A BILL

To establish the National Museum of African American History and Culture within the Smithsonian Institution.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "National Museum of
- 5 African American History and Culture Act of 2001".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress makes the following findings:
- 8 (1) Over the history of our Nation, the United
- 9 States has grown into a symbol of democracy and

- freedom around the world, and the legacy of African

 Americans is rooted in the very fabric of our Nation's democracy and freedom.
 - (2) There exists no national museum within the Smithsonian Institution located on the National Mall that is devoted to the documentation of African American life, art, history, and culture and that encompasses on a national level, the period of slavery, the era of reconstruction, the Harlem renaissance, the civil rights movement, and beyond.
 - (3) Slavery was an accepted practice in this Nation, authorized by the Government through legislation such as the fugitive slave law of 1793 (1 Stat. 302) and sanctioned by the Supreme Court in the Dred Scott decision (Scott v. Sanford, 60 U.S. 393 (1857)).
 - (4) Those African Americans who suffered under slavery and their descendants show us the strength of the human character and provide us with a model of courage, commitment, and perseverance. A national museum dedicated to the history of and commemorating those who suffered the grave injustice of slavery in this country will help in "binding our Nation's wounds" rooted in slavery and will

- 1 allow all Americans to understand the past and 2 honor the history of all Americans.
 - (5) Leaders of the African American community in the 1950s and 1960s led this Nation in the civil rights movement with the intent of ending discrimination against African Americans. During this period, many African American churches were destroyed and countless individuals involved in this movement were often beaten and killed. Through the devotion and sacrifice of those leaders, the civil rights movement made great strides in ensuring equality for African Americans in this country.
 - (6) African Americans have enriched the cultural make-up of the United States by their contributions in the areas of science, medicine, the arts and humanities, sports, music, and dance.
 - (7) Preserving this rich record of the experiences of African Americans, studying their experiences, and presenting those experiences through exhibits to the public would be of great educational and social value.
 - (8) The creation of a National Museum of African American History and Culture located on the National Mall in the District of Columbia and administered by the Smithsonian Institution's Board of

- Regents was endorsed in 1991 by a unanimous vote by the Smithsonian Institution's Board of Regents.
 - (9) The Smithsonian African American Institutional Study recommended that the National Museum of African American History and Culture be established in the Arts and Industries Building of the Smithsonian Institution.
 - (10) Although the Smithsonian Institution has had some success in focusing on African American history and culture, the programming on African American history and culture has been occasional and episodic.
 - (11) A National Museum of African American History and Culture will provide a continued and consistent African American presence on the National Mall.
 - (12) The National Museum of African American History and Culture will be dedicated to the collection, preservation, research, and exhibition of African American historical and cultural material reflecting the breadth and depth of the experiences of persons of African descent living in the United States.
- (13) The National Museum of African Amer ican History and Culture established by this Act will

1 coordinate the collection of material related to Afri-2 can Americans, which is rapidly disappearing due to 3 a lack of resources and trained professionals en-

gaged in preservation.

5 (14) The work of the National Museum of Afri-6 can American History and Culture will be, fun-7 damentally, the same as the work of all museums in 8 the United States that reflect and express the expe-9 riences of the people of the United States in an in-10 clusive manner.

11 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF

- 12 AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY AND CULTURE.
- 13 (a) Establishment.—There is established within
- 14 the Smithsonian Institution the National Museum of Afri-
- 15 can American History and Culture (hereafter referred to
- 16 in this Act as the "Museum"), and the Smithsonian Insti-
- 17 tution shall maintain and administer the Museum.
- 18 (b) Purpose.—The purpose of the Museum is to pro-
- 19 vide for—
- 20 (1) the collection, study, and creation of schol-
- 21 arship relating to the African American diaspora
- that encompasses slavery, the era of reconstruction,
- the Harlem renaissance, the civil rights movement,
- and beyond;

