## A BILL

To amend title VI of the Higher Education Act of 1965 to enhance international education programs.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; REFERENCES; TABLE OF CON-2TENTS.

3 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the 4 "International Studies in Higher Education Act of 2003". 5 (b) REFERENCES.—Except as otherwise expressly provided, whenever in this Act an amendment or repeal is ex-6 7 pressed in terms of an amendment to, or repeal of, a section 8 or other provision, the reference shall be considered to be 9 made to a section or other provision of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001 et seq.). 10

16	for higher education.
17	"(2) PURPOSE.—The purpose of the Inter-
18	national Advisory Board is—
19	"(A) to provide expertise in the area of na-
20	tional needs for proficiency in world regions, for-
21	eign languages, and international affairs;
22	``(B) to make recommendations that will
23	promote the excellence of international education
24	programs and result in the growth and develop-
25	ment of such programs at the postsecondary edu-

cation level that will reflect diverse perspectives and represent the full range of views on world regions, foreign language, and international affairs; and

5 "(C) to advise the Secretary and the Con-6 gress with respect to needs for expertise in gov-7 ernment, the private sector, and education in 8 order to enhance America's understanding of, 9 and engagement in, the world.

10 "(b) INDEPENDENCE OF INTERNATIONAL ADVISORY BOARD.—In the exercise of its functions, powers, and du-11 12 ties, the International Advisory Board shall be independent 13 of the Secretary and the other offices and officers of the Department. Except as provided in this subsection and sub-14 15 section (f), the recommendations of the International Advisory Board shall not be subject to review or approval by 16 any officer of the Federal Government. Nothing in this title 17 shall be construed to authorize the International Advisory 18 Board to mandate, direct, or control an institution of high-19 er education's specific instructional content, curriculum, or 20 21 program of instruction. The Board is authorized to study, 22 monitor, apprise, and evaluate a sample of activities sup-23 ported under this title in order to provide recommendations 24 to the Secretary and the Congress for the improvement of 25 programs under the title and to ensure programs meet the

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1	purposes of the title. The recommendations of the Board
2	may address any area in need of improvement, except that
3	any recommendation of specific legislation to Congress shall
4	be made only if the President deems it necessary and expe-
5	dient.
6	"(c) Membership.—
7	"(1) APPOINTMENT.—The International Advi-
8	sory Board shall have 7 members of whom—
9	(A) 3 members shall be appointed by the
10	Secretary;
11	(B) 2 members shall be appointed by the
12	Speaker of the House of Representatives, upon
13	the recommendation of the Majority Leader and
14	the Minority Leader; and
15	(C) 2 members shall be appointed by the
16	President pro tempore of the Senate, upon the
17	recommendation of the Majority Leader and the
18	Minority Leader.
19	"(2) Representation.—Two of the members
20	appointed by the Secretary under paragraph $(1)(A)$
21	shall be appointed to represent Federal agencies that
22	have national security responsibilities, after consulta-
23	tion with the heads of such agencies. The members of
24	the International Advisory Board shall also include
25	(but not be limited to) representatives of States, insti-

1	tutions of higher education, cultural organizations,
2	educational organizations, local education agencies,
3	students, and private citizens with expertise in inter-
4	national concerns.
5	"(3) QUALIFICATION.—Members of the Inter-
6	national Advisory Board shall be individuals who
7	have technical qualifications, professional standing,
8	experience working in international affairs or foreign

9 service occupations, or demonstrated knowledge in the 10 fields of higher education and international edu-11 cation, including foreign languages, world regions, or 12 international affairs.

13 "(d) Functions of the Committee.—

14 "(1) IN GENERAL.—The International Advisory 15 Board shall provide recommendations in accordance 16 with subsection (b) regarding improvement of pro-17 grams under this title to the Secretary and the Con-18 gress for their review. The Board may—

19 "(A) review and comment upon the regula-20 tions for grants under this title;

21 "(B) monitor, apprise, and evaluate a sam-22 ple of activities supported under this title based 23 on the purposes and objectives of this title in 24 order to provide recommendations for improve-25 ment of the programs under this title;

