## A BILL

- To establish a Federal interagency task force to promote the benefits, safety, and potential uses of agricultural biotechnology to improve human and animal nutrition, increase crop productivity, and improve agricultural sustainability while ensuring the safety of food and the environment.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. FEDERAL INTERAGENCY TASK FORCE TO PRO MOTE THE BENEFITS, SAFETY, AND POTEN TIAL USES OF AGRICULTURAL BIO TECHNOLOGY.

5 (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF INTERAGENCY TASK FORCE TO PROMOTE BENEFITS, SAFETY, AND POTENTIAL USES 6 7 OF AGRICULTURAL BIOTECHNOLOGY.—There is estab-8 lished the "Federal Interagency Task Force to Promote 9 the Benefits, Safety, and Potential Uses of Agricultural Biotechnology" (in this section referred to as the "task 10 11 force") for the purpose of improving interagency cooperation and to develop and disseminate accurate written sci-12 13 entific information on the benefits, safety, and potential uses of agricultural biotechnology. 14

15 (b) MEMBERSHIP.—The members of the task force shall consist of the Secretary of Agriculture, the Secretary 16 17 of State, the Secretary of Commerce, the United States Trade Representative, the Administrator of the United 18 19 States Agency for International Development, and the Di-20 rector of the National Science Foundation. The Secretary of Agriculture shall chair the task force. Members of the 21 22 task force may designate a senior official from the appro-23 priate participating Federal agency to attend meetings of 24 the task force.

(c) OBJECTIVES OF TASK FORCE.—The task force
 shall coordinate the activities of the participating agencies
 regarding the following:

4 (1) Improved knowledge of foreign-assigned in5 dividuals from the participating agencies regarding
6 the safety and potential of biotechnology-derived ag7 ricultural products, including regulatory safeguards
8 that assure food and environmental safety.

9 (2) Expanded dissemination by participating
10 agencies of scientifically-based facts regarding the
11 safety and potential of biotechnology-derived agricul12 tural products.

(3) Improved ability of the participating agencies to advocate to foreign countries, including developing nations, the benefits that agricultural biotechnology can potentially provide for human and
animal nutrition, the environment, crop productivity,
and agricultural sustainability.

(4) Achievement of a better understanding by
foreign countries, including developing nations, of
the potential benefits of agricultural biotechnology to
develop products that can be grown under local soil
and climate conditions and better meet the health
and nutritional needs of local populations.

25 (d) REPORTING REQUIREMENTS.—

1	(1) SUBMISSION.—Not later than one year after
2	the date of the enactment of this Act, and annually
3	thereafter, the Secretary of Agriculture shall submit
4	to the congressional committees specified in para-
5	graph (3) a report on the activities undertaken by
6	the task force and the participating agencies to pro-
7	mote the benefits, safety, and potential uses of agri-
8	cultural biotechnology.
9	(2) CONTENT.—Each report under paragraph
10	(1) shall include information from each member of
11	the task force regarding the measures taken, and
12	progress made, to achieve the objectives of the task
13	force described in subsection (c).
14	(3) Congressional committees.—Each re-
15	port under paragraph $(1)$ shall be submitted to the
16	following congressional committees:
17	(A) The Committee on Agriculture of the
18	House of Representatives.
19	(B) The Committee of Energy and Com-
20	merce of the House of Representatives.
21	(C) The Committee on International Rela-
22	tions of the House of Representatives.
23	(D) The Committee on Science of the

1	(E) The Committee on Agriculture, Nutri-
2	tion, and Forestry of the Senate.
3	(F) The Committee on Commerce, Science,
4	and Transportation of the Senate.
5	(G) The Committee on Foreign Relations
6	of the Senate.
7	(e) DURATION.—The task force shall terminate 10
8	years after the date of the enactment of this Act.
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
