## A BILL

Making emergency supplemental appropriations for defense and for the reconstruction of Iraq and Afghanistan for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2004, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*  
3       That the following sums are appropriated, out of any  
4       money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the

1 fiscal year ending September 30, 2004, and for other pur-

5 DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE—MILITARY

6 MILITARY PERSONNEL

7 MILITARY PERSONNEL, ARMY

8 For an additional amount for “Military Personnel,  
9 Army”, \$12,188,870,000: *Provided*, That the entire  
10 amount is designated by the Congress as an emergency  
11 requirement pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95  
12 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution on the budget  
13 for fiscal year 2004.

14 MILITARY PERSONNEL, NAVY

15 For an additional amount for “Military Personnel,  
16 Navy”, \$816,100,000: *Provided*, That the entire amount  
17 is designated by the Congress as an emergency require-  
18 ment pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th  
19 Congress), the concurrent resolution on the budget for fis-  
20 cal year 2004.

21 MILITARY PERSONNEL, MARINE CORPS

22 For an additional amount for “Military Personnel,  
23 Marine Corps”, \$753,190,000: *Provided*, That the entire  
24 amount is designated by the Congress as an emergency  
25 requirement pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95

4       For an additional amount for “Military Personnel,

8 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution on the budget  
9 for fiscal year 2004.

11                   OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, ARMY

12       For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-  
13 tenance, Army”, \$24,355,664,000: *Provided*, That the en-  
14 tire amount is designated by the Congress as an emer-  
15 gency requirement pursuant to section 502 of H. Con.  
16 Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution on  
17 the budget for fiscal year 2004.

18                   OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, NAVY

19                   (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

20       For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-  
21 tenance, Navy”, \$1,934,058,000, of which up to  
22 \$80,000,000 may be transferred to the Department of  
23 Homeland Security for Coast Guard Operations: *Provided*,  
24 That the entire amount is designated by the Congress as  
25 an emergency requirement pursuant to section 502 of H.

1 Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution  
2 on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

3 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, MARINE CORPS

4 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-  
5 tenance, Marine Corps”, \$1,198,981,000: *Provided*, That  
6 the entire amount is designated by the Congress as an  
7 emergency requirement pursuant to section 502 of H.  
8 Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution  
9 on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

10 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, AIR FORCE

11 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-  
12 tenance, Air Force”, \$5,598,368,000: *Provided*, That the  
13 entire amount is designated by the Congress as an emer-  
14 gency requirement pursuant to section 502 of H. Con.  
15 Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution on  
16 the budget for fiscal year 2004.

17 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, DEFENSE-WIDE

18 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-  
19 tenance, Defense-Wide”, \$4,485,452,000, of which—

20 (1) not to exceed \$15,000,000 may be used for  
21 the CINC Initiative Fund account, to be used pri-  
22 marily in Iraq and Afghanistan; and

23 (2) not to exceed \$1,300,000,000, to remain  
24 available until expended, may be used, notwith-  
25 standing any other provision of law, for payments to

1 reimburse Pakistan, Jordan, and other key cooper-  
2 ating nations, for logistical and military support pro-  
3 vided, or to be provided, to United States military  
4 operations in connection with military action in Iraq  
5 and the global war on terrorism: *Provided*, That  
6 such payments may be made in such amounts as the  
7 Secretary of Defense, with the concurrence of the  
8 Secretary of State, and in consultation with the Di-  
9 rector of the Office of Management and Budget,  
10 may determine, in his discretion, based on docu-  
11 mentation determined by the Secretary of Defense to  
12 adequately account for the support provided, and  
13 such determination is final and conclusive upon the  
14 accounting officers of the United States, and 15  
15 days following notification to the appropriate con-  
16 gressional committees: *Provided further*, That the  
17 Secretary of Defense shall provide quarterly reports  
18 to the Committees on Appropriations on the use of  
19 these funds: *Provided further*, That the entire  
20 amount is designated by the Congress as an emer-  
21 gency requirement pursuant to section 502 of H.  
22 Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concurrent reso-  
23 lution on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

