(a) Section 101(a) of the Supplemental 3 Appropriations Act, 1977 (2 U.S.C. 61h–6(a)) is amended 4 in the first sentence by striking "four individual consult-5 ants" and inserting "six individual consultants", and is 6 amended in the second sentence by striking "one consult-7 ant" and inserting "not more than two individual consult-8 ants".

11 SEC. 2. STUDENT LOAN REPAYMENTS. (a) DEFINI-12 TIONS.—In this section:

(1) EMPLOYEE OF THE SENATE.—The term
"employee of the Senate" has the meaning given the
term in section 101 of the Congressional Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1301).

17 (2) EMPLOYING OFFICE.—The term "employing
18 office" means the employing office, as defined in
19 such section 101, of an employee of the Senate.

20 (3) STUDENT LOAN.—The term "student loan"
21 has the meaning given the term in section 5379 of
22 title 5, United States Code.

(b) STUDENT LOAN REPAYMENT PROGRAM.—The
head of an employing office may, in order to recruit or
retain highly qualified personnel, establish a program

under which the office may agree to repay (by direct pay-
ments on behalf of an employee of the Senate) any student
loan previously taken out by such employee.
(c) Administration.—
(1) IN GENERAL.—The head of an employing
office shall carry out the program in accordance with
the provisions of subsections (b) through (d) and
subsection (f) of section 5379 of title 5, United
States Code.
(2) Application.—For purposes of this sec-
tion, references in such provisions—
(A) to an agency shall be considered to be
references to an employing office; and
(B) to an employee shall be considered to
be references to an employee of the Senate.
(d) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
are authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section
such sums as may be necessary.
(e) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply to
fiscal year 2002 and each fiscal year thereafter.
SEC. 3. (a) Agency contributions for employees whose
salaries are disbursed by the Secretary of the Senate from
the appropriations account "Expenses of the United
States Senate Caucus on International Narcotics Control"
under the heading "Congressional Operations" shall be

paid from the Senate appropriations account for "Salaries,
 Officers and Employees".

3 (b) This section shall apply to pay periods beginning4 on or after October 1, 2001.

5 SEC. 4. (a) Section 5(a) under the subheading "AD-6 MINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS" under the heading "SEN-7 ATE" under title I of the Legislative Branch Appropria-8 tions Act, 1996 (2 U.S.C. 58a note) is amended by strik-9 ing "invoice ends" and inserting "invoice begins".

(b) The amendment made by subsection (a) shall take
effect on October 1, 2001, and shall apply to base service
periods beginning on or after that date.

SEC. 5. (a) Section 120 of Public Law 97–51 (2
U.S.C. 61g–6) is amended in the first sentence by striking
"\$75,000" and inserting "\$100,000".

(b) This section shall apply with respect to fiscal year2002 and each fiscal year thereafter.

18 SEC. 6. Effective on and after October 1, 2001, each 19 of the dollar amounts contained in the table under section 20 105(d)(1)(A) of the Legislative Branch Appropriations 21 Act, 1968 (2 U.S.C. 61–1(d)(1)(A)) shall be deemed to 22 be the dollar amounts in that table, as adjusted by law 23 and in effect on September 30, 2001, increased by an ad-24 ditional \$50,000 each.

For the Capitol Police Board for necessary expenses 4 5 of the Capitol Police, including motor vehicles, communications and other equipment, security equipment and in-6 7 stallation, uniforms, weapons, supplies, materials, train-8 ing, medical services, forensic services, stenographic serv-9 ices, personal and professional services, the employee as-10 sistance program, not more than \$2,000 for the awards program, postage, telephone service, travel advances, relo-11 12 cation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, and \$85 per month 13 for extra services performed for the Capitol Police Board 14 15 by an employee of the Sergeant at Arms of the Senate or the House of Representatives designated by the Chair-16 17 man of the Board, \$12,394,000, to be disbursed by the Capitol Police Board or their delegee: *Provided*, That, not-18 withstanding any other provision of law, the cost of basic 19 20 training for the Capitol Police at the Federal Law En-21 forcement Training Center for fiscal year 2002 shall be 22 paid by the Secretary of the Treasury from funds available to the Department of the Treasury. 23

1 Administrative Provision 2 SEC. 101. Amounts appropriated for fiscal year 2002 3 for the Capitol Police Board for the Capitol Police may be transferred between the headings "SALARIES" and 4 "GENERAL EXPENSES" upon the approval of— 5 (1) the Committee on Appropriations of the 6 7 House of Representatives, in the case of amounts 8 transferred from the appropriation provided to the 9 Sergeant at Arms of the House of Representatives under the heading "SALARIES"; 10 11 (2) the Committee on Appropriations of the 12 Senate, in the case of amounts transferred from the 13 appropriation provided to the Sergeant at Arms and 14 Doorkeeper of the Senate under the heading "SALA-15 RIES"; and 16 (3) the Committees on Appropriations of the 17 Senate and the House of Representatives, in the 18 case of other transfers. 19 CAPITOL GUIDE SERVICE AND SPECIAL SERVICES

 more than two additional individuals for not more than
 120 days each, and not more than 10 additional individ uals for not more than 6 months each, for the Capitol
 Guide Service.

Budget Office may, by regulation, make applicable such
provisions of chapter 41 of title 5, United States Code,
as the Director determines necessary to provide hereafter
for training of individuals employed by the Congressional
Budget Office.

(b) The implementing regulations shall provide for
training that, in the determination of the Director, is consistent with the training provided by agencies subject to
chapter 41 of title 5, United States Code.

(c) Any recovery of debt owed to the Congressional
Budget Office under this section and its implementing regulations shall be credited to the appropriations account
available for training employees of the Office at the time
of recovery.

(d) This section shall apply to fiscal year 2002 andeach fiscal year thereafter.

