12 For necessary expenses of the Department of Agri-13 culture, to comply with the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (42 U.S.C. 14 15 9601 et seq.) and the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (42 U.S.C. 6901 et seq.), \$15,713,000, to remain 16 17 available until expended: *Provided*, That appropriations 18 and funds available herein to the Department for Haz-19 ardous Materials Management may be transferred to any 20 agency of the Department for its use in meeting all re-21 quirements pursuant to the above Acts on Federal and 22 non-Federal lands.

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3 For Departmental Administration, \$38,592,000, to 4 provide for necessary expenses for management support 5 services to offices of the Department and for general administration, security, repairs and alterations, and other 6 7 miscellaneous supplies and expenses not otherwise pro-8 vided for and necessary for the practical and efficient work 9 of the Department: *Provided*, That this appropriation shall 10 be reimbursed from applicable appropriations in this Act for travel expenses incident to the holding of hearings as 11 12 required by 5 U.S.C. 551–558.

16 For necessary salaries and expenses of the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Congressional Relations to 17 18 carry out the programs funded by this Act, including programs involving intergovernmental affairs and liaison 19 within the executive branch, \$3,796,000: Provided, That 20 21 these funds may be transferred to agencies of the Depart-22 ment of Agriculture funded by this Act to maintain per-23 sonnel at the agency level: *Provided further*, That no funds 24 made available by this appropriation may be obligated 25 after 30 days from the date of enactment of this Act, unless the Secretary has notified the Committees on Appro priations of both Houses of Congress on the allocation of
 these funds by USDA agency: *Provided further*, That no
 other funds appropriated to the Department by this Act
 shall be available to the Department for support of activi ties of congressional relations.

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#### OFFICE OF COMMUNICATIONS

8 For necessary expenses to carry out services relating 9 to the coordination of programs involving public affairs, 10 for the dissemination of agricultural information, and the 11 coordination of information, work, and programs author-12 ized by Congress in the Department, \$9,245,000: *Pro-*13 *vided*, That not to exceed \$2,000,000 may be used for 14 farmers' bulletins.

#### 15 Office of the Inspector General

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Inspector 16 17 General, including employment pursuant to the Inspector 18 General Act of 1978, \$77,314,000, including such sums 19 as may be necessary for contracting and other arrange-20 ments with public agencies and private persons pursuant 21 to section 6(a)(9) of the Inspector General Act of 1978, 22 and including not to exceed \$125,000 for certain confiden-23 tial operational expenses as well as the payment of inform-24 ants, to be expended under the direction of the Inspector General pursuant to Public Law 95–452 and section 1337
 of Public Law 97–98.

For necessary expenses of the National Agricultural Statistics Service in conducting statistical reporting and service work, including crop and livestock estimates, statistical coordination and improvements, marketing suryeys, and the Census of Agriculture, as authorized by 7 U.S.C. 1621–1627 and 2204g, and other laws,
 \$129,800,000, of which up to \$25,279,000 shall be avail able until expended for the Census of Agriculture.

# 4 AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH SERVICE 5 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

6 For necessary expenses to enable the Agricultural Re-7 search Service to perform agricultural research and dem-8 onstration relating to production, utilization, marketing, 9 and distribution (not otherwise provided for); home eco-10 nomics or nutrition and consumer use including the acquisition, preservation, and dissemination of agricultural in-11 12 formation; and for acquisition of lands by donation, ex-13 change, or purchase at a nominal cost not to exceed \$100, and for land exchanges where the lands exchanged shall 14 15 be of equal value or shall be equalized by a payment of money to the grantor which shall not exceed 25 percent 16 17 of the total value of the land or interests transferred out 18 of Federal ownership, \$1,014,000,000: Provided, That ap-19 propriations hereunder shall be available for the operation 20 and maintenance of aircraft and the purchase of not to 21 exceed one for replacement only: *Provided further*, That 22 appropriations hereunder shall be available pursuant to 7 23 U.S.C. 2250 for the construction, alteration, and repair 24 of buildings and improvements, but unless otherwise pro-25 vided, the cost of constructing any one building shall not

