AN ACT

4 SEC. 1301. (a) CADET PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT 5 CENTER.—Notwithstanding section 138 of the Military Construction Appropriations Act, 2001 (division A of Pub-6 7 lie Law 106–246; 114 Stat. 524), the Secretary of the 8 Army may expend appropriated funds in excess of the 9 amount specified by such section to construct and renovate 10 the Cadet Physical Development Center at the United States Military Academy, except that— 11

12 (1) such additional expenditures may be used 13 only for the purposes of meeting unanticipated price 14 increases and related construction contingency costs 15 and making minor changes to the project to incor-16 porate design features that result in reducing long-17 term operating costs; and

18 (2) such additional expenditures may not exceed 19 the difference between the authorized amount for 20 the project and the amount specified in such section. 21 (b) LIMITATIONS AND REPORTS.—No sums may be 22 expended for final phase construction of the project until 23 15 days after the Secretary of the Army submits a report 24 to the congressional defense committees describing the re-25 vised cost estimates referred to in subsection (a), the

methodology used in making these cost estimates, and the 1 changes in project costs compared to estimates made in 2 October, 2000. Not later than August 1, 2001, the Sec-3 retary of the Army shall submit a report to the congres-4 5 sional defense committees explaining the plan of the Department of the Army to expend privately donated funds 6 7 for eapital improvements at the United States Military 8 Academy between fiscal years 2001 and 2011.

9 SEC. 1302. Except as otherwise specifically provided 10 in this Chapter, amounts provided to the Department of 11 Defense under each of the headings in this Chapter shall 12 be made available for the same time period as the amounts 13 appropriated under each such heading in Public Law 106– 14 246.

6 COMMISSION. There are hereby appropriated, out of any
7 funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,
8 \$1,700,000, to remain available until expended, to the
9 United States-China Security Review Commission.

10 SEC. 3003. DESIGNATION OF ENGINEERING AND MAN-11 AGEMENT BUILDING AT NORFOLK NAVAL SHIPYARD, VIR-GINIA, AFTER NORMAN SISISKY. The engineering and man-12 agement building (also known as Building 1500) at Norfolk 13 Naval Shipyard, Portsmouth, Virginia, shall be known as 14 15 the Norman Sisisky Engineering and Management Building. Any reference to that building in any law, regulation, 16 map, document, record, or other paper of the United States 17 shall be considered to be a reference to the Norman Sisisky 18 Engineering and Management Building. 19
