AN ACT

S.632

To provide assistance for poison prevention and to stabilize the funding of regional poison control centers.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Poison Control Center
- 5 Enhancement and Awareness Act".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

2 Congress makes the following findings:

(1) Each year more than 2,000,000 poisonings
are reported to poison control centers throughout
the United States. More than 90 percent of these
poisonings happen in the home. 53 percent of poisoning victims are children younger than 6 years of
age.

9 (2) Poison control centers are a valuable na-10 tional resource that provide life-saving and cost-ef-11 fective public health services. For every dollar spent 12 on poison control centers, \$7 in medical costs are 13 saved. The average cost of a poisoning exposure call 14 is \$32, while the average cost if other parts of the 15 medical system are involved is \$932. Over the last 16 2 decades, the instability and lack of funding has re-17 sulted in a steady decline in the number of poison 18 control centers in the United States. Within just the 19 last year, 2 poison control centers have been forced 20 to close because of funding problems. A third poison 21 control center is scheduled to close in April 1999. 22 Currently, there are 73 such centers.

(3) Stabilizing the funding structure and increasing accessibility to poison control centers will
increase the number of United States residents who
have access to a certified poison control center, and

reduce the inappropriate use of emergency medical
 services and other more costly health care services.
 SEC. 3. DEFINITION.

4 In this Act, the term "Secretary" means the Sec-5 retary of Health and Human Services.

6 SEC. 4. ESTABLISHMENT OF A NATIONAL TOLL-FREE NUM7 BER.

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall provide co-9 ordination and assistance to regional poison control cen-10 ters for the establishment of a nationwide toll-free phone 11 number to be used to access such centers.

12 (b) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing in this sec-13 tion shall be construed as prohibiting the establishment 14 or continued operation of any privately funded nationwide 15 toll-free phone number used to provide advice and other 16 assistance for poisonings or accidental exposures.

(c) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section,
\$2,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 2000 through
2004. Funds appropriated under this subsection shall not
be used to fund any toll-free phone number described in
subsection (b).

1 SEC. 5. ESTABLISHMENT OF NATIONWIDE MEDIA CAM-2 PAIGN.

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall establish a 4 national media campaign to educate the public and health 5 care providers about poison prevention and the availability 6 of poison control resources in local communities and to 7 conduct advertising campaigns concerning the nationwide 8 toll-free number established under section 4.

9 (b) CONTRACT WITH ENTITY.—The Secretary may 10 carry out subsection (a) by entering into contracts with 11 1 or more nationally recognized media firms for the devel-12 opment and distribution of monthly television, radio, and 13 newspaper public service announcements.

(c) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section,
\$600,000 for each of the fiscal years 2000 through 2004.

17 SEC. 6. ESTABLISHMENT OF A GRANT PROGRAM.

(a) REGIONAL POISON CONTROL CENTERS.—The
Secretary shall award grants to certified regional poison
control centers for the purposes of achieving the financial
stability of such centers, and for preventing and providing
treatment recommendations for poisonings.

(b) OTHER IMPROVEMENTS.—The Secretary shall
also use amounts received under this section to—

25 (1) develop standard education programs;

1	(2) develop standard patient management pro-
2	tocols for commonly encountered toxic exposures;
3	(3) improve and expand the poison control data
4	collection systems;
5	(4) improve national toxic exposure surveillance;
6	and
7	(5) expand the physician/medical toxicologist
8	supervision of poison control centers.
9	(c) CERTIFICATION.—Except as provided in sub-
10	section (d), the Secretary may make a grant to a center
11	under subsection (a) only if—
12	(1) the center has been certified by a profes-
13	sional organization in the field of poison control, and
14	the Secretary has approved the organization as hav-
15	ing in effect standards for certification that reason-
16	ably provide for the protection of the public health
17	with respect to poisoning; or
18	(2) the center has been certified by a State gov-
19	ernment, and the Secretary has approved the State
20	government as having in effect standards for certifi-
21	cation that reasonably provide for the protection of
22	the public health with respect to poisoning.
23	(d) WAIVER OF CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS.—
24	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may grant a
25	waiver of the certification requirement of subsection

(c) with respect to a noncertified poison control cen ter or a newly established center that applies for a
 grant under this section if such center can reason ably demonstrate that the center will obtain such a
 certification within a reasonable period of time as
 determined appropriate by the Secretary.

7 (2) RENEWAL.—The Secretary may only renew
8 a waiver under paragraph (1) for a period of 3
9 years.

(e) SUPPLEMENT NOT SUPPLANT.—Amounts made
available to a poison control center under this section shall
be used to supplement and not supplant other Federal,
State, or local funds provided for such center.

14 (f) MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT.—A poison control 15 center, in utilizing the proceeds of a grant under this sec-16 tion, shall maintain the expenditures of the center for ac-17 tivities of the center at a level that is not less than the 18 level of such expenditures maintained by the center for 19 the fiscal year preceding the fiscal year for which the 20 grant is received.

(g) MATCHING REQUIREMENT.—The Secretary may
impose a matching requirement with respect to amounts
provided under a grant under this section if the Secretary
determines appropriate.

(h) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
 authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section,
 \$25,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 2000 through
 2004.
