On October 9, 2002, the Committee on Government Reform approved and adopted a report entitled "Problems with the Presidential Gifts System." The chairman was directed to transmit a copy to the Speaker of the House.

I. Summary of Oversight Findings

Several laws, involving six Federal offices and agencies, govern the current system for the receipt, valuation, and disposition of Presidential gifts. Consequently, no single agency is ultimately responsible for tracking Presidential gifts.

In early 2001, there were numerous press accounts regarding President Clinton's decision to accept close to \$200,000 in gifts during his final year in office, as revealed in his last financial disclosure report. There was also a great deal of press attention focused on furniture gifts returned by the Clintons to the White House residence. To prevent future abuses, the Government Reform Subcommittee on Energy Policy, Natural Resources and Regulatory Affairs spent 11 months conducting oversight and gathering empirical data. The subcommittee investigated how the current system works and what legislative changes, if any, are needed to prevent future abuses of the Presidential gifts process.

In March 2001, Chairman Ose introduced H.R. 1081, "Accountability for Presidential Gifts Act." This bill establishes responsibil-

ity in one agency for the receipt, valuation and disposition of Presidential gifts.

In February 2002, the subcommittee released a 55-page document summarizing the subcommittee's findings. The subcommittee identified a host of problems with the Presidential gifts system, such as consistently undervalued gifts and questionable White House counsel rulings. Since the current system is subject to abuse and political interference, there is a need for centralized accountability in one agency staffed by career employees.

II. REPORT ON THE COMMITTEE'S OVERSIGHT

Current System

Several laws, involving six Federal offices and agencies, govern the current system for the receipt, valuation, and disposition of Presidential gifts. The White House Gifts Unit is responsible for recording all domestic and foreign gifts received by the First Family and White House employees, including the valuation and disposition of gifts. Under the Presidential Records Act of 1978 (44 U.S.C. § 2201–2207), the National Archives and Records Administration [NARA] accepts gifts for Presidential archival depositories (libraries) and provides courtesy storage for Presidential gifts that are not immediately retained by the President but which can be recalled for possible retention by the President.

Under a second law (3 U.S.C. § 109), the Department of the Interior's [DOI] National Park Service [NPS] annually prepares a snapshot inventory of public property in or belonging to the White House residence. In addition, NPS officially accepts gifts for the White House residence.

White House residence.

Under a third law (5 U.S.C. § 7432(f)), the Office of Protocol in the Department of State [DOS] annually publishes a listing of all gifts (both tangible and monetary) from a foreign government to a Federal employee, including to the First Family. The listing includes gifts to the President and Members of Congress.

Under a fourth law (5 U.S.C. App. §103(b) and 5 U.S.C. §102(a)(2)(A)), the Office of Government Ethics [OGE] receives annual financial disclosure reports—which are publicly available—from the President for gifts retained over a reporting threshold from any source other than a relative. The threshold is currently set at \$260 but it will be raised to \$285, retroactive to January 1, 2002.

Last, the General Services Administration [GSA] has detailed career staff to the White House Gifts Unit and is responsible for updating the reporting threshold for gifts (e.g., from \$250 to \$260) and for disposing of some gifts which are not retained by the President or sent to NARA. GSA's regulations require a commercial appraisal for foreign gifts over a reporting threshold that a Federal employee (including the President) wishes to retain (41 C.F.R. § 102–42.40(a)). A recipient may purchase a foreign gift at the appraised value plus the cost of the appraisal (41 C.F.R. § 102–42.140). In contrast, there is no statutory requirement for a commercial appraisal for domestic gifts over a reporting threshold.

Press Reports

In early 2001, there were numerous press accounts detailing gifts retained by the First Family during calendar year 2000 and January 1–20, 2001. These gifts, valued by the White House at \$190,027, were made public in President Clinton's last financial disclosure report, filed on January 20, 2001. For example, a January 25th New York Daily News article included a listing of the gifts disclosed for this nearly 13-month period. The article stated,

A friend of Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton helped solicit donors to buy the pricey gifts that the former First Family took with them as they exited the White House, NBC News said last night. Clinton had registered her choices for gifts in November, just like a bride. NBC said Clinton contributor Rita Pynoos of Beverly Hills, Calif., then urged potential contributors to send a \$5,000 check to the store quickly, before a Senate ethics deadline that bans senators from receiving gifts. . . . The former First Lady was registered at Omaha-based Borsheim's Fine Jewelry and Gifts, a subsidiary of Warren Buffett's Bershire Hathaway, an aide confirmed earlier (1/25/01, New York Daily News, see Appendix A).

Another example was an article entitled, "A Shower of Gifts for Hillary and Bill; Why did the Clintons troll for freebies they can surely afford?," in the February 5, 2001 edition of Time magazine. This article also stated that potential donors "had been contacted by political supporter Rita Pynoos, who is married to a California developer, to send the gift registry a \$5,000 check" (2/5/01, Time, see Appendix A).

There was another string of press reports in February 2001 about gifts of furniture removed from the White House by the Clintons, which were later returned to the U.S. Government. For example, from February 5th to 10th, the Washington Post ran five stories and one editorial (see Appendix A). Two of these articles were captioned "Gifts Were Not Meant for Clintons, Some Donors Say" and "Clintons Shipped Furniture Year Ago; White House Usher Doubted Ownership." In the former, a previous Commissioner of the Internal Revenue Service [IRS] was quoted as saying, "If someone gave something of value to the White House as the White House and not to the president, that is a gift to the government of the United States . . . a charitable contribution" and the Clintons "have no business taking it with them. That is conversion of government property and income to them." The latter begins by stating.

President Bill Clinton and his wife started shipping furniture from the White House to the Clintons' newly purchased home in New York more than a year ago, despite questions at the time by the chief usher about whether they were entitled to remove the items. The day before the items were shipped out, White House chief usher Gary J. Walters said he asked whether the Clintons should be taking the furnishings because he believed that they were

government property donated as part of a White House redecoration project in 1993.

Investigation

In February 2001, the subcommittee began an inquiry into this matter to determine if legislative changes were needed to curb abuses. This section briefly details steps taken by the subcommittee to gather information.

On February 13, 2001, Subcommittee Chairman Ose faxed a draft letter to the Acting Director of NPS (see Appendix B). This letter stated:

The Subcommittee on Energy Policy, Natural Resources, and Regulatory Affairs is conducting oversight of the National Park Service's (NPS's) implementation of 3 U.S.C. §§ 109–110 relating to public property—including furniture and furnishings—belonging to the Executive Residence at the White House. The law requires NPS to annually inventory all such public property, including when purchased, its costs, condition, and final disposition. Since the 1948 enactment of these provisions, the Department of the Interior (DOI) appears to have not issued codified regulations governing implementation.

. . . please provide the Subcommittee with each of the annual NPS inventories from June 1992 to present and any non-codified guidance issued by DOI governing implementation, including internal and external DOI guidance documents. In addition, please provide all correspondence (including e-mails) relating to any furniture and furnishings which former President Clinton removed from the Executive Residence at any time since January 20, 1993 and all correspondence (including e-mails) relating to gifts received by the Clintons from November 3, 1992 to January 20, 2001.

On February 22, 2001, subcommittee staff visited NPS to inspect its annual inventory. There is only one copy of this inventory, which NPS protects and will not copy. For example, NPS staff used white gloves to turn pages. NPS had established its own numbering system and its own electronic database, which is not linked to any other agency's database.

On February 27, 2001, the subcommittee requested by telephone that OGE provide a copy of each of the eight financial disclosure reports filed by President Clinton with OGE. Later that day, OGE was only able to provide seven of the eight reports due to its 6-year record retention requirement (see relevant parts of these reports in Appendix C). As a consequence, on October 29, 2001, Subcommittee Chairman Ose sent a followup letter to the Archivist, specifically requesting the remaining, first financial disclosure statement filed by President Clinton with OGE (see Appendixes B and C, respectively).

On March 1, 2001, at a full committee hearing, entitled, "The Controversial Pardon of International Fugitive Marc Rich—Day 2," Subcommittee Chairman Ose questioned former White House officials about their role in the process of receiving and disposing of

gifts. For instance, he asked former counsel to the President Beth Nolan, "in your role as counsel, Ms. Nolan, have you ever been involved in judgment calls on any of these gifts or setting the policy or determining . . . what's a personal gift and what's for archives? Have you ever played a part in that?" She replied, "It's not normally a legal question." Later, Chairman Ose asked, "How is the value of the gift that's received determined?" Former White House chief of staff John Podesta replied, "By the Gifts Unit, which is staffed by a career employee, I believe of the General Services Administration, who's detailed to the White House." Mr. Ose continued, "is there a check on these valuations?" Mr. Podesta replied, "I don't believe there's any re-review of the career employee's decision about what a gift is worth."

On March 5, 2001, Subcommittee Chairman Ose sent a letter to the Archivist of the United States who is head of NARA (see Ap-

pendix B). This letter stated:

The Subcommittee on Energy Policy, Natural Resources and Regulatory Affairs is conducting an investigation of the laws, codified rules, and noncodified guidance documents governing gifts for the Executive Residence at the White House, the President, and the Presidential archival depositories. Under various authorities, the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) accepts for deposit certain material (familiarly known as "courtesy storage"), accepts gifts for Presidential archival depositories, and deposits Presidential records in Presidential archival depositories.

. . . please provide the subcommittee by March 20, 2001 with: (a) access to all existing databases (including but not limited to NARA's read-only database and the White House Gifts Unit's database) about gifts for the President, Executive Mansion, or The William J. Clinton Presidential Center (including the Clinton Presidential Library) processed by the White House Gifts Unit from January 20, 1993 to January 20, 2001; (b) copies of the "green sheets" for all items not yet included in these databases; (c) copies of the deeds of gifts to NARA for all items in the White House Craft Collection or any other gifts (such as gowns) accepted by NARA for the Clinton Presidential archival depository and any information related to any of these items that may have been removed (including loans to the Clintons); (d) copies of the "green sheets" for all items recalled from November 1, 1999 to January 20, 2001 and any information related to the return of any items to the White House by the Clintons after January 20, 2001; and (e) any inventories, correspondence, e-mail or other information about any Clinton personal material for which NARA provided courtesy storage since January 20, 1993.

In addition, please provide the Subcommittee by April 5, 2001 with: (f) all correspondence and e-mail relating to gifts received by the Clintons from January 20, 1993 to

January 20, 2001.

In a March 7, 2001 e-mail, the subcommittee requested certain information from GSA (see Appendix B). The e-mail stated:

The House Government Reform Subcommittee on Energy Policy, Natural Resources and Regulatory Affairs is conducting an investigation of the laws, codified rules, and noncodified guidance documents governing gifts for the Executive Residence at the White House and the President. Using special regulatory authority (5 C.F.R. § 315.602), the General Services Administration (GSA) hired non-competitively an employee working both in the White House Travel Office and the White House Gift Unit and then detailed her to the White House Gift Unit. She became Director of the Unit and, thus, she was responsible for the operations of the Unit, including its receipt, administration, and disposition of the gifts. . . . please provide by March 22, 2001, the Subcommittee with all GSA documents, correspondence and e-mail relating to gifts received for the Executive Residence at the White House and the President from January 20, 1993 to January 20, 2001, including but not limited to the following: all GSA records (including any authored, received or mentioning GSA employee Lori Krause), including any relating to receipt, administration (including evaluation and appraisal) and disposition of gifts for the Executive Residence at the White House and the President.

Non-Competitive Hiring of Political Appointee for Career Job

In response to the subcommittee's inquiry, GSA provided information about the May 24, 1998, non-competitive hiring of Lori Krause as a career employee and the subsequent detail of her by GSA to the White House Gifts Unit. Ms. Krause's prior work experience included only political positions. At the March 1, 2001, hearing, noted above, former White House chief of staff John Podesta assured the committee that a career employee made the gift valuations

Ms. Krause's resume shows no prior experience in gift valuations. It shows that she served as: (a) a staff member in the Correspondence Department in the Clinton/Gore Presidential Transition (from November 1992 to January 1993); (b) a writer in Presidential correspondence (from January to February 1993); (c) an unspecified position in the White House Volunteer Office (from March to April 1993); (d) director of the Presidential Correspondence Intern Program (from March 1993 to March 1997); (e) an unspecified position doing advance work for the White House Travel Office (from October 1994 until her hiring by GSA); and (f) an unspecified position in the White House Gifts Unit (from April 1995 until her hiring by GSA).

