Mr. GRAVES submitted the following concurrent resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

- Expressing the sense of the Congress that any reform of the Social Security program not include mandatory coverage of State and local employees.
- Whereas more than 5 million State and local government workers across the United States are exempt from paying Social Security taxes and instead participate in public pension plans outside Social Security;
- Whereas these public pension plans wisely invest the pension assets to obtain the most favorable returns;
- Whereas providing new hires that are forced to participate in Social Security with the same level of benefits as current employees would increase State and local government costs;

- Whereas mandatory coverage would likely result in reduced contributions to the existing public pension plans;
- Whereas reduced contributions to the current plans could adversely affect the return of the plan for current employees; and
- Whereas these State and local government employees deserve to be secure in the knowledge that their coverage will not be affected against their will by Social Security reform measures: Now, therefore, be it
 - 1 Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate 2 concurring), That no Social Security reform plan favorably 3 considered by the Congress should cause State and local 4 government employees covered under public pensions to be 5 forced into coverage under the old-age, survivors, and dis-6 ability insurance program under title II of the Social Secu-7 rity Act.
