A BILL

To enhance ecosystem protection and the range of outdoor opportunities protected by statute in the Skykomish River valley of the State of Washington by designating certain lower-elevation Federal lands as wilderness, and for other purposes. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Wild Sky Wilderness
5 Act of 2002".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND STATEMENT OF POLICY.

7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:

8 (1) Americans cherish the continued existence of 9 diverse wilderness ecosystems and wildlife found on 10 their Federal lands and share a strong sense of moral 11 responsibility to protect their wilderness heritage as 12 an enduring resource to cherish, protect, and bequeath 13 undisturbed to future generations of Americans.

14 (2) The values an area of wilderness offer to this 15 and future generations of Americans are greatly en-16 hanced to the degree that the area is diverse in topog-17 raphy, elevation, life zones and ecosystems, and to the 18 extent that it offers a wide range of outdoor rec-19 reational and educational opportunities accessible in 20 all seasons of the year.

21 (3) Large blocks of wildlands embracing a wide
22 range of ecosystems and topography, including low23 elevation forests, have seldom remained undisturbed
24 due to many decades of development.

1 (4) Certain wildlands on the western slope of the 2 Cascade Range in the Skykomish River valley of the 3 State of Washington offer an outstanding representa-4 tion of the original character of the forested landscape, ranging from high alpine meadows and ex-5 6 tremely rugged peaks to low-elevation mature and 7 old-growth forests, including groves with some of the 8 largest and most spectacular trees in Washington, 9 with diameters of eight feet and larger.

10 These diverse, thickly forested mountain (5)11 slopes and valleys of mature and old-growth trees in 12 the Skykomish River valley harbor nearly the full complement of the original wildlife and fish species 13 14 found by settlers of the 19th century, including moun-15 tain goats, bald eagles, black bear, pine marten, black-tailed deer, as well as rare and endangered 16 17 wildlife such as northern spotted owls and goshawks. 18 Chinook and Coho salmon, and steelhead and bull 19 trout.

(6) An ecologically and topographical diverse
wilderness area in the Skykomish River valley accessible in all seasons of the year will be enjoyable to
users of various kinds, such as hikers, horse riders,
hunters, anglers, and educational groups, but also to
the many who cherish clean water and clean air, fish

and wildlife (including endangered species such as
 wild salmon), and pristine mountain and riverside
 scenery.

4 (b) STATEMENT OF POLICY.—Congess hereby declares
5 that it is the policy of the United States:

6 (1) to better serve the diverse wilderness and en-7 vironmental education needs of the people of the State 8 of Washington and its burgeoning metropolitan re-9 gions by granting wilderness protection to certain 10 lower elevation wildlands in the Skykomish River val-11 ley of the State of Washington; and

12 (2) to protect additional lands adjacent to the Henry M. Jackson Wilderness designated by the 13 Washington Wilderness Act of 1984 (Public Law 98-14 15 339), in further tribute to the ecologically enlightened 16 vision of the distinguished Senator from the State of 17 Washington and former Chairman of the Senate Com-18 mittee on Energy and Natural Resources (formerly 19 the Senate Interior and Insular Affairs Committee). 20 SEC. 3. ADDITIONS TO THE NATIONAL WILDERNESS PRES-

ERVATION SYSTEM.

(a) ADDITIONS.—The following Federal lands in the
State of Washington are hereby designated as wilderness
and, therefore, as components of the National Wilderness
Preservation System:

(1) Certain lands which comprise approximately
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 106,000 acres, as generally depicted on a map enti tled "Wild Sky Wilderness Proposal", dated August
 2002, which shall be known as the Wild Sky Wilder ness.

6 (b) MAPS AND LEGAL DESCRIPTIONS.—As soon as 7 practicable after the date of enactment of this Act, the Sec-8 retary of Agriculture shall file a map and a legal descrip-9 tion for the wilderness area designated under this Act with the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of the 10 United States Senate and the Committee on Resources of 11 12 the United States House of Representatives. The map and 13 description shall have the same force and effect as if included in this Act, except that the Secretary of Agriculture 14 15 may correct clerical and typographical errors in the legal description and map. The map and legal description shall 16 be on file and available for public inspection in the office 17 of the Chief of the Forest Service, Department of Agri-18 19 culture.

