17 For salaries and expenses of the Committee on Appropriations, \$24,926,000, including studies and examina-18 19 tions of executive agencies and temporary personal serv-20 ices for such committee, to be expended in accordance with 21 section 202(b) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 22 1946 and to be available for reimbursement to agencies 23 for services performed: *Provided*, That such amount shall 24 remain available for such salaries and expenses until De-25 cember 31, 2004.

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#### SALARIES, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

2 For compensation and expenses of officers and em-3 ployees, as authorized by law, \$158,324,000, including: 4 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, includ-5 ing not more than \$13,000, of which not more than \$10,000 is for the Family Room, for official representa-6 7 tion and reception expenses, \$18,632,000; for salaries and 8 expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at Arms, including 9 the position of Superintendent of Garages, and including 10 not more than \$3,000 for official representation and reception expenses, \$5,471,000; for salaries and expenses of 11 12 the Office of the Chief Administrative Officer, 13 \$113,141,000, of which \$9,400,000 shall remain available 14 until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of 15 the Inspector General, \$3,847,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of Emergency Planning, Preparedness 16 17 and Operations, \$5,000,000, to remain available until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of General 18 19 Counsel, \$926,000; for the Office of the Chaplain, \$153,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the 2021 Parliamentarian, including the Parliamentarian and 22 \$2,000 for preparing the Digest of Rules, \$1,560,000; for 23 salaries and expenses of the Office of the Law Revision 24 Counsel of the House, \$2,263,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Legislative Counsel of the 25

House, \$6,233,000; for salaries and expenses of the Cor rections Calendar Office, \$948,000; and for other author ized employees, \$150,000.

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# ALLOWANCES AND EXPENSES

5 For allowances and expenses as authorized by House resolution or law, \$193,608,000, including: supplies, mate-6 7 rials, administrative costs and Federal tort claims, 8 \$3,975,000; official mail for committees, leadership of-9 fices, and administrative offices of the House, \$410,000; 10 Government contributions for health, retirement, Social other applicable 11 Security, and employee benefits. 12 \$188,533,000; and miscellaneous items including pur-13 chase, exchange, maintenance, repair and operation of House motor vehicles, interparliamentary receptions, and 14 15 gratuities to heirs of deceased employees of the House, \$690,000. 16

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#### CHILD CARE CENTER

For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-19 atives Child Care Center, such amounts as are deposited 20 in the account established by section 312(d)(1) of the Leg-21 islative Branch Appropriations Act, 1992 (2 U.S.C. 2112), 22 subject to the level specified in the budget of the Center, 23 as submitted to the Committee on Appropriations of the 24 House of Representatives.

#### Administrative Provision

2 SEC. 101. (a) REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN MEMBERS' REPRESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES TO BE 3 4 USED FOR DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO REDUCE THE FEDERAL DEBT.—Notwithstanding any other provision of 5 law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for 6 7 "HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—SALARIES AND 8 EXPENSES—MEMBERS' Representational ALLOW-9 ANCES" shall be available only for fiscal year 2004. Any 10 amount remaining after all payments are made under such allowances for fiscal year 2004 shall be deposited in the 11 12 Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no 13 Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as 14 15 the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate).

(b) REGULATIONS.—The Committee on House Administration of the House of Representatives shall have
authority to prescribe regulations to carry out this section.

(c) DEFINITION.—As used in this section, the term
"Member of the House of Representatives" means a Representative in, or a Delegate or Resident Commissioner
to, the Congress.

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10 Office of the Attending Physician

11 For medical supplies, equipment, and contingent ex-12 penses of the emergency rooms, and for the Attending 13 Physician and his assistants, including: (1) an allowance of \$2,175 per month to the Attending Physician; (2) an 14 15 allowance of \$725 per month each to four medical officers while on duty in the Office of the Attending Physician; 16 17 (3) an allowance of \$725 per month to two assistants and 18 \$580 per month each not to exceed 11 assistants on the 19 basis heretofore provided for such assistants; and (4)20 \$1,566,000 for reimbursement to the Department of the 21 Navy for expenses incurred for staff and equipment as-22 signed to the Office of the Attending Physician, which 23 shall be advanced and credited to the applicable appropria-24 tion or appropriations from which such salaries, allow-25 ances, and other expenses are payable and shall be available for all the purposes thereof, \$2,236,000, to be dis bursed by the Chief Administrative Officer of the House
 of Representatives.

