AN ACT

To provide compensation for the United States citizens who were victims of the bombings of United States embassies in East Africa on August 7, 1998, on the same basis as compensation is provided to victims of the terroristrelated aircraft crashes on September 11, 2001. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Embassy Employee5 Compensation Act".

6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

7 In this Act, the following definitions apply:

8 (1) CLAIMANT.—The term "claimant" means
9 an individual filing a claim for compensation under
10 section 5(a)(1).

(2) COLLATERAL SOURCE.—The term "collateral source" means all collateral sources, including
life insurance, pension funds, death benefit programs, and payments by Federal, State, or local
governments related to the bombings of United
States embassies in East Africa on August 7, 1998.

17 ECONOMIC LOSS.—The term "economic (3)18 loss" means any pecuniary loss resulting from harm 19 (including the loss of earnings or other benefits re-20 lated to employment, medical expense loss, replace-21 ment services loss, loss due to death, burial costs, 22 and loss of business or employment opportunities) to 23 the extent recovery for such loss is allowed under ap-24 plicable State law.

(4) ELIGIBLE INDIVIDUAL.—The term "eligible
 individual" means an individual determined to be eli gible for compensation under section 5(c).

4 (5) NONECONOMIC LOSSES.—The term "non-5 economic losses" means losses for physical and emo-6 tional pain, suffering, inconvenience, physical im-7 pairment, mental anguish, disfigurement, loss of en-8 joyment of life, loss of society and companionship, 9 loss of consortium (other than loss of domestic serv-10 ice), hedonic damages, injury to reputation, and all 11 other nonpecuniary losses of any kind or nature.

(6) SPECIAL MASTER.—The term "Special Master" means the Special Master appointed under section 404(a) of the September 11th Victim Compensation Fund of 2001 (title IV of the Air Transportation Safety and System Stabilization Act (Public Law 107–42; 115 Stat. ___)).

18 SEC. 3. PURPOSE.

19 It is the purpose of this Act to provide compensation 20 to any individual (or relatives of a deceased individual) 21 who was physically injured or killed as a result of the 22 bombings of United States embassies in East Africa on 23 August 7, 1998.

1 SEC. 4. ADMINISTRATION.

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General, acting3 through the Special Master, shall—

4 (1) administer the compensation program es5 tablished under this Act;

6 (2) promulgate all procedural and substantive
7 rules for the administration of this Act; and

8 (3) employ and supervise hearing officers and
9 other administrative personnel to perform the duties
10 of the Special Master under this Act.

(b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
are authorized to be appropriated such sums as may be
necessary to pay the administrative and support costs for
the Special Master in carrying out this Act.

15 SEC. 5. DETERMINATION OF ELIGIBILITY FOR COMPENSA-

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17 (a) FILING OF CLAIM.—

TION.

(1) IN GENERAL.—A claimant may file a claim
for compensation under this Act with the Special
Master. The claim shall be on the form developed
under paragraph (2) and shall state the factual basis
for eligibility for compensation and the amount of
compensation sought.

24 (2) CLAIM FORM.—

25 (A) IN GENERAL.—The Special Master
26 shall develop a claim form that claimants shall

1	use when submitting claims under paragraph
2	(1). The Special Master shall ensure that such
3	form can be filed electronically, if determined to
4	be practicable.
5	(B) CONTENTS.—The form developed
6	under subparagraph (A) shall request—
7	(i) information from the claimant con-
8	cerning the physical harm that the claim-
9	ant suffered, or in the case of a claim filed
10	on behalf of a decedent information con-
11	firming the decedent's death, as a result of
12	the bombings of United States embassies
13	in East Africa on August 7, 1998;
14	(ii) information from the claimant
15	concerning any possible economic and non-
16	economic losses that the claimant suffered
17	as a result of such bombings; and
18	(iii) information regarding collateral
19	sources of compensation the claimant has
20	received or is entitled to receive as a result
21	of such bombings.
22	(3) LIMITATION.—No claim may be filed under
23	paragraph (1) after the date that is 2 years after
24	the date on which regulations are promulgated
25	under section 7.

