#### 108TH CONGRESS 1ST SESSION **H. R. 1762**

To amend title 38, United States Code, to provide for preservation and protection of historic buildings under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, and for other purposes.

## A BILL

- To amend title 38, United States Code, to provide for preservation and protection of historic buildings under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the "Veterans National5 Heritage Preservation Act of 2003".

#### 1 SEC. 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Act is to provide for the preservation and protection of the most historically significant buildings of the Department of Veterans Affairs, to provide for the documentation and appreciation of the historic significance of those buildings, and to increase public understanding of the Nation's long commitment to honoring veterans.

#### 9 SEC. 3. FINDINGS.

10 The Congress finds the following:

(1) One of the last Acts signed by President
Lincoln before his assassination in 1865 established
the National Asylum for disabled volunteer soldiers
and sailors of the Civil War (renamed the National
Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers in 1873 and
often referred to as the National Military Home).

17 (2) The National Home eventually expanded to 18 comprise ten branches and one sanatorium in Togus, 19 Maine (1866); Milwaukee, Wisconsin (1867); Day-20 ton, Ohio (1867); Hampton, Virginia (1870); Leav-21 enworth, Kansas (1885); Santa Monica, California 22 (1888); Marion, Indiana (1888); Danville, Illinois 23 (1898);Johnson City, Tennessee (1901);Hot 24 Springs, South Dakota (1902); and Bath, New York 25 (1929).

(3) Until it was combined with the Veterans Bureau to become the United States Veterans Administration in 1930, the National Home cared for

4 more than 100,000 Civil War and other veterans,
5 many of whom were shattered physically and spir6 itually from the carnage of war.

7 (4) The National Home evolved into complete
8 planned communities with barracks, mess halls, gate
9 houses, chapels, schools, hotels, libraries, band
10 stands, amusements halls, theaters, shops, and other
11 structures, many of which still stand, and include
12 outstanding examples of 19th and early 20th cen13 tury architecture.

14 (5) The National Home is an important part of 15 the Nation's history, representing many historical 16 developments, including the Nation's first non-reli-17 gious planned communities, the first Federal effort 18 to establish large-scale rehabilitation programs, a 19 significant expansion of Federal benefits to citizen-20 veterans, a landmark in the development of Federal 21 responsibility for the social safety net, and the first permanent churches constructed by the Federal Gov-22 23 ernment.

24 (6) The branches of the National Home made25 significant contributions to the history, identity, and

culture of the communities in which they are lo cated.

3 (7) The Department of Veterans Affairs has ju4 risdiction over about 1,680 historic buildings in
5 nearly every State of the Union.

6 (8) Preservation of historic buildings under the 7 jurisdiction of the Department of Veterans Affairs 8 contributes to the heritage of all Americans and rep-9 resents a powerful symbol of the national debt to the 10 Nation's war veterans.

(9) Partnerships between the Department of
Veterans Affairs, other Federal agencies, and State
and local governments and nonprofit organizations
have the potential to help restore, maintain, interpret, and reuse the historic buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

17 (10)The organizations veterans service 18 AMVETS, Disabled American Veterans, Paralyzed 19 Veterans of America, and Veterans of Foreign Wars 20 jointly support establishing historic preservation as a 21 responsibility of the Department of Veterans Affairs, 22 systematically preserving the Department's most im-23 portant historic buildings, and reducing legal, ad-24 ministrative, and financial barriers to adaptive reuse 25 of historic properties by local communities.

(11) More than 100 historic buildings under the
 jurisdiction of the Department of Veterans Affairs,
 including the Nation's first permanent church build ing constructed by the Federal Government, are un derutilized or vacant and are threatened with dete rioration and demolition.
 (12) Providing for the Department of Veterans

Affairs' historic preservation requirements in no way
need diminish funding for the Department's other
missions and is fully consistent with the Department's broader goal of honoring and caring for the
Nation's veterans.

### 13 TITLE I—PRESERVATION OF HIS-

# 14 TORIC FACILITIES OF THE 15 DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS 16 AFFAIRS

#### 17 SEC. 101. DEFINITION.

18 Section 101 of title 38, United States Code, is19 amended by adding at the end the following new para-20 graph:

21 "(34) The term 'historic building' means a building
22 listed on, or eligible for listing on, the National Register
23 of Historic Places.".

