

AMENDMENT

TITLE III—YOSEMITE NATIONAL 12 PARK 13

14 SEC. 301. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.

15 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:

16 (1) The three elementary schools serving the chil17 dren of employees of Yosemite National Park are
18 served by the Bass Lake Joint Union Elementary
19 School District and the Mariposa Unified School Dis20 trict.

21 (2) The schools are in remote mountainous areas
22 and long distances from other educational and ad23 ministrative facilities of the two local educational
24 agencies.

(3) Because of their remote locations and rel-

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2 atively small number of students, schools serving the 3 children of employees of the Park provide fewer serv-4 ices in more basic facilities than the educational serv-5 ices and facilities provided to students that attend 6 other schools served by the two local educational agen-7 cies. 8 (4) Because of the long distances involved and 9 adverse weather and road conditions that occur during much of the school year, it is impractical for the 10 11 children of employees of the Park who live within or 12 near the Park to attend other schools served by the 13 two local educational agencies. 14 (b) PURPOSE.—The purpose of this title is to authorize 15 the Secretary of the Interior to provide supplemental funding and other services that are necessary to assist the State 16 of California or local educational agencies in California in 17 providing educational services for students attending 18 19 schools located within the Park. 20 SEC. 302. PAYMENTS FOR EDUCATIONAL SERVICES. 21 (a) AUTHORITY TO PROVIDE FUNDS.—For fiscal years 22 2003 through 2007, the Secretary may provide funds to the 23 Bass Lake Joint Union Elementary School District and the 24 Mariposa Unified School District for educational services 25 to students who are dependents of persons engaged in the

administration, operation, and maintenance of the Park or
 students who live at or near the Park upon real property
 of the United States.

4 (b) LIMITATION ON USE OF FUNDS.—Payments made
5 by the Secretary under this section may not be used for
6 new construction, construction contracts, or major capital
7 improvements, and may be used only to pay public employ8 ees for services otherwise authorized by this title.

9 (c) LIMITATION ON AMOUNT OF FUNDS.—Payments 10 made under this section shall not exceed the lesser of 11 \$750,000 in any fiscal year or the amount necessary to pro-12 vide students described in subsection (a) with educational 13 services that are normally provided and generally available 14 to students who attend public schools elsewhere in the State 15 of California.

16 (d) ADJUSTMENT OF PAYMENTS.—Subject to subsection (c), the Secretary is authorized to adjust payments 17 made under this section if the State of California or the 18 appropriate local educational agencies do not continue to 19 provide funding for educational services at Park schools at 20 21 per student levels that are equivalent to or greater than 22 those provided in the fiscal year prior to the date of enact-23 ment of this title.

24 (e) Source of Payments.—

(1) AUTHORIZED SOURCES.—Except as provided
in paragraph (2), in order to make payments under
this section, the Secretary may use funds available to
the National Park Service from appropriations, dona-
tions, or fees.
(2) EXCEPTIONS.—Funds from the following
sources may not be used to make payments under this
section:
(A) Fees authorized and collected under the
Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965
(16 U.S.C. 460l-4 et seq.).
(B) The recreational fee demonstration pro-
gram under section 315 of the Department of the
Interior and Related Agencies Appropriations
Act, 1996 (as contained in section 101(c) of Pub-
lic Law 104–134; 16 U.S.C. 460l–6a note).
(C) The national park passport program es-
tablished under section 602 of the National
Parks Omnibus Management Act of 1998 (16
U.S.C. 5992).
(D) Emergency appropriations for Yosemite
flood recovery.
(f) DEFINITIONS.—For the purposes of this title, the
following definitions apply:

1	(1) LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES.—The term
2	"local educational agencies" has the meaning given
3	that term in section 9101(26) of the Elementary and
4	Secondary Education Act of 1965.
5	(2) Educational services.—The term "edu-
6	cational services" means services that may include
7	maintenance and minor upgrades of facilities and
8	transportation to and from school.
9	(3) PARK.—The term "Park" means Yosemite
10	National Park.
11	(4) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
12	the Secretary of the Interior.

