Mr. Kennedy (for himself, Mr. Chafee, Mr. Leahy, Mr. Harkin, Mr. Feingold, Mr. Reed, Mr. Jeffords, and Mr. Kerry) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations

A BILL

To provide assistance to East Timor to facilitate the transition of East Timor to an independent nation, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "East Timor Transition
- 5 to Independence Act of 2001".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress makes the following findings:
- 8 (1) On August 30, 1999, the East Timorese
- 9 people voted overwhelmingly in favor of independ-

- ence from Indonesia. Anti-independence militias,
 with the support of the Indonesian military, attempted to prevent then retaliated against this vote
 by launching a campaign of terror and violence, displacing 500,000 people and murdering at least
 1,000 people.
 - (2) The violent campaign devastated East Timor's infrastructure, destroyed or severely damaged 60 to 80 percent of public and private property, and resulted in the collapse of virtually all vestiges of government, public services and public security.
 - (3) The Australian-led International Force for East Timor (INTERFET) entered East Timor in September 1999 and successfully restored order. On October 25, 1999, the United Nations Transitional Administration for East Timor (UNTAET) began to provide overall administration of East Timor, guide the people of East Timor in the establishment of a new democratic government, and maintain security and order.
 - (4) UNTAET and the East Timorese leadership currently anticipate that East Timor will become an independent nation as early as late 2001.

- 1 (5) East Timor is one of the poorest places in 2 Asia. A large percentage of the population live below 3 the poverty line, only 20 percent of East Timor's 4 population is literate, most of East Timor's people 5 remain unemployed, the annual per capita Gross Na-6 tional Product is \$340, and life expectancy is only 7 56 years.
- 8 (6) The World Bank and the United Nations 9 have estimated that it will require \$300,000,000 in 10 development assistance over the next three years to 11 meet East Timor's basic development needs.

12 SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS RELATING TO SUPPORT FOR

- EAST TIMOR.
- 14 It is the sense of Congress that the United States 15 should—
- 16 (1) facilitate East Timor's transition to inde-17 pendence, support formation of broad-based democ-18 racy in East Timor, help lay the groundwork for 19 East Timor's economic recovery, and strengthen 20 East Timor's security;
 - (2) help ensure that the nature and pace of the economic transition in East Timor is consistent with the needs and priorities of the East Timorese people, that East Timor develops a strong and independent

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1	economic infrastructure, and that the incomes of the
2	East Timorese people rise accordingly;
3	(3) begin to lay the groundwork, prior to East
4	Timor's independence, for an equitable bilateral
5	trade and investment relationship;
6	(4)(A) officially open a diplomatic mission to
7	East Timor as soon as possible;
8	(B) recognize East Timor, and establish diplo-
9	matic relations with East Timor, upon its independ-
10	ence; and
11	(C) ensure that a fully functioning, fully
12	staffed, adequately resourced, and securely main-
13	tained United States diplomatic mission is accred-
14	ited to East Timor upon its independence;
15	(5) support efforts by the United Nations and
16	East Timor to ensure justice and accountability re-
17	lated to past atrocities in East Timor through—
18	(A) United Nations investigations;
19	(B) development of East Timor's judicial
20	system, including appropriate technical assist-
21	ance to East Timor from the Department of
22	Justice, the Federal Bureau of Investigation,
23	and the Drug Enforcement Administration;
24	(C) the possible establishment of an inter-
25	national tribunal for East Timor; and

1	(D) sharing with the United Nations Tran-
2	sitional Administration for East Timor
3	(UNTAET) and East Timorese investigators
4	any unclassified information relevant to past
5	atrocities in East Timor gathered by the United
6	States Government; and
7	(6)(A) as an interim step, support observer sta-
8	tus for an official delegation from East Timor to ob-
9	serve and participate, as appropriate, in all delibera-
10	tions of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation
11	(APEC) group, the Association of Southeast Asian
12	Nations (ASEAN), and other international institu-
13	tions; and
14	(B) after East Timor achieves independence,
15	support full membership for East Timor in these
16	and other international institutions, as appropriate.
17	SEC. 4. BILATERAL ASSISTANCE.
18	(a) Authority.—The President, acting through the
19	Administrator of the United States Agency for Inter-
20	national Development, is authorized to—
21	(1) support the development of civil society, in-
22	cluding nongovernmental organizations in East
23	Timor;
24	(2) promote the development of an independent
25	news media:

- 1 (3) support job creation, including support for 2 small business and microenterprise programs, envi-3 ronmental protection, sustainable development, de-4 velopment of East Timor's health care infrastruc-5 ture, educational programs, and programs strength-6 ening the role of women in society;
 - (4) promote reconciliation, conflict resolution, and prevention of further conflict with respect to East Timor, including establishing accountability for past gross human rights violations;
 - (5) support the voluntary and safe repatriation and reintegration of refugees into East Timor; and
 - (6) support political party development, voter education, voter registration, and other activities in support of free and fair elections in East Timor.

(b) Authorization of Appropriations.—

- (1) In General.—There are authorized to be appropriated to the President to carry out this section \$30,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 2002, 2003, and 2004.
- (2) AVAILABILITY.—Amounts appropriated pursuant to the authorization of appropriations under paragraph (1) are authorized to remain available until expended.

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SEC. 5. MULTILATERAL ASSISTANCE.

- 2 The Secretary of the Treasury shall instruct the
- 3 United States executive director at each international fi-
- 4 nancial institution to which the United States is a member
- 5 to use the voice, vote, and influence of the United States
- 6 to support economic and democratic development in East
- 7 Timor.

8 SEC. 6. PEACE CORPS ASSISTANCE.

- 9 (a) AUTHORITY.—The Director of the Peace Corps
- 10 is authorized to—
- 11 (1) provide English language and other tech-
- nical training for individuals in East Timor as well
- as other activities which promote education, eco-
- 14 nomic development, and economic self-sufficiency;
- 15 and
- 16 (2) quickly address immediate assistance needs
- in East Timor using the Peace Corps Crisis Corps,
- to the extent practicable.
- 19 (b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—
- 20 (1) In General.—There are authorized to be
- appropriated to the Peace Corps to carry out this
- section \$2,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 2001,
- 23 2002, 2003, and 2004.
- 24 (2) AVAILABILITY.—Amounts appropriated pur-
- suant to the authorization of appropriations under

1	paragraph (1) are authorized to remain available
2	until expended.
3	SEC. 7. TRADE AND INVESTMENT ASSISTANCE.
4	(a) OPIC.—Beginning on the date of the enactment
5	of this Act, the President should initiate negotiations with
6	the United Nations Transitional Administration for East
7	Timor (UNTAET), the National Council of East Timor,
8	and the government of East Timor (after independence
9	for East Timor)—
10	(1) to apply to East Timor the existing agree-
11	ment between the Overseas Private Investment Cor-
12	poration and Indonesia; or
13	(2) to enter into a new agreement authorizing
14	the Overseas Private Investment Corporation to
15	carry out programs with respect to East Timor,
16	in order to expand United States investment in East
17	Timor, emphasizing partnerships with local East Timorese
18	enterprises.
19	(b) Trade and Development Agency.—
20	(1) In General.—The Director of the Trade
21	and Development Agency is authorized to carry out
22	projects in East Timor under section 661 of the
23	Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2421).
24	(2) Authorization of appropriations.—

- 1 (A) IN GENERAL.—There are authorized to
 2 be appropriated to the Trade and Development
 3 Agency to carry out this subsection \$1,000,000
 4 for each of the fiscal years 2001, 2002, 2003,
- 6 (B) AVAILABILITY.—Amounts appro-7 priated pursuant to the authorization of appro-8 priations under subparagraph (A) are author-9 ized to remain available until expended.
- 10 (c) EXPORT-IMPORT BANK.—The Export-Import
 11 Bank of the United States shall expand its activities in
 12 connection with exports to East Timor.

