A BILL

To amend chapter 35 of title 44, United States Code, for the purpose of facilitating compliance by small business concerns with certain Federal paperwork requirements, to establish a task force to examine the feasibility of streamlining paperwork requirements applicable to small business concerns, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Small Business Paper-
5	work Relief Act of 2001".
6	SEC. 2. FACILITATION OF COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL PA-
7	PERWORK REQUIREMENTS.
8	(a) REQUIREMENTS APPLICABLE TO THE DIRECTOR
9	OF OMB. Section 3504(e) of title 44, United States
10	Code (commonly referred to as the "Paperwork Reduction
11	Act"), is amended—
12	(1) in paragraph (4), by striking "; and" and
13	inserting a semicolon;
14	(2) in paragraph (5), by striking the period and
15	inserting a semicolon; and
16	(3) by adding at the end the following:
17	"(6) publish in the Federal Register on an an-
18	nual basis a list of the collections of information ap-
19	plicable to small-business concerns (as defined in
20	section 3 of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C.
21	632)), organized by North American Industrial Clas-
22	sification System code and industrial/sector descrip-
23	tion (as published by the Office of Management and
24	Budget), with the first such publication occurring
25	not later than 1 year after the date of enactment of

1	the Small Business Paperwork Relief Act of 2001;
2	and
3	"(7) make available on the Internet, not later
4	than 1 year after the date of enactment of the Small
5	Business Paperwork Relief Act of 2001, the list of
6	requirements described in paragraph (6).".
7	(b) Establishment of Agency Point of Con-
8	TACT.—Section 3506 of title 44, United States Code, is
9	amended by adding at the end the following:
10	"(i) In addition to the requirements described in sub-
11	section (e), each agency shall, with respect to the collection
12	of information and the control of paperwork, establish 1
13	point of contact in the agency to act as a liaison between
14	the agency and small-business concerns (as defined in sec-
15	tion 3 of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 632)).".
16	(e) Additional Reduction of Paperwork for
17	CERTAIN SMALL BUSINESSES.—Section 3506(e) of title

6	SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF TASK FORCE TO STUDY
7	STREAMLINING OF PAPERWORK REQUIRE-
8	MENTS FOR SMALL-BUSINESS CONCERNS.

18	"(a) There is established a task force to study the
19	feasibility of streamlining requirements with respect to
20	small-business concerns regarding collection of informa-
21	tion (in this section referred to as the 'task force').
22	"(b) The members of the task force shall be ap-
23	pointed by the Director, and include—
24	"(1) not less than 2 representatives of the De-
25	partment of Labor, including 1 representative of the

1	Bureau of Labor Statistics and 1 representative of
2	the Occupational Safety and Health Administration;
3	"(2) not less than 1 representative of the Envi-
4	ronmental Protection Agency;
5	"(3) not less than 1 representative of the De-
6	partment of Transportation;
7	"(4) not less than 1 representative of the Office
8	of Advocacy of the Small Business Administration;
9	"(5) not less than 1 representative of each of
10	two agencies other than the Department of Labor,
11	the Environmental Protection Agency, the Depart-
12	ment of Transportation, and the Small Business Ad-
13	ministration; and
14	"(6) not less than 2 representatives of the De-
15	partment of Health and Human Services, including
16	one representative of the Health Care Financing Ad-
17	ministration.
18	"(e) The task force shall—
19	"(1) recommend a system to clarify which small
20	businesses within particular North American Indus-
21	trial Classification System codes are subject to
22	which information compliance requirements; and
23	"(2) examine the feasibility of requiring each
24	agency to consolidate requirements regarding collec-
25	tions of information with respect to small-business

1	concerns, in order that each small business concern
2	may submit all information required by the agency—
3	"(A) to 1 point of contact in the agency;
4	"(B) in a single format, such as a single
5	electronic reporting system, with respect to the
6	agency; and
7	"(C) on the same date.
8	"(d) Not later than 1 year after the date of enact-
9	ment of the Small Business Paperwork Relief Act of 2001,
10	the task force shall submit a report of its findings under
11	subsection (e) to the chairpersons and ranking minority
12	members of the Committee on Governmental Affairs and
13	the Committee on Small Business of the Senate, and the
14	Committee on Government Reform and the Committee on
15	Small Business of the House of Representatives.

2	collection and dissemination
3	"(a) There is established a task force to study the feasi-
4	bility of streamlining requirements with respect to small
5	business concerns regarding collection of information and
6	strengthening dissemination of information (in this section
7	referred to as the 'task force').
8	"(b) The members of the task force shall be appointed
9	by the Director, and include—
10	"(1) not less than 2 representatives of the De-
11	partment of Labor, including 1 representative of the
12	Bureau of Labor Statistics and 1 representative of the
13	Occupational Safety and Health Administration;
14	"(2) not less than 1 representative of the Envi-
15	ronmental Protection Agency;
16	"(3) not less than 1 representative of the Depart-
17	ment of Transportation;
18	"(4) not less than 1 representative of the Office
19	$of \ Advocacy \ of \ the \ Small \ Business \ Administration;$
20	"(5) not less than 1 representative of the Internal
21	Revenue Service;
22	"(6) not less than 2 representatives of the De-
23	partment of Health and Human Services, including
24	1 representative of the Health Care Financing Ad-
25	ministration;

1	"(7) not less than 1 representative of the Depart-
2	$ment\ of\ Agriculture;$
3	"(8) not less than 1 representative of the Depart-
4	ment of Interior;
5	"(9) not less than 1 representative of the General
6	$Services\ Administration;$
7	"(10) not less than 1 representative of each of 2
8	agencies not represented by representatives described
9	under paragraphs (1) through (9) and (11);
10	"(11) 1 representative of the Director, who shall
11	convene and chair the task force; and
12	"(12) not less than 3 representatives of the small
13	business community.
14	"(c) The task force shall—
15	"(1) recommend a plan for the development of
16	an interactive Government application, available
17	through the Internet, to allow each small business to
18	better understand which Federal requirements regard-
19	ing collection of information (and, when possible,
20	which other Federal regulatory requirements) apply
21	to that particular business;
22	"(2) identify ways to integrate the collection of
23	information across Federal agencies and programs
24	and examine the feasibility of requiring each agency
25	to consolidate requirements regarding collections of

1	information with respect to small business concerns,
2	within and across agencies without negatively im-
3	pacting the effectiveness of underlying laws and regu-
4	lations regarding such collections of information, in
5	order that each small business concern may submit
6	all information required by the agency—
7	"(A) to 1 point of contact in the agency;
8	and
9	"(B) in a single format, such as a single
10	electronic reporting system, with respect to the
11	agency;
12	"(3) examine the feasibility and helpfulness to
13	small businesses of the Director publishing a list of
14	the collections of information applicable to small busi-
15	ness concerns (as defined in section 3 of the Small
16	Business Act (15 U.S.C. 632)), organized—
17	"(A) by North American Industrial Classi-
18	fication System code;
19	"(B) industrial/sector description; or
20	"(C) in another manner by which small
21	business concerns can more easily identify re-
22	quirements with which those small business con-
23	cerns are expected to comply; and

2	for implementing a system of electronic paperwork
3	submissions.
