A BILL

To establish a National Border Security Agency.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "National Border Secu-

5 rity Agency Act".

SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF NATIONAL BORDER SECURITY AGENCY.

3 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established a Na4 tional Border Security Agency (hereinafter in this Act re5 ferred to as the "Agency").

6 (b) DIRECTOR.—There shall be at the head of the 7 Agency a Director of Homeland Security (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Director"), who shall be appointed 8 by the President by and with the advice and consent of 9 10 the Senate. The Director shall be compensated at the rate 11 provided for level I of the Executive Schedule under section 5312 of title 5, United States Code. The Director 12 13 shall serve as an advisor to the National Security Council.

(c) DUTIES.—The Director shall plan, coordinate,
and integrate those United States Government activities
relating to border security, and act as a focal point regarding enforcement of United States immigration laws.

18 SEC. 3. TRANSFER OF AUTHORITIES, FUNCTIONS, PER-

SONNEL, AND ASSETS TO AGENCY.

20 The authorities, functions, personnel, and assets of21 the following entities are hereby transferred to the Agency:

(1) The portions of the Immigration and Naturalization Service responsible for law enforcement
and border management, including the Border Patrol and the divisions of Inspection, Investigations,
and Detention and Removal.

(2) The United States Customs Service, which
 shall be maintained as a distinct entity within the
 Agency.

4 (3) The United States Coast Guard, which shall
5 be maintained as a distinct entity within the Agency.

6 SEC. 4. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS.

7 (a) BIENNIAL REPORT.—The Director shall submit
8 to Congress on a biennial basis a report assessing the re9 sources and requirements of executive agencies relating to
10 border security issues.

(b) ADDITIONAL REPORT.—Not later than the date
that is one year after the date of the enactment of this
Act, the Director shall submit to Congress a report—

14	(1) assessing the progress of the Agency in—
15	(A) implementing the provisions of this
16	Act; and
17	(B) ensuring the core functions of each en-

18 tity transferred to the Agency are maintained19 and strengthened; and

20 (2) recommending any conforming changes in
21 law necessary as a result of the enactment and im22 plementation of this Act.

23 SEC. 5. COORDINATION WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS.

24 The Director shall establish and maintain strong 25 mechanisms for the sharing of information and intel-

ligence with the Department of State and international in telligence entities.

3 SEC. 6. PLANNING, PROGRAMMING, AND BUDGETING PROC 4 ESS.

5 The Director shall establish procedures to ensure that 6 the planning, programming, budgeting, and financial ac-7 tivities of the Agency comport with sound financial and 8 fiscal management principles. Those procedures shall, at 9 a minimum, provide for the planning, programming, and 10 budgeting of activities of the Agency using funds that are 11 available for obligation for a limited number of years.

12 SEC. 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.

13 This Act shall take effect on the date that is 614 months after the date of the enactment of this Act.