4 Capitol Guide Service and Special Services

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#### OFFICE

6 For salaries and expenses of the Capitol Guide Serv-7 ice and Special Services Office, \$3,511,000, to be dis-8 bursed by the Secretary of the Senate: *Provided*, That no 9 part of such amount may be used to employ more than 10 58 individuals: *Provided further*, That the Capitol Guide Board is authorized, during emergencies, to employ not 11 more than two additional individuals for not more than 12 120 days each, and not more than 10 additional individ-13 uals for not more than 6 months each, for the Capitol 14 15 Guide Service.

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#### STATEMENTS OF APPROPRIATIONS

17 For the preparation, under the direction of the Committees on Appropriations of the Senate and the House 18 of Representatives, of the statements for the first session 19 20 of the One Hundred Eighth Congress, showing appropria-21 tions made, indefinite appropriations, and contracts au-22 thorized, together with a chronological history of the reg-23 ular appropriations bills as required by law, \$30,000, to be paid to the persons designated by the chairmen of such 24 25 committees to supervise the work.

#### CAPITOL POLICE

#### SALARIES

3 For salaries of employees of the Capitol Police, in-4 cluding overtime, hazardous duty pay differential, and 5 Government contributions for health, retirement, Social other applicable employee 6 Security, and benefits. 7 \$189,913,000, to be disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol 8 Police or his designee.

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#### General Expenses

10 For necessary expenses of the Capitol Police, including motor vehicles, communications and other equipment, 11 12 security equipment and installation, uniforms, weapons, 13 supplies, materials, training, medical services, forensic 14 services, stenographic services, personal and professional 15 services, the employee assistance program, the awards program, postage, communication services, travel advances, 16 relocation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Fed-17 18 eral Law Enforcement Training Center, and not more 19 than \$5,000 to be expended on the certification of the 20 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-21 resentation and reception expenses, \$21,917,000, of which 22 \$1,745,000 shall remain available until expended, to be 23 disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his des-24 ignee: *Provided*, That, notwithstanding any other provi-25 sion of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police

at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis cal year 2004 shall be paid by the Secretary of Homeland
 Security from funds available to the Department of Home land Security.

5 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION6 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

7 SEC. 1001. TRANSFER AUTHORITY.—Amounts ap-8 propriated for fiscal year 2004 for the Capitol Police may 9 be transferred between the headings "SALARIES" and 10 "GENERAL EXPENSES" upon the approval of the Commit-11 tees on Appropriations of the Senate and the House of 12 Representatives.

- 13 OFFICE OF COMPLIANCE
- 14 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

15 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compliance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional 16 Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$2,255,000, 17 18 of which \$304,700 shall remain available until September 19 30, 2005: *Provided*, That the Executive Director of the 20 Office of Compliance may have the authority, within the 21 limits of available appropriations, to dispose of surplus or 22 obsolete personal property by interagency transfer, dona-23 tion, or discarding.

### CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

#### SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than \$3,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with official representation and reception expenses, \$33,820,000: *Provided*, That no part of such amount may be used for the purchase or hire of a passenger motor vehicle.

# 10 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

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#### GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

12 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and 13 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law; for surveys and studies in connection with activities under 14 15 the care of the Architect of the Capitol; for all necessary expenses for the general and administrative support of the 16 operations under the Architect of the Capitol including the 17 Botanic Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Sen-18 ate and House office buildings, and other facilities under 19 the jurisdiction of the Architect of the Capitol; including 20 21 furnishings and office equipment; including not more than 22 \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses, 23 to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-24 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and oper-25 ation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$84,513,000, of which

\$11,660,000 shall remain available until September 30,
 2008.

3 CAPITOL BUILDING

For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
and operation of the Capitol, \$23,307,000, of which
\$7,863,000 shall remain available until September 30,
2008.

8 CAPITOL GROUNDS

9 For all necessary expenses for care and improvement
10 of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House
11 office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant, \$6,886,000,
12 of which \$585,000 shall remain available until September
13 30, 2008.

14 HOUSE OFFICE BUILDINGS

For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
and operation of the House office buildings, \$54,564,000,
of which \$19,498,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2008.