exceed \$375,000, except for headhouses or greenhouses 1 2 which shall each be limited to \$1,200,000, and except for 3 10 buildings to be constructed or improved at a cost not 4 to exceed \$750,000 each, and the cost of altering any one 5 building during the fiscal year shall not exceed 10 percent of the current replacement value of the building or 6 7 \$375,000, whichever is greater: *Provided further*, That the 8 limitations on alterations contained in this Act shall not 9 apply to modernization or replacement of existing facilities 10 at Beltsville, Maryland: Provided further, That appropriations hereunder shall be available for granting easements 11 12 at the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center: *Provided further*, That the foregoing limitations shall not apply to 13 replacement of buildings needed to carry out the Act of 14 15 April 24, 1948 (21 U.S.C. 113a): Provided further, That funds may be received from any State, other political sub-16 17 division, organization, or individual for the purpose of establishing or operating any research facility or research 18 project of the Agricultural Research Service, as authorized 19 20 by law.

None of the funds appropriated under this heading
shall be available to carry out research related to the production, processing, or marketing of tobacco or tobacco
products.

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#### BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

For acquisition of land, construction, repair, improvement, extension, alteration, and purchase of fixed equipment or facilities as necessary to carry out the agricultural research programs of the Department of Agriculture, where not otherwise provided, \$35,900,000, to remain available until expended.

# 8 COOPERATIVE STATE RESEARCH, EDUCATION, AND 9 EXTENSION SERVICE

10 RESEARCH AND EDUCATION ACTIVITIES

11 For payments to agricultural experiment stations, for 12 cooperative forestry and other research, for facilities, and 13 for other expenses, \$594,772,000, as follows: to carry out the provisions of the Hatch Act of 1887 (7 U.S.C. 361a– 14 15 i), \$180,148,000; for grants for cooperative forestry research (16 U.S.C. 582a through a-7), \$21,884,000; for 16 17 payments to the 1890 land-grant colleges, including 18 Tuskegee University and West Virginia State College (7) U.S.C. 3222), \$36,000,000, of which \$1,507,496 shall be 19 20 made available only for the purpose of ensuring that each 21 institution shall receive no less than \$1,000,000; for spe-22 cial grants for agricultural research (7 U.S.C. 450i(c)), 23 \$101,241,000; for special grants for agricultural research 24 on improved pest control (7 U.S.C. 450i(c)), \$15,194,000; for competitive research grants (7 U.S.C. 450i(b)), 25

\$149,248,000; for the support of animal health and dis-1 ease programs (7 U.S.C. 3195), \$5,065,000; for supple-2 3 mental and alternative crops and products (7 U.S.C. 4 3319d), \$1,188,000; for the 1994 research grants pro-5 gram for 1994 institutions pursuant to section 536 of Public Law 103–382 (7 U.S.C. 301 note), \$998,000, to 6 7 remain available until expended; for rangeland research 8 grants (7 U.S.C. 3333), \$1,000,000; for higher education 9 graduate fellowship grants (7 U.S.C. 3152(b)(6)),10 \$3,222,000, to remain available until expended (7 U.S.C. 2209b); for higher education challenge grants (7 U.S.C. 11 12 3152(b)(1), \$4,888,000; for a higher education multicul-13 tural scholars program (7 U.S.C. 3152(b)(5)), \$992,000, 14 to remain available until expended; for an education 15 grants program for Hispanic-serving Institutions (7) U.S.C. 3241), \$4,073,000; for noncompetitive grants for 16 the purpose of carrying out all provisions of 7 U.S.C. 3242 17 18 (section 759 of Public Law 106–78) to individual eligible 19 institutions or consortia of eligible institutions in Alaska 20and in Hawaii, with funds awarded equally to each of the 21 States of Alaska and Hawaii, \$2,997,000; for a secondary 22 agriculture education program and 2-year post-secondary 23 education (7 U.S.C. 3152(j)), \$994,000; for aquaculture 24 grants (7 U.S.C. 3322), \$3,996,000; for sustainable agri-U.S.C. 25 culture research and education (75811).