Appendix D includes: GSA's posted announcement for intended competitive hiring of a career employee to be detailed to the White House Gifts Unit, GSA's cancellation notice for a competitive selection, Ms. Krause's resume, and a March 9, 2001, internal GSA routing slip. This document stated, "Ms. Krause did not apply for any announcement. She was noncompetitively appointed on a special hiring authority."

In response to Chairman Ose's March 5, 2001, letter, on March 22, 2001, NARA provided the subcommittee with 73 "Acknowledgment of Gift and Nonexclusive License" agreements (also known as deeds of gift) for items in the White House craft collection. All 73 craft objects were by living artists. NARA's cover letter states, "These are the only items that were donated in this manner to the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA)"

National Archives and Records Administration (NARA)."

NARA's letter also stated, "With respect to the remainder of your request, we believe that it would be useful to meet with you to discuss facilitating access to items (a), (b), (d) and (e) and to discuss narrowing your request for item (f). Responding to item (f) as written, would place an enormous burden on NARA" (see Appendix B).

NARA orally informed the subcommittee that NARA provided 8 years of free "courtesy" storage for personal property owned by the Clintons prior to the start of the Clinton Presidency. In response to Chairman Ose's March 5th letter, on April 3, 2001, NARA provided the subcommittee with a copy of the "Deposit Agreement regarding the Administration of Personal Materials of President William J. Clinton, Hillary Rodham Clinton and Chelsea Clinton In the President William J. Clinton Library," which was signed by President Clinton on January 16, 2001 (i.e., at the end of the Presidency) and then co-signed by the Archivist on March 1st. The agreement provides that NARA "shall arrange for and bear the expense of shipping the Personal Property from Washington, D.C. to the temporary library storage facility in Little Rock, Arkansas, and thereafter, to the Clinton Library once it is constructed," "Personal Property may be conveyed to the United States at some future time," and "The Owners may from time to time, with permission of the National Archives, deposit additional Personal Property to be held and maintained by the National Archives."

A 14-page list of personal property items, entitled, "Curatorial Inventory of Clinton Gubernatorial Boxes," was attached to this agreement. The list, with the names of each "donor," included art objects and other miscellaneous items but no furniture items. NARA told the subcommittee staff that this list constituted a small

subset of all of the items covered by the agreement.

Also on April 3, 2001, NARA provided the subcommittee with backup information about the White House craft collection, including a July 28, 1996, letter to NARA sent on behalf of one of the donors. This letter sought to ensure that the gift was recognized by the IRS as a tax deductible contribution to the U.S. Government. It stated, "I must provide the IRS with a completed form in order to document the donation" (see Appendix E).

On April 20, 2001, GSA sent an e-mail to the subcommittee (see

Appendix B). It stated:

. . . in response to your request for the disposition of National Park Service (NPS) property that is excess to its needs, including property within its jurisdiction at the White House, the Department of Interior (NPS) would report property excess to its needs to GSA for normal disposition. Once the property is reported to GSA as excess to the Department's needs, GSA screens the property for Federal use by other agencies. If no agency has a need for the property then the property is declared surplus and un-

dergoes donation screening by the State Agencies for Surplus Property (SASP). If no SASP claims the property then the property is sold.

GSA plays no role in the acceptance of gifts by the NPS under their authorities. GSA recommends that you contact the NPS directly with any questions you have with respect to that process.

After officially requesting Presidential records under the Presidential Records Act by a March 5, 2001 letter to NARA, as noted above, after a May 8th meeting with the former President's representatives, on May 9, 2001, the subcommittee finally received access to Presidential gift records and the White House Gifts Unit's database (see Appendix B). Also, NARA informed the subcommittee that its March 5th request for "all correspondence and e-mail relating to gifts received by the Clintons from January 20, 1993 to January 20, 2001" could not be processed for many months, if not years, due to other pending congressional requests. However, on May 9th, NARA did provide a few e-mails from NARA to the White House Gifts Unit.

Two of the NARA e-mail exchanges with Lori Krause, head of the White House Gifts Unit, are provided in Appendix F. They are indicative of a multi-agency system which has problems in tracking gifts. A January 3, 2000 e-mail from NARA to Ms. Krause says, "Im afraid we havn't turned up the clothing from #32 or the sweats from #131—we had a look again in the boxes indicated, and in adjacent boxes to see if it might have been an easy misfile. No luck. And they dont show up at all any more in our Domestic database (records used to be completely deleted when stuff was recalled), so we have no additional clues as to where they might be." A September 1, 2000 e-mail from NARA to Ms. Krause says about one two-part gift item that it "got lost in our mounting craziness."

As a result of the access restriction noted above, the subcommit-

As a result of the access restriction noted above, the subcommittee was only able to examine NPS's annual inventory and other records for the White House residence, the financial disclosure reports still in OGE's files and the additional one provided by NARA, NARA's database for the former administration, and the White House Gifts Unit's database for the former administration.

Findings

The White House gifts system had 94,178 gift records (many of which included multiple gift items) to the former First Family during the two-term Presidency. The former First Family retained one or more gift items in 16 percent (14,770) of these gift records. The former President disclosed on his annual financial statements less than 2 percent of these retained gifts (227 of 14,770), each valued at \$260 or more. These 227 gifts totaled \$361,968. Of that total, \$190,027 in gifts were accepted in the final year of the Clinton Presidency.

Some Gifts Over the Reporting Threshold Were Not Disclosed

Several charts reveal details of these and other findings. The law requires the President to disclose each retained gift of \$260 or more on his annual financial statements submitted to OGE. Chart I–A shows details of the 227 retained gifts valued at \$260 or more which were disclosed. This chart also includes an additional 26 retained gifts of \$260 or more which were not disclosed; some of these were gifts which the Clintons intended to purchase from the U.S. Government. 61 retained gifts of \$260 or more were not appraised or otherwise independently valued. Two examples of gift records (with one donor's address redacted for privacy) for undisclosed retained gifts over the \$260 threshold are provided. They include: a Palm VII palm pilot, which was valued at \$449 and for which no donor name was indicated; and gift of a Baccarat crystal sculpture and a shirt, which were valued at \$255 and \$40, respectively.

Retained gifts of \$260 or more included a variety of items, ranging from a \$38,000 glass sculpture and a \$25,350 Lenox crystal bowl to \$172,926 in art objects and books, \$68,770 in furniture (sofas, chairs, carpets, etc.), and \$39,875 in china and silver to \$25,955 in golf items, \$23,798 in clothing, \$5,975 in jewelry, and other types of items.

Some Gifts Were Solicited

OGE's rules state that a Federal employee 1 shall not solicit a gift (5 C.F.R. $\S 2635.202(c)(2)$). Nonetheless, in December 2000 (i.e., after the former First Lady was elected a U.S. Senator but before her term began), the former First Lady received \$38,617 in china and sterling silver gifts purchased from Borsheim's in Omaha, NE (see Chart I-B).

[Chart I–B follows:]

¹In the litigation surrounding the President's Task Force on National Health Care Reform, which was chaired by the First Lady, the Clinton administration's Department of Justice argued that the First Lady was a de facto full-time Federal employee (Association of American Physicians and Surgeons, Inc. et al. v. Hillary Rodham Clinton, et al., 989 F. Supp. 8, D.D.C. 1997). In reaching its decision, the District Court relied upon a 1993 decision of the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals that found that the First Lady was the "functional equivalent" of a full-time Federal officer or employee and that the Task Force was, therefore, exempt from the Federal Advisory Committee Act (AAPS v. Clinton, 997 F.2d 898, D.C. Cir. 1993). In its opinion, the Court of Appeals concurred with the Justice Department's assertion that, "the traditional, if informal, status and 'duties' of the President's wife as 'First Lady' gives her de facto officer or employee status" (Id. at 904).


March 10, 2000 press report revealed that the First Lady was in Omaha, NE the day before (on March 9th) and that "[Warren] Buffett spent two hours with HRC [Hillary Rodman Clinton] during her 5 1/2 hour visit, most of it at his store [Borsheim's] where she shopped for china and silverware for her new home" (3/10/00, the National Journal's Hotline, see Appendix A). In a December 24, 2000 op-ed, Maureen Dowd stated in the New York Times, "Lissa Muscatine, Mrs. Clinton's spokeswoman, says that the first lady's silver and china patterns can be found at Borsheim's. Hillary shopped there when she was in Omaha last March to raise campaign money, with Mr. Buffett's help. I clicked onto Borsheim's bridal registry on the Web to sample the merchandise. What would Mrs. Clinton like? Just some basics to get her started. Place settings for 40, including oyster forks and marmalade spoons?" (12/24/00, the New York Times, see Appendix A).


It is clear that the former First Lady was registered at Borsheim's and that she solicited these gifts because, unlike gifts from Tiffany's, Neiman Marcus and other fancy retailers which only require the name of the intended gift recipient to see his or her gift registry, Borsheim's Web site says "Friend's Wish List—View a friend's wish list (You will need their e-mail address and wish list password)." Three Web pages from the Tiffany's and Borsheim's Web sites reveal how their respective gift selection processes work (see three graphics). This means that the 11 donors who purchased these gifts from Borsheim's needed to know both the former First Lady's personal e-mail address and personal password to purchase items from her "wish list." All 11 of these gift records (with the donors' addresses redacted for privacy) are pro-

vided.

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

Many Gifts Were Undervalued²

In addition, the former First Family retained thousands of other gifts valued at less than \$260, which were not required to be disclosed. Chart II includes an additional \$24,012 of retained gifts, which were each valued at \$240 to \$259, which is just below the threshold. 49 percent of these gifts were not appraised or otherwise independently valued. Two examples of gift records (with the donors' addresses redacted for privacy) are provided. They include a Yves Saint Laurent men's suit, which the White House "estimated" at \$249, and a framed John Quincy Adams signed original land grant from 1826, which the White House "estimated" at \$240. Both appear to be significantly undervalued.

Charts I and II account for about 2 percent of all gifts retained by the former First Family. The remaining 98 percent of the retained gifts (14,445 gift records) were each valued by the White House at \$239 or less.

From calls to retailers and Web searches, the subcommittee found that 69 percent of certain fair-trade gifts (i.e., brand name goods widely sold) were undervalued. Many fair-trade items were not appraised or otherwise independently valued. Many were valued by the White House at less than \$260 and, thus, not subject to disclosure. Chart III—A includes 26 examples of undervalued items. Some of these gifts, if properly valued (i.e., valued at or over \$260), should have been included in the former President's annual financial disclosure reports or increased in value.

Some Gifts Were Not Included in the White House Database

Some known gifts to the First Family were not included in the White House gifts database. Therefore, the database is incomplete. For example, the independent counsel's report stated, "By her estimate, [Monica Lewinsky] gave [President Clinton] about 30 items." Chart IV-A includes the only three gift records in the database for gifts from Monica Lewinsky.

