A BILL

To establish the Benjamin Franklin Tercentenary Commission.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be referred to as the "Benjamin Frank-
- 5 lin Tercentenary Commission Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 The Congress finds as follows:

- (1) Benjamin Franklin was one of the most extraordinary men of the generation that founded the United States. Around the world, he remains one of the best-known Americans who has ever lived.
 - (2) Benjamin Franklin's achievements include his literary work, his creation of philanthropic and educational institutions, his significant scientific explorations, and his service to the Nation as a statesman and diplomat.
 - (3) Benjamin Franklin was the only American to sign all 5 enabling documents of the United States.
 - (4) All people in the United States could benefit from studying the life of Benjamin Franklin and gaining a deeper appreciation of his legacy to the Nation.
 - (5) January 17, 2006 is the 300th anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin, and a commission should be established to study and recommend to the Congress activities that are fitting and proper to celebrate that anniversary in a manner that appropriately honors Benjamin Franklin.

1 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT.

2	There is established a commission to be known as the
3	Benjamin Franklin Tercentenary Commission (referred to
4	in this Act as the "Commission").
5	SEC. 4. DUTIES.
6	(a) Study.—The Commission shall have the fol-
7	lowing duties:
8	(1) To study activities by the Government that
9	would be fitting and proper to honor Benjamin
10	Franklin on the occasion of the tercentenary of his
11	birth, including the following:
12	(A) The minting of a Benjamin Franklin
13	tercentenary coin.
14	(B) The issuance of a Benjamin Franklin
15	tercentenary postage stamp.
16	(C) The convening of a joint meeting or
17	joint session of the Congress for ceremonies and
18	activities commemorating Benjamin Franklin.
19	(D) The rededication of the Benjamin
20	Franklin National Memorial at the Franklin In-
21	stitute in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, or other
22	activities with respect to that memorial.
23	(E) The acquisition and preservation of ar-
24	tifacts associated with Benjamin Franklin.

1	(F) The sponsorship of publications, in-
2	cluding catalogs and scholarly work, concerning
3	Benjamin Franklin.
4	(G) The sponsorship of conferences, exhibi-
5	tions, or other public meetings concerning Ben-
6	jamin Franklin.
7	(H) The sponsorship of high school and
8	collegiate essay contests concerning the life and
9	legacy of Benjamin Franklin.
10	(2) To recommend to the Congress in one or
11	more interim reports submitted under section 9(a)—
12	(A) the activities that the Commission con-
13	siders most fitting and proper to honor Ben-
14	jamin Franklin on the occasion of the tercente-
15	nary of his birth; and
16	(B) the entity or entities in the Federal
17	Government that the Commission considers
18	most appropriate to carry out such activities.
19	(b) Point of Contact.—The Commission, acting
20	through its secretariat, shall serve as the point of contact
21	of the Government for all State, local, international, and
22	private sector initiatives regarding the tercentenary of
23	Benjamin Franklin's birth, with the purpose of coordi-
24	nating and facilitating all fitting and proper activities hon-
25	oring Benjamin Franklin.

1 SEC. 5. MEMBERSHIP.

2	(a) Number and Appointment.—The Commission
3	shall be composed of 15 members as follows:
4	(1) The Librarian of Congress.
5	(2) 14 qualified citizens, appointed as follows:
6	(A) 2 members appointed by the President.
7	(B) 2 members appointed by the President
8	on the recommendation of the Governor of the
9	Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
10	(C) 2 members appointed by the President
11	on the recommendation of the Governor of the
12	Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
13	(D) 2 members, at least 1 of whom shall
14	be a Senator, appointed by the majority leader
15	of the Senate.
16	(E) 2 members, at least 1 of whom shall
17	be a Senator, appointed by the minority leader
18	of the Senate.
19	(F) 2 members, at least 1 of whom shall
20	be a Member of the House of Representatives,
21	appointed by the Speaker of the House of Rep-
22	resentatives.
23	(G) 2 members, at least 1 of whom shall
24	be a Member of the House of Representatives,
25	appointed by the minority leader of the House
26	of Representatives.

- 1 (b) QUALIFIED CITIZEN.—For purposes of this sec-
- 2 tion, a qualified citizen is a citizen of the United States
- 3 with—
- 4 (1) a substantial knowledge and appreciation of
- 5 the work and legacy of Benjamin Franklin; and
- 6 (2) a commitment to educating people in the
- 7 United States about the historical importance of
- 8 Benjamin Franklin.
- 9 (c) Time of Appointment.—Each initial appoint-
- 10 ment of a member of the Commission shall be made before
- 11 the expiration of the 120-day period beginning on the date
- 12 of the enactment of this Act.
- 13 (d) Continuation of Membership.—If a member
- 14 of the Commission was appointed to the Commission as
- 15 a Member of the Congress, and ceases to be a Member
- 16 of the Congress, that member may continue to serve on
- 17 the Commission for not longer than the 30-day period be-
- 18 ginning on the date on which that member ceases to be
- 19 a Member of the Congress.
- 20 (e) Terms.—Each member shall be appointed for the
- 21 life of the Commission.
- 22 (f) Vacancies.—A vacancy in the Commission shall
- 23 not affect the powers of the Commission and shall be filled
- 24 in the manner in which the original appointment was
- 25 made.

