A BILL

- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- This Act may be cited as the "Liberty Bill Act".

- 2 The Congress finds as follows:
- 3 (1) Many Americans are unaware of the provi-4 sions of the Constitution of the United States, one 5 of the most remarkable and important documents in 6 world history.
 - (2) An abbreviated version of this important document, consisting of the preamble, a list of the Articles, and a list of the Articles of Amendment, could easily be placed on the reverse side of all Federal reserve notes.
 - (3) The placement of an abbreviated version of the Constitution on all Federal reserve notes would serve to remind people of the historical importance of the Constitution and its impact on their lives today.
 - (4) Americans would be reminded by the preamble of the blessings of liberty; by the Articles, of the framework of the Government; and by the Articles of Amendment, of the historical changes to the document that forms the very core of the American experience.

3 SEC. 3. REDESIGN OF REVERSE SIDE OF FEDERAL RE-2 SERVE NOTES. 3 (a) In General.—Section 5114 of title 31, United States Code, is amended by adding at the end the fol-4 5 lowing new subsection: 6 "(d) Liberty Bills.— 7 "(1) IN GENERAL.—In addition to the require-8 ments of subsection (b) (relating to the inclusion of 9 the inscription 'In God We Trust' on all United 10 States currency) and the 8th undesignated para-11 graph of section 16 of the Federal Reserve Act, the 12 design of the reverse side of all Federal reserve 13 notes shall incorporate the preamble to the Constitu-14 tion of the United States, a list describing the Arti-15 cles of the Constitution, and a list describing the Ar-16 ticles of Amendment.

"(2) Design.—Subject to paragraph (3), the preamble to the Constitution of the United States and the list describing the Articles of the Constitution shall appear on the reverse side of all Federal reserve notes in the following format (shown as it would appear on the \$1 Federal reserve note):

"(3) AUTHORITY OF SECRETARY.—The require-1 ments of this subsection shall not be construed as— 2 "(A) prohibiting the inclusion of any other 3 4 inscriptions or material on the reverse side of 5 Federal reserve notes which the Secretary may 6 determine to be necessary or appropriate; or 7 "(B) limiting any other authority of the 8 Secretary with regard to the design of Federal 9 reserve notes, including the adoption of any de-10 sign features to deter the counterfeiting of 11 United States currency.". 12 (b) Date of Application.—The amendment made 13 by subsection (a) shall apply to all Federal reserve notes which are first placed into circulation after December 31,