Some Gifts Were Lost

Some gifts were "misplaced" or "lost." Chart IV-B includes 30 examples of them, including a 7 foot 3 inches by 6 foot 2 inches oriental rug (valued at \$1,200) and an inscribed Tiffany silver box ental rug (valued at \$1,200) and an inscribed liftary silver box (valued at \$271), both of which were "on loan in the Residence" but later "Misplaced by Staff Member, Never Conveyed to the President." Even though both gifts were physically in the Executive residence, they were never officially accepted by NPS for the Executive residence so neither appears on any NPS annual inventory. Questionable White House Counsel Rulings

Despite former counsel to the President Beth Nolan's March 1, 2001 testimony, noted above, that treatment of gifts is not usually a legal question, the White House counsel made some unusual rulings relating to gifts, which were oddly reflected in the treatment of gifts (see Chart V). For example, in 2000, counsel advised "it would be a bad idea to accept" 10 shares of General Electric stock and thus the gift was returned to the sender. However, the former First Family retained a 1997 gift of 15 shares of Coca-Cola stock, valued at \$1,027. Both of these gift records (with the donors' addresses redacted for privacy) are provided. Publicly-traded stocks are cash equivalents. Cash gifts cannot be accepted.³

Furniture

The former First Family received 45 furniture gifts, valued at \$94,365. Six of these gifts were never disclosed in the former President's annual financial disclosure reports. The accounting of the 45 furniture gifts is remarkable in its complexity (see Chart VI). Usually, the chief usher for the Executive residence decides if items should be accepted for the Executive residence and then NPS sends an official thank you letter as proof for the donor of his or her contribution to the Federal Government. However, on March 24, 1993 (i.e., 2 months after the inauguration), deputy counsel to the President, Vince Foster, directed the chief usher that certain items already received by the White House and certain items not yet received (such as two sofas valued at \$8,750 each and a \$4,600 coffee table) were to be accepted by NPS for the Executive residence (see Appendix G). As noted above, Appendix E included a letter which sought to ensure that a gift to the U.S. Government was recognized by the IRS as a tax deductible contribution. Mr. Foster's memorandum ensured that the noted furniture gifts for the Executive residence could be recognized by the IRS as tax deductible contributions to the U.S. Government. A sample NPS letter acknowledging one of these furniture gifts—sent in July 1993 for the two sofas not yet received when Mr. Foster directed their acceptance in March 1993—is also provided in Appendix E.

Then, on April 22, 1994, associate counsel to the President, Cheryl Mills, contradictingly wrote the director of the White House Gifts Unit about the three items discussed above and many others (see Appendix G). Ms. Mills stated:

The National Park Service initially thought these gifts to the President were to be accepted for the permanent White House collection; it therefore sent thank you letters to each of the donors. Upon discovering that the President had indicated a desire to have these items go to the Clinton Presidential library, the National Park Service elected not to accept these items; therefore, the Park Service never declared these gifts as accepted for the permanent White House collection.

All three of the furniture items in this example were taken from the White House Residence by the former First Family and then returned to the NPS in February-March 2001.

Some U.S. Property Was Taken

It is illegal to remove U.S. Government property. Therefore, after unfavorable press reports, in February-March 2001, the former First Family returned 25 furniture items to NPS. However, in September 2001, NPS apparently returned two of these items (a \$1,725 easy chair and a \$675 ottoman) back to the former First Family since neither had been officially accepted by NPS for the White House Residence. A copy of the gift record (with the donor's address redacted for privacy), which includes these two items, is provided. Also, four furniture gifts (such as a \$9,600 TV armoire and a \$3,895 gaming table) were never disclosed on the former President's annual financial disclosure reports since the White House counsel's office in a January 3, 2000, memorandum stated that they were "accepted" prior to the inauguration even though they were not received in the White House until July 20, 1993 (i.e., 6 months after the inauguration) (see Appendix G). How can you "accept" a gift not yet in hand? And, why did the White House counsel opine in 2000 on gifts received 7 years before? A copy of the four gift records (with the donors' addresses redacted for privacy), which include these four items, are provided.



The former First Family still has 21 more furniture items, none of which ever appeared in NPS's White House annual June snapshot inventory. 19 of these items, valued at \$38,328, were received on December 1, 2000, i.e., after the former First Lady was elected a U.S. Senator but before her term began on January 3, 2001. A graphic revealing the history of the furniture gifts to the Clintons is provided.

Most Furniture Gifts Were Coordinated

Last, the gift records reveal that the Clintons' interior decorator, Kaki Hockersmith from Arkansas, "coordinated" 43 of the 45 furniture gifts received during the 8-year Presidency—largely at the beginning of the administration and in December 2000. Her coordination ensured that there was only one dining room table, one chandelier, etc.

Comparison

Chart VII reveals that President George H.W. Bush received 41,779 gifts in 4 years in office, which is an amount similar in magnitude to President Clinton's 94,178 gifts in 8 years in office. During George H.W. Bush's Presidency, the reporting threshold was \$100; the threshold increased to \$250 before the start of the Clinton Presidency. As noted above, Chart II includes an additional \$24,012 of gifts to the Clintons valued just below the new threshold. The value of gifts to the Clintons from \$100 to \$240 was not totaled. As a consequence, it is impossible to directly compare the total value of gifts retained by these two Presidents. However, it should be noted that there is no evidence of improper gift acceptance, valuation or retention by the former Bush administration.

The subcommittee's investigation was intended to reveal whether there is a problem that needs a legislative solution. Some may ask why the subcommittee chose only to explore in-depth the 94,178 gift records (many of which included multiple gifts) from the most recent 8-year period. The subcommittee's 1-year examination clearly demonstrated that the current system is broken. Examining indepth 41,779 additional gift records for the previous 4-year Presidency was unnecessary to accomplish the purpose of the investigation.

Other Findings

Some Gift Certificates Were Accepted

After the subcommittee's February 12, 2002, hearing, the subcommittee compiled three additional charts. Chart VIII includes information about 22 of the 125 gift certificate gifts. The Clintons retained 11 of these gifts, totaling \$940 in estimated value. For example, in a 10-day period at the end of the second term, four White House staff members (including assistant to the President and deputy counsel to the President, Bruce Lindsay, and personal secretary Maggie Williams) each gave the President a \$100 gift certificate to the Sharper Image, all four of which he retained. These appear to be "coordinated" gifts. The four gift records (with the donors' addresses redacted for privacy) are provided. Chart VIII also shows that some gift certificates were returned to the donor. For example, the gift record for a \$200 gift certificate to Casual Corner states, "return to sender—the White House can not (sic) accept money as mail." Also, the gift record for a \$25 gift certificate to B. Dalton Bookseller confirms that gift certificates are not allowed to be retained; it states, "files—Money mail cannot be accepted by the White House."

Denise Rich's former husband Marc Rich received a last-day (January 20, 2001) pardon from the President. The 44 gifts from the Kayes totaled \$19,255 in estimated value. Denise Rich, the Dozoretzs, and the Kayes gave furniture gifts to the Clintons in December 2000. The Pynoos and Cantors gave china/silver gifts from Borsheim's to the Clintons in December 2000. The following donors were investigated by this committee in its campaign fundraising investigation: James Riady, Johnny Chung, Charlie Trie, and Pauline Kanchanalek. William Fugazy also received a last-day Presidential pardon.

Huge Gifts to the Presidential Library

Chart X includes some of the large non-monetary gifts (each valued over \$5,000) for the Presidential library. For example, Malcolm S. Forbes gave a \$90,000 framed handwritten letter by President Truman.⁴ This chart includes gifts which total nearly \$1 million in value.

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Proposed Legislation and Hearings

On March 15, 2001, Subcommittee Chairman Ose introduced H.R. 1081, the "Accountability for Presidential Gifts Act." This bill establishes responsibility in one agency for the receipt, valuation

and disposition of Presidential gifts.

On February 12, 2002, the subcommittee held a hearing entitled, "Accountability for Presidential Gifts." The subcommittee presented results from its 1-year investigation and received comments on H.R. 1081. At the hearing, Chairman Ose released a 55-page document summarizing the subcommittee's findings. Witnesses included: Scott Harshbarger, president and chief executive officer, Common Cause; Paul Light, director, Center for Public Service, the Brookings Institution; Gregory S. Walden, former associate counsel, White House Counsel's Office, President George H.W. Bush and former ethics counsel for President-Elect George W. Bush's transition, currently of counsel, Patton Boggs LLP; and William H. Taft IV, Legal Advisor, DOS. Both Bruce R. Lindsey, former assistant to the President and deputy counsel to the President and current designated representative for President Clinton, and Lori Krause, former head of the White House Gifts Unit during the Clinton administration, declined to testify about the Clinton administration (see Appendix B for letters inviting them to testify and the reply from former President Clinton's Office).

Messrs. Harshbarger, Light, and Walden-either in their written statements or in response to Member questions—all recommended that Subcommittee Chairman Ose refer this matter for criminal investigation by the Department of Justice [DOJ]. Therefore, on February 13th, Chairman Ose sent the Attorney General evidence relating to the solicitation, receipt, failure to report, or conversion of Presidential gifts by the former President and First Lady (see Appendix H). One of the documents forwarded was Mr. Walden's written statement. In a section captioned "Evidence of widespread or systemic failures should be investigated," he concluded that such evidence could form the basis for a DOJ investigation of possible violations of 18 U.S.C. § 1001 (regarding false statements), 18 U.S.C. §641 (regarding conversion of Federal property) and 5 C.F.R. §2635.202(c)(1), (2), (j) (regarding solicitation of a gratuity).

Additionally, witnesses recommended that H.R. 1081 be amended to: (a) disclose all gifts received over a minimal threshold, (b) cap gifts (except personalized, honorific awards and gifts from relatives or foreign officials) over a certain threshold, (c) prohibit acceptance of gifts in certain periods, and (d) prohibit the solicitation or coordination of gifts.

On June 18, 2002, the Government Reform Subcommittee on Government Efficiency, Financial Management and Intergovernmental Relations held a hearing on H.R. 1081. Witnesses included: John W. Carlin, Archivist of the United States, NARA; P. Daniel Smith, Special Assistant to the Director, NPS, DOI; and Messrs. Harshbarger, Light, and Walden. The subcommittee also orally increased the approach White House to have a witness testify at the vited the current White House to have a witness testify at the hearing but the Bush administration declined to do so.

The hearing revealed that, to date, only minor changes have been made by the new Bush administration to address the problems revealed in February 2002. These include a new requirement for a statement of intent from the donor for each furniture gift intended for the White House residence, and some changes by NARA. NARA's "newest" procedures now include separately tracking each part of a gift record which includes multiple gifts, and tracking both gifts which are recalled by the President for additional consideration for retention and recalled gifts which are returned to NARA after the President's additional review. A copy of NARA's "newest" procedures which were appended to the Archivist's testimony is provided in Appendix I (see page 4). It is unclear if they will protect against other items lost in the transfer from the White House Gifts Unit to NARA (see Appendix F).

Again, witnesses recommended that H.R. 1081 be amended to: (a) disclose all gifts received over a minimal threshold—possibly using the same rules as apply to Members of Congress, (b) cap gifts (except personalized, honorific awards and gifts from relatives or foreign officials) over a certain threshold, (c) prohibit acceptance of gifts in certain periods, and (d) prohibit the solicitation or coordina-

tion of gifts.

Additionally, Mr. Harshbarger recommended that more information be provided about each donor, including possibly his employer and occupation. He also stated, "Reform is further necessary to preclude White House Counsels from having too much leeway in interpreting standards (as they do under the status quo)" (page 4, written statement). Mr. Light added, "To the extent possible, valuation should be independent, consistent, and based on a clearly transparent methodology" (page 3, written statement). Mr. Walden concurred, stating, "If there are no written guidelines on how to conduct a valuation, including when it is necessary to obtain a commercial or independent appraisal, guidelines could be written after consultation with other appraisal experts" (page 3, written statement). Mr. Walden also recommended that the NPS inventory be a continuing inventory rather than an annual event, and "as a first step the Archivist and Park Service should adopt a common database" (page 4, Walden's written statement). He elaborated in his oral statement, saying, "Perhaps we should explore how the Park Service database and the Archivist's database and the White House gifts office database can be harmonized" (page 59, transcript).

Last, in answer to a question from Chairman Horn ("do you know what changes the White House gifts office has made to improve its controls?"), both NARA and NPS were unable to provide any information (pages 86–87, transcript). The Archivist stated, "I cannot speak specifically to exactly what has gone on . . . It is

clear they have made adjustments" (page 87, transcript).

On July 24, 2002, the subcommittee invited staff from all six agencies involved in the Presidential gifts system to a July 31st bipartisan work session to determine what other changes, if any, were made by the Bush administration to address the problems identified by the subcommittee in the Presidential gifts system. The meeting time was established to accommodate and ensure the participation of NARA. Nonetheless, after the White House declined to attend, NARA also decided not to attend. In the end, three of the six agencies—the White House, NARA and DOS—chose not to attend. The other three—GSA, OGE and NPS—attended.