13 SEC. 8. GENERALIZED SYSTEM OF PREFERENCES.

- 14 (a) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Con-
- 15 gress that the President should encourage the United Na-
- 16 tions Transitional Administration for East Timor
- 17 (UNTAET), in close consultation with the National Coun-
- 18 cil of East Timor, to seek to become eligible for duty-free
- 19 treatment under title V of the Trade Act of 1974 (19
- 20 U.S.C. 2461 et seq.; relating to generalized system of pref-
- 21 erences).
- 22 (b) Technical Assistance.—The United States
- 23 Trade Representative and the Commissioner of the United
- 24 States Customs Service are authorized to provide technical
- 25 assistance to UNTAET, the National Council of East

- 1 Timor, and the government of East Timor (after inde-
- 2 pendence for East Timor) in order to assist East Timor
- 3 to become eligible for duty-free treatment under title V
- 4 of the Trade Act of 1974.

5 SEC. 9. BILATERAL INVESTMENT TREATY.

- 6 It is the sense of Congress that the President should
- 7 seek to enter into a bilateral investment treaty with the
- 8 United Nations Transitional Administration for East
- 9 Timor (UNTAET), in close consultation with the National
- 10 Council of East Timor, in order to establish a more stable
- 11 legal framework for United States investment in East
- 12 Timor.

13 SEC. 10. SCHOLARSHIPS FOR EAST TIMORESE STUDENTS.

- 14 (a) AUTHORITY.—The Secretary of State—
- 15 (1) is authorized to carry out an East Timorese
- scholarship program under the authorities of the
- 17 United States Information and Educational Ex-
- change Act of 1948, the Mutual Educational and
- 19 Cultural Exchange Act of 1961, Reorganization Plan
- Number 2 of 1977, and the National Endowment
- 21 for Democracy Act; and
- 22 (2) shall make every effort to identify and pro-
- vide scholarships and other support to East Timor-
- ese students interested in pursuing undergraduate

1	and graduate studies at institutions of higher edu-
2	cation in the United States.
3	(b) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
4	are authorized to be appropriated to the Department of
5	State, \$1,000,000 for the fiscal year 2002 and \$1,000,000
6	for the fiscal year 2003 to carry out subsection (a).
7	SEC. 11. PLAN FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF DIPLOMATIC FA
8	CILITIES IN EAST TIMOR.
9	(a) Development of Detailed Plan.—The Sec-
10	retary of State shall develop a detailed plan for the official
11	establishment of a United States diplomatic mission to
12	East Timor, with a view to—
13	(1) officially open a fully functioning, fully
14	staffed, adequately resourced, and securely main-
15	tained diplomatic mission in East Timor as soon as
16	possible;
17	(2) recognize East Timor, and establish diplo-
18	matic relations with East Timor, upon its independ-
19	ence; and
20	(3) ensure that a fully functioning, fully staffed
21	adequately resourced, and securely maintained diplo-
22	matic mission is accredited to East Timor upon its
23	independence.
24	(b) Reported

- (1) Initial Report.—Not later than three months after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State shall submit to the Committee on International Relations of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate a report that contains the detailed plan described in subsection (a), including a timetable for the official opening of a facility in Dili, East Timor, the personnel requirements for the mission, the estimated costs for establishing the facility, and its security requirements.
 - (2) Subsequent reports.—Beginning six months after the submission of the initial report under paragraph (1), and every six months thereafter until January 1, 2004, the Secretary of State shall submit to the committees specified in that paragraph a report on the status of the implementation of the detailed plan described in subsection (a), including any revisions to the plan (including its timetable, costs, or requirements) that have been made during the period covered by the report.
 - (3) FORM OF REPORT.—Each report submitted under this subsection shall be in unclassified form, with a classified annex as necessary.

1 SEC. 12. SECURITY ASSISTANCE FOR EAST TIMOR.

2	(a) Authorization.—Beginning on the date on
3	which the President transmits to the Congress a certifi-
4	cation described in subsection (b), the President is
5	authorized—
6	(1) to transfer excess defense articles under
7	section 516 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961
8	(22 U.S.C. 2321j) to East Timor in accordance with
9	such section; and
10	(2) to provide military education and training
11	under chapter 5 of part II of such Act (22 U.S.C.
12	2347 et seq.) for the armed forces of East Timor in
13	accordance with such chapter.
14	(b) CERTIFICATION.—A certification described in this
15	subsection is a certification that—
16	(1) East Timor has established an independent
17	armed forces; and
18	(2) the assistance proposed to be provided pur-
19	suant to subsection (a)—
20	(A) is in the national security interests of
21	the United States; and
22	(B) will promote both human rights in
23	East Timor and the professionalization of the
24	armed forces of East Timor.
25	(c) STUDY AND REPORT —

