A BILL

 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE AND FINDINGS.

- 4 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the
- 5 "Tongass Rain Forest Protection Act".
- 6 (b) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
- 7 (1) Rain forests constitute a unique reserve of8 biological resources.

(2) Biological diversity depends on protecting 2 the habitats of animal and plant species in rain forests around the world. 3 4 (3) United States leadership in urging other 5 countries to protect tropical rain forests is under-6 mined by Federal Government policies that subsidize 7 the destruction of publicly owned pristine temperate 8 rain forests in the United States. 9 (4) The Tongass National Forest in Alaska is 10 the largest temperate rain forest in the United 11 States. 12 (5) The protection of pristine and old-growth 13 forests in the Tongass National Forest will help con-14 serve biological diversity and enhance the credibility 15 of United States' efforts to conserve biological diver-16 sity globally. 17 (6) Islands constitute unique ecosystems with 18 special biological resources and should be afforded 19 special protections. 20 **SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.** 21 In this Act: 22 (1) ROADLESS AREA.—The term "roadless

23 area" means—

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24 (A) an area identified in the set of inven-25 toried roadless area maps contained in the doc-

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1	ument entitled "Forest Service Roadless Area
2	Conservation, Final Environmental Impact
3	Statement, Volume 2" and dated November
4	2000, which is on file at the national head-
5	quarters office of the Forest Service, or any
6	subsequent update or revision of such maps; or
7	(B) an area of more than 1,000 contiguous
8	acres that does not contain a road.
9	(2) INHOLDING.—The term "inholding" means
10	any land that is not in Federal ownership in the
11	Tongass National Forest, but that is surrounded by
12	land in Federal ownership in the Tongass National
13	Forest.
14	(3) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
15	the Secretary of Agriculture.
16	SEC. 3. TONGASS RAINFOREST NATURE PRESERVE.
17	(a) DESIGNATION.—All roadless areas in the Tongass
18	National Forest, Alaska, including Duke Island, are des-
19	ignated as the Tongass Rainforest Nature Preserve.
20	(b) PROTECTION.—Within the Tongass Rainforest
21	Nature Preserve, native animal and plant species, includ-
22	ing grizzly bears, brown bears, sea lions, seals, trumpeter
23	swans, wolves, wolverines, sea otters, river otters, beavers,
24	moose, Queen Charlotte goshawks, Peale's Peregrine Fal-
25	cons, snowy owls, and bald eagles, shall be protected in
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perpetuity in their natural and wild state. No activity that 1 2 disturbs native animal and plant species or their habitats 3 shall be allowed in the Tongass Rainforest Nature Pre-4 serve. 5 (c) PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES.—Activities that are prohibited under this section include the following: 6 7 (1) Construction of roads. 8 (2) Mining or extraction of minerals. 9 (3) Construction of any structure. 10 (4) Use of any mechanized vehicle or equip-11 ment.

12 (5) Logging or cutting of trees.

13 SEC. 4. DUKE ISLAND TRUMPETER SWAN WILDERNESS14AREA.

15 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:

16 (1) Duke Island, Alaska, provides habitat for
17 Sitka black tailed deer, Peale's Peregrine falcon,
18 Queen Charlotte goshawk, black bear, trumpeter
19 swan, and the stellar sea lion.

20 (2) Duke Island contains special natural and
21 scenic qualities that should be preserved in per22 petuity.

(b) DESIGNATION OF WILDERNESS AREA.—In accordance with the Wilderness Act (16 U.S.C. 1131 et
seq.), all of Duke Island and the Duke Inventoried

Roadless Area, comprising approximately 46,100 acres,
 are designated as wilderness and, therefore, as a compo nent of the National Wilderness Preservation System,
 which shall be known as the "Duke Island Trumpeter
 Swan Wilderness Area.".

6 SEC. 5. ACQUISITION OF INHOLDINGS.

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may acquire, by
8 gift, bequest, or purchase from willing sellers, inholdings
9 in the Tongass National Forest.

10 (b) USE OF EMINENT DOMAIN.—In the case of an 11 inholding in the Tongass National Forest that the Sec-12 retary finds is of exceptional importance for biological or 13 scenic reasons, the Secretary may acquire such inholding 14 through eminent domain. The owner of the inholding so 15 acquired shall receive compensation equal to the full fair 16 market value of the inholding.

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