\$13,661,000; for a program of capacity building grants 1 2 (7 U.S.C. 3152(b)(4)) to colleges eligible to receive funds 3 under the Act of August 30, 1890 (7 U.S.C. 321–326 and 4 328), including Tuskegee University and West Virginia 5 State College, \$9,479,000, to remain available until expended (7 U.S.C. 2209b); for payments to the 1994 Insti-6 7 tutions pursuant to section 534(a)(1) of Public Law 103– 8 382, \$1,689,000; and for necessary expenses of Research 9 and Education Activities, \$36,815,000.

10 None of the funds appropriated under this heading 11 shall be available to carry out research related to the pro-12 duction, processing, or marketing of tobacco or tobacco 13 products: *Provided*, That this paragraph shall not apply 14 to research on the medical, biotechnological, food, and in-15 dustrial uses of tobacco.

1 ANIMAL AND PLANT HEALTH INSPECTION SERVICE

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

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(INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary 4 5 to prevent, control, and eradicate pests and plant and animal diseases; to carry out inspection, quarantine, and reg-6 7 ulatory activities; and to protect the environment, as authorized by law, \$725,502,000, of which \$4,139,000 shall 8 9 be available for the control of outbreaks of insects, plant 10 diseases, animal diseases and for control of pest animals and birds to the extent necessary to meet emergency con-11 12 ditions; of which \$51,000,000 shall be used for the boll 13 weevil eradication program for cost share purposes or for debt retirement for active eradication zones: *Provided*, 14 15 That no funds shall be used to formulate or administer 16 a brucellosis eradication program for the current fiscal 17 year that does not require minimum matching by the 18 States of at least 40 percent: *Provided further*, That this 19 appropriation shall be available for the operation and 20maintenance of aircraft and the purchase of not to exceed 21 four, of which two shall be for replacement only: *Provided* 22 *further*, That, in addition, in emergencies which threaten any segment of the agricultural production industry of this 23 country, the Secretary may transfer from other appropria-24 tions or funds available to the agencies or corporations 25 of the Department such sums as may be deemed nec-26 HR 2673 RH

essary, to be available only in such emergencies for the 1 2 arrest and eradication of contagious or infectious disease 3 or pests of animals, poultry, or plants, and for expenses 4 in accordance with sections 10411 and 10417 of the Ani-5 mal Health Protection Act (7 U.S.C. 8310 and 8316) and sections 431 and 442 of the Plant Protection Act (7 6 7 U.S.C. 7751 and 7772), and any unexpended balances of 8 funds transferred for such emergency purposes in the pre-9 ceding fiscal year shall be merged with such transferred 10 amounts: *Provided further*, That appropriations hereunder shall be available pursuant to law (7 U.S.C. 2250) for the 11 12 repair and alteration of leased buildings and improve-13 ments, but unless otherwise provided the cost of altering any one building during the fiscal year shall not exceed 14 15 10 percent of the current replacement value of the build-16 ing.

17 In fiscal year 2004, the agency is authorized to collect 18 fees to cover the total costs of providing technical assist-19 ance, goods, or services requested by States, other political 20subdivisions, domestic and international organizations, 21 foreign governments, or individuals, provided that such 22 fees are structured such that any entity's liability for such 23 fees is reasonably based on the technical assistance, goods, 24 or services provided to the entity by the agency, and such 25 fees shall be credited to this account, to remain available until expended, without further appropriation, for pro viding such assistance, goods, or services.