6 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

7 For “Iraq Freedom Fund”, \$1,988,600,000, to re-  
8 main available for transfer until September 30, 2005, for  
9 the purposes authorized under this heading in Public Law  
10 108–11: *Provided*, That the Secretary of Defense may  
11 transfer the funds provided herein to appropriations for  
12 military personnel; operation and maintenance; Overseas  
13 Humanitarian, Disaster, and Civic Aid; procurement; mili-  
14 tary construction; the Defense Health Program; and work-  
15 ing capital funds: *Provided further*, That funds transferred  
16 shall be merged with and be available for the same pur-  
17 poses and for the same time period as the appropriation  
18 or fund to which transferred: *Provided further*, That this  
19 transfer authority is in addition to any other transfer au-  
20 thority available to the Department of Defense: *Provided*  
21 *further*, That upon a determination that all or part of the  
22 funds transferred from this appropriation are not nec-  
23 essary for the purposes provided herein, such amounts  
24 may be transferred back to this appropriation: *Provided*  
25 *further*, That the Secretary of Defense shall, not fewer

1 than 5 days prior to making transfers from this appropria-  
2 tion, notify the congressional defense committees of any  
3 such transfer: *Provided further*, That the Secretary shall  
4 submit a report no later than 30 days after the end of  
5 each fiscal quarter to the congressional defense commit-  
6 tees summarizing the details of the transfer of funds from  
7 this appropriation: *Provided further*, That the entire  
8 amount is designated by the Congress as an emergency  
9 requirement pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95  
10 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution on the budget  
11 for fiscal year 2004.

23 For an additional amount for “Other Procurement,  
24 Army”, \$1,250,287,000, to remain available until Sep-  
25 tember 30, 2006: *Provided*, That the entire amount is des-

1 ignated by the Congress as an emergency requirement  
2 pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Con-  
3 gress), the concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal  
4 year 2004.

5 AIRCRAFT PROCUREMENT, NAVY

6 For an additional amount for “Aircraft Procurement,  
7 Navy”, \$158,600,000, to remain available until September  
8 30, 2006: *Provided*, That the entire amount is designated  
9 by the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant  
10 to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the  
11 concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

12 OTHER PROCUREMENT, NAVY

13 For an additional amount for “Other Procurement,  
14 Navy”, \$76,357,000, to remain available until September  
15 30, 2006: *Provided*, That the entire amount is designated  
16 by the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant  
17 to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the  
18 concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

19 PROCUREMENT, MARINE CORPS

20 For an additional amount for “Procurement, Marine  
21 Corps”, \$123,397,000, to remain available until Sep-  
22 tember 30, 2006: *Provided*, That the entire amount is des-  
23 ignated by the Congress as an emergency requirement  
24 pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Con-

1 gress), the concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal  
2 year 2004.

3 AIRCRAFT PROCUREMENT, AIR FORCE

4 For an additional amount for “Aircraft Procurement,  
5 Air Force”, \$53,972,000, to remain available until Sep-  
6 tember 30, 2006: *Provided*, That the entire amount is des-  
7 ignated by the Congress as an emergency requirement  
8 pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Con-  
9 gress), the concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal  
10 year 2004.

11 MISSILE PROCUREMENT, AIR FORCE

12 For an additional amount for “Missile Procurement,  
13 Air Force”, \$20,450,000, to remain available until Sep-  
14 tember 30, 2006: *Provided*, That the entire amount is des-  
15 ignated by the Congress as an emergency requirement  
16 pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Con-  
17 gress), the concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal  
18 year 2004.

19 OTHER PROCUREMENT, AIR FORCE

20 For an additional amount for “Other Procurement,  
21 Air Force”, \$3,418,006,000, to remain available until  
22 September 30, 2006: *Provided*, That the entire amount is  
23 designated by the Congress as an emergency requirement  
24 pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Con-



1 remain available until September 30, 2005: *Provided*,  
2 That the entire amount is designated by the Congress as  
3 an emergency requirement pursuant to section 502 of H.

6 RESEARCH, DEVELOPMENT, TEST AND EVALUATION,  
7 DEFENSE-WIDE

8 For an additional amount for “Research, Develop-  
9 ment, Test and Evaluation, Defense-Wide”,  
10 \$195,817,000, to remain available until September 30,  
11 2005: *Provided*, That the entire amount is designated by  
12 the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to  
13 section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the con-  
14 current resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

15 REVOLVING AND MANAGEMENT FUNDS

16 DEFENSE WORKING CAPITAL FUNDS

17 For an additional amount for “Defense Working  
18 Capital Funds”, \$600,000,000: *Provided*, That the entire  
19 amount is designated by the Congress as an emergency  
20 requirement pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95  
21 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution on the budget  
22 for fiscal year 2004.

