A BILL

- To accord honorary citizenship to the alien victims of the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks against the United States and to provide for the granting of citizenship to the alien spouses and children of certain victims of such attacks.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Terrorist Victim Citi-
- 5 zenship Relief Act".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 Congress makes the following findings:

1	(1) On September 11, 2001, the United States
2	suffered a series of attacks which led to the deaths
3	of thousands of people.
4	(2) Hundreds of foreign nationals perished in
5	the attacks on the American institutions on Amer-
6	ican soil.
7	(3) At that time, the Immigration and Natu-
8	ralization Service was processing applications for ad-
9	justment in immigration status for immigrants who
10	perished in the attacks.
11	(4) The immigrant or nonimmigrant status of
12	many immigrant families depends on the sponsor-
13	ship of those who perished.
14	(5) The former Immigration and Naturalization
15	Service publicly stated that it would not take action
16	against foreign nationals whose immigration status
17	is in jeopardy as a direct result of the attack.
18	(6) The Commissioner of the former Immigra-
19	tion and Naturalization Service James Ziglar stated
20	that "the Immigration and Naturalization Service
21	will exercise its discretion toward families of victims
22	during this time of mourning and readjustment".
23	(7) Only Congress has the authority to change
24	immigration law to address unanticipated omissions
25	in existing law to account for the unique cir-

cumstances surrounding the events of September 11,
 2001.

3 SEC. 3. DECEASED ALIEN VICTIMS OF TERRORIST ATTACKS 4 DEEMED TO BE UNITED STATES CITIZENS.

5 Notwithstanding title III of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1401 et seq.), and except as pro-6 7 vided in section 5, each alien who died as a result of a 8 September 11, 2001, terrorist attack against the United 9 States, shall, as of that date, be considered to be an hon-10 orary citizen of the United States if the alien held lawful 11 status under the immigration laws of the United States as of that date. 12

13 SEC. 4. CITIZENSHIP ACCORDED TO ALIEN SPOUSES AND14CHILDREN OF CERTAIN VICTIMS OF TER-15RORIST ATTACKS.

16 Notwithstanding title III of the Immigration and Na-17 tionality Act (8 U.S.C. 1401 et seq.), and except as provided in section 5, an alien spouse or child of an individual 18 19 who was lawfully present in the United States and who 20 died as a result of a September 11, 2001, terrorist attack 21 against the United States shall be entitled to naturaliza-22 tion as a citizen of the United States upon being adminis-23 tered the oath of renunciation and allegiance in an appro-24 priate ceremony pursuant to section 337 of the Immigration and Nationality Act, without regard to the current 25

status of the alien spouse or child under the immigration
 laws of the United States, if the spouse or child applies
 to the Secretary of Homeland Security for naturalization
 not later than two years after the date of enactment of
 this Act. The Secretary of Homeland Security shall record
 the date of naturalization of any person granted natu ralization under this section as being September 10, 2001.

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8 SEC. 5. EXCEPTIONS.

9 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, an 10 alien may not be naturalized as a citizen of the United 11 States, or afforded honorary citizenship, under this Act 12 if the alien is—

(1) inadmissible under paragraph (2) or (3) of
section 212(a) of the Immigration and Nationality
Act, or deportable under paragraph (2) or (4) of section 237(a) of that Act, including any terrorist perpetrator of a September 11, 2001, terrorist attack
against the United States; or

(2) a member of the family of a person de-scribed in paragraph (1).