These three agencies revealed only one additional change since January 20, 2001: GSA has not detailed any staff—career or otherwise—to the White House Gifts Unit. The agencies also confirmed that: (a) since January 20, 2001, there has been no interagency meeting or other coordination (such as via e-mail) between the six agencies; (b) there is still no unified database system in use by the six agencies for the receipt, valuation and disposition of Presidential gifts, i.e., the White House, NARA, NPS and GSA continue to each have their own separate electronic systems; (c) there is no single numbering system for Presidential gifts, i.e., GSA cannot track the Presidential gifts presented by the White House Gifts Unit to GSA for disposal; and (d) there is no standard protocol for uniformity in handling Presidential gifts, including for valuation and appraisals. In an August 2nd telephone conversation, NARA confirmed these facts.

Also, after the meeting, GSA confirmed that it only tracked—using its own numbering system—all or parts of 44 of the 334 gift records in the White House gifts database with a disposition as purchased from GSA or with GSA for disposal. All but two of these gifts were to a White House staff member. Seven were purchased by the recipient from the Federal Government, including an \$800 gift purchased by the former President and a \$2,800 gift from Yasser Arafat purchased by Sandy Berger. Four examples of these gift records (with the domestic donors' addresses redacted for privacy) are provided. They include these two purchases, a \$13,700 gift to a White House staff member, and a \$450 1.2 ounce solid gold coin in a presentation box from Charlie Trie to Mark Middleton. Chart XI includes information on the 56 gifts (from the 334) valued at \$250 or more which were sent to GSA for disposition. The chart reveals that the ultimate disposition is unknown for many of these gifts.

III. CONCLUSIONS

The committee finds that the American people have the right to know what gifts were received and retained by their President. Donors should receive no unfair advantage in the policymaking process or other governmental benefits.

The committee also finds that the subcommittee's investigation revealed startling information about retained gifts, valuation of gifts, missing gifts, legal rulings about gifts, and other findings.

The total value of gifts retained by the former First Family creates at least an appearance problem. The fact that so many gifts were undervalued raises many questions. The fact that gifts were misplaced or lost shows sloppy management and maybe more. The fact that U.S. Government property was improperly taken is troubling. And, the fact that, after the former First Lady's election to the U.S. Senate and before she was subject to the Congress' very strict gift acceptance rules, the former First Family accepted nearly \$40,000 in furniture gifts and the First Lady solicited nearly \$40,000 in fine china and silver is at the very least disturbing. Public servants, including the President, should not be able to enrich themselves with lavish gifts.

The current system is clearly broken and needs to be fixed.

WASHINGTON - A friend of Sen. Hillary Rodham **Clinton** helped solicit donors to buy the pricey gifts that the former First Family took with them as they exited the White House, NBC News said last night.

Clinton had registered her choices for gifts in November, just like a bride.

NBC said **Clinton** contributor Rita Pynoos of Beverly Hills, Calif., then urged potential contributors to send a \$5,000 check to the store quickly, before a Senate ethics deadline that bans senators from receiving gifts. The donors had no idea what their money bought, according to the network.

But Pynoos, a longtime **Clinton** friend who lives in Marina Del Ray, Calif., insisted to the Daily News last night: "None of it's true. . . . Whatever they are talking about, it's not true."

The Clintons received \$190,027 in gifts, mostly home furnishings, according to their financial disclosure statement released last week.

In addition to denying soliciting any gifts for the Clintons, Pynoos told The News she gave the **Clintons** a single gift - flatware

The **Clintons'** financial disclosure statement reported that Pynoos also gave the First Lady an expensive cashmere shawl. The flatware and shawl were valued at \$5,767.

"I don't know about the cashmere shawl. I haven't given her a cashmere shawl, " said a distraught Pynoos. "I have a friendship with Hillary, and have for years, and that's it. I'm not in the political field at all."

Clinton's spokesman denied any wrongdoing. "The **Clintons** received gifts while in the White House, as did previous Presidents. All complied with relevant rules and ethics regulations," said Howard Wolfson.

Why did the Clintons troll for freebies they can surely afford?

Last month, when newspapers reported that Hillary Rodham **Clinton had registered** for gifts like a bride at a department store, many of her friends insisted Hillary simply wouldn't do something that tacky. Now that the President and First Lady have filed their annual financial-disclosure report, we have proof they would. Amid the DVD player and chandelier were \$ 22,000 in china and \$ 18,000 in silverware. Only one gift looks like a quid pro quo: furniture valued at \$ 7,375 from Denise Rich, the ex-wife of Marc Rich, the fugitive tycoon pardoned last week.

The rest just smells bad. Most of us look at the platter from Aunt Katie with a wave of affection. Can you really get a warm glow from a place setting sent by a contributor you barely know who's angling for your attention? I'd stack my dishes on the floor before I'd accept a china cabinet from Walter Kaye, the insurance mogul who also delivered intern Monica Lewinsky to the West Wing. What's most revealing here is not the gifts themselves-although it is hard to picture one adult giving another a sofa--but how horrified people were at the very suggestion that Hillary would lean on supporters to furnish her house. The Clintons have long dismissed the criticism of those in the vast right-wing conspiracy whom they don't respect. But how do you dismiss the views of those you do respect--who insist you would never sink so low, until they are silenced by proof of your grasping?

No prior First Family has reported a \$ 190,000-plus haul in their last year (the Bushes only reported \$ 52,000; Ronald Reagan's friends bought him a \$ 2.5 million house, which he rented for \$ 15,000 a month). While the givers may have hoped their generosity might remain a little secret between them and the recipients, the Clintons, well aware of disclosure requirements, had no such expectation. Even as Hillary was registering for the china (Spode) and the silver (Faberge), she understood that the day would come when she would have to admit to the world what she had done. In the absence of a law (the Senate gift ban didn't take effect for Hillary until Jan. 3) or an active conscience, you might think shame would rein in the Clintons. How many people would park in a handicapped space if they knew the next morning's paper would carry a picture of it? Answer: no one not in need of therapy.

Most Presidents are felled by failures of their office--Carter by the hostages, Nixon by Watergate, Johnson by Vietnam--but the **Clintons** have been brought down almost entirely by their sexual and financial escapades, the former his, the latter hers. Hillary's lapses have been explained away by her husband's low pay in Arkansas. Yet by most standards, the **Clintons** lived large in Little Rock; she was a partner in one of the city's leading law firms, they called the Governor's mansion home, and had only one child to put through college. Still, she got the family enmeshed in a shabby get-rich-quick land deal and cattle futures, which led to the Whitewater investigation, which led to Ken Starr, which led to impeachment. The most interest Governor **Clinton** ever showed in Whitewater was when he

famously dripped sweat on James McDougal's office chair after a jog, stopping by for a look at the books at Hillary's behest. Ever angling, the **Clintons** actually took a tax deduction for donating used underwear (boxers or briefs not specified) to charity.

Here is the real tragedy: Hillary doesn't realize that finally she is rich, with her \$ 8 million book advance and married to a man with massive earning potential. Just in salary and pension, the **Clintons** bring in about \$300,000. So why did they debase themselves for gifts as if they were struggling newlyweds starting out? Some on the givers' list told NBC they weren't "wanting to give her special farewell presents," as a **Clinton** spokesman had claimed. They said they had been contacted by political supporter Rita Pynoos, who is married to a California developer, to send the gift registry a \$ 5,000 check. Hillary didn't fill a pillowcase with the sterling after the last state dinner. But trolling for soup ladles you can easily afford is as irrational as the Fifth Avenue matron who filches a vial of perfume from the counter at Bergdorf's. Only Freud could sort it out.

Maybe the specter of giving up Hail to the Chief and motorcades puts you back in the nursery, frantic that your mother isn't going to warm your milk. But how can you ever have a home when it's partly filled with loot from strangers? There may be no connection between the disgraceful pardon **Clinton** gave Marc Rich and the coffee table Denise Rich gave the **Clintons**. But I'd never be comfortable putting my feet up on it.

Among the gifts that former president Bill **Clinton** says he is keeping as personal presents he accepted last year are \$ 28,000 worth of furnishings that documents and interviews indicate were given to the **National Park Service** in 1993 as part of the permanent White House collection.

The Park Service serves as a steward for the White House and, according to the White House curator's office, is the only unit with the legal authority to accept gifts for the White House. A gift meant for the current White House occupants, by contrast, is routed through the White House gifts office, a separate unit.

Two of the **furniture** makers whose donations **Clinton** took with him on leaving the White House last month say they gave them to the White House as part of a widely publicized, \$ 396,000 redecoration of the executive mansion and not to **Clinton** personally.

"When we've been asked to donate, it was always hyphenated with the words," "White House,' " New York manufacturer Steve Mittman said of his family-owned business, which gave two sofas, an easy chair and an ottoman, worth \$ 19,900 and listed by Clinton as part of the gifts he took with him. "To us, it was not a donation to a particular person." A spokesman for the Clintons, Jim Kennedy, rejected the notion that the gifts in question had been made to the White House rather than to the Clintons. He said it was his understanding that the furnishings in question were on the White House gifts office list and that the Clintons were entitled to rely on that in deciding each year which gifts they were going to

In the case of the furnishings, Kennedy said, the **Clintons** postponed a decision until 2000. He said "all of the items" listed on Bill **Clinton's** final financial disclosure report "were considered by the gifts office to be gifts to the **Clintons** that they could keep or leave behind."

When the redecoration project was completed in the fall of 1993, the White House distributed a four-page summary of the work, saying it had been "financed by private donations of money to the White House Historical Association, including a donation from surplus funds of the Presidential Inaugural Committee, as well as donations of goods and services to the National Park Service."

Attached was a **National Park Service** list of "contributors to the **National Park Service**" and what they had given. In addition to **furniture** from Mittman, the document listed "Mr. and Mrs. Lee Ficks, Cincinatti, OH., **furniture**; David Martinous, Little Rock, AR., rug; Mr. Brad Noe, High Point, NC., **furniture**; and Stuart Schiller, Hialeh, Tx., **furnishings**."

Clinton also listed these five in his Jan. 19 disclosure report, saying he was keeping a kitchen table and four chairs, worth \$ 3,650, from Lee Ficks; a sofa, worth \$ 2,843, from Noe; lamps, worth \$ 1,170, from Schiller; and a needlepoint rug, worth \$ 1,000, from Martinous.

All were merchants and manufacturers whose high-end gifts, according to those contacted, had been solicited by the interior decorator for the 1993 project, Kaki Hockersmith of Little Rock. Hockersmith, who used a Park Service pass at the time, did not return phone calls.

Like Mittman, Joy Ficks, whose late husband headed the Ficks Reed Co., said she thought the custom-finished rattan chairs and breakfast table installed in the private quarters would remain there as government property. She was puzzled when she learned the **Clintons** had taken the set with them.

"We gave it to the White House," she said. "I wondered what happened to it,"

Noe, who worked at Henredon **Furniture** Industries at the time, and Schiller, who heads Cambridge Lamps Inc. of Hialeah, Fla., did not respond to phone calls. Martinous, who operates an Oriental rug company in Little Rock, said he wanted the **Clintons** to keep the handwoven needlepoint he gave.

Two former Internal Revenue Service commissioners, one a Republican and the other a Democrat, said that **Clinton's** taking the furnishings under such circumstances would appear to be an improper "conversion of government property" that could require the **Clintons** to pay taxes on them. They said they were not suggesting criminal wrongdoing by the president.

"It's the intent of the giver that counts," said Sheldon S. Cohen, who headed the IRS under president Lyndon B. Johnson. "If it was given to him **[Clinton]**, it's his. But if it was given to the United States, then it is improper for it to end up in his hands unless he buys it."

Donald C. Alexander, who was IRS commissioner under Richard M. Nixon and Gerald R. Ford, said: "If someone gave something of value to the White House as the White House and not to the president, that is a gift to the government of the United States . . . a charitable contribution." The Clintons, he said, "have no business taking it with them. That is conversion of government property and income to them."

In the report, which **Clinton** signed Jan. 19, his last full day in office, the departing president said he was keeping \$ 190,027 in gifts. On Friday, the former president and his wife, Sen. Hillary Rodham **Clinton** (D-N.Y.), announced they would pay for nearly \$ 86,000 in gifts, covering those given to them in 2000.

Thank-you notes to the Fickses suggest the gifts were understood to be for the White House. In a June 28, 1993, note "on behalf of the President and Mrs. **Clinton**," White House usher Gary J. Walters said he wanted to express "my deep appreciation for the donation of a table and a breakfast set to the Executive Residence at the White House."