SEC. 103. Section 105(a) of the Legislative Branch
Appropriations Act, 1996 (2 U.S.C. § 606(a)), is amended

by striking "or discarding." and inserting "sale, trade-in, 1 or discarding.", and by adding at the end the following: 2 3 "Amounts received for the sale or trade-in of personal 4 property shall be credited to funds available for the oper-5 ations of the Congressional Budget Office and be available for the costs of acquiring the same or similar property. 6 7 Such funds shall be available for such purposes during the 8 fiscal year in which received and the following fiscal year.". 9

10 SEC. 104. (a) The Director of the Congressional 11 Budget Office may, in order to recruit or retain qualified 12 personnel, establish and maintain hereafter a program 13 under which the Office may agree to repay (by direct pay-14 ments on behalf of the employee) all or a portion of any 15 student loan previously taken out by such employee.

(b) The Director may, by regulation, make applicable
such provisions of section 5379 of title 5, United States
Code as the Director determines necessary to provide for
such program.

20 (c) The regulations shall provide the amount paid by21 the Office may not exceed—

(1) \$6,000 for any employee in any calendaryear; or

16 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, the As-17 sistant Architect of the Capitol, and other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law; for surveys and stud-18 19 ies in connection with activities under the care of the Ar-20 chitect of the Capitol; for all necessary expenses for the 21 maintenance, care and operation of the Capitol and elec-22 trical substations of the Senate and House office buildings 23 under the jurisdiction of the Architect of the Capitol, in-24 cluding furnishings and office equipment, including not 25 more than \$1,000 for official reception and representation

expenses, to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol 1 2 may approve; for purchase or exchange, maintenance and 3 operation of a passenger motor vehicle; and not to exceed 4 \$20,000 for attendance, when specifically authorized by 5 the Architect of the Capitol, at meetings or conventions in connection with subjects related to work under the Ar-6 7 chitect of the Capitol, \$54,000,000, of which \$5,000,000 8 shall remain available until expended: *Provided*, That the 9 Architect of the Capitol, in consultation with the Comp-10 troller General or his designee, shall appoint a Chief Financial Officer within 90 days after the date of enactment 11 12 of this Act: *Provided further*, That notwithstanding any 13 other provision of law and subject to the availability of appropriations, the Architect of the Capitol is authorized 14 15 to secure, through multi-year rental, lease, or other appropriate agreement, the property located at 67 K Street, 16 17 S.W., Washington, D.C., for use of Legislative Branch 18 agencies, and to incur any necessary incidental expenses 19 including maintenance, alterations, and repairs in connection therewith: *Provided further*, That in connection with 20 21 the property referred to under the preceding proviso, the 22 Architect of the Capitol is authorized to expend funds ap-23 propriated to the Architect of the Capitol for the purpose of the operations and support of Legislative Branch agen-24

cies, including the United States Capitol Police, as may
 be required for that purpose.

SEC. 302. No part of the funds appropriated in this
 Act shall remain available for obligation beyond fiscal year
 2002 unless expressly so provided in this Act.

4 SEC. 303. Whenever in this Act any office or position 5 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of 6 1929 is appropriated for or the rate of compensation or 7 designation of any office or position appropriated for is 8 different from that specifically established by such Act, 9 the rate of compensation and the designation in this Act 10 shall be the permanent law with respect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act for the various items of 11 12 official expenses of Members, officers, and committees of 13 the Senate and House of Representatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of the House of Representa-14 15 tives shall be the permanent law with respect thereto.

16 SEC. 304. The expenditure of any appropriation 17 under this Act for any consulting service through procurement contract, pursuant to section 3109 of title 5, United 18 19 States Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such 20 expenditures are a matter of public record and available 21 for public inspection, except where otherwise provided 22 under existing law, or under existing Executive order 23 issued pursuant to existing law.

SEC. 305. (a) It is the sense of the Congress that,to the greatest extent practicable, all equipment and prod-

ucts purchased with funds made available in this Act
 should be American-made.

3 (b) In providing financial assistance to, or entering 4 into any contract with, any entity using funds made avail-5 able in this Act, the head of each Federal agency, to the 6 greatest extent practicable, shall provide to such entity a 7 notice describing the statement made in subsection (a) by 8 the Congress.

9 (c) If it has been finally determined by a court or 10 Federal agency that any person intentionally affixed a label bearing a "Made in America" inscription, or any in-11 12 scription with the same meaning, to any product sold in 13 or shipped to the United States that is not made in the United States, such person shall be ineligible to receive 14 15 any contract or subcontract made with funds provided pursuant to this Act, pursuant to the debarment, suspen-16 17 sion, and ineligibility procedures described in section 18 9.400 through 9.409 of title 48, Code of Federal Regula-19 tions.

SEC. 306. Such sums as may be necessary are appropriated to the account described in subsection (a) of section 415 of Public Law 104–1 to pay awards and settlements as authorized under such subsection.

24 SEC. 307. Amounts available for administrative ex-25 penses of any legislative branch entity which participates

in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council 1 (LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall 2 be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC 3 4 costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total 5 LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legislative branch entities (in such allocations among the entities 6 7 as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$252,000. 8 SEC. 308. Section 316 of Public Law 101–302 is 9 amended in the first sentence of subsection (a) by striking "2001" and inserting "2002". 10

11 SEC. 309. Section 5596(a) of title 5, U.S.C., is amended by deleting "and" at the end of paragraph (4); 12 13 by deleting the period at the end of paragraph (5) and inserting a semicolon, and by adding the following new 14 15 paragraphs, which shall be effective for all personnel actions taken on or after the date of enactment of this Act: 16 17 "(6) the Architect of the Capitol, including em-18 ployees of the United States Senate Restaurants; 19 and
