A BILL

- To direct the Secretary of the Interior to conduct a study of the suitability and feasibility of establishing the Muscle Shoals National Heritage Area in Alabama, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Muscle Shoals Na-5 tional Heritage Area Study Act of 2001".

6 SEC. 2. STUDY.

7 The Secretary of the Interior, in consultation with8 appropriate State historic preservation officers, States his-

torical societies, and other appropriate organizations, shall
 conduct a study regarding the suitability and feasibility
 of designating the study area described in section 3 as
 the Muscle Shoals National Heritage Area. The study
 shall include analysis, documentation, and determination
 regarding whether the study area—

7 (1) has an assemblage of natural, historic, and 8 cultural resources that together represent distinctive 9 aspects of American heritage worthy of recognition, 10 conservation, interpretation, and continuing use, and 11 are best managed through partnerships among pub-12 lic and private entities and by combining diverse and 13 sometimes noncontiguous resources and active com-14 munities;

(2) reflects traditions, customs, beliefs, andfolklife that are a valuable part of the national story;

17 (3) provides outstanding opportunities to con-18 serve natural, historic, cultural, or scenic features;

(4) provides outstanding recreational and edu-cational opportunities;

(5) contains resources important to the identified theme or themes of the study area that retain
a degree of integrity capable of supporting interpretation;

1	(6) includes residents, business interests, non-
2	profit organizations, and local and State govern-
3	ments that are involved in the planning, have devel-
4	oped a conceptual financial plan that outlines the
5	roles of all participants (including the Federal Gov-
6	ernment), and have demonstrated support for the
7	concept of a national heritage area;
8	(7) has a potential management entity to work
9	in partnership with residents, business interests,
10	nonprofit organizations, and local and State govern-
11	ments to develop a national heritage area consistent
12	with continued local and State economic activity;
13	and
14	(8) has a conceptual boundary map that is sup-
15	ported by the public.
16	SEC. 3. BOUNDARIES OF THE STUDY AREA.
17	The study area referred to in section 2 shall be com-
18	prised of the following:
19	(1) The part of the Tennessee River's water-
20	shed in northern Alabama.
21	(2) The cities of Florence, Sheffield,
22	Tuscumbia, and Muscle Shoals City, Alabama.
23	(3) The towns of Anderson, Cherokee,
24	Courtland, Leighton, Lexington, Littleville, Red

Bay, Rogersville, Russellville, Town Creek, and Wa-1 2 terloo, Alabama, and their environs. 3 (4) Colbert, Lauderdale, Franklin, and Law-4 rence Counties, Alabama. (5) Other areas that have heritage aspects that 5 6 are similar to those aspects that are in the areas described in paragraphs (1) through (4) and which are 7 8 adjacent to or in the vicinity of those areas. 9 SEC. 4. REPORT.

10 Not later than 3 fiscal years after the date on which 11 funds are first made available for this Act, the Secretary 12 of the Interior shall submit to the Committee on Resources 13 of the House of Representatives and the Committee on 14 Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate a report on 15 the findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the 16 study.