In an Aug. 10, 1993, letter signed "Hillary," the then-first lady expressed appreciation "for your generous contribution to the White House."

"That sounds like an acceptance of the United States," Cohen said. "That's what I would have understood if I were the recipient of that letter."

Asked whether any items the **Clintons** kept were taxable to them, the IRS declined to comment. The IRS reportedly launched an inquiry in 1989 into former first lady Nancy Reagan's borrowing of designer dresses, gowns and jewelry -- valued at more than \$ 1 million -- to see whether her use of the items might be taxable as interest-free loans. The IRS has refused to discuss the case, citing privacy laws.

It was not clear how the **Clinton** furnishings might have been included on the White House gifts office list when the Park Service had them on its list. A former White House aide who asked not to be named said inclusion of the items may have been a clerical error by someone at the gifts office, but not one for which the **Clintons** should be faulted.

White House curator Betty Monkman and Capricia Marshall, a personal assistant to the first lady in 1993, said they were confident that the process of sorting out gifts to the president and gifts to the White House was reliable. But neither they nor Kennedy could account for the Park Ser- vice's 1993 contributors' list.

Whatever the answer, Kennedy protested that "from the perspective of the **Clintons**, all they know is that these were gifts to them. . . . Given that Hillary **Clinton** helped raise more than \$ 25 million for the benefit of the White House and that all the proceeds from her new book, 'Invitation to the White House,' will also go to the White House, it is a little silly and small to be talking about these few furnishings."

Former White House curator Clement Conger, however, said it was "outrageous" for the **Clintons** to take expensive items that were designated for the White House unless they "did not fit into the permanent collection."

"I was shocked to read about it," Conger said of **Clinton's** Jan. 19 gift list. "I was dumbfounded that they would pick up all kinds of things. I can see ordinary things, but certainly not anything of value."

In his Jan. 19 disclosure statement, **Clinton** said that "[n]o reportable gifts were accepted in 2001." Hillary **Clinton** was sworn in as a senator on Jan. 3, bound by Senate rules prohibiting her and her spouse from accepting a gift worth more than \$ 50.

Alexander said that what he viewed as the transfer of government property may have taken place, as a legal matter, whenever the property was removed from the White House, "when the moving vans took it away."

AND NOW it turns out that some of those gifts the **Clintons** took with them on leaving the White House last month weren't gifts to them at all, at least not according to the givers. They were public property, given by merchants and **furniture** manufacturers to the government as part of a redecoration of the White House in 1993. At least some of the gifts were solicited by the Little Rock interior decorator the **Clintons** had chosen for the project. They were made not to the **Clintons** but to the **National Park Service**, according to a park service listing at the time -- and that is the memory of the donors. The **Clintons** book \$ 19,900 in **furniture** -- two sofas, an easy chair and an ottoman -- donated in 1993 by Steve Mittman, a New York **furniture** manufacturer. "When we've been asked to donate, it was always hyphenated with the words 'White House,' " Mr. Mittman told Post reporter George Lardner. "To us, it was not a donation to a particular person." "We gave it to the White House," said Joy Ficks, the widow of another **furniture** manufacturer of the kitchen table and four chairs worth \$ 3,650 that they contributed to the 1993 refurbishing. She has 1993 thank-you notes, one from the White House usher, another from Mrs. **Clinton**, expressing appreciation for the gift "to the Executive Residence" and "the White House," respectively.

A spokesman for the **Clintons** said all the items they took had been listed by the White House gifts office as theirs to take or leave behind; that they had had no reason to doubt the accuracy of the list; and that it was "a little silly and small to be talking about these few furnishings" given the millions of dollars that Mrs. **Clinton** had raised and was continuing to raise through the proceeds of a book for the White House. It's hard to know how to respond to that; it's the **Clinton** administration in miniature. They do something wrong and force the country to stoop to their level to make them get it right.

The night before they left the White House, Mr. **Clinton** signed a disclosure form indicating they were taking with them some \$ 190,000 in gifts, mainly household furnishings. The disclosure caused a stir, particularly because many of the items were given after Mrs. **Clinton** was elected to the Senate in November and could not have been accepted under Senate rules once she was sworn in. The **Clintons** have since agreed to pay for all the gifts they were given last year, some \$ 86,000 worth. In response to similar criticism, Mr. **Clinton** has agreed that his presidential foundation will pay part of the \$ 650,000-a-year rent of the office space he has chosen in Manhattan. The country ought not be put in a position of having to dicker with a former first family over items such as these. That, and not the graspiness itself, is ultimately the **Clintons'** worst offense.

A California businessman said yesterday that a sofa worth almost \$ 3,000 that he was supposed to have given President Bill **Clinton** and first lady Hillary Rodham **Clinton** seven years ago wasn't meant for them and that he was "offended" to have been named as the giver

"I would never give a gift to the **Clintons,**" said Brad Noe, a former executive with **Furniture** Industries Inc. "It was a corporate gift [for the White House], not a personal gift to the **Clintons.** I don't know why my name is on it."

Noe spoke to The Washington Post as the **Clintons** announced they will return any gifts they took from the White House last month if it turns out the items weren't meant for them. The Post reported Monday that the **Clintons** left the White House with \$ 28,000 in furnishings that they said were personal gifts but that were actually given to the **National Park Service** for the White House's permanent collection. How those items wound up on a list of personal gifts to the president, compiled by the White House gifts office, remained unexplained. **Clinton's** transition office said yesterday none of the furnishings in question was on the official list of White House property that is not to be removed from the premises.

The gifts at issue include two sofas, an easy chair and an ottoman worth \$ 19,900 from a New York **furniture** maker, a \$ 2,843 sofa from Henredon, and a \$ 3,650 breakfast set from a Cincinnati company. The New York **furniture** maker, Steve Mittman, and, Joy Ficks, the widow of the Cincinnati manufacturer, have said they made the donations to the White House for a \$ 396,000 redecoration of the executive mansion in 1993 and not to the **Clintons** personally.

Noe said the sofa also was given for the same project. He said it actually came from an Arkansas ${\bf furniture}$ dealer but Henredon picked up the tab.

"All of these items were considered gifts to us," Hillary **Clinton**, now a senator from New York, told reporters in Rochester, N.Y., yesterday. "That's what the permanent record of the White House showed. . . . But if there is a different intent, we will certainly honor the intention of the donor."

Clinton's transition office added in a statement that the White House usher's office and the

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White House curator's office reviewed each of the items the **Clintons** took with them against the official list of White House property.

"In short, gifts did not leave the White House without the approval of the White House Usher's and Curator's Offices," the statement said.

In connection with a press tour of the White House redecoration project in November 1993, however, the **National Park Service** issued an itemized list of "contributors to the **National Park Service**" and what they had donated for the refurbishing. The Park Service is the only unit with the legal authority to accept gifts for the White House. A gift meant for the first family personally is routed through the gifts office, a separate unit.

On the Park Service list were Mittman, the Fickses, Noe and two others whose gifts the **Clintons** took with them on leaving the White House: Little Rock rug dealer David Martinous, who donated a \$ 1,000 needlepoint, and Hialeah lamp manufacturer Stuart Schiller, who provided lamps valued at \$ 1,170. Martinous has said he wanted the **Clintons** to keep the rug. Schiller did not return telephone calls from a reporter, but **Clinton** transition spokesman Jake Siewert said yesterday that Schiller told that office that the lamps, too, were meant for the **Clintons**.

Former White House curator Clement Conger said items meant for the White House collection are usually stamped with an accession number within a day or two of arrival and catalogued as official property. Apparently this was not done with the 1993, Park Service-listed furnishings that the **Clintons** took with them.

Jim Kennedy, a spokesman for Hillary **Clinton**, said the **Clintons** reviewed the gifts office list -- several hundred pages long -- each year, but did not decide until shortly before leaving office what they wanted to keep.

Asked about the gifts yesterday, President Bush said that he was confident the ${\bf Clintons}$ "will make the right decision."

The word "conversion" has a number of definitions, but only one that is legal. In the parlance of the law, a conversion is, as the new edition of the American Heritage, Dictionary succinctly puts it, "(a) the unlawful appropriation of another's property; b) the changing of real property to personal property or vice versa." To convert something is "to appropriate (another's property) without right to one's own use." There is a fine line between converting and stealing. To steal, says the dictionary, is "to take (the property of another) without right or permission."

The only real difference is one of class and manners. A pickpocket steals. A person to whom, by virtue of position, respect is accorded, converts. It's more genteel-like. It's also not necessarily a crime, which is helpful in the gingerly matter of dealing with a light-fingered person of position; one may "convert" property by accident -- for example, if one mistakenly thought that one actually owned the property. This issue of manners and semantics and intent arose this week in connection with, of course, Bill and Hillary Clinton. The Post reported on Monday that the world's most entertaining former first couple had removed from the White House and taken unto themselves some \$ 28,000 worth of furniture that did not belong to them: two sofas, an easy chair and an ottoman, a kitchen table and four chairs, another sofa, some lamps and a needlepoint rug. All of these items had been donated to the National Park Service as contributions to the 1993 redecoration of the White House

In other words, it seems the **Clintons** engaged in "the unlawful appropriation of another's property," in this case property that belonged to the U.S. government. They converted it. At least that is how it appears to two former Internal Revenue Service commissioners, who carefully told The Post that, while they were not suggesting criminal wrongdoing, it certainly seemed that the **Clinton's** takings appeared to be a "conversion of government property." Donald C. Alexander, IRS commissioner under Presidents Nixon and Ford, said the **Clintons** had "no business taking [the **furniture**] with them. That is conversion of government property and income to them."

On Monday afternoon, the **Clintons**, who last week promised to pay for \$ 86,000 in household furnishings they had received from wealthy friends last year, announced that they also would be giving the White House back its **furniture**. Hillary **Clinton** spokesman Jim Kennedy said that the **Clintons** had thought the **furniture** did belong to them because the

items had been listed by the White House gifts office as "gifts to the **Clintons** that they could keep or leave behind."

This latter claim is more than just the reflexive **Clinton** response of blaming the help. It is about intent. If the **Clintons** knew the **furniture** belonged to the government but took it anyway, that could be adjudged to be "criminal conversion" -- you know, um, stealing. If they thought it was theirs, they are innocent of criminal intent.

Well, of course they should be accorded the benefit of the doubt. And yet, it does seem odd. The 1993 refurbishing of the White House was a big deal, much discussed and written about because it was personally directed by Mrs. **Clinton** through her chosen designer, Kaki Hockersmith. It is hard to imagine that Mrs. **Clinton** did not approve the selection of each piece of **furniture** donated to the government for her big redecoration project.

When the project was completed, the White House put out a four-page summary listing each person who had donated **furniture** or furnishings as "contributors to the **National Park Service.**" Mr. and Mrs. Lee Ficks, whose kitchen table and four chairs the **Clintons** converted and are now returning, received a letter from none other than Mrs. **Clinton** thanking them for their "generous contribution to the White House."

All presidents accept personal gifts. The key word here is "personal." What we are talking about here is the **furniture**. **The Clintons** took the kitchen table. The chairs. The sofas. The lamps. You might think that at some point, it would have occurred to one or the other of them that it was unlikely that this stuff belonged to them -- that Bill might have turned to Hillary and said, "You know, hon, no matter what that list from the gifts office says, I don't really think the residence **furniture** belongs to us. I mean, it's probably supposed to stay here, you know, like the refrigerator and the sink and stuff, doncha think?"

Nah. I believe them.

Former president Bill **Clinton** and Sen. Hillary Rodham **Clinton** (D-N.Y.) sent more than \$ 28,000 worth of furnishings back to White House custodians yesterday as officials confirmed that all the items had been legally accepted as government property in 1993.

The **National Park Service**, which by law administers the White House as a unit of the national park system, said it was taking custody of the property in light of questions that had been raised about its status.

The furnishings were delivered by truck yesterday from the **Clintons'** home in Chappaqua, N.Y. A knowledgeable source said they included all five contributions identified by The Washington Post earlier this week as having been given to the Park Service for a 1993 White House redecoration project plus "some additional items" from the **Clinton** home that had been previously designated as part of the White House collection.