19 CAPITOL POWER PLANT

For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care and operation of the Capitol Power Plant; lighting, heating, power (including the purchase of electrical energy) and water and sewer services for the Capitol, Senate and House office buildings, Library of Congress buildings, and the grounds about the same, Botanic Garden, Senate ga-

rage, and air conditioning refrigeration not supplied from 1 2 plants in any of such buildings; heating the Government 3 Printing Office and Washington City Post Office, and 4 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Su-5 preme Court Building, the Union Station complex, the Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the 6 7 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be 8 advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of 9 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited 10 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation, \$81,543,000, of which \$36,652,000 shall remain available 11 12 until September 30, 2008: *Provided*, That not more than 13 \$4,400,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed to this appropriation as herein provided shall be available for 14 15 obligation during fiscal year 2004.

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#### LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and
structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library
buildings and grounds, \$34,750,000, of which
\$16,877,000 shall remain available until September 30,
2008.

22 CAPITOL POLICE BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care,and operation of buildings and grounds of the United

States Capitol Police, \$3,308,000, of which \$2,075,000
 shall remain available until September 30, 2008.

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# BOTANIC GARDEN

4 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care 5 and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries, buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-6 7 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger 8 motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-9 mittee on the Library, \$6,062,000, of which \$25,000 shall 10 remain available until September 30, 2008: Provided, That this appropriation shall not be available for any ac-11 12 tivities of the National Garden.

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#### Administrative Provision

14 SEC. 1101. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), 15 none of the funds provided by this Act or any other Act may be used by the Architect of the Capitol after the expi-16 17 ration of the 180-day period which begins on the date of the enactment of this Act to employ any individual as a 18 temporary employee within a category of temporary em-19 20 ployment which does not provide employees with the same 21 eligibility for life insurance, health insurance, retirement, 22 and other benefits which is provided to temporary employ-23 ees who are hired for a period exceeding 1 year in length. 24 (b) Subsection (a) shall not apply with respect to any of the following individuals: 25

(1) An individual who is employed under the
 Architect of the Capitol Summer Employment Pro gram.

4 (2) An individual who is hired for a total of 120
5 days or less during any 5-year period (excluding any
6 days in which the individual is employed under the
7 Architect of the Capitol Summer Employment Pro8 gram).

9 (3) An individual employed by the Architect of 10 the Capitol as a temporary employee as of the date 11 of the enactment of this Act who exercises in writ-12 ing, not later than 180 days after such date, an op-13 tion offered by the Architect to remain under the 14 pay system (including benefits) provided for the in-15 dividual as of such date.

16 (4) An individual who becomes employed by the 17 Architect of the Capitol after the date of the enact-18 ment of this Act who exercises in writing, prior to 19 the individual's employment, an option offered by 20 the Architect to receive pay and benefits under an 21 alternative system which does not provide the bene-22 fits described in subsection (a), except that under 23 such an option the Architect shall be required to 24 provide the individual with the benefits described in 25 subsection (a) as soon as the individual's period of service as a temporary employee exceeds 1 year in
 length.

3 (c) Nothing in this section may be construed to re4 quire the Architect of the Capitol to provide duplicative
5 benefits for any employee.

# 6 LIBRARY OF CONGRESS7 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

8 For necessary expenses of the Library of Congress 9 not otherwise provided for, including development and 10 maintenance of the Library's Catalogs; custody and custodial care of the Library buildings; special clothing; clean-11 ing, laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of 12 13 motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the 14 15 Library; preparation and distribution of catalog records and other publications of the Library; hire or purchase 16 17 of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the Library of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly charge-18 able to the income of any trust fund held by the Board, 19 20 \$366,520,000, of which not more than \$6,500,000 shall 21 be derived from collections credited to this appropriation 22 during fiscal year 2004, and shall remain available until 23 expended, under the Act of June 28, 1902 (chapter 1301; 24 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150) and not more than \$350,000 shall be derived from collections during fiscal year 2004 25

