## A BILL

To authorize the President of the United States to agree to certain amendments to the Agreement between the Government of the United States of America and the Government of the United Mexican States concerning the establishment of a Border Environment Cooperation Commission and a North American Development Bank, and for other purposes.

3	SECTION 1. AUTHORITY TO AGREE TO CERTAIN AMEND-				
4	MENTS TO THE BORDER ENVIRONMENT CO				
5	OPERATION AGREEMENT.				
6	(a) In General.—Part 2 of subtitle D of title V of				
7	7 Public Law 103–182 (22 U.S.C. 290m—290m—3) is amen				
8	ed by adding at the end the following:				
9	"SEC. 545. AUTHORITY TO AGREE TO CERTAIN AMEND-				
10	MENTS TO THE BORDER ENVIRONMENT CO-				
11	OPERATION AGREEMENT.				
12	"The President may agree to amendments to the Co-				
13	operation Agreement that—				
14	"(1) enable the Bank to make grants and non-				
15	market rate loans out of its paid-in capital resources				
16	with the approval of its Board; and				
17	"(2) amend the definition of border region' to				
18	include the area in the United States that is within				
19	100 kilometers of the international boundary between				
20	the United States and Mexico, and the area in Mexico				
21	that is within 300 kilometers of the international				
22	boundary between the United States and Merico"

18	SEC. 3. SENSE OF THE CONGRESS RELATING TO UNITED					
19	STATES SUPPORT FOR NADBANK PROJECTS					
20	WHICH FINANCE WATER CONSERVATION FOR					
21	TEXAS IRRIGATORS AND AGRICULTURAL					
22	PRODUCERS IN THE LOWER RIO GRANDE					
23	RIVER VALLEY.					
24	(a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds that—					

- 1 (1) Texas irrigators and agricultural producers 2 are suffering enormous hardships in the lower Rio 3 Grande River valley because of Mexico's failure to 4 abide by the 1944 Water Treaty entered into by the 5 United States and Mexico;
  - (2) over the last 10 years, Mexico has accumulated a 1,500,000-acre fee water debt to the United States which has resulted in a very minimal and inadequate irrigation water supply in Texas;
  - (3) recent studies by Texas A&M University show that water savings of 30 percent or more can be achieved by improvements in irrigation system infrastructure such as canal lining and metering;
  - (4) on August 20, 2002, the Board of the North American Development Bank agreed to the creation in the Bank of a Water Conservation Investment Fund, as required by Minute 308 to the 1944 Water Treaty, which was an agreement signed by the United States and Mexico on June 28, 2002; and
  - (5) the Water Conservation Investment Fund of the North American Development Bank stated that up to \$80,000,000 would be available for grant financing of water conservation projects, which grant funds would be divided equally between the United States and Mexico.

19	It is the sense of the Congress that the Board of the					
20	North American Development Bank should support—					
21	(1) the development of qualified water conserva-					
22	tion projects in southern California and other eligible					
23	areas in the 4 United States border States, including					
24	the conjunctive use and storage of surface and ground					
25	water, delivery system conservation, the re-regulation					

- of reservoirs, improved irrigation practices, wastewater reclamation, regional water management modeling, operational and optimization studies to improve water conservation, and cross-border water exchanges consistent with treaties; and
- 6 (2) new water supply research and projects along
  7 the Mexico border in southern California and other el8 igible areas in the 4 United States border States to
  9 desalinate ocean seawater and brackish surface and
  10 groundwater, and dispose of or manage the brines re11 sulting from desalination.

#### 12 SEC. 5. SENSE OF THE CONGRESS RELATING TO UNITED

- 13 STATES SUPPORT FOR NADBANK PROJECTS
  14 FOR WHICH FINANCE WATER CONSERVATION
  15 FOR IRRIGATORS AND AGRICULTURAL PRO16 DUCERS IN THE SOUTHWEST UNITED STATES.
  - (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds as follows:
- 18 (1) Irrigators and agricultural producers are
  19 suffering enormous hardships in the southwest United
  20 States. The border States of California, Arizona, New
  21 Mexico, and Texas are suffering from one of the worst
  22 droughts in history. In Arizona, this is the second
  23 driest period in recorded history and the worst since
  24 1904.

- (2) In spite of decades of water conservation in
   the southwest United States, irrigated agriculture uses
   more than 60 percent of surface and ground water.
  - (3) The most inadequate water supplies in the United States are in the Southwest, including the lower Colorado River basin and the Great Plains River basins south of the Platte River. In these areas, 70 percent of the water taken from the stream is not returned.
    - (4) The amount of water being pumped out of groundwater sources in many areas is greater than the amount being replenished, thus depleting the groundwater supply.
    - (5) On August 20, 2002, the Board of the North American Development Bank agreed to the creation in the bank of a Water Conservation Investment Fund.
  - (6) The Water Conservation Investment Fund of the North American Development Bank stated that up to \$80,000,000 would be available for grant financing of water conservation projects, which grant funds would be divided equally between the United States and Mexico.
- 24 (b) Sense of the Congress.—It is the sense of the 25 Congress that—

- 1 (1) water conservation projects are eligible for 2 funding from the North American Development Bank 3 under the Agreement Between the Government of the 4 United States of America and the Government of the 5 United Mexican States Concerning the Establishment 6 of a Border Environment Cooperation Commission 7 and a North American Development Bank;
  - (2) the Board of the North American Development Bank should support qualified water conservation projects that can assist irrigators and agricultural producers; and
- 12 (3) the Board of the North American Develop-13 ment Bank should take into consideration the needs 14 of all of the border states before approving funding for 15 water projects, and strive to fund water conservation 16 projects in each of the border states.

#### 17 SEC. 6. ADDITIONAL SENSES OF THE CONGRESS.

18 (a) It is the sense of the Congress that the Board of 19 the North American Development Bank should support the 20 financing of projects, on both sides of the international 21 boundary between the United States and Mexico, which ad-22 dress coastal issues and the problem of pollution in both 23 countries having an environmental impact along the Pa-24 cific Ocean and Gulf of Mexico shores of the United States 25 and Mexico.