A Park Service official, James McDaniel, the agency's liaison with the White House, said yesterday that an inventory of the shipment would not be available until today. He said it consisted of 18 to 20 items. They were unloaded at a warehouse in suburban Maryland that houses the valuable White House collection.

Still unexplained was how the furnishings wound up on a White House gifts office list of presents that the **Clintons** say officials told them they could keep. White House usher Gary J. Walters asserted earlier this week on CNN that "we are not aware of anything that left the executive residence that was executive residence property.

"Everything that belongs to the government is still here," Walters declared.

However, Walters was sent copies of the five letters that then-Park Service Director Roger G. Kennedy sent on July 20, 1993, acknowledging receipt of two sofas from a New York furniture maker; a custom-made rattan breakfast set and table from a Cincinnati company; a sofa from a North Carolina manufacturer; a needlepoint rug from a Little Rock rug dealer; and a set of lamps from a Hialeah, Fla., manufacturer.

"It is with a great deal of pleasure that we acknowledge receipt of your gift \dots to be used in the executive residence at the White House," Kennedy said. "Your generosity will enable us

to further enhance the decor of the White House, a unit of our National Park System."

Walters did not respond to a call seeking comment.

Copies of the Park Service letters were also sent to Vincent Foster, the then-deputy counsel to the president. He was found dead on the night of July 20, 1993, at Fort Marcy Park in McLean. A note he left behind at the bottom of a briefcase contained an allegation that the White House usher's office had "plotted" to embarrass the **Clintons** by allowing higher than estimated costs on renovations then underway. Foster, whose death was ruled a suicide, said in the note that he was "not meant for the job or the spotlight of public life in Washington."

Kennedy's letters confirmed the furnishings' status as White House property. Only the Park Service has legal authority to accept gifts for the White House, McDaniel said. Personal gifts for the current occupants of the White House are handled by the gifts office, where employees change from one administration to another.

In another controversy involving **Clinton**, Rep. Ernest J. Istook Jr. (R-Okla.) protested yesterday that the landlords of a midtown Manhattan skyscraper had sent the General Services Administration a proposed lease that would install **Clinton** on the 56th floor for \$ 811,000 a year for the next six years.

Istook, who is chairman of a House appropriations subcommittee with jurisdiction over GSA and the White House, urged GSA not to sign the lease. Istook said the cost had leaped above earlier estimates and was unacceptable even if **Clinton's** presidential foundation offsets the cost to taxpayers by chipping in \$ 300,000 a year. Congress last year had set aside \$ 285,000 for a **Clinton** office, enough to put him on par with Ronald Reagan, whose quarters are currently the most expensive.

Clinton, Istook protested, is trying to get "one of the most expensive floors in one of the most expensive buildings in the most expensive area" of New York City. He said **Clinton** could save about a third of the cost by giving up a sweeping view of Central Park and moving down a few floors and could find space for about half the price elsewhere in midtown Manhattan.

Istook said he would also like to see the **Clinton** Foundation sign a separate lease, making it legally liable for its \$ 300,000 commitment. With \$ 1.83 million in transition funds to carry **Clinton's** office expenses through late July, he said, "there's no need to rush into a bad deal."

President Bill **Clinton** and his wife started shipping **furniture** from the White House to the **Clintons'** newly purchased home in New York more than a year ago, despite questions at the time by the chief usher about whether they were entitled to remove the items.

The day before the items were shipped out, White House chief usher Gary J. Walters said he asked whether the **Clintons** should be taking the furnishings because he believed they were government property donated as part of a White House redecoration project in 1993, during **Clinton's** first year in office.

But Walters was told by the White House counsel's office that the items he asked about --- which included an iron and glass coffee table, a painted TV armoire, a custom wood gaming table, and a wicker center table with wood top -- were "personal gifts received by the **Clintons** prior to President **Clinton's** assuming office."

Personal property brought to the White House by an incoming president does not have to be disclosed on financial reports. As a result of the counsel's determination, the furnishings were sent on to the **Clintons**' new home in Chappaqua. They were not listed among the controversial gifts **Clinton** revealed, the day before he left office this year, that he and his wife, Sen. Hillary Rodham **Clinton** (D-N.Y.), had taken with them. However, government records show that the gifts that concerned Walters did not arrive at the White House until after the **Clintons** moved in. At least one of the items, a Ficks-Reed wicker table, was logged in at the White House on Feb. 8, 1993. Joy Ficks, the widow of the manufacturer, told The Washington Post last week it was meant for the White House, not the **Clintons**, and she thought it would stay there.

The **Clintons'** interior decorator, Kaki Hockersmith, had been soliciting gifts for the White House redecoration project even before the 1993 inauguration, according to some of those she approached. Walters said he understood she was telling donors that the furnishings were for the executive mansion rather than the **Clintons** personally.

"As far as we were concerned, they were government property," Walters said of all the gifts obtained for the \$ 396,000 redecoration project.

This week, the **Clintons** returned the four items to the White House, along with other furnishings, after questions were raised about whether they actually belonged to the **Clintons**. Almost all the furnishings had been designated official White House property by the **National Park Service** in 1993.

Julia Payne, a spokeswoman for the former president, said the **Clintons** wanted to be "overcautious" in light of the concerns that had been raised. Despite the questions posed by Walters, Payne said the **Clintons** or Hockersmith acquired the four items in Little Rock before they came to Washington.

"I don't know physically where the items were," Payne said, but "they [the **Clintons]** were not required to put them on their financial disclosure form. He wasn't president yet."

Hockersmith did not return repeated calls this week seeking comment.

The **Clintons** came under strong criticism after disclosing that they were taking with them \$ 190,000 in gifts received over the past eight years. GOP lawmakers and other critics chastised Hillary **Clinton**, in particular, for accepting a rash of presents just before she was sworn in as a senator and became covered by strict ethics rules that prohibit the receipt of any gift worth more than \$ 50.

Bowing to such criticism, the **Clintons** decided on Feb. 2 to pay for \$ 86,000 worth of gifts given to them in the year 2000. This week, they agreed to return another set of gifts that had been donated to the White House in earlier years, including six items they had not previously disclosed as having been taken. These included the coffee table, the armoire, the gaming table and the wicker table that Walters has asked about a year ago.

Yesterday, the **National Park Service** released an inventory of all the furnishings returned this week by the **Clintons.** It included \$ 28,500 in furnishings identified by The Post earlier this week as having been legally designated as White House property by the Park Service.

The armoire, the coffee table and the wicker center table were trucked to New York on Jan. 4, 2000, just before the **Clintons** moved into the \$ 1.7 million home in suburban New York, Walters said yesterday. The gaming table and most of the other furnishings the **Clintons** returned to White House custodians this week had been taken from the White House last month in several shipments starting Jan. 4, 2001, the day after Hillary **Clinton** was sworn in.

Walters said he accepted without a fuss the determination of the counsel's office, in a memo dated Jan. 3, 2000, that the gifts were personal **Clinton** property. In the memo, White House associate counsel Meredith Cabe said the reason the four items "arrived after the **Clintons"** was each item "was given a special finish" under Hockersmith's direction "to match the design decor selected by the **Clintons** for individual rooms in their personal space in the Residence." Cabe said she was relying on information from Hockersmith.

"I'm not a lawyer," Walters said. "I didn't feel I was in a position to argue with the counsel's office "

Payne said, "No item, nothing, was removed without the approval of the usher's and curator's office "

Walters blamed himself for not raising any questions when the rest of the furnishings were taken from the White House last month. He said a Hillary **Clinton** aide, Eric Hothem, had told him these too were "the **Clintons**' personal property."

"I should have asked for more specifics on these items," Walters said. "I shoulder the blame for not saying, 'Hey, wait a minute.' $\!\!\!$ "

In interviews this week, Walters said that Hockersmith told the late Vincent Foster, then the White House deputy counsel, that the furnishings she was soliciting for the 1993 redecoration project were meant for the White House collection, not the **Clintons**

Walters said that Foster directed him and the Park Service in a March 24, 1993, memo to begin accepting the gifts with formal acknowledgments, thereby making the furnishings government property. Walters said he sent thank-you letters of his own, but by law, the Park Service's acknowledgments are what count since only it has the legal authority to accept gifts for the White House.

Gifts meant for the first family are supposed to be routed through the White House gifts office, a separate unit.

Walters said it was long-standing policy to have the donors state "if possible in writing, that the gift/donation is for the Executive Residence or the Presidency, not the President."

Walters said Hockersmith was given a copy of that policy and it was her job, as the one who solicited the gifts, to obtain the letters. But no letters ever materialized.

Walters said he tried unsuccessfully to "close that loop" for years. "It finally came to the point of decision when the **Clintons** bought their house in New York. They were under the impression that these [four] items were theirs to take."

Poor little Hillary.

She's the most famous face in the Senate. She just got \$8 million for her story. She has a huge house in Chappaqua and is shopping for another huge house in D.C. Her husband is set to make a fortune writing his own memoir and pocketing six figures a pop to do what he loves to do: talk. And yet, something is missing.

A \$2,340 Spode soup tureen, with stand, for starters.

Some of the first lady's wealthy friends and contributors have been fretting that Hillary has never had a chance to accumulate the sort of elegant appurtenances that they have, that the poor girl is starting her grand new life with nothing.

So they decided it would be nice to treat her like a bride -- building a nest from scratch -- and send her housewarming presents from one of her favorite stores, **Borsheim's** Fine Jewelry and Gifts, the Omaha emporium and subsidiary of Berkshire Hathaway, owned by Hillary admirer and donor Warren Buffett.

Attention Hillary shoppers! Only nine more days before that pesky Senate gift ban goes into effect!

The **Clintons** have spent most of their adult lives enjoying affordable public housing. They had scant furniture stored to decorate the Chappaqua manse -- probably precious period pieces such as Marimekko wall hangings and bookcases made of cinder blocks and plywood -- much less a Washington manse.

Sure, Bill wouldn't care. He looks as if he'd be completely at home with shag rugs, lava lamps and styrofoam coffee cups.

Some lawmakers think of their Washington digs as temporary, and live like college students. Two years ago, millionaire Senator Sam Brownback of Kansas rented the cramped two-bedroom Capitol Hill apartment that Marc Santora, my 26-year-old assistant, was leaving. Mr. Brownback bunked in with Representative Jim DeMint of South Carolina, keeping Marc's exquisite white plastic trash can, bamboo shades and whiffle bat, until the property was condemned a year later.

But Mrs. **Clinton** is no longer a Crate & Barrel liberal. She's a populist with a sweet tooth for the perquisites of arriviste life. She'll need something to suit her new station, and her new airs.

Lissa Muscatine, Mrs. **Clinton's** spokeswoman, says that the first lady's silver and china patterns can be found at **Borsheim's**. Hillary shopped there when she was in Omaha last March to raise campaign money, with Mr. Buffett's help.

I clicked onto **Borsheim's** bridal registry on the Web to sample the merchandise. What would Mrs. **Clinton** like? Just some basics to get her started. Place settings for 40, including oyster forks and marmalade spoons?

Supporters have suggested the Faberge Sterling Imperial Court silverware for the former czarina of health care. The Web site describes this as "a magnificent neo-Classical style pattern that was originally produced for the Grand Palace, Peterhof . . . intricate detailing with a laurel wreath on the tip."

The vegetable serving spoon is a bargain at \$510 and an iced tea spoon goes for only \$240. Asparagus tongs are a mere \$535.

For china, some of her friends give the nod to the Spode Stafford Flowers china pattern, described on the Web site as "a breathtaking pattern. Stafford Flowers has a scalloped shape with generous gold trim in a raised design. Twenty-two different flowers in vivid purples, pinks, blues and yellows are featured. . . ."

It's easy to picture Bill tossing leftover pizza onto a \$980 vegetable dish or spearing some fries with a \$284 lobster fork.

But Hillary will need the booty -- the \$716 teapot, the \$476 sauce boat, the \$792 punch ladle -- to entertain a parade of possible contributors for her next political adventure.

As a senator, Mrs. **Clinton** won't be able to accept gifts worth more than \$100. But as first lady, she can take gifts as long as she discloses those over \$250. So we have a nice window of opportunity before Jan. 3.