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 1 of title 38, United
4 States Code, is amended by adding at the end the fol5 lowing new section:

#### 6 "§117. Historic Preservation mission

7 "(a) It is a mission and responsibility of the Depart8 ment to maintain its most significant historic buildings
9 and to preserve them for future generations.

10 "(b) It is the sense of Congress that, in keeping with
11 the mission of the Department specified in subsection
12 (a)—

"(1) wherever practical, the historic buildings of
the Department should be preserved, protected, restored, interpreted, reused, and maintained as a living memorial to the contributions of veterans to the
Nation;

18 "(2) the director of each major Department fa19 cility that is listed on, or eligible for listing on, the
20 National Register of Historic Places should—

21 "(A) make available to the cultural re22 sources management officer of that facility suf23 ficient resources to document, conserve, and
24 display items of historical significance and as25 sist with the preservation of the history of the
26 facility; and

"(B) provide that officer with appropriate information and sufficient training, appropriate publications, authority, and total access to budgetary, management, and decision making processes to permit effective coordination of its cultural resource management plan; "(3) whenever feasible, the Secretary should restore and use historic buildings, rather than carry out new construction, for Department purposes; "(4) the Secretary should make greater use of the leasing authority for historic buildings that is provided for Federal agencies under section 111 of the National Historic Preservation Act (16 U.S.C. 470h-3); "(5) the Secretary should reduce barriers to reuse of historic buildings by non-Department private and public organizations if such reuse would enhance historic preservation of those buildings;

"(6) the Secretary should work with the Secretary of the Interior to coordinate historic preservation activities of the Department; and

"(7) the Secretary should form a partnership
with the National Trust for Historic Preservation,
within the context of the Capital Asset Realignment
for Enhancement of Services (CARES) process of

the Department, to ensure the appropriate, lawful,
 and financially prudent management of the Depart ment's historic properties, similar to the partnership
 formed between the Department of the Army and
 the Trust.".

6 (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of sections
7 at the beginning of such chapter is amended by adding
8 at the end the following new item:

"117. Historic preservation mission.".

#### 9 SEC. 103. OFFICE OF HISTORIC PRESERVATION.

10 (a) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 3 of title 38, United
11 States Code, is amended by adding at the end the fol12 lowing new section:

#### 13 **"§ 320. Office of Historic Preservation**

14 "(a) There is in the Department an Office of Historic 15 Preservation within the Office of the Secretary or other-16 wise at a sufficiently high level within the departmental 17 organization to ensure adequate communication with all 18 relevant divisions within the Department. There shall be 19 at the head of the Office a Director.

20 "(b) The Director shall administer the Veterans Her21 itage Preservation Fund established under section 8701
22 of this title.

23 "(c) The Director shall develop procedures to ensure
24 that decisions within the Department that affect or may
25 affect historic buildings, properties, and cultural resources

of the Department are made in accordance with Depart ment directives and applicable laws and regulations.

3 "(d) The Director shall ensure that the head of each 4 Department facility that is listed on, or eligible for listing 5 on, the National Register of Historic Places and the head of each regional office and each major program manager 6 7 of the Department designates a cultural resource manage-8 ment officer with training in historic preservation and 9 compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act 10 (40 U.S.C. 470 et seq.).

"(e) The Director shall review Department activities, policies, and procedures that might affect historic buildings, properties, and cultural resources, including review of initiatives through the Capital Asset Realignment for Enhancement of Services (CARES) program of the Department.

"(f) The Director shall maintain a comprehensive inventory of the Department's historic buildings, properties,
and cultural resources and shall forward to the Secretary
of the Interior nominations of such buildings, properties,
and cultural resources for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places.

23 "(g) The Director shall assure the Department's
24 compliance with section 106 of the National Historic Pres25 ervation Act of 1966 (16 U.S.C. 470f).".

(b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of sections
 at the beginning of such chapter is amended by adding
 at the end the following new item:
 "320. Office of Historic Preservation.".

#### 4 SEC. 104. VETERANS HERITAGE PRESERVATION.

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—(1) Part IV of title 38, United
6 States Code, is amended by adding at the end the fol7 lowing new chapter:

#### 8 "CHAPTER 87—HISTORIC PRESERVATION

"8701. Veterans Heritage Preservation Fund. "8702. Public-private partnerships.