1	(2) the creation and maintenance of permanent
2	and temporary exhibits documenting American slav-
3	ery and African American life, art, history, and cul-
4	ture from slavery and the era of reconstruction to
5	the Harlem renaissance, the civil rights movement,
6	and beyond;
7	(3) the collection and study of artifacts and
8	documents relating to African American life, art,
9	history, and culture and the African diaspora;
10	(4) the establishment of programs in coopera-
11	tion with other museums, historical societies, edu-
12	cational institutions, and other organizations that
13	promote the understanding of modern day practices
14	of slavery throughout the world;
15	(5) collaboration between the Museum and
16	other African American museums, historically black
17	colleges and universities, and other museums, histor-
18	ical societies, educational institutions, and other or-
19	ganizations that promote the study of the African
20	diaspora including collaboration regarding—
21	(A) development of cooperative programs
22	and exhibitions;
23	(B) identification, management, and care

of collections; and

1	(C) participation in the training of mu-
2	seum professionals; and
3	(6) leadership and commitment to historical ac-
4	curacy in the study, education, and exhibition of Af-
5	rican American life, art, history, and culture in the
6	museum and throughout the Nation.
7	SEC. 4. COUNCIL.
8	(a) Establishment.—There is established in the
9	Smithsonian Institution the National Museum of African
10	American History and Culture Council (hereinafter re-
11	ferred to in this Act as the "Council").
12	(b) Duties.—
13	(1) In general.—The Council, subject to sub-
14	section (l) and to the general policies of the Board
15	of Regents of the Smithsonian Institution (hereafter
16	referred to in this Act as the "Board of Regents"),
17	shall have sole authority to—
18	(A) solicit, accept, use, and dispose of
19	gifts, bequests, and devises of services and
20	property, both real and personal, for the pur-
21	pose of aiding and facilitating the work of the
22	Museum or the Council;
23	(B) establish policy with respect to the uti-
24	lization of the collections and resources of the
25	Museum, including policies on programming,

1	education, exhibitions, and research with re-
2	spect to life, art, and culture of African Ameri-
3	cans, the role of African Americans in the his-
4	tory of the United States, from slavery to the
5	present, and the contributions of African Amer-
6	icans to society;
7	(C) purchase, accept, borrow, and other-
8	wise acquire artifacts and other property for
9	addition to the collections of the Museum;
10	(D) provide for restoration, preservation,
11	and maintenance of the collections of the Mu-
12	seum;
13	(E) loan, exchange, sell, and otherwise dis-
14	pose of any part of the collections of the Mu-
15	seum, but only if the funds generated by such
16	disposition are used for additions to the collec-
17	tions of the Museum or for programs carried
18	out under section 6; and
19	(F) contract with and compensate Federal
20	Government and private agencies or persons for
21	supplies and services that would aid the work of
22	the Museum, without regard to section 3709 of
23	the Revised Statutes (41 U.S.C. 5).
24	(2) Administration.—Subject to subsection
25	(l), the Board of Regents shall advise and assist the

1	Council on all matters relating to the administration
2	operation, maintenance, and preservation of the Mu-
3	seum.
4	(3) Annual report to congress.—Subject
5	to subsection (l), the Council shall submit to Con-
6	gress an annual report that—
7	(A) provides a detailed account of the ac-
8	tivities of the Council and the Museum;
9	(B) recommends an annual budget for the
10	Council and the Museum; and
11	(C) identifies the future needs of the Coun-
12	cil and the Museum.
13	(4) Annual report to the board of re-
14	GENTS.—Subject to subsection (l), the Council shall
15	report annually to the Board of Regents on the ac-
16	quisition, disposition, and display of African Amer-
17	ican objects and artifacts and on other appropriate
18	matters.
19	(c) Composition and Appointment.—
20	(1) In general.—The Council shall be com-
21	posed of 25 voting members as provided under para-
22	graph (2) and 7 honorary nonvoting members as
23	provided under paragraph (3).
24	(2) Voting members.—The Council shall in-
25	clude the following voting members:

1	(A) The Secretary of the Smithsonian In-
2	stitution.
3	(B) An Assistant Secretary of the Smithso-
4	nian Institution appointed by the Board of Re-
5	gents.
6	(C) 13 individuals of diverse disciplines
7	and geographical residence who are committed
8	to the advancement of knowledge of African
9	American history and culture appointed as fol-
10	lows:
11	(i) 5 individuals shall be appointed by
12	the President from a list of nominees pro-
13	vided by the President pro tempore of the
14	Senate in consultation with the majority
15	and minority leaders of the Senate.
16	(ii) 5 individuals shall be appointed by
17	the President from a list of nominees pro-
18	vided by the Speaker of the House of Rep-
19	resentatives in consultation with the major-
20	ity and minority leaders of the House of
21	Representatives.
22	(iii) 3 individuals shall be appointed
23	by the President.
24	(D) 10 individuals appointed as follows:

(i) 4 individuals shall be appointed by the President from a list of nominees, provided by the President pro tempore of the Senate in consultation with the majority and minority leaders of the Senate, and recommended by the Association of African American Museums, the National African American Museum and Culture Complex, historically black colleges and universities, and cultural or other organizations committed to the advancement of knowledge of African American life, art, history and culture.

(ii) 4 individuals shall be appointed by the President from a list of nominees, provided by the Speaker of the House of Representatives in consultation with the majority and minority leaders of the House of Representatives, and recommended by the Association of African American Museums, the National African American Museum and Culture Complex, historically black colleges and universities, and cultural or other organizations committed to the ad-

1	vancement of knowledge of African Amer-
2	ican life, art, history and culture.
3	(iii) 2 individuals shall be appointed
4	by the President.
5	(3) Honorary nonvoting members.—The
6	Council shall include the following honorary non-
7	voting members:
8	(A) The Secretary of the Interior.
9	(B) 3 Members of the House of Represent-
10	atives appointed by the Speaker of the House of
11	Representatives upon the recommendation of
12	the majority and minority leaders of the House
13	of Representatives.
14	(C) 3 Senators appointed by the President
15	pro tempore of the Senate upon the rec-
16	ommendation of the majority and minority lead-
17	ers of the Senate.
18	(d) Terms.—
19	(1) In general.—
20	(A) Initial appointment.—Except as
21	provided in this subsection, each member of the
22	Council shall be appointed for a term that ter-
23	minates 9 years after the date on which the
24	museum is open to the general public.

- 1 (B) SUBSEQUENT APPOINTMENTS.—Ex2 cept as provided in this subsection, each of the
 3 members of the Council that are appointed
 4 after the members described in paragraph (1)
 5 shall be appointed for a term of 6 years.
 - (C) Reappointment.—Members of the Council may be reappointed for subsequent terms.
 - (2) MEMBERS OF CONGRESS.—If a member appointed to the Council under subparagraph (B) or (C) of subsection (c)(3) ceases to hold the office that qualified such member for appointment, that member shall cease to be a member of the Council.
 - (3) Vacancies and subsequent appointments.—A vacancy on the Council, including among the honorary non-voting members, shall not affect the Council's powers and shall be filled in the manner in which the original appointment was made, except that when filling any vacancies among the voting members and when making any appointments for voting members after the initial appointments, the President shall make appointments from a list of nominees provided by the Council. Any member appointed to fill a vacancy occasioned by death or res-

1 ignation shall be appointed for the remainder of the 2 term. 3 (e) Compensation.— 4 (1) In General.—Except as provided in para-5 graph (2), members of the Council shall serve with-6 out pay. 7 (2) Expenses.—Members of the Council shall 8 receive travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of 9 subsistence, in accordance with applicable provisions 10 under subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United 11 States Code. 12 (f) Chairperson.—The Council shall elect a chair-13 person by a majority vote of the voting members of the 14 Council. 15 (g) Meetings.— (1) IN GENERAL.—The Council shall meet at 16 17 the call of the chairperson or upon the written re-18 quest of a majority of the voting members of the 19 Council, but shall meet, subject to paragraph (2), 20 not fewer than 2 times each year. 21 (2) Planning.—During the first year, the 22 Council shall meet not fewer than 10 times for the 23 purpose of the planning and design of the Museum. 24 (h) QUORUM.—A majority of the voting members of