23 NATIONAL DEFENSE SEALIFT FUND

24 For an additional amount for “National Defense Sea-  
25 lift Fund”, \$24,000,000, to remain available until ex-

1 pending: *Provided*, That the entire amount is designated  
2 by the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant  
3 to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the  
4 concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

5 OTHER DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE PROGRAMS

6 DEFENSE HEALTH PROGRAM

7 For an additional amount for “Defense Health Pro-  
8 gram”, \$658,380,000 for Operation and maintenance:  
9 *Provided*, That the entire amount is designated by the  
10 Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-  
11 tion 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concur-  
12 rent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

13 DRUG INTERDICTION AND COUNTER-DRUG ACTIVITIES,

14 DEFENSE

15 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

16 For an additional amount for “Drug Interdiction and  
17 Counter-Drug Activities, Defense”, \$73,000,000: *Pro-*  
18 *vided*, That these funds may be used for such activities  
19 related to Afghanistan: *Provided further*, That the Sec-  
20 retary of Defense may transfer the funds provided herein  
21 only to appropriations for military personnel; operation  
22 and maintenance; procurement; and research, develop-  
23 ment, test and evaluation: *Provided further*, That the  
24 funds transferred shall be merged with and be available  
25 for the same purposes and for the same time period, as

1 the appropriation to which transferred: *Provided further*,  
2 That the transfer authority provided in this paragraph is  
3 in addition to any other transfer authority available to the  
4 Department of Defense: *Provided further*, That the entire  
5 amount is designated by the Congress as an emergency  
6 requirement pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95  
7 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution on the budget  
8 for fiscal year 2004.

#### 9 RELATED AGENCIES

##### 10 INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY MANAGEMENT ACCOUNT

11 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

12 For an additional amount for “Intelligence Commu-  
13 nity Management Account”, \$21,500,000, to remain avail-  
14 able until September 30, 2005; of which \$3,000,000 may  
15 be transferred to and merged with the Department of En-  
16 ergy, “Other Defense Activities”, and \$15,500,000 may  
17 be transferred to and merged with the Federal Bureau of  
18 Investigation, “Salaries and Expenses”: *Provided*, That all  
19 such amounts are designated by the Congress as an emer-  
20 gency requirement pursuant to section 502 of H. Con.  
21 Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution on  
22 the budget for fiscal year 2004.



1       SEC. 1103. Sections 1318 and 1319 of the Emer-  
2 gency Wartime Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2003  
3 (Public Law 108–11; 117 Stat. 571), shall remain in ef-  
4 fect during fiscal year 2004.

5       SEC. 1104. From October 1, 2003, through Sep-  
6 tember 30, 2004, (a) the rates of pay authorized by sec-  
7 tion 310(a) of title 37, United States Code, shall be \$225;  
8 and (b) the rates of pay authorized by section 427(a)(1)  
9 of title 37, United States Code, shall be \$250.

10       SEC. 1105. DEFENSE EMERGENCY RESPONSE FUND  
11 CLOSE-OUT AUTHORITY.—(a) Section 1313 of the Emer-  
12 gency Wartime Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2003  
13 (Public Law 108–11; 117 Stat. 569), is amended by in-  
14 serting “unobligated” before “balances”.

15       (b) Effective November 1, 2003, adjustments to obli-  
16 gations that before such date would have been properly  
17 chargeable to the Defense Emergency Response Fund  
18 shall be charged to any current appropriations account of  
19 the Department of Defense available for the same purpose.

20       SEC. 1106. During the current year, funds made  
21 available in this Act to the Department of Defense for op-  
22 eration and maintenance may be used, notwithstanding  
23 any other provision of law, to provide supplies, services,  
24 transportation, including airlift and sealift, and other  
25 logistical support to coalition forces supporting military

1 and stability operations in Iraq: *Provided*, That the Sec-  
2 retary of Defense shall provide quarterly reports to the  
3 congressional defense committees regarding support pro-  
4 vided under this section.