Ms. Muscatine said of the first couple that "people have routinely gotten them gifts, especially around the holidays. This year, because of the holidays and because it is their last year in the White House, there have been more inquiries."

The Subcommittee on Energy Policy, Natural Resources, and Regulatory Affairs is conducting oversight of the National Park Service's (NPS's) implementation of 3 U.S.C. §§ 109 - 110 relating to public property - including furniture and furnishings - belonging to the Executive Residence at the White House. The law requires NPS to annually inventory all such public property, including when purchased, its costs, condition, and final disposition. Since the 1948 enactment of these provisions, the Department of the Interior (DOI) appears to have not issued codified regulations governing implementation.

Pursuant to the Constitution and Rules X and XI of the United States House of Representatives, please provide the Subcommittee with each of the annual NPS inventories from June 1992 to present and any non-codified guidance issued by DOI governing implementation, including internal and external DOI guidance documents. In addition, please provide all correspondence (including e-mails) relating to any furniture and furnishings which former President Clinton removed from the Executive Residence at any time since January 20, 1993 and all correspondence (including e-mails) relating to gifts received by the Clintons from November 3, 1992 to January 20, 2001.

Clinton Presidential Center (including the Clinton Presidential Library) processed by the White House Gifts Unit from January 20, 1993 to January 20, 2001; (b) copies of the "green sheets" for all items not yet included in these databases; (c) copies of the deeds of gifts to NARA for all items in the White House Craft Collection or any other gifts (such as gowns) accepted by NARA for the Clinton Presidential archival depository and any information related to any of these items that may have been removed (including loans to the Clintons); (d) copies of the "green sheets" for all items recalled from November 1, 1999 to January 20, 2001 and any information related to the return of any items to the White House by the Clintons after January 20, 2001; and (e) any inventories, correspondence, e-mail or other information about any Clinton personal material for which NARA provided courtesy storage since January 20, 1993.

In addition, please provide the Subcommittee by April 5, 2001 with: (f) all correspondence and e-mail relating to gifts received by the Clintons from January 20, 1993 to January 20, 2001.

Barbara, in response to your request for the disposition of National Park Service (NPS) property that is excess to its needs, including property within its jurisdiction at the White House, the Department of Interior (NPS) would report property excess to its needs to GSA for normal disposition. Once the property is reported to GSA as excess to the Department's needs, GSA screens the property for Federal use by other agencies. If no agency has a need for the property then the property is declared surplus and undergoes donation screening by the State Agencies for Surplus Property (SASP). If no SASP claims the property then the property is sold.

GSA plays no role in the acceptance of gifts by the NPS under their authorities. GSA recommends that you contact the NPS directly with any questions you have with respect to that process.

Serves as the Gift Unit Analyst in the Executive Office of the President of the United States of America. Incumbent must use sound judgment, tact, diplomacy, and discretion in performing the duties and responsibilities of this position.

Maintains accountability of all gifts received by the President, First Lady, and members of the President's immediate family. Receives, identifies, and catalogs all gifts for the record and assures proper tagging for storage. Receives, and analyzes gifts presented to the First Family and determines appropriate disposition (e.g. to the President or First Lady, the National Archives and Records Administration for future Presidential Library and Museum, charity, White House for display, White House Mess for official use, GSA, or return to sender).

Maintains a computer log of all incoming gifts and classifies them into appropriate categories with detailed and accurate data on each gift. Develops and compiles a weekly report of gifts received for review by the President and First Lady.

Researches donor information to determine, as necessary, donor's relationship to the First Family. Reviews previous incoming and outgoing correspondence and determines value of previous gifts received to establish aggregate value of gifts received from donor for the calendar year.

Determines the type of response the donor will receive (e.g., personal Presidential or First Lady response, pre-printed card, robo letter, letter signed by Director of Correspondence, or return to sender). Develops draft thank you notes for the President's or First Lady's personal signature to acknowledge foreign and domestic gifts. Reviews all correspondence, channels to the Department of Correspondence editorial staff for review, and makes recommendations for additional actions as required prior to signature.

Develops various annual reports pertaining to foreign and domestic gifts. Such reports are presented to the Office of Management and Budget, General Accounting Office or other top level officials of the federal government.

Collaborates with the Director and/or Deputy Director of Correspondence and Presidential Messages and members of the White

House Counsel's Office to develop policies, regulations, and procedures to govern the operation of the White House Gift Unit.

Processes all gifts presented to White House staff members that are reported to the White House Gift Unit. Gifts are logged in via computer from information provided on Staff Gift Record Forms and, as necessary, gifts are appraised. Completed records are forwarded to the White House Counsel's Office for appropriate disposition (e.g., retention by staff member, transfer to GSA, return to sender).

Presidential Gifts

This memorandum responds to two issues: gift items on loan at the Residence from the Archives that to date have not been categorized and, 2) a gift misplaced by White House staff.

Certain Gift Items

The Chief Usher of the Executive Residence, Gary Walters, identified several gift items in use or on display in the Residence. See Memorandum from Gary Walters to Tim Flynn, Gift Office Director, January 31, 1994. The National Park Service initially thought these gifts to the President were to be accepted for the permanent white House collection; it therefore sent thank you letters to each of the donors. Upon discovering that the President had indicated a desire to have these items go to the Clinton Presidential library, the National Park Service elected not to accept these items; therefore, the Park Service never declared the gifts as accepted for the permanent White House collection. The Curator of the White House took responsibility for ensuring that the goods were not accepted by the National Park Service.

At this time, these gifts must be declared as personal gift items or items destined for the Clinton Presidential Library (the Archives). Since the President has not stated a desire to accept these items personally, it is my understanding based on the process in place that these gifts should be designated for the Archives and, with the approval of the Archives, on loan to the White House.

Misplaced Gift Item

It is also my understanding from you that the Correspondence Department misplaced a gift item -- a gold saxophone pin from Mr. James Steele valued by him at \$4,200. This item had inadvartently been recorded by your office as personally accepted by the President before you became aware of the fact that the pin had never been conveyed to the President. Indeed, the pin was misplaced before the President even became aware of its

existence. If the circumstances described above are accurate, the President has not personally accepted the pin. Accordingly, an appropriate record change should be made to reflect the fact that this gift was misplaced by staff and never received by the President.

Transition Gift Items

This memorandum is to record for the file the origins of certain gift items that were offered to the Clintons after the President was elected in November, 1992, and accepted by them prior to the President's inauguration in January, 1993.

The Clintons are currently reviewing their furnishings to make decisions regarding items to send to their home in New York. Kaki Hockersmith, who supervised the decorating for the Clintons at the White House, identified the following items as gifts that were offered and accepted by the Clintons after the November 1992 election, but prior to their move to the White House:

#4357358 Iron and glass coffee table
#4357432 Painted TV armoire
#4357335 Custom wood gaming table
#4357355 Wicker center table with wood top

The aforementioned items did not arrive in the White House until after the President assumed office. Accordingly, they were logged in through the Gift Unit as a matter of process. Ms. Hockersmith has indicated that these items arrived after the Clintons because, under Ms. Hockersmith's direction, each item was given a special finish, chosen specifically to match the design décor selected by the Clintons for individual rooms in their personal space in the Residence.

In light of the information provided by Ms. Hockersmith regarding the circumstances of the offer and acceptance of these gifts, these items are personal gifts received by the Clintons prior to President Clinton's assuming office. Thus, they are not required by statute to be disclosed on the Clintons' financial disclosure report. Because of the confusion caused by the items' having been logged in, we are creating this record for the file.

Dear Mr. Attorney General:

Yesterday, as Chairman of the House Government Reform Subcommittee on Energy Policy, Natural Resources and Regulatory Affairs, I chaired a Subcommittee hearing on Accountability for Presidential Gifts. The hearing presented the Subcommittee's undisputed factual findings following a one-year investigation. In addition, all three witnesses on Panel I — Common Cause President Scott Harshbarger, Brookings Institution Vice President Paul Light, and Gregory Walden, former Associate Counsel to the President — in their written statements or in response to Member questions recommended that I refer this matter for criminal investigation by the Department of Justice.

Pursuant to this testimony, I am referring to you for possible criminal investigation evidence relating to the solicitation, receipt, failure to report, or conversion of Presidential gifts by former President William Jefferson Clinton and former First Lady Hillary Rodman Clinton.

The documents that I have enclosed with this letter fully support the opening of a criminal investigation into this matter. These documents are as follows: (1) a copy of my opening statement (Attachment A); a copy of the Subcommitte's 55-page factual findings (Attachment B) that were undisputed at yesterday's hearing; and (3) a copy of Mr. Walden's written statement (Attachment C) reflecting (on pages 5-6) in a section captioned "Evidence of widespread or systemic failures should be investigated," his conclusion that such evidence could form the basis for a Department of Justice investigation of possible violations of 18 U.S.C. § 1001 (regarding false statements), 18 U.S.C. § 641 (regarding conversion of Federal property) and 5 C.F.R. § 2635.202(c)(1), (2), (j) (regarding solicitation of a gratuity).

The Subcommittee is willing to make available to you any materials that you need to assist in your investigation. Please contact Subcommittee Deputy Staff Director Barbara Kahlow at 226-3058 with any questions you may have.

Addendum

Procedures for Handling the Presidential Gift Collection by the National Archives and Records Administration

The Presidential Gift Collection

Every four to eight years with the change of each Presidential administration, National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) assumes the responsibility of providing courtesy storage for a new collection of records and gifts. Almost immediately, the President and his family begin to receive gifts from around the world. These gifts are given by leaders of nations, foreign officials, and private citizens alike.

For over thirty years, the National Archives has provided storage and care for incumbent Presidential gifts. Beginning in 1984, a new program for caring for Presidential gifts was instituted whereby NARA would transfer Presidential gifts on a regular basis from the White House Gift Office to the National Archives building to be preserved, wrapped and packaged for eventual shipment to the future Presidential project/library. This courtesy storage program for incumbent Presidential gifts remains in effect today, although it has been modified and improved over the years. It not only assists the President, but it also facilitates NARA in ensuring the preservation in one institution of both the records of the President and the gifts that he received, further adding to the understanding of the President, the Presidency, and the cultural and historical times of his administration.

NARA's Presidential Materials Staff (NLMS) provides courtesy storage for the records and historical materials created or received by the incumbent Presidential Administration. These materials are held for storage, servicing and initial processing pending eventual transfer to a Presidential library or Presidential materials project at the end of each administration. In the mean time, these materials remain fully available for recall by the incumbent Administration. By holding these materials at the National Archives facility, NLMS can establish basic physical and intellectual control over the records and historical materials and also ensure proper, curatorial standards for the preservation and security of these items. Throughout the courtesy storage phase of their life cycle, the records generated by the White House remain the key archival documentation on all materials in courtesy storage, with the understanding that these records will be transferred to NARA at the end of the administration. Any additional logs or files created by NARA are considered an adjunct to these records, and are based on information provided (volunteered) by the White House, and are created with the sole purpose of assisting with the control, tracking and proper care of the materials at hand.

White House Gift Office Handling of Presidential Gifts

The White House Gift Office (WHGO), which is part of the White House Correspondence Office, records, tracks, and appraises Presidential gifts, responds to donors, and assists in the requisite reporting requirements. Each gift, some containing multiple parts, is given a unique

identification number used by the White House and NARA to track gifts. Each gift is described by the WHGO for correspondence purposes, and identified as a Foreign Official gift or a Domestic gift (from a US or foreign private citizen). This information is managed by the WHGO through both paper files and its own electronic database. The WHGO also decides the disposition of Presidential gifts, the substantial majority of which are accepted on behalf of the American people and transmitted to NARA on courtesy storage for eventual deposit in the Presidential Library. Other dispositions may include retention by the President, return to donor, or destruction for reasons of security.

NLMS Procedures for Presidential Gifts on Courtesy Storage

NLMS Gift Pickups

At the White House Gift Office's request, the Presidential Materials Staff transfers Presidential gifts from the White House Gift Office to the Archives 1 building. Gift pickups are scheduled on a weekly basis, are assigned a sequential number by NLMS and logged in a trip log together with the date of the pickup and signatures of each participating NLMS staff.