20 SEC. 4. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Subject to valid existing rights,
lands designated as wilderness by this Act shall be managed
by the Secretary of Agriculture in accordance with the Wilderness Act (16 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.) and this Act, except
that, with respect to any wilderness areas designated by this

Act, any reference in the Wilderness Act to the effective date
 of the Wilderness Act shall be deemed to be a reference to
 the date of enactment of this Act.

4 (b) NEW TRAILS.—

5 (1) The Secretary of Agriculture shall consult 6 with interested parties and shall establish a hiking 7 trail plan designed to develop a system of hiking 8 trails within or adjacent to or to provide access to the 9 wilderness designated by this Act in a manner con-10 sistent with the Wilderness Act, Public Law 88–577 11 (16 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.).

(2) Within two years after the date of enactment
of this Act, the Secretary of Agriculture shall complete
a report on the implementation of the hiking trail
plan required under this Act. This report shall include the identification of priority hiking trails for
development.

(c) REPEATER SITE.—Within the Wild Sky Wilderness
designated under this Act, the Secretary of Agriculture may
use helicopter access to construct and maintain a joint Forest Service and Snohomish County repeater site, in compliance with a Forest Service approved communications site
plan, for the purposes of improving communication for safety, health, and emergency services.

(d) FLOAT PLANE ACCESS.—As provided by section
 4(d)(1) of the Wilderness Act (16 U.S.C. 1133(d)(1)), the
 use of floatplanes on Lake Isabel, where such use has al ready become established, shall be permitted to continue
 subject to such reasonable restrictions as the Secretary of
 Agriculture determines desirable.

7 SEC. 5. AUTHORIZATION FOR LAND ACQUISITION.

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Agriculture may 9 acquire lands and interests therein, by purchase, donation, 10 or exchange, and shall give priority consideration to those lands identified as "Priority Acquisition Lands" on the 11 map described in section 3(a)(1). The boundaries of the 12 13 Snoqualmie National Forest and the Wild Sky Wilderness shall be adjusted to encompass any lands acquired pursuant 14 15 to this section.

(b) ACCESS.—Consistent with section 5(a) of the Wilderness Act (Public Law 88–577; 16 U.S.C. 1134(a)), the
8 Secretary of Agriculture shall assure adequate access to private inholdings within the Wild Sky Wilderness.

(c) APPRAISAL.—Valuation of private lands shall be
determined without reference to any restrictions on access
or use which arise out of designation as a wilderness area
as a result of this Act.

1 SEC. 6. LAND EXCHANGES.

2 The Secretary of Agriculture shall exchange lands and
3 interests in lands, as generally depicted on a map entitled
4 Chelan County Public Utility District Exchange and dated
5 May 22, 2002, with the Chelan County Public Utility Dis6 trict in accordance with the following provisions:

7 (1) If the Chelan County Public Utility District,
8 within ninety days after the date of enactment of this
9 Act, offers to the Secretary of Agriculture approxi10 mately 371.8 acres within the Snoqualmie National
11 Forest in the State of Washington, the Secretary shall
12 accept such lands.

13 (2) Upon acceptance of title by the Secretary of 14 Agriculture to such lands and interests therein, the 15 Secretary of Agriculture shall convey to the Chelan 16 County Public Utility District a permanent easement, 17 including helicopter access, consistent with such levels 18 as used as of date of enactment, to maintain an exist-19 ing snowtel site on 1.82 acres on the Wenatchee Na-20 tional Forest in the State of Washington.

21 (3) The exchange directed by this Act shall be
22 consummated if Chelan County Public Utility Dis23 trict conveys title acceptable to the Secretary and pro24 vided there is no hazardous material on the site,
25 which is objectionable to the Secretary.

(4) In the event Chelan County Public Utility 1 2 District determines there is no longer a need to main-3 tain a snowtel site to monitor the snow pack for cal-4 culating expected runoff into the Lake Chelan hydroelectric project and the hydroelectric projects in the 5 6 Columbia River Basin, the Secretary shall be notified in writing and the easement shall be extinguished and 7 all rights conveyed by this exchange shall revert to the 8 United States. 9

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
