AN ACT

1 REVOLVING AND MANAGEMENT FUNDS

2 DEFENSE WORKING CAPITAL FUNDS

3 For an additional amount for “Defense Working
4 Capital Funds”, \$178,400,000, to remain available until
5 expended.

6 OTHER DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE PROGRAMS

7 DEFENSE HEALTH PROGRAM

8 For an additional amount for “Defense Health Pro-
9 gram”, \$1,453,400,000 for Operation and maintenance:
10 *Provided*, That such funds may be used to cover increases
11 in TRICARE contract costs associated with the provision
12 of health care services to eligible beneficiaries of all the
13 uniformed services.

14 For an additional amount for “Defense Health Pro-
15 gram”, \$200,000,000 for Operation and maintenance, to
16 remain available until expended, only for the use of the
17 Army, Navy, and Air Force Surgeons General to improve
18 the quality of care provided at military treatment facili-
19 ties, of which \$50,000,000 shall be available only to opti-
20 mize health care services at Army military treatment fa-
21 cilities, \$50,000,000 shall be available only to optimize
22 health care services at Navy military treatment facilities,

6 service determines that: (1) such project or activity shall
7 be self-financing within not more than 3 years of its initi-
8 ation after which time the project or activity will require
9 no net increase in Defense Health Program funds; or (2)
10 that such project or activity is necessary to address a seri-
11 ous health care deficiency at a military treatment facility
12 that could threaten health care outcomes: *Provided fur-*
13 *ther*, That none of the funds provided in this paragraph
14 may be made available to a service unless the Secretary
15 of Defense certifies to the congressional defense commit-
16 tees that all projects or activities to be financed by that
17 service with said funds will be continued and adequately
18 financed in the Department of Defense six year budget
19 plan known as the Program Objective Memorandum.

20 DRUG INTERDICTION AND COUNTER-DRUG ACTIVITIES,
21 DEFENSE

22 For an additional amount for “Drug Interdiction and
23 Counter-Drug Activities, Defense”, \$1,900,000.

1 GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS CHAPTER

2 SEC. 1101. Except as otherwise specifically provided
3 in this Act, amounts provided to the Department of De-
4 fense under each of the headings in this chapter shall be
5 available for the same period as the amounts appropriated
6 under each such heading in the Department of Defense
7 Appropriations Act, 2001 (Public Law 106–259).

8 SEC. 1102. Funds appropriated by this Act, or made
9 available by the transfer of funds in this Act, for intel-
10 ligence activities are deemed to be specifically authorized
11 by the Congress for purposes of section 504 of the Na-
12 tional Security Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 414).

13 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

14 SEC. 1103. In addition to the amount appropriated
15 in section 308 of Division A, Miscellaneous Appropriations
16 Act, 2001, as enacted by section 1(a)(4) of Public Law
17 106–554 (114 Stat. 2763A–181 and 182), \$44,000,000
18 is hereby appropriated for “Operation and Maintenance,
19 Navy”, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That
20 such amount, and the amount previously appropriated in
21 section 308, shall be for costs associated with the stabiliza-
22 tion, return, refitting, necessary force protection upgrades,
23 and repair of the U.S.S. COLE, including any costs pre-
24 viously incurred for such purposes: *Provided further*, That
25 the Secretary of Defense may transfer these funds to ap-
26 propriations accounts for procurement: *Provided further*,

1 That the funds transferred shall be merged with and shall
 2 be available for the same purposes and for the same time
 3 period as the appropriations to which transferred: *Pro-*
 4 *vided further*, That the transfer authority provided herein
 5 is in addition to any other transfer authority available to
 6 the Department of Defense: *Provided further*, That the en-
 7 tire amount made available in this section is designated
 8 by the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant
 9 to section 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced Budget and
 10 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

18 MILITARY CONSTRUCTION, ARMY

19 For an additional amount for “Military Construction,
20 Army”, \$67,400,000: *Provided*, That notwithstanding any
21 other provision of law, such funds may be obligated or ex-
22 pended to carry out planning and design and military con-
23 struction projects not otherwise authorized by law.