NLMS receives two copies of each Gift Record with each gift: one pink, one green (the 'green sheet'). While in the WHGO, the NLMS staff reviews the paperwork to ensure that each object is clearly described, that all parts are accounted for, that the gift has been assigned a value by the White House Gift Office, and is designated for disposition with NARA. The pink copy of the Gift Record is packed along with each gift into one of several transport bins. The green sheet is stamped and annotated by the NARA staff with the trip number, date and staff initials. The WHGO staff retains the green sheets long enough to enter trip numbers into their database, usually 48 hours or less. When this is completed, the green sheets are picked up by NARA and maintained as Presidential Records. Meanwhile, the bins are locked and transported back to Archives and stored in a secure holding vault.

Gift Processing At NARA

At NARA, the NLMS staff makes an additional copy set of the green sheets for security purposes. This procedure dates to early in the current Bush administration. NLMS staff reunites the green sheets with each gift. As an added precaution, certain gifts are photographed including: foreign official; high-value domestic gifts (appraised value over \$1,000); and any gifts bearing a likeness of the President. The bulk of the gifts are immediately packed for preservation purposes, then containerized with the pink sheet for intellectual control. The green sheets are collected together by box number for data entry. After data entry, the green sheets are annotated with the appropriate box number and data entry date. Green sheets are filed as a series in box number order, and maintained in a secure area with limited access. Access to the database is also restricted.

The NLMS Gift Database

The NLMS Gift database was created near the beginning of the Clinton administration to facilitate retrieval of gifts by NLMS for the WHGO and improved on the earlier practice of manually searching the paper files. This early database included the Gift ID, brief description, trip number, box number, and donor. It also tagged gifts that had photographic records. It was divided into several different tables to reflect the general divisions in collection storage: Foreign Head of State gifts, Domestic gifts, Domestic book and Audiovisual gifts and Staff gifts, with a separate table recording recalls.

In 1997, the Presidential Materials Staff was created as part of the Office of Presidential Libraries and included a museum component. After a professional curatorial staff was added, the level of detail of the gift database expanded, with hopes that it might become a more comprehensive tool for intellectual control, physical control and security. Also, the curatorial staff hoped to facilitate future use by the Curator, exhibit designers and other researchers once the materials were transferred to the future Presidential Materials Project or Presidential Library. Database improvements included breaking out gift records so that gifts with many parts could receive separate description and tracking for each part. Fields were also added to the general tables for class and object designations, for the donor's city and state/country, for whom the gift was intended, and for inventory codes. At this point, further electronic modifications were made to track recalls and returns. It is this database system that is currently used to track the Presidential gifts of George W. Bush.

Currently, NLMS is implementing a state-of-the-art software program tailored to the management of museum collections. Improvements include: the accumulation of a complete location history for each gift as a permanent part of its record; extensive features for creating and managing condition and loan files; and the potential of incorporating digital images. This software management tool is being implemented throughout the Presidential Library system.

Unpacked gifts and high value gifts

Historically, the packing of certain gifts has been delayed because of gifts' size, fragility or preservation needs. A new procedure has been implemented that allows for tracking of these unpacked gifts by using a special location code. In addition, very high value gifts are stored in a locked cabinet, documented immediately and assigned a special location code. Both unpacked gifts and high value gifts are inventoried every six months.

Gift Recalls

Requests for recalls by the incumbent President are made in writing through the WHGO. The WHGO faxes their request to NARA using a standardized recall request sheet created by NLMS. Once the items are located, they are returned to the WHGO along with the pink copy of the paperwork. Beginning in June 2002, NLMS staff delivering the gift and WHGO staff receiving it both sign the recall request sheet and note the date and time of delivery. This change more fully documents the recall process and the current location of the gift. The recall request along

with the green sheet for each recalled gift is maintained by NLMS in a permanent chronological file. If recalled gifts are returned to NARA, they are accompanied by fresh paperwork, but retain their original gift ID number.

The recalls are tracked in multiple tables within the gift database to ensure comprehensive intellectual and physical control. The recall table includes fields for the gift ID, the recall date, a brief description, and the return date, should the item come back to NARA. An inventory field in the general gift tables is used to code a particular gift or gift part as recalled. For any gifts or gift parts not yet in the database at the time of recall, a complete record is created in the general tables at that time. In order to track returns, all new gift entries are checked at the outset of the data entry process against the recall table to reveal any returned items. The return date is entered into the recall table, and in the general tables, the flag is removed from the inventory field of the existing record and new box and trip numbers assigned. The original box and trip numbers are preserved on the original green sheet, in the recall file.

Summary of NLMS's newest procedures for the incumbent Presidential administration

- 1. Gift records are broken out into parts, and each part documented and tracked separately.
- A security copy of green sheets for each trip is maintained undisturbed in secure storage.
- 3. Gifts for which packing will be delayed and very high value gifts are documented and tracked from early on in the gift processing sequence.
- 4. Recall returns, in addition to recalls, are fully documented, tracked and dated.
- 5. Recall deliveries, including the date, time and staff involved, are fully documented.
- 6. NLMS conducts regular inventories of gifts on courtesy storage. Unpacked and high value items are inventoried every 6 months. For the remaining collection, NLMS conducts an annual inventory of 5% of the collection, in accordance with NARA-wide standards for museum collections.

Gifts to Federal employees can give the appearance of corruption. Even if there is no quid pro quo, confidence in the government erodes if there is an appearance of influence. For this reason, reviewing the issue of Presidential gifts is important. Unfortunately, instead of working to produce a bipartisan bill, the majority has chosen to produce a partisan report.

One of the main problems with the report is that it looks only at gift problems during the Clinton administration. It is true that President and Mrs. Clinton accepted numerous gifts. President Clinton accepted gifts totaling an average of \$28,093 annually, adjusted for inflation, which is a very large amount to the average American.

But former President Bush accepted \$39,614 annually—far more than President Clinton. Yet there is no examination of abuses during the first Bush administration. And of course, there is no examination of the current Bush administration either.

Former President and Mrs. Reagan accepted a \$2.5 million ranch-style house from friends for their retirement. President and Mrs. Reagan eventually paid back their friends, but this report does not even mention the \$2.5 million house or the timing of its purchase, 2 years prior to the Reagans leaving the White House. Nor does this report address whether the friends of President and Mrs. Reagan received a benefit for their generosity.

If the committee wanted to conduct a fair investigation into the problem of Presidential gifts, it would have looked at the practices of both Democratic and Republican administrations.

In addition to failing to review the gift-giving practices of both Democratic and Republican administrations, this report strikes a partisan note by singling out President Clinton's records for disclosure. The majority chose not to disclose the records of President George W. Bush, former President Reagan, or former President George H.W. Bush.

The current Bush administration has been justifiably criticized for applying one standard to the release of documents from the Clinton administration and another standard to the release of its

own documents and documents from the Reagan administration.² This committee should not be making the same mistake.

Furthermore, this report scrutinizes the employment history of one Clinton White House employee but fails to review the resumes of Republican administration employees. The report emphasizes that a certain Clinton employee's "prior work experience included only political positions" and she had "no prior experience in gift valuations." 3 Yet a review of the resume of President Bush's director of the White House Gifts Office suggests that just like the Clinton employee discussed in the report, the Bush employee's "prior work experience included only political positions" and she had "no prior experience in gift valuations." 4

The vast majority of those giving gifts to the President are wellmeaning, honest people: the young schoolboy who wants the President to have a t-shirt with his elementary school logo on it, the grandmother who wants the President to have a needlepoint she

Yet some who give gifts want to gain influence and access to policymakers. That is why reforms to the Presidential gift process are needed. Two subcommittees held hearings on the issue of gifts to the President. At those hearings, witnesses made suggestions such as placing limitations of the value of gifts to the President, limiting when a President could accept a gift, and enhancing public disclosure of gifts.

Regrettably, these important reform proposals were not seriously considered in this report.

ADDITIONAL VIEWS OF HON. DOUG OSE

The minority views section of this report, unfortunately, mixes apples and oranges in its comparison of the average-sized gift retained by Presidents George H.W. Bush and Clinton. Chart VII reveals that President George H.W. Bush received 41,779 gifts in 4 years in office, which is an amount similar in magnitude to President Clinton's 94,178 gifts received in 8 years in office. However, gifts retained by the First Family are only a subset of gifts received by them. There is only aggregate dollar information on gifts retained by each President over the reporting threshold established by law at the time. The report explains that, during George H.W. Bush's Presidency, the reporting threshold for gifts retained by the First Family was \$100. This threshold increased to \$250 before the start of the Clinton Presidency and was then increased to \$260 for the last 2 years of the Clinton Presidency. The report explains, "As a consequence, it is impossible to directly compare the total value of gifts retained by these two Presidents.

In fact, the Clintons retained one or more gifts in 14,770 of the 94,178 gift records. The subcommittee only added the value of the 227 gift records with a retained gift over the reporting threshold (totaling \$361,968) (Chart I) and the 98 gift records with a retained gift from \$240 to the threshold (totaling \$24,012) (Chart II). Added together, these 325 gift records account for only 2 percent of records with one or more gifts retained by the Clintons. At the subcommittee's February 12, 2002, hearing, several 10" x 15" x12" boxes were displayed. These boxes included hundreds of individual gift records for additional gifts each over \$100 which were retained by the Clintons. The subcommittee did not sum the value of the gifts retained by the Clintons from \$100 to \$240. This additional number would need to be added to the Clinton total to allow a di-

rect and valid comparison between the two Presidents.

The minority views section also criticizes the investigation for focusing on Clinton's Presidential records. The report explains, "The subcommittee's investigation was intended to reveal whether there is a problem that needs a legislative solution. . . . The subcommittee's 1-year examination clearly demonstrated that the current system is broken. Examining in-depth 41,779 additional gift records for the previous 4-year Presidency was unnecessary to accomplish

the purpose of the investigation."

The minority views section of this report also states, "Yet some who give gifts want to gain influence and access to policymakers. That is why reforms to the Presidential gift process are needed. . Regrettably, these important reform proposals were not seriously considered in this report." In fact, the report presents the results of the subcommittee's investigation and a summary of the recommendations made by witnesses at two hearings in 2002 on my bill, H.R. 1081. In fact, I strongly believe that reform of the Presidential gifts system is essential; as a result, I intend to introduce a revised version of my reform proposal early in the next Congress. This version will be responsive to the thoughtful suggestions not only by the hearing witnesses but also later by the minority. I welcome bipartisan support for my initiative. My legislation will allow

my colleagues to match their calls for reform with action.

Since the committee's October 9, 2002 business meeting, questions were raised about the status of DOJ's response to Subcommittee Chairman Ose's February 13th referral (Appendix H). This referral was recommended by the witnesses in the subcommittee's February 12th hearing. A copy of DOJ's May 2nd reply is attached to these additional views. It indicates that the matter was referred internally within DOJ to the Department's Criminal Division. DOJ also requested additional information. Since that time, the subcommittee met with the Public Integrity Section of DOJ's Criminal Division and provided additional information.

Since the committee's business meeting, the subcommittee became aware of two additional factors. First, former Presidents and their families can borrow gifts from NARA that were not retained by a First Family but ended up with NARA for a Presidential archival library. Second, NARA has provided written acknowledgments to certain donors for use in receiving tax deductions for Presidential gifts that the First Family did not choose to retain. Instead, these gifts ended up with NARA for a Presidential archival

library.

As a consequence, on October 15th, Subcommittee Chairman Ose sent another letter to NARA, a copy of which is attached to these additional views. In the letter, the subcommittee requested: (a) copies of NARA's acknowledgments (including on IRS forms) for gifts since January 20, 1989 that ended up with NARA for a Presidential archival library, i.e., covering the Presidencies of George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton and George W. Bush; and (b) the identification of all loans (except to libraries, museums, and Federal agencies) from the 12 Presidential libraries, starting with the Harry S. Truman Library and ending with the not-yet-open William J. Clinton Library. This information may shed light on another avenue for possible influencing by donors of Presidential gifts, i.e., gifts that were not retained per se by a First Family but which ended up in a Presidential library, subject to being used for indeterminate periods by the President and First Family.

Please provide the requested information on a rolling basis, working from the most recent Administration backwards.