#### 9 "§ 8701. Veterans Heritage Preservation Fund

10 "(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary shall establish a fund to be known as the 'Veterans Heritage Preser-11 vation Fund'. The Director of the Office of Historic Pres-12 13 ervation, in consultation with the Department's facility di-14 rectors, shall make recommendations to the Secretary on the use of the assets of the fund. In making such rec-15 ommendations, the Director shall take into consideration 16 17 the priority order ranking specified in the report under 18 section 106 of the Veterans National Preservation Herit-19 age Act of 2003.

20 "(b) USES OF FUND.—The Secretary may use bal21 ances in the fund to—

22 "(1) evaluate, stabilize, preserve, renovate, and
23 restore historic buildings and properties owned by

the Department in conformity with applicable statu tory and regulatory standards for historic preserva tion;

4 "(2) assist in the maintenance and preservation
5 of the Department's historic artifacts and collec6 tions; and

7 "(3) make grants to State and local govern8 ments and non-profit organizations in connection
9 with the adaptive reuse of historic buildings.

"(c) GRANT REQUIREMENTS.—(1) A grant under
subsection (b)(3) may be used by the grant recipient for
studies, planning, construction, management, marketing,
interpretation, promoting cultural tourism, and operations.

15 "(2) Such a grant may provide funds for not more
16 than 75 percent of a project's cost, with the remainder
17 to be provided as a non-Federal match.

18 "(3) In selecting recipients for grants under sub-19 section (b)(3), the Secretary may establish a higher pri-20 ority for proposed projects that would benefit veterans, in-21 cluding homeless veterans, or that would honor the 22 achievements of veterans.

23 "(d) INCOME FROM RENTAL PROPERTY.—Income or
24 proceeds from the rental of historic properties at facilities
25 of the Department, including quarters rented by Depart-

ment personnel or other persons, shall be credited to, and 1 form a part of, the Fund. In allocating amounts to De-2 3 partment facilities under subsection (b)(1) that are de-4 rived from income or proceeds from rental property, the 5 Secretary shall provide funds to those facilities based upon the amount of funds credited under the preceding sentence 6 7 from properties at those facilities, subject to availability 8 of approved projects for the use of such funds.

9 "(e) DONATIONS.—The Secretary is authorized to ac10 cept donations for the purposes of the Fund. Any such
11 amount shall be credited to, and form a part of, the Fund.
12 "(f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
13 is authorized to be appropriated to the Veterans Heritage
14 Preservation Fund for each fiscal year the amount of
15 \$20,000,000.".

#### 16 "§8702. Public-private partnerships

17 "(a) COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.—The Secretary
18 may enter into cooperative agreements and leases with
19 State and local governments, nongovernmental organiza20 tions, and the Secretary of the Interior for the purpose
21 of restoring, rehabilitating, maintaining, interpreting, pro22 moting, and marketing historic buildings.

23 "(b) DONATIONS.—The Secretary may accept dona24 tions for the purpose of implementing a partnership under
25 this section.

1 "(c) COLLABORATION WITH DEPARTMENT OF THE 2 INTERIOR.—The Secretary may collaborate with, and 3 enter into agreements with, the Secretary of the Interior 4 and Interior-related agencies, including units of the Na-5 tional Park Service and Federally-designated national her-6 itage areas, for the purposes of this chapter.".

#### 7 SEC. 105. ENHANCED-USE LEASES.

8 Section 8162(a) of title 38, United States Code, is
9 amended by adding at the end the following new para10 graph:

11 "(5) In light of the statement in section 117(a) of 12 this title that it is a mission and responsibility of the De-13 partment to maintain its most significant historic buildings and to preserve them for future generations, historic 14 15 preservation shall be considered to be a Department mission for the purposes of paragraph (2)(A)(i) and any pro-16 17 posed enhanced-use lease that includes or incorporates preservation and restoration of the building proposed to 18 be leased shall be considered to be a veterans related pur-19 pose lease for purpose of priorities for the awarding of 20 21 leases under this section.".

