## AN ACT

To redesignate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 265 South Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California, as the “Nat King Cole Post Office”.

1        *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2        *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. FINDINGS.**

2 Congress finds the following:

3 (1) Nat King Cole was born Nathaniel Adams  
4 Coles in Montgomery, Alabama, during the difficult  
5 period of segregation in the United States, and was  
6 raised in the ghettos of the south side of Chicago,  
7 Illinois, where he endured the harshness of poverty.

8 (2) Nat King Cole was often confronted with  
9 racism during his career, including being attacked  
10 by members of a white supremacist group while he  
11 was on stage in Birmingham, Alabama, in 1956.

12 (3) Nat King Cole allowed neither poverty nor  
13 racism to prevent him from sharing his music with  
14 people worldwide and from leaving a lasting impres-  
15 sion on American culture.

16 (4) Nat King Cole established himself as the  
17 best selling African-American recording artist of his  
18 generation.

19 (5) Nat King Cole and his family became the  
20 first African-American family to integrate the com-  
21 munity of Hancock Park in Los Angeles when, de-  
22 spite threats and protests from local residents, they  
23 purchased their English Tudor mansion in 1948.

24 (6) “The Nat King Cole Show”, primarily  
25 broadcast from Burbank, California, aired nationally  
26 for more than a year beginning in 1956 and was the

1 first television show to be hosted by an African-  
2 American artist.

3 (7) Nat King Cole graced southern California  
4 with his music during the formative years of his  
5 music career and formed the successful “King Cole  
6 Trio” in Los Angeles, California.

7 (8) Nat King Cole’s recording of “Route 66”  
8 serenaded generations of eager California immi-  
9 grants.

10 (9) Nat King Cole’s recorded rendition of “The  
11 Christmas Song” symbolizes the family warmth of  
12 the yuletide season.

13 (10) Nat King Cole’s disarming delivery teaches  
14 people the meaning of “Unforgettable”.

15 (11) Although Nat King Cole died from lung  
16 cancer on February 15, 1965, the music and em-  
17 bracing baritone voice of Nat King Cole are lasting  
18 legacies that continue to be enjoyed by people world-  
19 wide.

20 (12) Nat King Cole exemplifies the American  
21 dream by having overcome societal and other bar-  
22 riers to become one of the great American enter-  
23 tainers.

24 (13) Members of the community surrounding  
25 the Oakwood Station Post Office in Los Angeles,

1 California, have advocated for the renaming of the  
2 post office in honor of Nat King Cole, a former resi-  
3 dent of the area.

4 **SEC. 2. REDESIGNATION AND REFERENCES.**

5 (a) REDESIGNATION.—The facility of the United  
6 States Postal Service located at 265 South Western Ave-  
7 nue, Los Angeles, California, and known as the Oakwood  
8 Station Post Office, shall be known and designated as the  
9 “Nat King Cole Post Office”.

10 (b) REFERENCES.—Any reference in a law, map, reg-  
11 ulation, document, paper, or other record of the United  
12 States to the facility referred to in subsection (a) shall  
13 be deemed to be a reference to the “Nat King Cole Post  
14 Office”.