and shall remain available until expended for the develop-1 2 ment and maintenance of an international legal informa-3 tion database and activities related thereto: *Provided*, 4 That the Library of Congress may not obligate or expend 5 any funds derived from collections under the Act of June 6 28, 1902, in excess of the amount authorized for obliga-7 tion or expenditure in appropriations Acts: Provided fur-8 ther, That the total amount available for obligation shall 9 be reduced by the amount by which collections are less 10 than the \$6,850,000: Provided further, That of the total amount appropriated, \$11,236,000 shall remain available 11 12 until expended for acquisition of books, periodicals, news-13 papers, and all other materials including subscriptions for bibliographic services for the Library, including \$40,000 14 15 to be available solely for the purchase, when specifically approved by the Librarian, of special and unique materials 16 for additions to the collections: *Provided further*, That of 17 the total amount appropriated, not more than \$12,000 18 may be expended, on the certification of the Librarian of 19 20 Congress, in connection with official representation and 21 reception expenses for the Overseas Field Offices: Pro-22 vided further, That of the total amount appropriated, 23 \$905,000 shall remain available until expended for the ac-24 quisition and partial support for implementation of an In-25 tegrated Library System (ILS): *Provided further*, That of

the amount appropriated, \$500,000 shall remain available 1 2 until expended, and shall be transferred to the Abraham 3 Lincoln Bicentennial Commission for carrying out the pur-4 poses of Public Law 106–173, of which amount \$10,000 5 may be used for official representation and reception expenses of the Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission: 6 7 *Provided further*, That of the total amount appropriated, 8 \$1,380,000 shall remain available until September 30, 9 2008 for the acquisition and partial support for implemen-10 tation of a Central Financial Management System: Provided further, That of the total amount appropriated, 11 12 \$11,060,000 shall remain available until expended for par-13 tial support of the National Audio-Visual Conservation Center: *Provided further*, That of the total amount appro-14 15 priated, \$2,762,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2008, for the development and maintenance 16 of the Alternate Computer Facility. 17

- 18 Copyright Office
- 19 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Copyright Office, \$47,290,000, of which not more than \$23,321,000, to remain available until expended, shall be derived from collections credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 2004 under section 708(d) of title 17, United States Code: *Provided*, That the Copyright Office may not obligate or ex-

pend any funds derived from collections under such sec-1 2 tion, in excess of the amount authorized for obligation or 3 expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided further*, That not more than \$6,343,000 shall be derived from collections 4 5 during fiscal year 2004 under sections 111(d)(2), 119(b)(2), 802(h), and 1005 of such title: Provided fur-6 7 ther, That the total amount available for obligation shall 8 be reduced by the amount by which collections are less 9 than \$29,664,000: Provided further, That not more than 10 \$100,000 of the amount appropriated is available for the maintenance of an "International Copyright Institute" in 11 12 the Copyright Office of the Library of Congress for the 13 purpose of training nationals of developing countries in intellectual property laws and policies: Provided further, 14 15 That not more than \$4,250 may be expended, on the certification of the Librarian of Congress, in connection with 16 17 official representation and reception expenses for activities 18 of the International Copyright Institute and for copyright 19 delegations, visitors, and seminars.

# SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses to carry out the provisions of section 203 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 (2 U.S.C. 166) and to revise and extend the Annotated Constitution of the United States of America,

\$93,590,000: *Provided*, That no part of such amount may 1 2 be used to pay any salary or expense in connection with 3 any publication, or preparation of material therefor (ex-4 cept the Digest of Public General Bills), to be issued by 5 the Library of Congress unless such publication has obtained prior approval of either the Committee on House 6 7 Administration of the House of Representatives or the 8 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate.

# 9 BOOKS FOR THE BLIND AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED 10 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries and expenses to carry out the Act of
March 3, 1931 (chapter 400; 46 Stat. 1487; 2 U.S.C.
135a), \$51,706,000, of which \$14,812,000 shall remain
available until expended.

#### 15 Administrative Provisions

16 SEC. 1201. Of the amounts appropriated to the Li-17 brary of Congress in this Act, not more than \$5,000 may 18 be expended, on the certification of the Librarian of Con-19 gress, in connection with official representation and recep-20 tion expenses for the incentive awards program.

SEC. 1202. (a) For fiscal year 2004, the obligational
authority of the Library of Congress for the activities described in subsection (b) may not exceed \$105,589,000.
(b) The activities referred to in subsection (a) are reimbursable and revolving fund activities that are funded

from sources other than appropriations to the Library in
 appropriations Acts for the legislative branch.