the Council shall constitute a quorum for purposes of con-

1 ducting business, but a lesser number may receive infor-

2	mation on behalf of the Council.
3	(i) Bylaws.—The Council shall adopt bylaws.
4	(j) Powers of Members and Agents.—Any mem-
5	ber or agent of the Council may, if authorized by a major-
6	ity of the voting members of the Council, take any action
7	that the Council is authorized to take by this Act.
8	(k) Voluntary Services.—Notwithstanding sec-
9	tion 1342 of title 31, United States Code, the chairperson
10	of the Council may accept for the Council voluntary serv-
11	ices provided by a member of the Council.
12	(l) Transfer of Powers and Duties.—
13	(1) In general.—Except as provided in this
14	subsection, the Council's powers and duties shall
15	transfer to the Board of Regents 3 years after the
16	date on which the Museum is open to the general
17	public.
18	(2) Advisory council.—
19	(A) IN GENERAL.—3 years after the date
20	on which the Museum is open to the general
21	public, the Council shall become an advisory
22	council (hereafter referred to in this Act as the
23	"Advisory Council").
24	(B) DUTIES OF THE ADVISORY COUNCIL.—
25	The Advisory Council shall advise the Board of

1	Regents on matters related to the administra-
2	tion, operation, and maintenance of the Mu-
3	seum.
4	(C) Meetings.—The Advisory Council
5	shall meet not fewer than 1 time each year.
6	(D) PERMANENT COMMITTEE.—Section 14
7	of the Federal Advisory Committee Act (5
8	U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to the Advisory
9	Council.
10	SEC. 5. DIRECTOR AND STAFF OF THE MUSEUM.
11	(a) In General.—The Council, in consultation with
12	the Board of Regents, shall appoint a Director who shall
13	manage the Museum.
14	(b) Applicability of Certain Civil Service
15	Laws.—
16	(1) Appointments.—The Council may appoint
17	the Director and any additional personnel to serve
18	under the Director, without regard to the provisions
19	of title 5, United States Code, governing appoint-
20	ments in the competitive service.
21	(2) PAY.—The Council may fix the pay of the
22	Director at a rate not to exceed the maximum rate
23	of basic pay payable for level III of the Executive
24	Schedule and fix the pay of such additional per-
25	sonnel as the Council considers appropriate.

1 SEC. 6. OFFICE OF EDUCATION AND LIAISON PROGRAMS.

2	(a) Office Established.—There is established
3	within the Museum, the Office of Education and Liaison
4	Programs, which shall carry out educational programs
5	with respect to the Museum and other programs in col-
6	laboration with other African American museums.
7	(b) Functions.—The Office of Education and Liai-
8	son Programs shall—
9	(1) carry out public educational programs with-
10	in the Museum relating to African American life,
11	art, history, and culture, including programs uti-
12	lizing digital, electronic, and interactive technologies,
13	and programs in collaboration with elementary
14	schools, secondary schools, and post-secondary
15	schools; and
16	(2) collaborate with African American museums
17	by—
18	(A) establishing educational grant pro-
19	grams that strengthen museum operations, im-
20	prove care of museum collections, and increase
21	professional development;
22	(B) providing internship and fellowship
23	programs that allow individuals pursuing ca-
24	reers or carrying out studies in the arts, hu-
25	manities, and sciences to study African Amer-
26	ican life, art, history and culture;