5       SEC. 1107. Notwithstanding any other provision of  
6 law, from funds made available in this Act to the Depart-  
7 ment of Defense under “Operation and Maintenance, De-  
8 fense-Wide”, not to exceed \$100,000,000 may be used by  
9 the Secretary of Defense, with the concurrence of the Sec-  
10 retary of State, to provide assistance only to the New Iraqi  
11 Army and the Afghan National Army to enhance their ca-  
12 pability to combat terrorism and to support U.S. military  
13 operations in Iraq and Afghanistan: *Provided*, That such  
14 assistance may include the provision of equipment, sup-  
15 plies, services, training and funding: *Provided further*,  
16 That the authority to provide assistance under this section  
17 is in addition to any other authority to provide assistance  
18 to foreign nations: *Provided further*, That the Secretary  
19 of Defense shall notify the congressional defense commit-  
20 tees not less than 15 days before providing assistance  
21 under the authority of this section.

22       SEC. 1108. None of the funds provided in this chap-  
23 ter may be used to finance programs or activities denied  
24 by Congress in fiscal year 2004 appropriations to the De-  
25 partment of Defense or to initiate a procurement or re-

1 search, development, test and evaluation new start pro-  
2 gram without prior notification to the congressional de-  
3 fense committees.

4 SEC. 1109. In addition to amounts made available  
5 elsewhere in this Act, there is hereby appropriated to the  
6 Department of Defense \$413,300,000, to be used only for  
7 recovery and repair of damage due to natural disasters  
8 including Hurricane Isabel, to be distributed as follows:

9 "Operation and Maintenance, Army",  
10 \$73,600,000;

11 "Operation and Maintenance, Navy",  
12 \$126,400,000;

13 "Operation and Maintenance, Marine Corps",  
14 \$9,200,000;

15 "Operation and Maintenance, Air Force",  
16 \$201,900,000; and

17 "Other Procurement, Air Force", \$2,200,000:

18 *Provided*, That the entire amount is designated by the  
19 Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-  
20 tion 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concur-  
21 rent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

22 SEC. 1110. During the current fiscal year, from  
23 funds made available in this Act to the Department of De-  
24 fense for operation and maintenance, not to exceed  
25 \$180,000,000 may be used, notwithstanding any other

1 provision of law, to fund the Commander's Emergency Re-  
2 sponse Program, established by the Administrator of the  
3 Coalition Provisional Authority for the purpose of enabling  
4 military commanders in Iraq to respond to urgent humani-  
5 tarian relief and reconstruction requirements within their  
6 areas of responsibility by carrying out programs that will  
7 immediately assist the Iraqi people, and to establish and  
8 fund a similar program to assist the people of Afghani-  
9 stan: *Provided*, That the Secretary of Defense shall pro-  
10 vide quarterly reports, beginning on January 15, 2004,  
11 to the congressional defense committees regarding the  
12 source of funds and the allocation and use of funds made  
13 available pursuant to the authority provided in this sec-  
14 tion.

15       SEC. 1111. Not later than 30 days after the date of  
16 the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Defense shall  
17 submit to the congressional defense committees a report  
18 describing an Analysis of Alternatives for replacing the ca-  
19 pabilities of the existing Air Force fleet of KC-135 tanker  
20 aircraft.



## 1                   MILITARY CONSTRUCTION, NAVY

2           For an additional amount for “Military Construction,  
3 Navy”, \$45,530,000, to remain available until September  
4 30, 2008: *Provided*, That notwithstanding any other provi-  
5 sion of law, such funds may be obligated or expended to  
6 carry out military construction projects not otherwise au-  
7 thorized by law: *Provided further*, That the entire amount  
8 is designated by the Congress as an emergency require-  
9 ment pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th  
10 Congress), the concurrent resolution on the budget for fis-  
11 cal year 2004.

## 12                   MILITARY CONSTRUCTION, AIR FORCE

13           For an additional amount for “Military Construction,  
14 Air Force”, \$292,550,000, to remain available until Sep-  
15 tember 30, 2008: *Provided*, That notwithstanding any  
16 other provision of law, such funds may be obligated or ex-  
17 pended to carry out planning and design and military con-  
18 struction projects not otherwise authorized by law: *Pro-*  
19 *vided further*, That the entire amount is designated by the  
20 Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-  
21 tion 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concur-  
22 rent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

1 FAMILY HOUSING OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE,  
2 ARMY

3 For an additional amount for “Family Housing Oper-  
4 ation and Maintenance, Army”, \$8,151,000: *Provided*,  
5 That the entire amount is designated by the Congress as  
6 an emergency requirement pursuant to section 502 of H.  
7 Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution  
8 on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

9 FAMILY HOUSING OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE,  
10 NAVY AND MARINE CORPS

11 For an additional amount for “Family Housing Oper-  
12 ation and Maintenance, Navy and Marine Corps”,  
13 \$6,280,000: *Provided*, That the entire amount is des-  
14 ignated by the Congress as an emergency requirement  
15 pursuant to section 502 of H. Con. Res. 95 (108th Con-  
16 gress), the concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal  
17 year 2004.