- (g) Basic Pay.—Members shall serve on the Commission without pay.
 (h) Travel Expenses.—Each member shall receive
- 5 (II) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—Each member shan receive
- 4 travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence,
- 5 in accordance with applicable provisions under subchapter
- 6 I of chapter 57 of title 5, United States Code.
- 7 (i) Quorum.—5 members of the Commission shall
- 8 constitute a quorum, but a lesser number may hold hear-
- 9 ings.
- 10 (j) Chair.—The Commission shall select a Chair
- 11 from among the members of the Commission.
- 12 (k) Meetings.—The Commission shall meet at the
- 13 call of the Chair.
- 14 SEC. 6. ORGANIZATION.
- 15 (a) Honorary Members.—The President—
- 16 (1) shall serve as an honorary, nonvoting mem-
- ber of the Commission; and
- 18 (2) shall invite the President of France and the
- 19 Prime Minister of the United Kingdom to serve as
- 20 honorary, nonvoting members of the Commission.
- 21 (b) Advisory Committee.—The Commission shall
- 22 form an advisory committee, to be composed of represent-
- 23 atives of the major extant institutions founded by or dedi-
- 24 cated to Benjamin Franklin, including the following:

1	(1) The Executive Director of the American
2	Philosophical Society.
3	(2) The President of the Franklin Institute.
4	(3) The Librarian of the Library Company.
5	(4) The Director and Chief Executive Officer of
6	the Philadelphia Museum of Art.
7	(5) The President of the University of Pennsyl-
8	vania.
9	(c) Administrative Secretariat.—The Commis-
10	sion shall seek to enter into an arrangement with the
11	Franklin Institute of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, under
12	which the Institute shall do the following:
13	(1) Serve as the secretariat of the Commission,
14	including by serving as the point of contact under
15	section 4(b).
16	(2) House the administrative offices of the
17	Commission.
18	SEC. 7. POWERS.
19	(a) Hearings and Sessions.—The Commission
20	may, for the purpose of carrying out this Act, hold such
21	hearings, sit and act at such times and places, take such
22	testimony, and receive such evidence as the Commission
23	considers appropriate.
24	(b) Powers of Members and Agents.—Any mem-
25	ber or agent of the Commission may, if authorized by the

- 1 Commission, take any action that the Commission is au-
- 2 thorized to take by this Act.
- 3 (c) Obtaining Official Data.—The Commission
- 4 may secure directly from any department or agency of the
- 5 United States information necessary to enable the Com-
- 6 mission to carry out this Act. Upon request of the Chair
- 7 of the Commission, the head of that department or agency
- 8 shall furnish that information to the Commission.
- 9 (d) Mails.—The Commission may use the United
- 10 States mails in the same manner and under the same con-
- 11 ditions as other departments and agencies of the United
- 12 States.
- 13 (e) Administrative Support Services.—Upon
- 14 the request of the Commission, the Administrator of Gen-
- 15 eral Services shall provide to the Commission, on a reim-
- 16 bursable basis, the administrative support services nec-
- 17 essary for the Commission to carry out its responsibilities
- 18 under this Act.
- 19 (f) Procurement.—The Commission may enter into
- 20 contracts for supplies, services, and facilities to carry out
- 21 the Commission's duties under this Act.
- 22 (g) Donations.—The Commission may accept and
- 23 use donations of—
- 24 (1) money;
- 25 (2) personal services; and

- 1 (3) real or personal property related to Ben-2 jamin Franklin or the occasion of the tercentenary 3 of his birth.
- 4 SEC. 8. DIRECTOR AND STAFF.

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- 5 (a) APPOINTMENT.—The Commission may appoint a
 6 Director and such additional personnel as the Commission
 7 considers to be appropriate.
- 8 (b) Applicability of Certain Civil Service 9 Laws.—
 - (1) DIRECTOR.—The Director of the Commission may be appointed without regard to the provisions of title 5, United States Code, governing appointments in the competitive service, and may be paid without regard to the provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of that title relating to classification and General Schedule pay rates.
 - (2) STAFF.—The staff of the Commission shall be appointed subject to the provisions of title 5, United States Code, governing appointments in the competitive service, and shall be paid in accordance with the provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of that title relating to classification and General Schedule pay rates.

SEC. 9. REPORTS.

- 2 (a) Interim Reports.—The Commission shall sub-
- 3 mit to the Congress such interim reports as the Commis-
- 4 sion considers to be appropriate.
- 5 (b) Final Report.—The Commission shall submit
- 6 a final report to the Congress not later than January 16,
- 7 2007. The final report shall contain—
- 8 (1) a detailed statement of the activities of the
- 9 Commission; and
- 10 (2) any other information that the Commission
- 11 considers to be appropriate.
- 12 SEC. 10. TERMINATION.
- The Commission shall terminate 120 days after sub-
- 14 mitting its final report pursuant to section 9(b).
- 15 SEC. 11. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
- There are authorized to be appropriated such sums
- 17 as may be necessary to carry out this Act.

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
