A BILL

To authorize the establishment of a national database for purposes of identifying, locating, and cataloging the many memorials and permanent tributes to America's veterans.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “National War Perma-
5 nent Tribute Historical Database Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 Congress finds that—

8 (1) on November 13, 2000, Congress agreed to
9 a resolution expressing the sense of Congress re-
10 garding the need for cataloging and maintaining
11 public memorials;

12 (2) there are many thousands of public memo-
13 rials and permanent tributes throughout the United
14 States and abroad that commemorate military con-
15 flicts of the United States and the service of individ-
16 uals in the Armed Forces;

17 (3) many of these memorials suffer from ne-
18 glect and disrepair, and many have been relocated or
19 stored in facilities where the memorials are unavail-
20 able to the public and subject to further neglect and
21 damage; and

1 (4) there exists a need to collect and centralize
2 information regarding the identification, location,
3 and description of these memorials, as no such cata-
4 log is available to the public from either the Federal
5 Government or any nongovernmental entity.

6 **SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF DATABASE.**

7 (a) **ESTABLISHMENT.**—In order to locate, identify,
8 and catalog the many thousands of permanent tributes
9 that commemorate the military conflicts of the United
10 States, and the service and sacrifice of individuals in the
11 Armed Forces of the United States, and to make such in-
12 formation readily available for the educational benefit of
13 the public, the Secretary of the Interior, in consultation
14 with the Secretary of Veterans' Affairs, may establish and
15 maintain a database known as the National War Perma-
16 nent Tribute Historical Database.

17 (b) **CONTENT.**—The database shall contain informa-
18 tion on—

19 (1) the location, history, and background of the
20 permanent tributes;

21 (2) photographs and other information to en-
22 hance the understanding of the permanent tributes;

23 (3) information about the veterans in whose
24 honor the permanent tributes are dedicated; and

1 (4) any other information the Secretary con-
2 siders appropriate and necessary.

3 (c) PUBLIC ACCESS.—The database shall be made ac-
4 cessible to the public, through the Internet or by other
5 means, in a format that permits the public to submit infor-
6 mation on permanent tributes for the purpose of updating
7 and expanding the database.

8 (d) ASSISTANCE.—The Secretary of the Interior may
9 seek the assistance of other Federal agencies and the
10 States and their political subdivisions, tribal governments,
11 public or private educational institutions, non-profit orga-
12 nizations, and individuals or other entities that the Sec-
13 retary considers appropriate in carrying out this Act, and
14 may enter into contracts and cooperative agreements to
15 obtain information or services that assist in the develop-
16 ment and implementation of the database.

17 (e) DEFINITION.—As used in this section, the term
18 “permanent tribute” means any statue, structure, or other
19 monument on public property commemorating the service
20 of any person or persons in the Armed Forces.

21 **SEC. 4. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

22 There are authorized to be appropriated to the Sec-
23 retary of the Interior such sums as may be necessary to
24 carry out this Act.

1 **SEC. 5. REPORT.**

2 Within 3 years after the date of enactment of this
3 Act, the Secretary of the Interior shall transmit to the
4 Congress a report assessing the efficacy and desirability
5 of establishing a permanent fund within the Treasury for
6 the repair, restoration, and maintenance of the memorials
7 identified and catalogued under section 3. The report shall
8 include recommended criteria regarding appropriate re-
9 cipients of expenditures from such a fund as well as pro-
10 posed funding mechanisms and any other information con-
11 sidered by the Secretary to be relevant.

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