18 FAMILY HOUSING OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, AIR  
19 FORCE

20 For an additional amount for “Family Housing Oper-  
21 ation and Maintenance, Air Force”, \$6,981,000: *Provided*,  
22 That the entire amount is designated by the Congress as  
23 an emergency requirement pursuant to section 502 of H.  
24 Con. Res. 95 (108th Congress), the concurrent resolution  
25 on the budget for fiscal year 2004.

## 1           GENERAL PROVISION—THIS CHAPTER

2           SEC. 1301. (a) TEMPORARY AUTHORITY TO USE OP-  
3 ERATION AND MAINTENANCE FUNDS FOR MILITARY CON-  
4 STRUCTION PROJECTS.—During fiscal year 2004, the Sec-  
5 retary of Defense may use this section as authority to obli-  
6 gate appropriated funds available for operation and main-  
7 tenance to carry out a construction project outside the  
8 United States that the Secretary determines meets each  
9 of the following conditions:

10           (1) The construction is necessary to meet ur-  
11 gent military operational requirements of a tem-  
12 porary nature involving the use of the Armed Forces  
13 in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom or the Global  
14 War on Terrorism.

15           (2) The construction is not carried out at a  
16 military installation where the United States is rea-  
17 sonably expected to have a long-term presence.

18           (3) The United States has no intention of using  
19 the construction after the operational requirements  
20 have been satisfied.

21           (4) The level of construction is the minimum  
22 necessary to meet the temporary operational require-  
23 ments.

24           (b) LIMITATION ON USE OF AUTHORITY.—The total  
25 cost of the construction projects carried out under the au-

1 thority of this section using, in whole or in part, appro-  
2 priated funds available for operation and maintenance  
3 shall not exceed \$500,000,000 in fiscal year 2004.

4 (c) QUARTERLY REPORT.—(1) Not later than 30  
5 days after the end of each fiscal-year quarter of fiscal year  
6 2004, the Secretary of Defense shall submit to the con-  
7 gressional committees specified in subsection (e) a report  
8 on the worldwide obligation and expenditure during that  
9 quarter of appropriated funds available for operation and  
10 maintenance for construction projects.

11 (2) The report shall include with regard to each  
12 project the following:

13 (A) Certification that the conditions specified in  
14 subsection (a) are satisfied with regard to the con-  
15 struction project.

16 (B) A description of the purpose for which ap-  
17 propriated funds available for operation and mainte-  
18 nance are being obligated.

19 (C) Relevant documentation detailing the con-

7 (B) if such procedures are to be used by  
8 reason of the application of paragraph (2) of  
9 section 303(c) of such Act (41 U.S.C.  
10 253(c)(2)), the head of the executive agency en-  
11 tering into the contract shall submit to the  
12 committees described in subsection (b), not  
13 later than 7 calendar days after approval of the  
14 justification for the use of such other proce-  
15 dures under section 303(f)(1)(B) of the Federal  
16 Property and Administrative Services Act of  
17 1949 (41 U.S.C. 253(f)(1)(B))—

21 (b) COMMITTEES.—The committees referred to in

2           on Foreign Relations, and on Appropriations of the

4           (c) APPLICABILITY.—This section shall not apply to  
5           contracts entered into before the date of the enactment  
6           of this Act or after September 30, 2010.

7   **SEC. 2203. PUBLIC DISCLOSURE OF NONCOMPETITIVE CON-**  
8                           **TRACTING FOR THE RECONSTRUCTION OF**

10          (a) DISCLOSURE REQUIRED.—

11               (1) PUBLICATION AND PUBLIC AVAILABILITY.—  
12           The head of an executive agency of the United  
13           States that enters into a contract for assistance for  
14           Iraq, using funds described in paragraph (3),  
15           through the use of procedures other than competitive  
16           procedures shall publish in the Federal Register or  
17           Commerce Business Daily and otherwise make avail-  
18           able to the public, not later than 7 days before the  
19           date on which the contract is entered into, except in  
20           the case of urgent and compelling contracts issued  
21           pursuant to paragraph (2) of section 303(c) of the  
22           Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of  
23           1949 (41 U.S.C. 253(c)(2)), the following informa-  
24           tion:

25                       (A) The amount of the contract.