1 MILITARY CONSTRUCTION, NAVY

2 For an additional amount for “Military Construction,
3 Navy”, \$10,500,000: *Provided*, That notwithstanding any
4 other provision of law, such funds may be obligated or ex-
5 pended to carry out planning and design and military con-
6 struction projects not otherwise authorized by law.

7 MILITARY CONSTRUCTION, AIR FORCE

8 For an additional amount for “Military Construction,
9 Air Force”, \$8,000,000: *Provided*, That notwithstanding
10 any other provision of law, such funds may be obligated
11 or expended to carry out planning and design and military
12 construction projects not otherwise authorized by law.

13 FAMILY HOUSING, ARMY

14 For an additional amount for “Family Housing,
15 Army”, \$29,480,000 for operation and maintenance.

16 FAMILY HOUSING, NAVY AND MARINE CORPS

17 For an additional amount for “Family Housing,
18 Navy and Marine Corps”, \$20,300,000 for operation and
19 maintenance.

20 FAMILY HOUSING, AIR FORCE

21 For an additional amount for “Family Housing, Air
22 Force”, \$18,000,000 for operation and maintenance.

24 For an additional amount for deposit into the “De-

3 GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS CHAPTER

4 SEC. 1301. (a) CADET PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT
5 CENTER.—Notwithstanding section 138 of the Military
6 Construction Appropriations Act, 2001 (division A of Pub-
7 lic Law 106-246; 114 Stat. 524), the Secretary of the
8 Army may expend appropriated funds in excess of the
9 amount specified by such section to construct and renovate
10 the Cadet Physical Development Center at the United
11 States Military Academy, except that—

12 (1) such additional expenditures may be used
13 only for the purposes of meeting unanticipated price
14 increases and related construction contingency costs
15 and making minor changes to the project to incor-
16 porate design features that result in reducing long-
17 term operating costs; and

18 (2) such additional expenditures may not exceed
19 the difference between the authorized amount for
20 the project and the amount specified in such section.

21 (b) LIMITATIONS AND REPORTS.—No sums may be
22 expended for final phase construction of the project until
23 15 days after the Secretary of the Army submits a report
24 to the congressional defense committees describing the re-
25 vised cost estimates referred to in subsection (a); the

1 allocated as follows: \$1,000,000 for the implementation of
2 the New E-Conomy Transformation Act of 2000 (D.C.
3 Act 13-543); and \$625,000 for the Department of Con-
4 sumer and Regulatory Affairs to carry out the purposes
5 of D.C. Code, sec. 5-513: *Provided*, That the fees estab-
6 lished and collected pursuant to Bill 13-646 shall be iden-
7 tified, and an accounting provided, to the Committee on
8 Consumer and Regulatory Affairs of the Council of the
9 District of Columbia.

10 PUBLIC SAFETY AND JUSTICE

11 (INCLUDING RESCISSION)

12 For an additional amount for “Public Safety and
13 Justice”, \$8,901,000 from local funds to be allocated as
14 follows: \$2,800,000 is for the Metropolitan Police Depart-
15 ment of which \$800,000 is for the speed camera program
16 and \$2,000,000 is for the Fraternal Order of Police arbi-
17 tration award and the Fair Labor Standards Act liability;
18 \$5,940,000 is for the Fire and Emergency Medical Serv-
19 ices Department of which \$5,540,000 is for pre-tax pay-
20 ments for pension, health and life insurance premiums and
21 \$400,000 is for the fifth fire fighter on trucks initiative;
22 and \$161,000 is for the Child Fatality Review Committee
23 established pursuant to the Child Fatality Review Com-
24 mittee Establishment Emergency Act of 2001 (D.C. Act

1 ~~14-40)~~ and the Child Fatality Review Committee Estab-
2 ~~lishment Temporary Act of 2001 (D.C. Bill 14-165).~~

3 Of the funds appropriated under this heading in the
4 District of Columbia Appropriations Act, 2001, approved
5 November 22, 2000 (Public Law 106-522), \$131,000 for
6 Taxicab Inspectors is rescinded.

