A BILL

- To require payments to State and local governments for infrastructure and social services needs in the same amount as the amount of relief and reconstruction funds provided to Iraq.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

4 The Congress finds the following:

(1) The President has proposed a multibillion
 dollar reconstruction project for Iraq.

3 (2) The President's plan includes resources to
4 rebuild potable water and wastewater treatment fa5 cilities; schools and health facilities; ports and air6 ports; the electric power system, roads, and bridges;
7 railroad infrastructure; solid waste management
8 services; irrigation systems; and selected local gov9 ernment buildings.

10 (3) State and local governments in the United
11 States have their own unmet infrastructure and so12 cial services needs.

(4) State and local governments represent a
significant segment of the national economy whose
economic health is essential to national economic
prosperity.

17 (5) Present national economic problems have
18 imposed considerable hardships on State and local
19 government budgets.

20 (6) Those governments, because of their own
21 fiscal difficulties, are being forced to take budget-re22 lated actions which tend to undermine Federal Gov23 ernment efforts to stimulate the economy.

24 (7) Efforts to stimulate the economy through25 reductions in Federal Government tax obligations or

increased spending on Federal programs are weak ened when State and local governments are forced to
 increase taxes or cut spending.

4 (8) Efforts by the Federal Government to stim5 ulate the economic recovery will be substantially en6 hanced by a program of emergency Federal Govern7 ment assistance to State and local governments to
8 help prevent those governments from taking budget9 related actions which undermine the Federal Gov10 ernment efforts to stimulate economic recovery.

(9) State and local governments deserve, at a
minimum, the same level of Federal investment to
address infrastructure and social services shortfalls
as the amount of relief and reconstruction funds
provided to Iraq.

16 SEC. 2. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE AUTHORIZED.

(a) PAYMENTS TO STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS.—The Secretary of the Treasury shall, in accordance with the provisions of this Act, make payments to
States and local governments to coordinate budget-related
actions by such governments with Federal Government efforts to stimulate economic recovery.

(b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATION.—There is
authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary of the
Treasury for fiscal year 2003 for payments under this Act

1 an amount equal to at least the total amount appropriated 2 for fiscal year 2003 under the heading "Iraq Relief and 3 Reconstruction Fund" in the Emergency Wartime Supple-4 mental Appropriations Act, 2003, and any amounts appro-5 priated for such Fund in any subsequent appropriation Act. Such amounts shall be in addition to, and not in lieu 6 7 of, other amounts appropriated for payments to States 8 and local governments.

9 (c) AVAILABILITY TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS.—Not 10 less than one-third of the amount appropriated pursuant 11 to the authorization in subsection (b) shall be made avail-12 able to local governments under the applicable laws of a 13 given State.

14 SEC. 3. ALLOCATION.

15 The Secretary of the Treasury shall establish a for-16 mula, within 30 days after the date of the enactment of 17 this Act, for determining the allocation of payments under 18 this Act. The formula shall give priority weight to the fol-19 lowing factors:

- 20 (1) The unemployment rate in relation to the21 national average unemployment rate.
- 22 (2) The duration of the unemployment rate23 above such average.
- 24 (3) Median income.
- 25 (4) Population.

1	(5) The poverty rate.
2	SEC. 4. USE OF FUNDS BY STATE AND LOCAL GOVERN-
3	MENTS.
4	(a) IN GENERAL.—Funds received under this Act
5	may be used only for priority expenditures. For purposes
6	of this Act, the term "priority expenditures" means only—
7	(1) ordinary and necessary maintenance and
8	operating expenses for—
9	(A) primary, secondary, or higher edu-
10	cation, including school building renovation;
11	(B) public safety;
12	(C) public health, including hospitals and
13	public health laboratories;
14	(D) social services for the disadvantaged or
15	aged;
16	(E) roads, transportation, and water infra-
17	structure; and
18	(F) housing; and
19	(2) ordinary and necessary capital expenditures
20	authorized by law.
21	(b) Certifications by State and Local Govern-
22	MENTS.—The Secretary of the Treasury may accept a cer-
23	tification by the chief executive officer of a State or local
24	government that the State or local government has used
25	the funds received by it under this Act only for priority

expenditures, unless the Secretary determines that such
 certification is not sufficiently reliable to enable the Sec retary to carry out this Act. The Secretary shall prescribe
 by rule the time and manner in which the certification
 must be filed.
