A BILL

- To authorize the Secretary of the Interior to conduct a study of the suitability and feasibility of establishing the Niagara Falls National Heritage Area in the State of New York, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This Act may be cited as the "Niagara Falls National
3	Heritage Area Study Act".
4	SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
5	In this Act:
6	(1) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
7	the Secretary of the Interior.
8	(2) Study area.—
9	(A) IN GENERAL.—The term "study area"
10	means the segment of the Niagara River in Ni-
11	agara County, New York, that extends from Ni-
12	agara Falls, New York, to the mouth of the Ni-
13	agara River at Lake Ontario.
14	(B) INCLUSION.—The term "study area"
15	includes land in any municipality that is adja-
16	cent to the Niagara River in Niagara County,
17	New York.
18	(2) Study Area.—The term "study area" means
19	lands in Niagara County, New York, along and in the
20	vicinity of the Niagara River.
21	SEC. 3. NIAGARA RIVER FALLS NATIONAL HERITAGE AREA
22	STUDY.
23	(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall conduct a
24	study of the suitability and feasibility of establishing a
25	heritage area in the State of New York to be known as
26	the "Niagara Falls National Heritage Area".

(b) ANALYSES AND DOCUMENTATION.—The study
shall include analysis and documentation of whether the
study area—
(1) contains an assemblage of natural, histor-
ical, scenic, and cultural resources that represent
distinctive aspects of the heritage of the United
States that—
(A) are worthy of recognition, conserva-
tion, interpretation, and continued use; and
(B) would best be managed—
(i) through partnerships among public
and private entities; and
(ii) by combining diverse and some-
times noncontiguous resources and active
communities;
(2) reflects traditions, customs, beliefs, and
folklife that are a valuable part of the story of the
United States;
(3) provides outstanding opportunities to con-
serve natural, historical, scenic, or cultural features;
(4) provides outstanding recreational and edu-
cational opportunities;
(5) contains resources important to the identi-
fied theme of the study area that retain a degree of
integrity capable of supporting interpretation;

1	(6) includes residents, business interests, non-
2	profit organizations, and State and local govern-
3	ments that—
4	(A) are involved in planning a national
5	heritage area;
6	(B) have developed a conceptual financial
7	plan for a national heritage area that outlines
8	the roles for all participants, including the Fed-
9	eral Government; and
10	(C) have demonstrated support for the
11	concept of a national heritage area;
12	(7) has a potential management entity to work
13	in partnership with residents, business interests,
14	nonprofit organizations, and State and local govern-
15	ments to develop a national heritage area consistent
16	with continued State and local economic activity;
17	and
18	(8) has a conceptual boundary map that is sup-
19	ported by the public.
20	(c) CONSULTATION.—In conducting the study, the
21	Secretary shall consult with—
22	(1) State and local agencies; and
23	(2) interested organizations within the study
24	area.

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1 (d) REPORT.—Not later than 3 fiscal years after the 2 date on which funds are made available to carry out this 3 Act, the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on Re-4 sources of the House of Representatives and the Com-5 mittee on Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate 6 a report that describes the findings, conclusions, and rec-7 ommendations of the study under subsection (a).

8 (e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
9 authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section
10 \$300,000.

11 SEC. 4. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

12 There is authorized to be appropriated \$300,000 to13 carry out this Act.