7 PUBLIC EDUCATION SYSTEM

8 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

9 For an additional amount for “Public Education Sys-
10 tem”, \$14,000,000, of which \$250,000 shall be derived by
11 transfer from the amount provided under the heading
12 “Federal Payment for Plan To Simplify Employee Com-
13 pensation Systems” in the District of Columbia Appro-
14 priations Act, 2001 (Public Law 106-522; 114 Stat.
15 2444) and \$13,750,000 from local funds, to be allocated
16 as follows: \$12,000,000 from local funds for the District
17 of Columbia Public Schools to conduct the 2001 summer
18 school program; \$1,000,000 from local funds for the State
19 Education Office for a census-type audit of the student
20 enrollment of each District of Columbia Public School and
21 of each public charter school; and \$1,000,000, of which
22 \$250,000 shall be from the funds transferred earlier in
23 this paragraph and \$750,000 from local funds, for the
24 Excel Institute Adult Education Program: *Provided*, That
25 section 108(b) of the District of Columbia Public Edu-

1 ection Act, Public Law 89–791 as amended (D.C. Code,
 2 sec. 31–1408), is amended by adding at the end of the
 3 paragraph the following: “In addition, any proceeds and
 4 interest accruing thereon, which remain from the sale of
 5 the former radio station WDCU in an escrow account of
 6 the District of Columbia Financial Management and As-
 7 sistance Authority for the benefit of the University of the
 8 District of Columbia, shall be used for the University of
 9 the District of Columbia’s Endowment Fund, and such
 10 proceeds may be invested in equity based securities if ap-
 11 proved by the Chief Financial Officer of the District of
 12 Columbia.”.

13 HUMAN SUPPORT SERVICES

14 For an additional amount for “Human Support Serv-
 15 ices”, \$28,000,000 from local funds to be allocated as fol-
 16 lows: \$15,000,000 for expansion of the Medicaid program;
 17 \$4,000,000 to increase the local share for Dispropor-
 18 tionate Share to Hospitals (DSH) payments; \$3,000,000
 19 for the Disability Compensation Fund; \$1,000,000 for the
 20 Office of Latino Affairs for Latino Community Education
 21 grants; and \$5,000,000 for the Children Investment
 22 Trust.

23 PUBLIC WORKS

24 For an additional amount for “Public Works”,
 25 \$131,000 from local funds for Taxicab Inspectors.

1 WORKFORCE INVESTMENTS

2 For expenses associated with the workforce invest-
3 ments program, \$40,500,000 from local funds.

4 WILSON BUILDING

5 For an additional amount for “Wilson Building”,
6 \$7,100,000 from local funds.

7 ENTERPRISE AND OTHER FUNDS

8 WATER AND SEWER AUTHORITY AND THE WASHINGTON
9 AQUEDUCT

10 For an additional amount for “Water and Sewer Au-
11 thority and the Washington Aqueduct”, \$2,151,000 from
12 local funds for the Water and Sewer Authority for initia-
13 tives associated with complying with stormwater legisla-
14 tion and proposed right-of-way fees.

15 CHAPTER 3

16 DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE—CIVIL

17 DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY

18 CORPS OF ENGINEERS—CIVIL

19 FLOOD CONTROL, MISSISSIPPI RIVER AND TRIBUTARIES,
20 ARKANSAS, ILLINOIS, KENTUCKY, LOUISIANA, MIS-
21 SISSIPPI, MISSOURI, AND TENNESSEE

22 For an additional amount for “Flood Control, Mis-
23 sissippi River and Tributaries, Arkansas, Illinois, Ken-
24 tucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, and Tennessee”,
25 for emergency expenses due to flooding and other natural

1 disasters, \$18,000,000, to remain available until ex-
2 pended: *Provided*, That the entire amount is designated
3 by the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant
4 to section 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced Budget and
5 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

6 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, GENERAL

7 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-
8 tenance, General”, for emergency expenses due to flooding
9 and other natural disasters, \$115,500,000, to remain
10 available until expended: *Provided*, That the entire amount
11 is designated by the Congress as an emergency require-
12 ment pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced
13 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as
14 amended: *Provided further*, That using \$1,900,000 of the
15 funds appropriated herein, the Secretary of the Army, act-
16 ing through the Chief of Engineers, is directed to under-
17 take the project authorized by section 518 of Public Law
18 106-53, at full Federal expense.