3 BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

For plans, construction, repair, preventive maintenance, environmental support, improvement, extension, alteration, and purchase of fixed equipment or facilities, as
authorized by 7 U.S.C. 2250, and acquisition of land as
authorized by 7 U.S.C. 428a, \$4,996,000, to remain available until expended.

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#### MARKETING SERVICES

AGRICULTURAL MARKETING SERVICE

12 For necessary expenses to carry out services related 13 to consumer protection, agricultural marketing and dis-14 tribution, transportation, and regulatory programs, as au-15 thorized by law, and for administration and coordination 16 of payments to States, \$75,953,000, including funds for 17 the wholesale market development program for the design 18 and development of wholesale and farmer market facilities 19 for the major metropolitan areas of the country: *Provided*, 20That this appropriation shall be available pursuant to law 21 (7 U.S.C. 2250) for the alteration and repair of buildings 22 and improvements, but the cost of altering any one build-23 ing during the fiscal year shall not exceed 10 percent of the current replacement value of the building. 24

Fees may be collected for the cost of standardization
 activities, as established by regulation pursuant to law (31
 U.S.C. 9701).

#### 4 LIMITATION ON ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES

5 Not to exceed \$62,577,000 (from fees collected) shall 6 be obligated during the current fiscal year for administra-7 tive expenses: *Provided*, That if crop size is understated 8 and/or other uncontrollable events occur, the agency may 9 exceed this limitation by up to 10 percent with notification 10 to the Committees on Appropriations of both Houses of 11 Congress.

## 12 FUNDS FOR STRENGTHENING MARKETS, INCOME, AND 13 SUPPLY (SECTION 32)

14 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

15 Funds available under section 32 of the Act of Au-16 gust 24, 1935 (7 U.S.C. 612c), shall be used only for com-17 modity program expenses as authorized therein, and other 18 related operating expenses, except for: (1) transfers to the Department of Commerce as authorized by the Fish and 19 20Wildlife Act of August 8, 1956; (2) transfers otherwise provided in this Act; and (3) not more than \$15,392,000 21 22 for formulation and administration of marketing agree-23 ments and orders pursuant to the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act of 1937 and the Agricultural Act of 1961. 24

PAYMENTS TO STATES AND POSSESSIONS

For payments to departments of agriculture, bureaus
and departments of markets, and similar agencies for
marketing activities under section 204(b) of the Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946 (7 U.S.C. 1623(b)),
\$1,347,000.

None of the funds in this Act shall be avail-4 able to pay indirect costs charged against competitive agri-5 cultural research, education, or extension grant awards 6 issued by the Cooperative State Research, Education, and 7 Extension Service that exceed 20 percent of total Federal 8 funds provided under each award: *Provided*, That notwith-9 standing section 1462 of the National Agricultural Re-10 search, Extension, and Teaching Policy Act of 1977 (7 U.S.C. 3310), funds provided by this Act for grants 11 12 awarded competitively by the Cooperative State Research, 13 Education, and Extension Service shall be available to pay 14 full allowable indirect costs for each grant awarded under 15 section 9 of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 638).

SEC. 711. Notwithstanding any other provision of
this Act, all loan levels provided in this Act shall be considered estimates, not limitations.

19 SEC. 712. Appropriations to the Department of Agri-20 culture for the cost of direct and guaranteed loans made 21 available in the current fiscal year shall remain available 22 until expended to cover obligations made in the current 23 fiscal year for the following accounts: the Rural Develop-24 ment Loan Fund program account, the Rural Telephone 25 Bank program account, the Rural Electrification and Telecommunication Loans program account, the Rural
 Housing Insurance Fund program account, and the Rural
 Economic Development Loans program account.

