AN ACT

To remove civil liability barriers that discourage the donation of fire equipment to volunteer fire companies.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- ${\it 2\ tives\ of\ the\ United\ States\ of\ America\ in\ Congress\ assembled},$

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- This Act may be cited as the "Good Samaritan Vol-
- 3 unteer Firefighter Assistance Act of 2004".
- 4 SEC. 2. REMOVAL OF CIVIL LIABILITY BARRIERS THAT DIS-
- 5 COURAGE THE DONATION OF FIRE EQUIP-
- 6 MENT TO VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANIES.
- 7 (a) LIABILITY PROTECTION.—A person who donates
- 8 fire control or fire rescue equipment to a volunteer fire
- 9 company shall not be liable for civil damages under any
- 10 State or Federal law for personal injuries, property dam-
- 11 age or loss, or death proximately caused by the equipment
- 12 after the donation.
- 13 (b) Exceptions.—Subsection (a) does not apply to
- 14 a person if—
- 15 (1) the person's act or omission proximately
- 16 causing the injury, damage, loss, or death con-
- stitutes gross negligence or intentional misconduct;
- 18 or
- 19 (2) the person is the manufacturer of the fire
- 20 control or fire rescue equipment.
- 21 (c) Preemption.—This Act preempts the laws of
- 22 any State to the extent that such laws are inconsistent
- 23 with this Act, except that notwithstanding subsection (b)
- 24 this Act shall not preempt any State law that provides
- 25 additional protection from liability for a person who do-

- 1 nates fire control or fire rescue equipment to a volunteer
- 2 fire company.

- 3 (d) Definitions.—In this section:
- 4 (1) Person.—The term "person" includes any governmental or other entity.
- 6 (2) FIRE CONTROL OR RESCUE EQUIPMENT.—
 7 The term "fire control or fire rescue equipment" in8 cludes any fire vehicle, fire fighting tool, communica9 tions equipment, protective gear, fire hose, or
 10 breathing apparatus.
 - (3) STATE.—The term "State" includes the several States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, American Samoa, Guam, the Virgin Islands, any other territory or possession of the United States, and any political subdivision of any such State, territory, or possession.
 - (4) Volunteer fire company" means an association of individuals who provide fire protection and other emergency services, where at least 30 percent of the individuals receive little or no compensation compared with an entry level full-time paid individual in that association or in the nearest such association with an entry level full-time paid individual.

- 1 (e) Effective Date.—This Act applies only to li-
- 2 ability for injury, damage, loss, or death caused by equip-
- 3 ment that, for purposes of subsection (a), is donated on
- 4 or after the date that is 30 days after the date of the
- 5 enactment of this Act.
- 6 SEC. 3. STATE-BY-STATE REVIEW OF DONATION OF FIRE-
- 7 FIGHTER EQUIPMENT.
- 8 (a) In General.—The Attorney General of the
- 9 United States shall conduct a State-by-State review of the
- 10 donation of firefighter equipment to volunteer firefighter
- 11 companies during the 5-year period ending on the date
- 12 of the enactment of this Act.
- 13 (b) Report.—Not later than 6 months after the date
- 14 of the enactment of this Act, the Attorney General of the
- 15 United States shall publish and submit to the Congress
- 16 a report on the results of the review conducted under sub-
- 17 section (a). The report shall include, for each State, the
- 18 most effective way to fund firefighter companies, whether
- 19 first responder funding is sufficient to respond to the Na-
- 20 tion's needs, and the best method to ensure that the equip-
- 21 ment donated to volunteer firefighter companies is in usa-
- 22 ble condition.
