A BILL

To remove civil liability barriers that discourage the donation of fire equipment to volunteer fire companies.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Good Samaritan Volun5 teer Firefighter Assistance Act of 2004".

6 SEC. 2. REMOVAL OF CIVIL LIABILITY BARRIERS THAT DIS7 COURAGE THE DONATION OF FIRE EQUIP8 MENT TO VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANIES.

9 (a) LIABILITY PROTECTION.—A person who donates 10 fire control or fire rescue equipment to a volunteer fire com-11 pany shall not be liable for civil damages under any State 12 or Federal law for personal injuries, property damage or 13 loss, or death proximately caused by the equipment after 14 the donation.

15 (b) EXCEPTIONS.—Subsection (a) does not apply to a
16 person if—

17 (1) the person's act or omission proximately
18 causing the injury, damage, loss, or death constitutes
19 gross negligence or intentional misconduct; or

1 (2) the person is the manufacturer of the fire 2 control or fire rescue equipment. 3 (c) PREEMPTION.—This Act preempts the laws of any 4 State to the extent that such laws are inconsistent with this 5 Act, except that notwithstanding subsection (b) this Act 6 shall not preempt any State law that provides additional 7 protection from liability for a person who donates fire con-8 trol or fire rescue equipment to a volunteer fire company. 9 (d) DEFINITIONS.—In this section: 10 (1) PERSON.—The term "person" includes any 11 governmental or other entity. 12 (2) FIRE CONTROL OR RESCUE EQUIPMENT.— 13 The term "fire control or fire rescue equipment" in-14 cludes any fire vehicle, fire fighting tool, communica-

15 tions equipment, protective gear, fire hose, or breath-16 ing apparatus.

17 (3) STATE.—The term "State" includes the sev18 eral States, the District of Columbia, the Common19 wealth of Puerto Rico, the Commonwealth of the
20 Northern Mariana Islands, American Samoa, Guam,
21 the Virgin Islands, any other territory or possession
22 of the United States, and any political subdivision of
23 any such State, territory, or possession.

24 (4) VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY.—The term "vol25 unteer fire company" means an association of indi-

viduals who provide fire protection and other emer gency services, where at least 30 percent of the indi viduals receive little or no compensation compared
 with an entry level full-time paid individual in that
 association or in the nearest such association with an
 entry level full-time paid individual.

7 (e) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This Act applies only to liabil8 ity for injury, damage, loss, or death caused by equipment
9 that, for purposes of subsection (a), is donated on or after
10 the date that is 30 days after the date of the enactment
11 of this Act.

12SEC. 3. STATE-BY-STATE REVIEW OF DONATION OF FIRE-13FIGHTER EQUIPMENT.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General of the United
States shall conduct a State-by-State review of the donation
of firefighter equipment to volunteer firefighter companies
during the 5-year period ending on the date of the enactment of this Act.

19 (b) REPORT.—Not later than 6 months after the date 20 of the enactment of this Act, the Attorney General of the 21 United States shall publish and submit to the Congress a 22 report on the results of the review conducted under sub-23 section (a). The report shall include, for each State, the most 24 effective way to fund firefighter companies, whether first re-25 sponder funding is sufficient to respond to the Nation's

- 1 needs, and the best method to ensure that the equipment
- 2 donated to volunteer firefighter companies is in usable con-
- 3 dition.