1	"(C) make recommendations that will assist
2	the Secretary and the Congress to improve the
3	programs under this title to better reflect the na-
4	tional needs related to the homeland security,
5	international education, and international af-
6	fairs, including an assessment of the national
7	needs and the training provided by the institu-
8	tions of higher education that receive a grant
9	under this title for expert and non-expert level
10	foreign language training;
11	``(D) make recommendations to the Sec-
12	retary and the Congress regarding such studies,
13	surveys, and analyses of international education
14	that will provide feedback about the programs
15	under this title and assure that their relative au-
16	thorized activities reflect diverse perspectives and
17	represent the full range of views on world re-
18	gions, foreign languages, and international af-
19	fairs;
20	((E) make recommendations that will
21	strengthen the partnerships between local edu-
22	cational agencies, public and private elementary
23	and secondary education schools, and grant re-
24	cipients under this title to ensure that the re-
25	search and knowledge about world regions, for-

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1 eign languages, and international affairs is 2 widely disseminated to local educational agen-3 cies: (F) make recommendations on how insti-4 tutions of higher education that receive a grant 5 6 under this title can encourage students to serve 7 the nation and meet national needs in an inter-8 national affairs, international business, foreign 9 language, or national security capacity; 10 (G) make recommendations on how linkages between institutions of higher education and 12 public and private organizations that are in-13 volved in international education. language 14 training, and international research capacities 15 to fulfill manpower and information needs of United States businesses: and 16

17 "(H) make recommendations to the Sec-18 retary and the Congress about opportunities for 19 underrepresented populations in the areas of 20 international relations, international affairs, 21 and international economics, in order to effec-22 tively carry out the activities of the Institute 23 under part C.

"(2) HEARINGS.—The International Advisory 24 25 Board shall provide for public hearing and comment

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regarding the matter contained in the recommenda tions described in paragraph (1), prior to the submis sion of those recommendations to Secretary and the
 Congress.

5 *"(e) OPERATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE.*—

6 "(1) TERMS.—Each member of the International 7 Advisory Board shall be appointed for a term of 3 8 years, except that, of the members first appointed (A) 9 4 shall be appointed for a term of 3 years, and (B) 10 3 shall be appointed for a term of 4 years, as des-11 ignated at the time of appointment by the Secretary. 12 A member of the International Advisory Board may 13 be reappointed to successive terms on the Inter-14 national Advisory Board.

15 "(2) VACANCIES.—Any member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of the term of a predecessor shall be appointed only for the remainder of such term. A member of the International Advisory Board shall, upon the Secretary's request, continue to serve after the expiration of a term until a successor has been appointed.

22 "(3) NO GOVERNMENTAL MEMBERS.—Except for
23 the members appointed by the Secretary under sub24 section (c)(1)(A), no officers or full-time employees of

1	the Federal Government shall serve as members of the
2	International Advisory Board.
3	"(4) MEETINGS.—The International Advisory
4	Board shall meet not less than once each year. The
5	International Advisory Board shall hold additional
6	meetings at the call of the Chair or upon the written
7	request of not less than 3 voting members of the Inter-
8	national Advisory Board.
9	"(5) QUORUM.—A majority of the voting mem-
10	bers of the Board serving at the time of a meeting
11	shall constitute a quorum.
12	"(6) Chair.—The International Advisory Board
13	shall elect a Chairman or Chairwoman from among
14	the members of the International Advisory Board.
15	"(f) Submission to Department for Comment.—
16	The International Advisory Board shall submit its proposed
17	recommendations to the Secretary of Education for com-
18	ment for a period not to exceed 30 days in each instance.
19	"(g) Personnel and Resources.—
20	"(1) Compensation and expense.—Members of

App. I) or any other statute or regulation, the 16 17 International Advisory Committee shall be authorized 18 through September 30, 2009. 19 "(i) FUNDS.—The Secretary shall use not more than one-half of the funds available to the Secretary under sec-20 21 tion 632 to carry out this section.".

3 "(a) STUDY.—The Secretary of Education, in con-4 sultation with the International Advisory Board, shall con-5 duct a study to identify foreign language heritage commu-6 nities, particularly such communities that include speakers 7 of languages that are critical to the national security of 8 the United States.

9 "(b) FOREIGN LANGUAGE HERITAGE COMMUNITY.— 10 For purposes of this section, the term 'foreign language her-11 itage community' means a community of residents or citi-12 zens of the United States who are native speakers of, or 13 who have partial fluency in, a foreign language.

14 "(c) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after the date
15 of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Education
16 shall submit a report to the Congress on the results of the
17 study conducted under this section.".
