorized to be appropriated such sums
- 3 as are necessary to carry out this Act.

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
