# H. R. 4844

To enhance ecosystem protection and the range of outdoor opportunities protected by statute in the Skykomish River valley of the State of Washington by designating certain lower-elevation Federal lands as wilderness, and for other purposes.

Mr. Larsen of Washington (for himself, Mr. Dicks, Mr. McDermott, Mr. Smith of Washington, Mr. Inslee, and Mr. Baird) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Resources

## A BILL

To enhance ecosystem protection and the range of outdoor opportunities protected by statute in the Skykomish River valley of the State of Washington by designating certain lower-elevation Federal lands as wilderness, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Wild Sky Wilderness
- 5 Act of 2002".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND STATEMENT OF POLICY.
- 7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:

- 1 (1) Americans cherish the continued existence 2 of diverse wilderness ecosystems and wildlife found 3 on their Federal lands and share a strong sense of 4 moral responsibility to protect their wilderness herit-5 age as an enduring resource to cherish, protect, and 6 bequeath undisturbed to future generations of Amer-7 icans.
  - (2) The values an area of wilderness offer to this and future generations of Americans are greatly enhanced to the degree that the area is diverse in topography, elevation, life zones and ecosystems, and to the extent that it offers a wide range of outdoor recreational and educational opportunities accessible in all seasons of the year.
  - (3) Large blocks of wildlands embracing a wide range of ecosystems and topography, including lowelevation forests, have seldom remained undisturbed due to many decades of development.
  - (4) Certain wildlands on the western slope of the Cascade Range in the Skykomish River valley of the State of Washington offer an outstanding representation of the original character of the forested landscape, ranging from high alpine meadows and extremely rugged peaks to low-elevation mature and old-growth forests, including groves with some of the

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- largest and most spectacular trees in Washington,
   with diameters of eight feet and larger.
- 3 (5) These diverse, thickly forested mountain slopes and valleys of mature and old-growth trees in 5 the Skykomish River valley harbor nearly the full 6 complement of the original wildlife and fish species 7 found by settlers of the 19th century, including 8 mountain goats, bald eagles, black bear, pine 9 marten, black-tailed deer, as well as rare and endan-10 gered wildlife such as northern spotted owls and gos-11 hawks, Chinook and Coho salmon, and steelhead and 12 bull trout.
  - (6) An ecologically and topographical diverse wilderness area in the Skykomish River valley accessible in all seasons of the year will be enjoyable to users of various kinds, such as hikers, horse riders, hunters, anglers, and educational groups, but also to the many who cherish clean water and clean air, fish and wildlife (including endangered species such as wild salmon), and pristine mountain and riverside scenery.
- 22 (b) STATEMENT OF POLICY.—Congess hereby de-23 clares that it is the policy of the United States:
- 24 (1) to better serve the diverse wilderness and 25 environmental education needs of the people of the

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- 1 State of Washington and its burgeoning metropoli-2 tan regions by granting wilderness protection to cer-
- 2 tan regions by granting wilderness protection to cer-

tain lower elevation wildlands in the Skykomish

- 4 River valley of the State of Washington; and
- 5 (2) to protect additional lands adjacent to the
- 6 Henry M. Jackson Wilderness designated by the
- 7 Washington Wilderness Act of 1984 (Public Law
- 8 98–339), in further tribute to the ecologically en-
- 9 lightened vision of the distinguished Senator from
- the State of Washington and former Chairman of
- the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Re-
- sources (formerly the Senate Interior and Insular
- 13 Affairs Committee).

- 14 SEC. 3. ADDITIONS TO THE NATIONAL WILDERNESS PRES-
- 15 ERVATION SYSTEM.
- 16 (a) Additions.—The following Federal lands in the
- 17 State of Washington are hereby designated as wilderness
- 18 and, therefore, as components of the National Wilderness
- 19 Preservation System:
- 20 (1) Certain lands which comprise approximately
- 21 106,000 acres, as generally depicted on a map enti-
- tled "Wild Sky Wilderness Proposal", dated May
- 23 2002, which shall be known as the Wild Sky Wilder-
- 24 ness.