TITLE IV—ESTABLISHMENT OF GOLDEN CHAIN HIGHWAY AS A NATIONAL HERITAGE COR-RIDOR STUDY

5 SEC. 401. STUDY; REPORT.

6 (a) STUDY.—

7 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after 8 the date that funds are first made available for this 9 section, the Secretary of the Interior, in consultation 10 with the affected local governments, the State govern-11 ment, State and local historic preservation offices, 12 community organizations, and the Golden Chain 13 Council, shall complete a special resource study of the 14 national significance, suitability, and feasibility of 15 establishing Highway 49 in California, known as the 16 "Golden Chain Highway", as a National Heritage 17 Corridor.

18 (2) CONTENTS.—The study shall include an
19 analysis of—

20 (A) the significance of Highway 49 in
21 American history;

(B) options for preservation and use of the
highway;

24 (C) options for interpretation of significant
25 features associated with the highway; and

1	(D) private sector preservation alternatives.
2	(3) Boundaries of study area.—The area
3	studied under this section shall be comprised of High-
4	way 49 in California extending from the city of
5	Oakhurst in Madera County to the city of Tuttletown
6	in Tuolumne County, and lands, structures, and cul-
7	tural resources within the immediate vicinity of the
8	highway.
9	(b) REPORT.—Not later than 30 days after completion
10	

10 of the study required by subsection (a), the Secretary shall
11 submit a report describing the results of the study to the
12 Committee on Resources of the House of Representatives
13 and the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of
14 the Senate.

15 TITLE V—JOHN MUIR NATIONAL 16 HISTORIC SITE BOUNDARY 17 ADJUSTMENT

18 SEC. 501. BOUNDARY ADJUSTMENT.

(a) BOUNDARY.—The boundary of the John Muir National Historic Site is adjusted to include the lands generally depicted on the map entitled "Boundary Map, John
Muir National Historic Site" numbered PWR-OL 42680,044a and dated August 2001.

(b) LAND ACQUISITION.—The Secretary of the Interior
25 is authorized to acquire the lands and interests in lands

identified as the "Boundary Adjustment Area" on the map
 referred to in subsection (a) by donation, purchase with do nated or appropriated funds, exchange, or otherwise.

4 (c) ADMINISTRATION.—The lands and interests in
5 lands described in subsection (b) shall be administered as
6 part of the John Muir National Historic Site established
7 by the Act of August 31, 1964 (78 Stat. 753; 16 U.S.C.
8 461 note).

9 TITLE VI—SAN GABRIEL RIVER 10 WATERSHEDS STUDY

11 SEC. 601. AUTHORIZATION OF STUDY.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of the Interior (hereinafter in this title referred to as the "Secretary") shall conduct a special resource study of the following areas:

(1) The San Gabriel River and its tributaries
north of and including the city of Santa Fe Springs.
(2) The San Gabriel Mountains within the territory of the San Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers
and Mountains Conservancy (as defined in section
32603(c)(1)(C) of the State of California Public Resource Code).

(b) STUDY CONDUCT AND COMPLETION.—Section 8(c)
of Public Law 91–383 (16 U.S.C. 1a–5(c)) shall apply to
the conduct and completion of the study required by this
section.

(c) CONSULTATION WITH FEDERAL, STATE, AND
 LOCAL GOVERNMENTS.—In conducting the study author ized by this section, the Secretary shall consult with the San
 Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers and Mountains Con servancy and other appropriate Federal, State, and local
 governmental entities.

7 (d) CONSIDERATIONS.—In conducting the study au8 thorized by this section, the Secretary shall consider re9 gional flood control and drainage needs and publicly owned
10 infrastructure, including, but not limited to, wastewater
11 treatment facilities.

12 SEC. 602. REPORT.

Not later than 3 years after funds are made available
for this title, the Secretary shall submit to the Committee
on Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate and the
Committee on Resources of the House of Representatives a
report on the findings, conclusions, and recommendations
of the study.
