Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Long Walk National5 Historic Trail Study Act".

#### 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 Congress finds the following:

8 (1) Beginning in the fall of 1863 and ending in 9 the winter of 1864, the United States Government 10 forced thousands of Navajos and Mescalero Apaches 11 to relocate from their ancestral lands to Fort Sum-12 ner, New Mexico, where the tribal members were 13 held captive, virtually as prisoners of war, for over 14 4 years.

(2) Thousands of Native Americans died at
Fort Sumner from starvation, malnutrition, disease,
exposure, or conflicts between the tribes and United
States military personnel.

### 19 SEC. 3. DESIGNATION FOR STUDY.

Section 5(c) of the National Trails System Act (16
U.S.C. 1244(c)) is amended by adding at the end the following new paragraph:

23 "(\_\_\_\_) The Long Walk Trail, a series of routes
24 which the Navajo and Mescalero Apache Indian tribes
25 were forced to walk beginning in the fall of 1863 as a

result of their removal by the United States Government
 from their ancestral lands, generally located within a cor ridor extending through portions of Canyon de Chelley,
 Arizona, and Albuquerque, Canyon Blanco, Anton Chico,
 Canyon Piedra Pintado, and Fort Sumner, New Mexico.".

Passed the House of Representatives October 2, 2001.