1	(b) REVIEW AND DETERMINATION.—
2	(1) REVIEW.—The Special Master shall review
3	a claim submitted under subsection (a) and
4	determine—
5	(A) whether the claimant is an eligible in-
6	dividual under subsection (c);
7	(B) with respect to a claimant determined
8	to be an eligible individual—
9	(i) the extent of the harm to the
10	claimant, including any economic and non-
11	economic losses; and
12	(ii) the amount of compensation to
13	which the claimant is entitled based on the
14	harm to the claimant, the facts of the
15	claim, and the individual circumstances of
16	the claimant.
17	(2) NEGLIGENCE.—With respect to a claimant,
18	the Special Master shall not consider negligence or
19	any other theory of liability.
20	(3) Determination.—Not later than 120 days
21	after that date on which a claim is filed under sub-
22	section (a), the Special Master shall complete a re-
23	view, make a determination, and provide written no-
24	tice to the claimant, with respect to the matters that
25	were the subject of the claim under review. Such a

1	determination shall be final and not subject to judi-
2	cial review.
3	(4) RIGHTS OF CLAIMANT.—A claimant in a re-
4	view under paragraph (1) shall have—
5	(A) the right to be represented by an at-
6	torney;
7	(B) the right to present evidence, including
8	the presentation of witnesses and documents;
9	and
10	(C) any other due process rights deter-
11	mined appropriate by the Special Master.
12	(5) NO PUNITIVE DAMAGES.—The Special Mas-
13	ter may not include amounts for punitive damages
14	in any compensation paid under a claim under this
15	Act.
16	(6) Collateral compensation.—The Special
17	Master shall reduce the amount of compensation de-
18	termined under paragraph (1)(B)(ii) by the amount
19	of the collateral source compensation the claimant
20	has received or is entitled to receive as a result of
21	the bombings of United States embassies in East Af-
22	rica on August 7, 1998.
23	(c) ELIGIBILITY.—
24	(1) IN GENERAL.—A claimant shall be deter-
25	mined to be an eligible individual for purposes of

1	this subsection if the Special Master determines that
2	such claimant—
3	(A) is an individual described in paragraph
4	(2); and
5	(B) meets the requirements of paragraph
6	(3).
7	(2) INDIVIDUALS.—A claimant is an individual
8	described in this paragraph if the claimant is—
9	(A) a citizen of the United States who—
10	(i) was present at the United States
11	Embassy in Nairobi, Kenya, or the United
12	States Embassy in Dar es Salaam, Tan-
13	zania, at the time, or in the immediate
14	aftermath, of the bombings of United
15	States embassies in East Africa on August
16	7, 1998; and
17	(ii) suffered physical harm or death as
18	a result of such a bombing; or
19	(B) in the case of a decedent who is an in-
20	dividual described in subparagraph (A), the per-
21	sonal representative of the decedent who files a
22	claim on behalf of the decedent.
23	(3) Requirements.—

1	(A) SINGLE CLAIM.—Not more than one
2	claim may be submitted under this Act by an
3	individual or on behalf of a deceased individual.
4	(B) LIMITATION ON CIVIL ACTION.—
5	(i) IN GENERAL.—Upon the submis-
6	sion of a claim under this Act, the claim-
7	ant waives the right to file a civil action
8	(or to be a party to an action) in any Fed-
9	eral or State court for damages sustained
10	as a result of the bombings of United
11	States embassies in East Africa on August
12	7, 1998. The preceding sentence does not
13	apply to a civil action to recover collateral
14	source obligations.
15	(ii) Pending actions.—In the case
16	of an individual who is a party to a civil
17	action described in clause (i), such indi-
18	vidual may not submit a claim under this
19	Act unless such individual withdraws from

such action by the date that is 90 days
after the date on which regulations are
promulgated under section 7.

23 SEC. 6. PAYMENTS TO ELIGIBLE INDIVIDUALS.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 20 days after thedate on which a determination is made by the Special Mas-

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ter regarding the amount of compensation due a claimant
 under this Act, the Special Master shall authorize pay ment to such claimant of the amount determined with re spect to the claimant.

5 (b) PAYMENT AUTHORITY.—This Act constitutes 6 budget authority in advance of appropriations Acts and 7 represents the obligation of the Federal Government to 8 provide for the payment of amounts for compensation 9 under this Act.

10 (c) Additional Funding.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General is authorized to accept such amounts as may be contributed by individuals, business concerns, or other entities to carry out this Act, under such terms and conditions as the Attorney General may impose.

16 (2) USE OF SEPARATE ACCOUNT.—In making
17 payments under this section, amounts contained in
18 any account containing funds provided under para19 graph (1) shall be used prior to using appropriated
20 amounts.

21 SEC. 7. REGULATIONS.

Not later than 90 days after the date of enactment
of this Act, the Attorney General, in consultation with the
Special Master, shall promulgate regulations to carry out
this Act, including regulations with respect to—

1	(1) forms to be used in submitting claims under
2	this Act;
3	(2) the information to be included in such
4	forms;
5	(3) procedures for hearing and the presentation
6	of evidence;
7	(4) procedures to assist an individual in filing
8	and pursuing claims under this Act; and
9	(5) other matters determined appropriate by
10	the Attorney General.
11	SEC. 8. RIGHT OF SUBROGATION.
12	The United States shall have the right of subrogation
13	with respect to any claim paid by the United States under
14	this Act.
