### A BILL

To authorize funds for an educational center for the Castillo de San Marcos National Monument, and for other purposes.

# *TITLE I*—CASTILLO DE SAN *MARCOS NATIONAL MONU- MENT PRESERVATION ACT*

#### 4 SEC. 101. SHORT TITLE.

5 This title may be cited as the "Castillo de San Marcos6 National Monument Preservation and Education Act".

#### 7 SEC. 102. VISITOR CENTER.

8 (a) AUTHORIZATION.—Subject to the availability of 9 appropriations and the project being prioritized in the Na-10 tional Park Services 5-year, line-item construction pro-11 gram, the Secretary of the Interior (referred to in this sec-12 tion as the "Secretary") may design and construct a Visitor 13 Center for the Castillo de San Marcos National Monument 14 (referred to in this section as the "Monument").

(b) PREFERRED ALTERNATIVE.—The Visitor Center
authorized in subsection (a) shall be located and constructed
in accordance with the Preferred Alternative identified in
the Record of Decision for the General Management Plan
for the Monument, expected to be signed in 2005.

#### 20 SEC. 103. COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT.

The Secretary may enter into cooperative agreements
with the City of St. Augustine, Florida, the Colonial St.
Augustine Preservation Foundation, other Federal, State,
and local departments or agencies, academic institutions,

and non-profit entities for the planning and design, con struction, management, and operation of the Visitor Center.

#### 3 SEC. 104. BOUNDARY EXPANSION.

4 (a) PROPERTY ACQUISITION.—If the Preferred Alter5 native for the Visitor Center authorized by section 102 is
6 located outside the boundary of the Monument, the Sec7 retary is authorized to acquire the site for the Visitor Cen8 ter, from willing sellers, by donation, purchase with do9 nated or appropriated funds, or by exchange.

(b) ADMINISTRATION OF NEWLY ACQUIRED LAND.—
11 Land added to the Monument pursuant to subsection (a)
12 shall be administered by the Secretary in accordance with
13 applicable laws and regulations.

(c) BOUNDARY MODIFICATION.—The boundary of the
Monument shall be modified to reflect the acquisition of
land authorized in subsection (a) after completion of the
acquisition.

#### 18 SEC. 105. PROJECT APPROVAL.

Prior to initiating any planning, design, or construction on the Visitor Center authorized by section 102, the
project must be reviewed and approved by the National
Park Service consistent with partnership construction
guidelines established by that agency.

# 1 TITLE II—CASTILLO DE SAN 2 MARCOS NATIONAL MONU 3 MENT BOUNDARY MODIFICA 4 TION

5 SEC. 201. SHORT TITLE.

6 This title may be cited as the "Castillo de San Marcos
7 National Monument Boundary Adjustment Act of 2004".
8 SEC. 202. FINDINGS.

9 Congress finds the following:

(1) The early defense lines for Fort Marion,
Florida, today known as the Castillo de San Marcos
National Monument, included defenses extending in a
line due west to the Sebastian River, a distance of
about one half mile.

(2) In the 1830's, during the Seminole Wars in
Florida, these defensive lines were maintained, but as
Florida became more settled they fell into disrepair
and/or became obsolete.

19 (3) In 1908 the War Department deeded much of
20 the property running west to the Sebastian River to
21 the St. Johns County Board of Public Instruction.
22 The portion of this property remaining in federal
23 ownership today is occupied by Orange Street, a City
24 of St. Augustine, Florida street.

(4) For nearly a century, the City of St. Augus-
tine has maintained and managed Orange Street, a
modern city street, and associated utilities in the Or-
ange Street corridor.
(5) Any archeological remains that are still
present on the property overlaid by Orange Street are
adequately protected by the City's archeological ordi-
nances, and by the City having an archeologist on
staff.
(6) Although the city currently operates Orange
Street under a right-of-way from the National Park
Service, from a management perspective it is appro-
priate for the City of St. Augustine to own Orange
Street.
SEC. 203. BOUNDARY ADJUSTMENT.
(a) CONVEYANCE OF LAND.—The Secretary of the Inte-
rior shall convey, without consideration, to the City of St.
Augustine, Florida, all right, title, and interest of the
United States in and to the lands Imerum as Ananas Street
United States in and to the lands known as Orange Street,
a portion of the Castillo de San Marcos National Monument
a portion of the Castillo de San Marcos National Monument
a portion of the Castillo de San Marcos National Monument (Monument), consisting of approximately 3.1 acres, as

of the conveyance, the Secretary shall revise the boundary
 of the Monument to exclude the land conveyed.

3 (b) BOUNDARY REVISION.—Effective on the date of the 4 enactment of this Act, the boundary of the Monument is 5 revised to include an area of approximately 0.45 acres, as 6 shown on the map identified in subsection (a). The Sec-7 retary shall administer the lands included in the boundary 8 as part of the national monument in accordance with ap-9 plicable laws and regulations.

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
