Mr. JENKINS (for himself, Mr. FORD, and Mr. GOODE) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Financial Services

A BILL

- To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins celebrating the recovery and restoration of the American bald eagle, the national symbol of the United States, to America's lands, waterways, and skies and the great importance of the designation of the American bald eagle as an "endangered" species under the Endangered Species Act of 1973, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "American Bald Eagle3 Recovery and National Emblem Commemorative Coin4 Act"

5 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

6 The Congress finds as follows:

7 (1) The bald eagle was designated as the na8 tional emblem of the United States on June 20,
9 1782, by our country's Founding Fathers at the
10 Second Continental Congress.

(2) The bald eagle is the greatest visible symbol
of the spirit of freedom and democracy in the world.
(3) The bald eagle species is unique to North
America and represents the American values and attributes of freedom, courage, strength, spirit, loyalty,
justice, equality, democracy, quality, and excellence.

17 (4) The bald eagle is the central image used in 18 the Great Seal of the United States and the seal of 19 many branches and departments of the United 20 States Government, including the President and the 21 Vice President of the United States, the United 22 States Congress, the Department of Defense, the 23 Department of the Treasury, the Department of 24 Justice, the Department of State, the Department of 25 Commerce, the Department of Homeland Security, 26 and the United States Postal Service.

(5) The bald eagle's image and symbolism have played a profound role in establishing and honoring American beliefs and traditions.(6) The bald eagle's image and symbolism have

5 influenced American art, music, history, literature,
6 commerce, and culture since the founding of our Na7 tion.

8 (7) The bald eagle species was once threatened 9 with possible extinction in the lower 48 States but 10 is now making a gradual, encouraging recovery with-11 in America's lands, waterways, and skies.

(8) The bald eagle was federally classified as an
"endangered" species in 1973 under the Endangered
Species Act of 1973, and, in 1995, was removed
from the "endangered" species list and upgraded to
the less imperiled "threatened" status under such
Act.

(9) The administration is likely to officially
delist the bald eagle from both the "endangered"
and "threatened" species lists under the Endangered
Species Act of 1973 by no later than 2008.

(10) The initial recovery of the bald eagle population in the United States was accomplished by the
vigilant efforts of numerous caring agencies, corporations, organizations, and citizens.

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1 (11) The continued caring and concern of the 2 American people and the further restoration and 3 protection of the bald eagle and its habitat is nec-4 essary to guarantee the full recovery and survival of 5 this precious national treasure for future genera-6 tions.

7 (12) Since the Endangered Species Act of 1973 8 requires that delisted species be administratively 9 monitored for a 5-year period, the bald eagle nests 10 in 49 States will require continual monitoring after 11 the bald eagle is removed from the protection of 12 such Act; and such efforts will require substantial 13 funding to the Federal and State agencies and pri-14 vate organizations that will conduct such monitoring.

(13) Due to Federal and State budget cutting
and balancing trends, funding for on-going bald
eagle care, restoration, monitoring, protection, and
enhancement programs has diminished annually.

(14) In anticipation of the nationwide observance of the official removal, by 2008, of the bald
eagle from the "threatened" species list under the
Endangered Species Act of 1973, and the 35th anniversary, in 2008, of the Endangered Species Act of
1973 and the designation of the bald eagle as an
"endangered" species under such Act, Congress

1	wishes to offer the opportunity for all persons to vol-
2	untarily participate in raising funds for future bald
3	eagle recovery, monitoring, and preservation efforts
4	and to contribute to a special American Eagle Fund
5	endowment managed by the not-for-profit American
6	Eagle Foundation of Tennessee in the United
7	States, in cooperation with fund management ex-
8	perts.
9	(15) It is appropriate for Congress to authorize
10	coins—
11	(A) celebrating the recovery and restora-
12	tion of the bald eagle, the living symbol of free-
13	dom in the United States, to America's lands,
14	waterways, and skies;
15	(B) commemorating the removal of the
16	bald eagle from the "endangered" and "threat-
17	ened" species lists under the Endangered Spe-
18	cies Act of 1973; and
19	(C) commemorating the 35th anniversary
20	of the enactment of the Endangered Species
21	Act of 1973 and the designation of the bald
22	eagle as an "endangered" species under such
23	Act.

1 SEC. 3. COIN SPECIFICATIONS.

2	(a) DENOMINATIONS.—In celebration of the recovery
3	of the bald eagle, the national living symbol of freedom,
4	to America's lands, waterways, and skies and in com-
5	memoration of the 35th anniversary of the enactment of
6	the Endangered Species Act of 1973 and the placement
7	of the bald eagle on the endangered species list under such
8	Act, the Secretary of the Treasury (hereafter in this Act
9	referred to as the "Secretary") shall mint and issue the
10	following coins:
11	(1) 5 GOLD COINS.—Not more than 100,000
12	\$5 coins, which shall—
13	(A) weigh 8.359 grams;
14	(B) have a diameter of 0.850 inches; and
15	(C) contain 90 percent gold and 10 percent
16	alloy.
17	(2) 1 SILVER COINS.—Not more than 500,000
18	\$1 coins, which shall—
19	(A) weigh 26.73 grams;
20	(B) have a diameter of 1.500 inches; and
21	(C) contain 90 percent silver and 10 per-
22	cent copper.
23	(3) HALF DOLLAR CLAD COINS.—Not more
24	than 750,000 half dollar coins which shall—
25	(A) weigh 11.34 grams;
26	(B) have a diameter of 1.205 inches; and

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(C) be minted to the specifications for half
 dollar coins contained in section 5112(b) of title
 31, United States Code.