1 (B) A brief description of the scope of the  
2 contract.

3 (C) A discussion of how the executive  
4 agency identified, and solicited offers from, po-  
5 tential contractors to perform the contract, to-  
6 gether with a list of the potential contractors  
7 that were issued solicitations for the offers.

8 (D) The justification and approval docu-  
9 ments (as required under section 303(f)(1) of  
10 the Federal Property and Administrative Serv-  
11 ices Act of 1949 (41 U.S.C. 253(f)(1)) on  
12 which was based the determination to use pro-  
13 cedures other than competitive procedures.

14 (2) FUNDS.—The funds referred to in para-  
15 graph (1) are—

16 (A) any funds available to carry out sec-  
17 tions 103 through 106 and chapter 4 of part II  
18 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22  
19 U.S.C. 2151b–2151d; 2346 et seq.); and

20 (B) any funds appropriated by Public Law  
21 108–11 under the heading “Iraq Relief and Re-  
22 construction Fund” (in chapter 5 of title I; 117  
23 Stat. 573).

1           (3) APPLICABILITY.—Paragraph (1) shall not  
2 apply to contracts entered into before the date of the  
3 enactment of this Act or after September 30, 2010.

4           (b) CLASSIFIED INFORMATION.—

5           (1) AUTHORITY TO WITHHOLD.—The head of  
6 an executive agency may—

7                   (A) withhold from publication and disclo-  
8 sure under subsection (a) any document that is  
9 classified for restricted access in accordance  
10 with a Executive order in the interest of na-  
11 tional defense or foreign policy; and

12                   (B) redact any part so classified that is in  
13 a document not so classified before publication  
14 and disclosure of the document under sub-  
15 section (a).

16           (2) AVAILABILITY TO CONGRESS.—In any case  
17 in which the head of an executive agency withholds  
18 information under paragraph (1), the head of such  
19 executive agency shall make available an unredacted  
20 version of the document containing that information  
21 to the chairman and ranking member of each of the  
22 following committees of Congress:

23                   (A) The Committee on Governmental Af-  
24 fairs of the Senate and the Committee on Gov-

1           ernment Reform of the House of Representa-  
2           tives.

3           (B) The Committees on Appropriations of  
4           the Senate and House of Representatives.

5           (C) Each committee that the head of the  
6           executive agency determines has legislative ju-  
7           risdiction for the operations of such department  
8           or agency to which the information related.

9           (c) RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER DISCLOSURE LAWS.—  
10          Nothing in this section shall be construed as affecting obli-  
11          gations to disclose United States Government information  
12          under any other provision of law.

13          (d) DEFINITIONS.—In this section, the terms “com-  
14          petitive procedures” and “executive agency” have the  
15          meanings given such terms in section 4 of the Office of  
16          Federal Procurement Policy Act (41 U.S.C. 403).

17          SEC. 2204. Section 1503 of Public Law 108–11 is  
18          amended—

19               (1) by striking “equipment” and inserting in  
20               lieu thereof “equipment, including equipment”; and

21               (2) by striking “2004” and inserting in lieu  
22               thereof “2005”.

23          SEC. 2205. Section 1504 of Public Law 108–11 is  
24          amended by striking “controlled” and inserting “or small  
25          arms controlled”.

1        SEC. 2206. Section 202(b) of the Afghanistan Free-  
2 dom Support Act of 2002 (Public Law 107–327) is  
3 amended by striking “\$300,000,000” and inserting in lieu  
4 thereof “\$450,000,000”.

5        SEC. 2207. (a) Until January 2005, the Coalition  
6 Provisional Authority (CPA) shall, on a monthly basis,  
7 submit a report to the Committees on Appropriations and  
8 International Relations of the House of Representatives  
9 and the Committees on Appropriations and Foreign Rela-  
10 tions of the Senate that details, for the preceding month,  
11 Iraqi oil production and oil revenues, and uses of such rev-  
12 enues.