#### 22 SEC. 106. PRESERVATION STUDY AND REPORT.

(a) STUDY AND REPORT.—The Secretary of Veterans
Affairs shall conduct a study of the historic buildings of
the Department of Veterans Affairs and, not later than

February 1, 2005, shall submit to the Committees on Vet erans' Affairs of the Senate and House of Representatives
 a report on the results of that study.

4 (b) CONTENTS OF REPORT.—The report under sub-5 section (a) shall include the following:

6 (1) A detailed inventory of historic buildings 7 and sites under the jurisdiction of the Department 8 of Veterans Affairs, together with a description of 9 the historical significance of each such building or 10 site.

(2) Identification of the most important historic
buildings and sites named under paragraph (1) and,
for each such building or site—

14 (A) a description of potential threats to the15 preservation of the building or site;

16 (B) a cost analysis for restoration of the17 building or site; and

18 (C) a comprehensive structural engineering19 analysis of the building or site.

20 (3) Ranking of the priority order of such build21 ings and sites for restoration, taking into consider22 ation historical significance, reuse potential, preser23 vation threat, and organized community support.

24 (4) An action plan for the stabilization and25 preservation of the buildings and sites identified

under paragraph (2) that the Secretary determines
 to be the most threatened.

3 (c) CONSULTATION.—In preparing the report under 4 subsection (a), the Secretary shall consult with the Sec-5 retary of the Interior and with State and local govern-6 mental agencies and appropriate local private non-profit 7 organizations in the communities of the historic buildings.

8 (d) DEFINITION.—For purposes of this section, the 9 term "historic building" means a building listed on, or eli-10 gible for listing on, the National Register of Historic 11 Places.

# 12 TITLE II—NATIONAL HISTORIC 13 LANDMARK THEME STUDY

#### 14 SEC. 201. AUTHORIZATION OF STUDY.

15 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of the Interior, in consultation and cooperation with the Secretary of Vet-16 erans Affairs, shall conduct a National Historic Landmark 17 theme study to identify sites, districts, buildings, struc-18 19 tures, and landscapes that best illustrate or commemorate 20 key events at facilities managed by the National Home 21 for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers and the United States 22 Veterans Bureau between 1865 and 1930.

(b) SITES TO BE STUDIED.—The sites to be studiedunder this section are the branches of the former National

1	Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers and associated enti-
2	ties at the following locations:
3	(1) Togus, Maine.
4	(2) Milwaukee, Wisconsin.
5	(3) Dayton, Ohio.
6	(4) Hampton, Virginia.
7	(5) Leavenworth, Kansas.
8	(6) Santa Monica, California.
9	(7) Marion, Illinois.
10	(8) Danville, Illinois.
11	(9) Johnston City, Tennessee.
12	(10) Hot Springs, South Dakota.
13	(11) Bath, New York.
14	(c) CRITERIA; NOMINATIONS.—In conducting the
15	study under this section, the Secretary of the Interior shall
16	use the criteria set forth in section 65.4 of title 36, Code
17	of Federal Regulations, to identify, in order of importance
18	or merit, potential National Historic Landmarks at the
19	locations listed in subsection (b). The study shall include
20	a nomination submittal for each potential National His-
21	toric Landmark identified under this subsection that
22	meets such criteria.

(d) EDUCATION AND RESEARCH.—The study shall—

(1) identify appropriate means to maximize op portunities for public education on the National
 Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers; and

4 (2) recommend opportunities for cooperative ar5 rangements with State and local governments, edu6 cational institutions, local historical organizations,
7 and other entities to preserve and interpret key cul8 tural resources at or associated with the locations
9 listed in subsection (b).

10 (e) COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.—The Secretary of 11 the Interior may enter into cooperative agreements with 12 one or more educational institutions, public history organi-13 zations, or veterans' organizations knowledgeable about 14 the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers to pre-15 pare the study under subsection (a) and to ensure that 16 the study meets scholarly standards.

(f) REPORT.—Not later than two years after the date
on which funds are made available for the study under
subsection (a), the Secretary of the Interior shall submit
to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources and
the Committee on Veterans' Affairs of the Senate and the
Committee on Resources and the Committee on Veterans'
Affairs of the House of Representatives a report con-

- 1 taining the findings, conclusions, and recommendations of
- 2 the study.