4 (b) LEGAL TENDER.—The coins minted under this
5 Act shall be legal tender, as provided in section 5103 of
6 title 31, United States Code.

7 (c) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of sections
8 5134 and 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all coins
9 minted under this Act shall be considered to be numis10 matic items.

11 SEC. 4. DESIGN OF COINS.

12 (a) DESIGN REQUIREMENTS.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The design of the coins
minted under this Act shall be emblematic of the
bald eagle and its history, natural biology, and national symbolism.

17 (2) DESIGNATION AND INSCRIPTIONS.—On
18 each coin minted under this Act there shall be—

(A) a designation of the value of the coin;
(B) an inscription of the year "2008"; and
(C) inscriptions of the words "Liberty",
"In God We Trust", "United States of America", and "E Pluribus Unum".

(b) SELECTION.—The design for the coins mintedunder this Act shall be—

(1) selected by the Secretary after consultation
 with the Commission of Fine Arts, and the Amer ican Eagle Foundation of Tennessee in the United
 States; and

5 (2) reviewed by the Citizens Coinage Advisory6 Committee.

7 SEC. 5. ISSUANCE OF COINS.

8 (a) QUALITY OF COINS.—Coins minted under this9 Act shall be issued in uncirculated and proof qualities.

(b) MINT FACILITY.—Only 1 facility of the United
States Mint may be used to strike any particular quality
of the coins minted under this Act.

(c) PERIOD FOR ISSUANCE.—The Secretary may
issue coins minted under this Act only during the 1-year
period beginning on January 1, 2008.

16 SEC. 6. SALE OF COINS.

17 (a) SALE PRICE.—The coins issued under this Act
18 shall be sold by the Secretary at a price equal to the sum
19 of—

20 (1) the face value of the coins;

(2) the surcharge provided in section 7(a) with
respect to such coins; and

(3) the cost of designing and issuing the coins
(including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery,
overhead expenses, marketing, and shipping).

(b) BULK SALES.—The Secretary shall make bulk
 sales of the coins issued under this Act at a reasonable
 discount.

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4 (c) Prepaid Orders.—

5 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall accept
6 prepaid orders for the coins minted under this Act
7 before the issuance of such coins.

8 (2) DISCOUNT.—Sale prices with respect to pre9 paid orders under paragraph (1) shall be at a rea10 sonable discount.

11 SEC. 7. SURCHARGES.

12 (a) IN GENERAL.—All sales of coins minted under13 this Act shall include a surcharge as follows:

14 (1) A surcharge of \$35 per coin for the \$5 coin.
15 (2) A surcharge of \$10 per coin for the \$1 coin.

16 (3) A surcharge of \$3 per coin for the half dol-17 lar coin.

(b) DISTRIBUTION.—Subject to section 5134(f) of
title 31, United States Code, all surcharges received by
the Secretary from the sale of coins issued under this Act
shall be promptly paid by the Secretary to the American
Eagle Foundation of Tennessee in the United States for
use solely for the following purposes:

24 (1) To establish an interest-bearing endowment25 called the American Eagle Fund as a permanent

1	source of support for the care, monitoring, mainte-
2	nance, and recovery of the bald eagle and its habitat
3	in the United States, including the following:
4	(A) Public education activities and events.
5	(B) Habitat purchases and cooperative
6	land agreements.
7	(C) Raptor rehabilitation and captive
8	breeding and hacking.
9	(D) Behavior and migration research and
10	wintering migration counts.
11	(E) Facilitate the enforcement of laws pro-
12	tecting the bald eagle.
13	(F) Nest-watch monitoring and eaglet
14	banding.
15	(G) Public viewing areas and visitor cen-
16	ters.
17	(2) To make annual grants, in an amount not
18	to exceed 10 percent of the annual income of the
19	American Eagle Fund, to Federal, State, and pri-
20	vate eagle restoration, protection, and enhancement
21	projects within the 5 bald eagle recovery regions es-
22	tablished by the United States Fish and Wildlife
23	Service, in accordance with recommendations made
24	by an advisory committee of recognized eagle experts
25	which the Foundation shall establish.

1	(3) To administer the American Eagle Fund,
2	including contracting for necessary services, in an
3	annual amount not to exceed the lesser of—
4	(A) 10 percent of the annual income of the
5	American Eagle Fund; or
6	(B) \$250,000.
7	(4) To provide financial support for capital
8	projects related to the restoration and protection of
9	bald eagles in Tennessee and in the United States,
10	in general.
11	(5) To provide financial support for the con-
12	tinuation and expansion of the efforts of the Amer-
13	ican Eagle Foundation of Tennessee in the United
14	States to educate the American people nationally
15	about the livelihood, symbolism, and protection of
16	the bald eagle, the national symbol of the United
17	States, through the dissemination of information re-
18	garding bald eagles and their habitat at special
19	events and through the media (including news-
20	papers, magazines, radio, television, the Internet,
21	and billboards).
22	(c) AUDITS.—The American Eagle Foundation of
23	Tennessee in the United States and the American Eagle
24	Fund shall be subject to the audit requirements of section
25	5134(f)(2) of title 31, United States Code, with regard

1 to the amounts received by the Foundation or the Fund

2 under subsection (b).