1	(C) providing scholarship programs to as-
2	sist individuals who demonstrate a commitment
3	to a career in African American museum man-
4	agement in financing their studies; and
5	(D) collaborating with national and inter-
6	national organizations that address the issue of
7	slavery in the international community.
8	SEC. 7. LOCATION OF THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF AFRICAN
9	AMERICAN HISTORY AND CULTURE.
10	(a) Main Building.—The Council, in consultation
11	with the Board of Regents of the Smithsonian Institution
12	is authorized to plan, design, reconstruct, and renovate the
13	Arts and Industries Building of the Smithsonian Institu-
14	tion and the surrounding site to house the Museum. The
15	Council shall consider expanding, and is authorized to ex-
16	pand, the Arts and Industries Building horizontally,
17	vertically, and below ground.
18	(b) Additional Facilities.—
19	(1) In General.—If the Council determines
20	that facilities in addition to the Arts and Industries
21	Building of the Smithsonian Institution are needed
22	for the Museum, the Council, in consultation with
23	the General Services Administration and the Na-
24	tional Capital Planning Commission is authorized
25	to—

1	(A) identify a site for the additional facili-
2	ties;
3	(B) acquire real property for the additional
4	facilities;
5	(C) design the additional facilities; and
6	(D)(i) construct a building for the addi-
7	tional facilities; or
8	(ii) reconstruct and renovate a building for
9	the additional facilities.
10	(2) LOCATION.—Any additional facilities for the
11	Museum shall be located, if feasible, on or adjacent
12	to the National Mall.
13	(3) Purchase authority.—After consultation
14	with the General Services Administration and the
15	National Capital Planning Commission, the Council
16	may purchase, with the consent of the owner thereof,
17	any real property on or adjacent to the National
18	Mall for such additional facilities.
19	(4) Transfer authority.—For the purpose
20	of securing additional facilities, any department or
21	agency of the United States is authorized to transfer
22	to the Council any interest of such department or
23	agency in real property located on or adjacent to the
24	National Mall, and the Council, after consultation
25	with the General Services Administration and the

- 1 National Capital Planning Commission, may accept
- any such interest in such property.
- 3 (c) Cost-Sharing.—The Council shall pay ½ of the
- 4 total cost of carrying out this section from appropriated
- 5 funds. The Council shall pay the remainder of such costs
- 6 from non-Federal sources. The Council shall have 5 years
- 7 following the date of the Council's first meeting to secure
- 8 the non-Federal funds required under this subsection.
- 9 (d) Commemorative Works Act.—Any building to
- 10 house the Museum, including any additional facilities for
- 11 the Museum, is not a commemorative work for purposes
- 12 of the Commemorative Works Act (40 U.S.C. 1001 et
- 13 seq.).
- 14 SEC. 8. NATIONAL MALL.
- 15 In this Act, the term "National Mall" means the Na-
- 16 tional Mall (United States Government Reservations 3, 4,
- 17 5, and 6) in the District of Columbia.
- 18 SEC. 9. AUTHORITY.
- 19 Authority under this Act to enter into contracts or
- 20 to make payments is effective in any fiscal year only to
- 21 the extent provided in advance in an appropriations act,
- 22 except as provided under section 10(b)(3).

1 SEC. 10. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

2	(a) Renovation.—There is authorized to be appro-
3	priated such sums as may be necessary to carry out the
4	activities authorized under section 7.
5	(b) OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE.—
6	(1) In general.—There is authorized to be
7	appropriated to the Council to carry out this Act,
8	other than sections 6 and 7—
9	(A) \$15,000,000 for fiscal year 2002; and
10	(B) such sums as may be necessary for
11	each succeeding fiscal year.
12	(2) Office of education and liaison pro-
13	GRAMS.—There is authorized to be appropriated to
14	the Council to carry out section 6, \$10,000,000 for
15	fiscal year 2002 and for each succeeding fiscal year.
16	(3) AVAILABILITY.—The amounts appropriated
17	under paragraphs (1) and (2) shall remain available
18	for the operation and maintenance of the Museum
19	until expended.
20	SEC. 11. AMENDMENT.
21	Section 5580 of the Revised Statutes (20 U.S.C. 42)
22	is amended in subsection (b)(2) by inserting "the National
23	Museum of African American History and Culture," after
24	"Performing Arts,".