3 (c) During fiscal year 2004, the Librarian of Con-4 gress may temporarily transfer funds appropriated in this Act under the heading "LIBRARY OF CONGRESS-5 SALARIES AND EXPENSES" to the revolving fund for the 6 7 FEDLINK Program and the Federal Research Program 8 established under section 103 of the Library of Congress 9 Fiscal Operations Improvement Act of 2000 (Public Law 10 106–481; 2 U.S.C. 182c): *Provided*, That the total amount of such transfers may not exceed \$1,900,000: Provided 11 *further*, That the appropriate revolving fund account shall 12 13 reimburse the Library for any amounts transferred to it before the period of availability of the Library appropria-14 15 tion expires.

17 Congressional Printing and Binding

### 18 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

For authorized printing and binding for the Congress and the distribution of Congressional information in any format; printing and binding for the Architect of the Capitol; expenses necessary for preparing the semimonthly and session index to the Congressional Record, as authorized by law (section 902 of title 44, United States Code); printing and binding of Government publications author-

1 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE REVOLVING FUND

2 For payment to the Government Printing Office Re-3 volving Fund, \$5,000,000 for working capital. 5 SEC. 1301. (a) At any time during fiscal year 2004 6 or any succeeding fiscal year, the Comptroller General 7 may accept payment from the Securities and Exchange 8 Commission for the performance of any audit of the finan-9 cial statements of the Commission which is conducted by 10 the Comptroller General.

(b) Any payment accepted under the authority of subsection (a) shall be credited to the account established for

and shall be available for obligation and expenditure upon
receipt.

## 21 TITLE II—GENERAL PROVISIONS

SEC. 201. No part of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as may be provided under regulations relating to parking facilities for the House of Representatives issued by the
 Committee on House Administration and for the Senate
 issued by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

4 SEC. 202. No part of the funds appropriated in this
5 Act shall remain available for obligation beyond fiscal year
6 2004 unless expressly so provided in this Act.

7 SEC. 203. Whenever in this Act any office or position 8 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of 9 1929 is appropriated for or the rate of compensation or 10 designation of any office or position appropriated for is different from that specifically established by such Act, 11 12 the rate of compensation and the designation in this Act 13 shall be the permanent law with respect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act for the various items of 14 15 official expenses of Members, officers, and committees of the Senate and House of Representatives, and clerk hire 16 17 for Senators and Members of the House of Representatives shall be the permanent law with respect thereto. 18

19 SEC. 204. The expenditure of any appropriation 20 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-21 ment contract, under section 3109 of title 5, United States 22 Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such ex-23 penditures are a matter of public record and available for 24 public inspection, except where otherwise provided under existing law, or under existing Executive order issued
 under existing law.

3 SEC. 205. Such sums as may be necessary are appro-4 priated to the account described in subsection (a) of sec-5 tion 415 of the Congressional Accountability Act to pay 6 awards and settlements as authorized under such sub-7 section.

8 SEC. 206. Amounts available for administrative ex-9 penses of any legislative branch entity which participates 10 in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council (LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall 11 be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC 12 costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total 13 LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legisla-14 15 tive branch entities (in such allocations among the entities as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$2,000. 16 17 SEC. 207. The Architect of the Capitol, in consulta-

17 SEC. 207. The Architect of the Capitol, in consulta18 tion with the District of Columbia, is authorized to main19 tain and improve the landscape features, excluding streets
20 and sidewalks, in the irregular shaped grassy areas bound21 ed by Washington Avenue, SW on the northeast, Second
22 Street SW on the west, Square 582 on the south, and the
23 beginning of the I-395 tunnel on the southeast.

SEC. 208. None of the funds made available in thisAct may be transferred to any department, agency, or in-

strumentality of the United States Government, except
 pursuant to a transfer made by, or transfer authority pro vided in, this Act or any other appropriation Act.

4 SEC. 209. During fiscal year 2004 and any suc-5 ceeding fiscal year, any entity in the legislative branch 6 which is a member of the Federal Accounting Standards 7 Advisory Board may use funds made available to the enti-8 ty for the fiscal year to finance an appropriate share of 9 the costs of the Board for the year.

10 This Act may be cited as the "Legislative Branch Ap-11 propriations Act, 2004".