- 1 (b) Maps and Legal Descriptions.—As soon as
- 2 practicable after the date of enactment of this Act, the
- 3 Secretary of Agriculture shall file a map and a legal de-
- 4 scription for the wilderness area designated under this Act
- 5 with the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of
- 6 the United States Senate and the Committee on Resources
- 7 of the United States House of Representatives. The map
- 8 and description shall have the same force and effect as
- 9 if included in this Act, except that the Secretary of Agri-
- 10 culture may correct clerical and typographical errors in
- 11 the legal description and map. The map and legal descrip-
- 12 tion shall be on file and available for public inspection in
- 13 the office of the Chief of the Forest Service, Department
- 14 of Agriculture.

### 15 SEC. 4. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS.

- 16 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subject to valid existing rights,
- 17 lands designated as wilderness by this Act shall be man-
- 18 aged by the Secretary of Agriculture in accordance with
- 19 the Wilderness Act (16 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.) and this Act,
- 20 except that, with respect to any wilderness areas des-
- 21 ignated by this Act, any reference in the Wilderness Act
- 22 to the effective date of the Wilderness Act shall be deemed
- 23 to be a reference to the date of enactment of this Act.
- 24 (b) New Trails.—

- 1 (1) The Secretary of Agriculture shall consult
  2 with interested parties and shall establish a hiking
  3 trail plan designed to develop a system of hiking
  4 trails within or adjacent to or to provide access to
  5 the wilderness designated by this Act in a manner
  6 consistent with the Wilderness Act, Public Law 88–
  7 577 (16 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.).
  - (2) Within two years after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Agriculture shall complete a report on the implementation of the hiking trail plan required under this Act. This report shall include the identification of priority hiking trails for development.
- 14 (c) Repeater Site.—Within the Wild Sky Wilder15 ness, the Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to use heli16 copter access to construct and maintain, in a manner com17 patible with the preservation of the wilderness environ18 ment, a Forest Service communication repeater site to
  19 provide improved communication for safety and health
  20 purposes.

### 21 SEC. 5. AUTHORIZATION FOR LAND ACQUISITION.

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Agriculture is 23 authorized to acquire lands and interests therein, by pur-24 chase, donation, or exchange, identified as "Priority Ac-25 quisition Lands" on the map entitled "Wild Sky Wilder-

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- 1 ness Proposal", dated May 2002. The boundaries of the
- 2 Snoqualmie National Forest and the Wild Sky Wilderness
- 3 shall be adjusted to encompass any lands acquired pursu-
- 4 ant to this section.
- 5 (b) Access.—Consistent with section 5(a) of the Wil-
- 6 derness Act (Public Law 88–577; 16 U.S.C. 1134(a)), the
- 7 Secretary of Agriculture shall assure adequate access to
- 8 private inholdings within the Wild Sky Wilderness.
- 9 (c) Appraisal.—Valuation of private lands shall be
- 10 determined without reference to any restrictions on access
- 11 or use which arise out of designation as a wilderness area
- 12 as a result of this Act.
- 13 SEC. 6. LAND EXCHANGES.
- 14 The Secretary of Agriculture shall exchange lands
- 15 and interests in lands, as generally depicted on a map enti-
- 16 tled Chelan County Public Utility District Exchange and
- 17 dated May 22, 2002, with the Chelan County Public Util-
- 18 ity District in accordance with the following provisions:
- 19 (1) If the Chelan County Public Utility District,
- within ninety days after the date of enactment of
- 21 this Act, offers to the Secretary of Agriculture ap-
- proximately 371.8 acres within the Snoqualmie Na-
- tional Forest in the State of Washington, the Sec-
- retary shall accept such lands.

- (2) Upon acceptance of title by the Secretary of Agriculture to such lands and interests therein, the Secretary of Agriculture shall convey to the Chelan County Public Utility District a permanent easement, including helicopter access, consistent with such levels as used as of date of enactment, to maintain an existing snowtel site on 1.82 acres on the Wenatchee National Forest in the State of Washington.
  - (3) The exchange directed by this Act shall be consummated if Chelan County Public Utility District conveys title acceptable to the Secretary and provided there is no hazardous material on the site, which is objectionable to the Secretary.
  - (4) In the event Chelan County Public Utility District determines there is no longer a need to maintain a snowtel site to monitor the snow pack for calculating expected runoff into the Lake Chelan hydroelectric project and the hydroelectric projects in the Columbia River Basin, the Secretary shall be notified in writing and the easement shall be extinguished and all rights conveyed by this exchange shall revert to the United States.