13        (b) The first report required by subsection (a) shall  
14 be submitted not later than 30 days after enactment of  
15 this Act.

16        (c) The reports required by this section shall also be  
17 made publicly available, including through the CPA’s  
18 Internet website.

19        SEC. 2208. Any reference in this chapter to the “Coa-  
20 lition Provisional Authority in Iraq” shall be deemed to  
21 include any successor United States Government entity  
22 with the same or substantially the same authorities and  
23 responsibilities as the Coalition Provisional Authority in  
24 Iraq.

1        SEC. 2209. Assistance or other financing under chap-  
2 ter 2 of this title may be provided for Iraq and Afghani-  
3 stan notwithstanding any other provision of law not con-  
4 tained in this Act that restricts assistance to foreign coun-  
5 tries and section 660 of the Foreign Assistance Act of  
6 1961: *Provided*, That funds made available for Iraq pursu-  
7 ant to this section shall be subject to the regular re-  
8 programming notification procedures of the Committees  
9 on Appropriations and section 634A of the Foreign Assist-  
10 ance Act of 1961, except that notification shall be trans-  
11 mitted at least 5 days in advance of obligation.

12        SEC. 2210. Funds made available in chapter 2 of this  
13 title are made available notwithstanding section 10 of  
14 Public Law 91–672 and section 15 of the State Depart-  
15 ment Basic Authorities Act of 1956, as amended.

16        SEC. 2211. Notwithstanding any other provision of  
17 law, the Overseas Private Investment Corporation is au-  
18 thorized to undertake any program authorized by title IV  
19 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 in Iraq: *Provided*,  
20 That funds made available pursuant to the authority of  
21 this section shall be subject to the regular reprogramming  
22 notification procedures of the Committees on Appropria-  
23 tions.

1                   REPORT ON MILITARY OPERATIONS AND  
2 RECONSTRUCTION EFFORTS IN IRAQ AND AFGHANISTAN

3           SEC. 2212. (a) REPORT.—The President shall pre-  
4 pare and transmit to Congress on a quarterly basis a re-  
5 port on United States military operations and reconstruc-  
6 tion efforts in Iraq and Afghanistan.

7           (b) CONTENTS.—The report shall, at a minimum,  
8 contain the following information:

9                   (1) A full accounting of amounts appropriated  
10 under this Act or any other Act that were expended  
11 during the preceding quarter for military operations  
12 and reconstruction efforts in Iraq and Afghanistan.

13                   (2) A description of progress made in recon-  
14 struction efforts in Iraq and Afghanistan, particu-  
15 larly efforts relating to public safety, defense and  
16 law enforcement, energy infrastructure, water,  
17 sewer, roads, and other public works, transportation  
18 and telecommunications infrastructure, medical and  
19 hospital services, and private sector development.

20                   (3) A description of progress made to reduce  
21 attacks against members of the United States  
22 Armed Forces in Iraq and Afghanistan.

23                   (4) An analysis of the impact that military op-  
24 erations in Iraq and Afghanistan have had on overall  
25 readiness of the Armed Forces.

1           (5) An analysis of the impact that the extended  
2           deployment of members of the Armed Forces in con-  
3           nection with Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation  
4           Enduring Freedom is having on recruiting and re-  
5           tention efforts in the active and reserve components.

6           (6) An estimate of the cost of repairing or re-  
7           placing the combat vehicles, aircraft, and other  
8           equipment damaged or destroyed by combat, by pro-  
9           longed use in Iraq and Afghanistan, or by exposure  
10          to the extreme climatic and terrain conditions in  
11          Iraq and Afghanistan.

12          (7) A description of progress made toward hold-  
13          ing of free and fair elections in Iraq.

14          (8) A description of the extent of international  
15          participation in the stabilization and reconstruction  
16          of Iraq and the amount of financial assistance that  
17          the United States has secured from the international  
18          community during the preceding quarter.

19          (9) The number of members of the Armed  
20          Forces deployed in connection with Operation Iraqi  
21          Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom.

22          SEC. 2213. (a) REVIEW OF CONTRACTING PROCE-  
23          DURES.—The Comptroller General shall review each cov-  
24          ered contract and task or delivery order entered into dur-  
25          ing a review period to determine whether the procedures

1 used to enter into the contracts and orders were in compli-  
2 ance with the requirements of this Act and other applica-  
3 ble laws and regulations.

