A BILL

To authorize appropriations for the Coast Guard for fiscal year 2002.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	$tives\ of\ the\ United\ States\ of\ America\ in\ Congress\ assembled,$
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Coast Guard Author-
5	ization Act of 2001".
6	SEC. 2. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
7	Funds are authorized to be appropriated for fiscal
8	year 2002 for necessary expenses of the Coast Guard, as
9	follows:
10	(1) For the operation and maintenance of the
11	Coast Guard, \$3,682,838,000, of which—
12	(A) $$25,000,000$ shall be derived from the
13	Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund to carry out the
14	purposes of section 1012(a)(5) of the Oil Pollu-
15	tion Act of 1990; and
16	(B) $$5,500,000$ shall be available for the
17	commercial fishing vessel safety program.
18	(2) For the acquisition, construction, rebuild-
19	ing, and improvement of aids to navigation, shore
20	and offshore facilities, vessels, and aircraft, includ-
21	ing equipment related thereto, \$659,323,000, of
22	which—
23	(A) $$20,000,000$ shall be derived from the
24	Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund to carry out the

- purposes of section 1012(a)(5) of the Oil Pollution Act of 1990; and
- 3 (B) not less than \$338,000,000 shall be 4 available to the Coast Guard only to implement 5 the Coast Guard's Integrated Deepwater Sys-6 tem.
 - (3) For research, development, test, and evaluation of technologies, materials, and human factors directly relating to improving the performance of the Coast Guard's mission in support of search and rescue, aids to navigation, marine safety, marine environmental protection, enforcement of laws and treaties, ice operations, oceanographic research, and defense readiness, \$21,722,000, to remain available until expended, of which \$3,500,000 shall be derived each fiscal year from the Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund to carry out the purposes of section 1012(a)(5) of the Oil Pollution Act of 1990.
 - (4) For retired pay (including the payment of obligations otherwise chargeable to lapsed appropriations for this purpose), payments under the Retired Serviceman's Family Protection and Survivor Benefit Plans, and payments for medical care of retired personnel and their dependents under chapter 55 of title 10, United States Code, \$876,346,000.

1	(5) For alteration or removal of bridges over
2	navigable waters of the United States constituting
3	obstructions to navigation, and for personnel and
4	administrative costs associated with the Bridge Al-
5	teration Program, \$15,466,000, to remain available
6	until expended.
7	(6) For environmental compliance and restora-
8	tion at Coast Guard facilities (other than parts and
9	equipment associated with operations and mainte-
10	nance), \$16,927,000, to remain available until ex-
11	pended.