19 FLOOD CONTROL AND COASTAL EMERGENCIES

20 For expenses necessary for emergency flood control,
21 hurricane, and shore protection activities, as authorized
22 by section 5 of the Flood Control Act of August 18, 1941,
23 as amended, \$50,000,000, to remain available until ex-
24 pended: *Provided*, That the entire amount is designated
25 by the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant

1 to section 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced Budget and
2 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

3 DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY

4 ENERGY PROGRAMS

5 NON-DEFENSE ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

6 For an additional amount for “Non-Defense Environ-
7 mental Management”, \$11,950,000, to remain available
8 until expended.

9 URANIUM FACILITIES MAINTENANCE AND REMEDIATION

10 For an additional amount for “Uranium Facilities
11 Maintenance and Remediation”, \$18,000,000, to be de-
12 rived from the Uranium Enrichment Decontamination and
13 Decommissioning Fund, to remain available until ex-
14 pended.

15 POWER MARKETING ADMINISTRATIONS

16 CONSTRUCTION, REHABILITATION, OPERATION AND
17 MAINTENANCE, WESTERN AREA POWER ADMINIS-
18 TRATION

19 For an additional amount for “Construction, Reha-
20 bilitation, Operation and Maintenance, Western Area
21 Power Administration”, \$1,578,000, to remain available
22 until expended: *Provided*, That these funds shall be non-
23 reimbursable.

1 GENERAL PROVISION—THIS CHAPTER

2 SEC. 2301. Of the amounts appropriated under the
3 heading “Operation and Maintenance, General” under
4 title I of the Energy and Water Appropriations Act, 2001
5 (enacted by Public Law 106–377; 114 Stat. 1441 A–62),
6 the \$500,000 made available for the Chickamauga Lock,
7 Tennessee, shall be available for completion of the feasi-
8 bility study for Chickamauga Lock, Tennessee.

9 SEC. 2302. The amounts otherwise provided by this
10 Act for “National Nuclear Security Administration—
11 Weapons Activities” are reduced by \$23,700,000. For an
12 additional amount for “Corps of Engineers—Civil—Oper-
13 ation and Maintenance, General”, \$23,700,000, to remain
14 available until expended.

15 CHAPTER 4

16 DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

17 BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS

18 OPERATION OF INDIAN PROGRAMS

19 For an additional amount for “Operation of Indian
20 Programs”, \$50,000,000, to remain available until Sep-
21 tember 30, 2002, for electric power operations at the San
22 Carlos Irrigation Project, of which such amounts as nec-
23 essary may be transferred to other appropriations ac-
24 counts for repayment of advances previously made for
25 such power operations: *Provided*, That the entire amount

1 is designated by the Congress as an emergency require-
2 ment pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced
3 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as
4 amended.

5 UNITED STATES FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE
6 CONSTRUCTION

7 For an additional amount for “Construction”,
8 \$17,700,000, to remain available until expended, to repair
9 damages caused by floods, ice storms, and earthquakes in
10 the States of Washington, Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Mis-
11 souri, Wisconsin, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas: *Pro-*
12 *vided*, That the entire amount is designated by the Con-
13 gress as an emergency requirement pursuant to section
14 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
15 Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

16 NATIONAL PARK SERVICE

17 UNITED STATES PARK POLICE

18 For an additional amount for “United States Park
19 Police”, \$1,700,000, to remain available until September
20 30, 2002, for unbudgeted increases in pension costs for
21 retired United States Park Police officers.

1 WILDLAND FIRE MANAGEMENT

2 For an additional amount for “Wildland Fire Man-