4 (b) REPORT.—At the end of each review period, the  
5 Comptroller General shall submit to Congress a report on  
6 the results of the review.

7 (c) REVIEW PERIOD.—A review under subsection (a)  
8 shall be carried each quarter of a fiscal year, beginning  
9 with the first quarter beginning after the date of the en-  
10 actment of this Act.

11 (d) COVERED CONTRACTS AND ORDERS.—This sec-  
12 tion applies to any contract or task or delivery order en-  
13 tered into using funds appropriated by this Act for foreign  
14 assistance if—

15 (1) in the case of a contract, the contract is in  
16 an amount in excess of the simplified acquisition  
17 threshold (as defined in section 4 of the Office of  
18 Federal Procurement Policy Act (41 U.S.C. 403),  
19 and

20 (2) in the case of a task or delivery order, the  
21 order is in an amount in excess of \$1,000,000.

## 22 TITLE III—GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS ACT

23 SEC. 3001. No part of any appropriation contained  
24 in this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond  
25 the current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

1        SEC. 3002. None of the funds made available in this  
2 or any other Act for fiscal year 2004 may be used for  
3 any defense or reconstruction activities in Iraq or Afghani-  
4 stan coordinated by any officer of the United States Gov-  
5 ernment whose office is not subject to appointment by the  
6 President by and with the advice and consent of the Sen-  
7 ate.

8        SEC. 3003. For purposes of computing the amount  
9 of a payment for an eligible local educational agency under  
10 section 8003(a) of the Elementary and Secondary Edu-  
11 cation Act (20 U.S.C. 7703(a)), children enrolled in a  
12 school of such agency that would otherwise be eligible for  
13 payment under section 8003(a)(1)(B) of such Act, but due  
14 to the deployment of both parents or legal guardians, or  
15 due to the death of a military parent or legal guardian  
16 while on active duty, are no longer eligible under such sec-  
17 tion, shall be considered as eligible students under such  
18 section, provided such students remain in average daily  
19 attendance at the same school that they attended prior  
20 to their change in eligibility status.

21        SEC. 3004. None of the funds made available by this  
22 Act may be provided to any unit of the security forces  
23 of a foreign country participating with coalition forces in  
24 Afghanistan or Iraq if the Secretary of State or the Sec-  
25 retary Defense has credible evidence that such unit has

1 committed gross violations of human rights, unless the ap-  
2 propriate Secretary determines and reports to the Com-  
3 mittees on Appropriations that the government of such  
4 country is taking effective measures to bring the respon-  
5 sible members of the security forces unit to justice: *Pro-*  
6 *vided*, That nothing in this section shall be construed to  
7 withhold funds made available by this Act from any unit  
8 of the security forces of a foreign country not credibly al-  
9 leged to be involved in gross violations of human rights:  
10 *Provided further*, That in the event that funds are withheld  
11 from any unit pursuant to this section, the appropriate  
12 Secretary shall promptly inform the foreign government  
13 of the basis for such action and shall, to the maximum  
14 extent practicable, assist the foreign government in taking  
15 effective measures to bring the responsible members of the  
16 security forces to justice.

17 SEC. 3005. None of the funds in this Act, or any  
18 other appropriations Act, may be used to execute the Lat-  
19 eral Repatriation Program, or any other program under  
20 which citizens or nationals of Mexico are removed by land  
21 from the United States by returning them to a location  
22 other than the United States port of entry closest to the  
23 location where they were apprehended or last imprisoned,  
24 or, in the case of an alien who is removed upon being ac-  
25 quitted of a criminal charge, the port of entry closest to

1 the courthouse where the acquittal occurs. If the Secretary  
2 of Homeland Security determines that compliance with the  
3 preceding sentence is not feasible, the Secretary shall no-  
4 tify the Committees on the Judiciary and on Appropria-  
5 tions of the House of Representatives and of the Senate.

6       SEC. 3006. None of the funds in this Act, or any  
7 other appropriations Act, may be used for the issuance  
8 of Form I-20A by the San Antonio Office of Detention  
9 and Removal of the Bureau of Immigration and Customs  
10 Enforcement and the Border Patrol sectors served by said  
11 office.

12       This Act may be cited as the “Emergency Supple-  
13 mental Appropriations Act for Defense and for the Recon-  
14 struction of Iraq and Afghanistan, 2004”.
