# A BILL

To amend the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act to establish a program to provide assistance to enhance the ability of first responders to respond to incidents of terrorism, including incidents involving weapons of mass destruction, and for other purposes. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "First Responder Ter5 rorism Preparedness Act of 2002".

### 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

8 (1) the Federal Government must enhance the 9 ability of first responders to respond to incidents of 10 terrorism, including incidents involving weapons of 11 mass destruction; and

(2) as a result of the events of September 11,
2001, it is necessary to clarify and consolidate the
authority of the Federal Emergency Management
Agency to support first responders.