1	(1) Study.—The President shall conduct a
2	study to determine—
3	(A) the extent to which East Timor's secu-
4	rity needs can be met by the transfer of excess
5	defense articles under section 516 of the For-
6	eign Assistance Act of 1961;
7	(B) the extent to which international mili-
8	tary education and training (IMET) assistance
9	will enhance professionalism of the armed
10	forces of East Timor, provide training in
11	human rights, and promote respect for human
12	rights and humanitarian law; and
13	(C) the terms and conditions under which
14	such defense articles or training, as appro-
15	priate, should be provided.
16	(2) Report.—Not later than 1 month after the
17	date of enactment of this Act, the President shall
18	submit a report to the Committee on Foreign Rela-
19	tions and the Committee on Appropriations of the
20	Senate and the Committee on International Rela-
21	tions and the Committee on Appropriations of the
22	House of Representatives setting forth the findings
23	of the study conducted under paragraph (1).

SEC. 13. AUTHORITY FOR RADIO BROADCASTING.

- 2 The Broadcasting Board of Governors shall further
- 3 the communication of information and ideas through the
- 4 increased use of audio broadcasting to East Timor to en-
- 5 sure that radio broadcasting to that country serves as a
- 6 consistently reliable and authoritative source of accurate,
- 7 objective, and comprehensive news.

8 SEC. 14. REPORTING REQUIREMENT.

- 9 (a) In General.—Not later than three months after
- 10 the date of the enactment of this Act, and every six
- 11 months thereafter until January 1, 2004, the Secretary
- 12 of State, in coordination with the Administrator of the
- 13 United States Agency for International Development, the
- 14 Secretary of the Treasury, the United States Trade Rep-
- 15 resentative, the Secretary of Commerce, the Overseas Pri-
- 16 vate Investment Corporation, the Director of the Trade
- 17 and Development Agency, the President of the Export-Im-
- 18 port Bank of the United States, the Secretary of Agri-
- 19 culture, and the Director of the Peace Corps, shall prepare
- 20 and transmit to the Committee on International Relations
- 21 of the House of Representatives and the Committee on
- 22 Foreign Relations of the Senate a report that contains the
- 23 information described in subsection (b).
- 24 (b) Information.—The report required by sub-
- 25 section (a) shall include—

- (1) developments in East Timor's political and economic situation in the period covered by the report, including an evaluation of any elections occurring in East Timor and the refugee reintegration process in East Timor;

 (2)(A) in the initial report, a 3-year plan for
 - (2)(A) in the initial report, a 3-year plan for United States foreign assistance to East Timor in accordance with section 4, prepared by the Administrator of the United States Agency for International Development, which outlines the goals for United States foreign assistance to East Timor during the 3-year period; and
 - (B) in each subsequent report, a description in detail of the expenditure of United States bilateral foreign assistance during the period covered by each such report;
 - (3) a description of the activities undertaken in East Timor by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the Asian Development Bank, and other international financial institutions, and an evaluation of the effectiveness of these activities;

23 (4) an assessment of—

(A) the status of United States trade and investment relations with East Timor, including

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- a detailed analysis of any trade and investmentrelated activity supported by the Overseas Private Investment Corporation, the Export-Import Bank of the United States, and the Trade and Development Agency during the period of time since the previous report; and
 - (B) the status of any negotiations with the United Nations Transitional Administration for East Timor (UNTAET) or East Timor to facilitate the operation of the United States trade agencies in East Timor;
 - (5) the nature and extent of United States-East Timor cultural, education, scientific, and academic exchanges, both official and unofficial, and any Peace Corps activities;
 - (6) a comprehensive study and report on local agriculture in East Timor, emerging opportunities for producing, processing, and exporting indigenous agricultural products, and recommendations for appropriate technical assistance from the United States; and
 - (7) statistical data drawn from other sources on economic growth, health, education, and distribution of resources in East Timor.