4 SEC. 713. funds appropriated or otherwise made available by this

 on Appropriations of both Houses of Congress.

any accounts in the Treasury of the United States derived 1 by the collection of fees available to the agencies funded 2 by this Act, shall be available for obligation or expenditure 3 4 for activities, programs, or projects through a reprogram-5 ming of funds in excess of \$500,000 or 10 percent, whichever is less, that: (1) augments existing programs, 6 7 projects, or activities; (2) reduces by 10 percent funding 8 for any existing program, project, or activity, or numbers 9 of personnel by 10 percent as approved by Congress; or 10 (3) results from any general savings from a reduction in personnel which would result in a change in existing pro-11 12 grams, activities, or projects as approved by Congress; unless the Committees on Appropriations of both Houses of 13 Congress are notified 15 days in advance of such re-14 15 programming of funds.

SEC. 722. None of the funds made available by this
Act or any other Act may be used to close or relocate a
state Rural Development office unless or until cost effec-

tiveness and enhancement of program delivery have been
 determined.

3 SEC. 723. In addition to amounts otherwise appro-4 priated or made available by this Act, \$3,000,000 is ap-5 propriated for the purpose of providing Bill Emerson and 6 Mickey Leland Hunger Fellowships, as authorized by sec-7 tion 4404 of Public Law 107–171 (2 U.S.C. 1161).

8 SEC. 724. Notwithstanding section 412 of the Agri-9 cultural Trade Development and Assistance Act of 1954 10 (7 U.S.C. 1736f), any balances available to carry out title 11 III of such Act as of the date of enactment of this Act, 12 and any recoveries and reimbursements that become avail-13 able to carry out title III of such Act, may be used to 14 carry out title II of such Act.

15 SEC. 725. Section 375(e)(6)(B) of the Consolidated
16 Farm and Rural Development Act (7 U.S.C.
17 2008j(e)(6)(B)) is amended by striking "\$26,499,000"
18 and inserting "\$26,998,000".

SEC. 726. Notwithstanding any other provision of
law, the Natural Resources Conservation Service may provide financial and technical assistance through the Watershed and Flood Prevention Operations program for the
Ditch 26 project in Arkansas.

24 SEC. 727. Notwithstanding any other provision of 25 law, the Secretary shall consider the County of Lawrence,

Ohio; the City of Havelock, North Carolina; the City of 1 2 Portsmouth, Ohio; the City of Atascadero, California; the 3 City of Binghamton, New York; the Town of Vestal, New 4 York; the City of Ithaca, New York; the City of Casa 5 Grande, Arizona; and the City of Clarksdale, Mississippi, as meeting the eligibility requirements for loans and 6 7 grants programs in the Rural Development mission area. 8 SEC. 728.  of 1985 (16 U.S.C. 3839aa et seq.) in excess of
 \$975,000,000.

6 SEC. 739. The Administrator of the Agricultural Re-7 search Service may make available by outlease agreements 8 with other Federal agencies or non-Federal public or pri-9 vate entities any unused or underused portion or interest 10 of or interest in any agency real and related personal prop-11 erty, and may retain and use the proceeds of such agree-12 ments in carrying out the programs of the agency. Prop-13 erty proposed for outlease must not be property otherwise required to be reported excess under the Federal Property 14 15 and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended. Outleases shall be made competitively, and be based on 16 17 the fair market value of the property.

8 SEC. 743. None of the funds appropriated or other-9 wise made available by this Act shall be used for the imple-10 mentation of Country of Origin Labeling for meat or meat 11 products.

SEC. 744. Any unobligated balances in the Alternative Agricultural Research and Commercialization Revolving Fund are hereby rescinded.

15 SEC. 745. None of the funds appropriated or other16 wise made available by this Act shall be used to carry out
17 a Conservation Security Program authorized in section
18 1241(a)(3) of the Food Security Act of 1985 (16 U.S.C.
19 3841(a)(3)).

SEC. 746. Section 726 of Division A of Public Law
108–7 is amended by striking ", as authorized by section
4404 of Public Law 107–171 (2 U.S.C. 1161)" and inserting "through the Congressional Hunger Center".
