A BILL

To eliminate the annual operating deficit and maintenance backlog in the national parks, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "National Park Centen-
- 5 nial Act of 2004".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.

2 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds:

3 (1) The National Park Service was established
4 to conserve the national parks, their scenery, natural
5 and historic objects, and wildlife for the enjoyment,
6 in such manner and by such means as will leave
7 them unimpaired for the enjoyment of future gen8 erations.

9 (2) The central purpose of the establishment of 10 our national parks is being challenged by chronic 11 funding shortfalls, which have created annual short-12 falls in operational funding that exceed 13 \$600,000,000, and have amassed a maintenance 14 backlog estimated by the General Accounting Office 15 at between \$4,080,000,000 and \$6,800,000,000.

16 (3) Without providing the Park Service the re-17 sources necessary to operate and maintain our na-18 tional parks, future generations will receive dimin-19 ished visitor services, will experience a continually 20 weakening system that is less and less able to fulfill 21 its mission, and will inherit a national park system 22 than has been left to them in worse condition that 23 it was left to their ancestors.

24 (4) The annual appropriations process has
25 proved incapable of fully addressing the debilitating
26 funding shortfalls of the national parks, making it
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necessary to supplement what the appropriations 2 process is able to accomplish.

3 (5) It is necessary to ensure that fiscal re-4 sources devoted to the national parks are spent wise-5 ly and effectively, making strong congressional over-6 sight over annual appropriations extremely impor-7 tant.

8 (6) Congress can enhance the resources avail-9 able for national park operations and ensure ade-10 quate oversight over Park Service spending by re-11 moving from the appropriations process a series of 12 funding responsibilities that are outside the core op-13 erating budgets for the national parks.

14 (b) PURPOSE.—The purpose of this Act is to elimi-15 nate the annual operating deficit and the maintenance backlog in the national parks by the centennial anniver-16 sary of the National Park System by enabling Congress 17 to focus on overseeing and fully funding the core oper-18 19 ations of the national parks in the annual appropriations 20 process.

TITLE I—CENTENNIAL FUND 21

22 SEC. 101. CENTENNIAL FUND FOR PRESERVING AMERICA'S 23 NATIONAL PARKS.

24 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the 25 Treasury of the United States a fund which shall be known as the "National Park Centennial Fund", herein after in this Act referred to as the "Centennial Fund".
 In each fiscal year beginning in fiscal year 2005, the Sec retary of the Treasury shall deposit in the Centennial
 Fund amounts set forth in subsection (b) sufficient to
 fund the programs identified in titles II, III, and IV.

7 (b) APPROPRIATIONS.—There are hereby appro8 priated to the Centennial Fund in each fiscal year, the
9 following amounts:

10 (1) Amounts equivalent to the amounts des11 ignated in the fiscal year concerned under section
12 6097 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

(2) Any additional amounts necessary to make
the total amounts deposited to the Centennial Fund
each fiscal year equal to the total amount listed in
section 103.

17 SEC. 102. DESIGNATION OF OVERPAYMENTS AND CON18 TRIBUTIONS FOR THE BENEFIT OF UNITS OF
19 THE NATIONAL PARK SYSTEM.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Subchapter A of chapter 61 of the
Internal Revenue Code of 1986 is amended by adding at
the end the following new part:

PART IX—DESIGNATION OF OVERPAYMENTS AND CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE BENEFIT OF UNITS OF THE NATIONAL PARK SYSTEM

"Sec. 6097. Designation.

4 "SEC. 6097. DESIGNATION.

5 "(a) IN GENERAL.—In the case of an individual, with 6 respect to each taxpayer's return for the taxable year of 7 the tax imposed by chapter 1, such taxpayer may des-8 ignate that—

9 "(1) a specified portion (but not less than \$1)
10 of any overpayment of tax for such taxable year, and
11 "(2) any cash contribution which the taxpayer
12 includes with such return, shall be used for the ben13 efit of units of the National Park System.

14 "(b) MANNER AND TIME OF DESIGNATION.—A designation under subsection (a) may be made with respect 15 to any taxable year only at the time of filing the return 16 17 of the tax imposed by chapter 1 for such taxable year. Such designation shall be made in such manner as the 18 19 Secretary prescribes by regulations except that such des-20ignation shall be made either on the first page of the return or on the page bearing the taxpayer's signature. 21

22 "(c) OVERPAYMENTS TREATED AS REFUNDED.—For
23 purposes of this title, any portion of any overpayment of
24 tax designated under subsection (a) shall be treated as

being refunded to the taxpayer as of the last date pre scribed for filing the return of tax imposed by chapter 1
 (determined without regard to extensions) or, if later, the
 date the return is filed.".

5 (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of parts for
6 subchapter A of chapter 61 of such Code is amended by
7 adding at the end thereof the following new item:

8 (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made by
9 this section shall apply to taxable years beginning after
10 December 31, 2004.

11 SEC. 103. PROGRAM ALLOCATION.

12 The following amounts shall be deposited in the Cen-13 tennial Fund from amounts designated under section 102 14 (and from the General Fund of the Treasury to the extent 15 the amounts so designated are less than the total amounts 16 specified in this section for the fiscal year concerned). 17 Such amounts shall, without further appropriation, be 18 available to the Secretary of the Interior until expended:

- 19 (1) Fiscal year 2005: \$100,000,000.
- 20 (2) Fiscal year 2006: \$125,000,000.
- (3) Fiscal year 2007: \$150,000,000.
- (4) Fiscal year 2008: \$175,000,000.
- 23 (5) Such sums as may be necessary through fis-24 cal year 2016.

[&]quot;Part IX. Designation of overpayments and contributions for the benefit of units of the National Park System".

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1 SEC. 104. DISTRIBUTION OF FUND.

2 There are hereby created within the Centennial Fund3 accounts, designated for the following purposes:

- 4 (1) National Park Backlog Elimination Fund5 (60 percent).
- 6 (2) Natural Resource Challenge Fund (20 per7 cent).
- 8 (3) Cultural Resource Challenge Fund (20 per-9 cent).

10 SEC. 105. PATRIOTS FOR PARKS PROMOTION.

11 There are hereby authorized to be appropriated to the 12 Secretary of the Interior such sums as necessary for a 13 public awareness campaign about the existence of the Na-14 tional Park Centennial Fund created in section 101 and 15 the ability of taxpayers to contribute to it through the tax 16 checkoff created in section 6097 of the Internal Revenue 17 Code of 1986.

18 TITLE II—ELIMINATING THE NA-

19 TIONAL PARK MAINTENANCE20 BACKLOG

21 SEC. 201. BACKLOG ELIMINATION.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Sixty percent of the funds deposited into the Centennial Fund shall be used to eliminate
the backlog of unmet needs in the National Parks, as identified in the Facility Condition Index (hereinafter in this

Act referred to as the "FCI") of the National Park Serv ice.

3 (b) PRIORITIES.—(1) The Secretary of the Interior 4 shall prepare, as part of the annual budget proposal, a 5 priority list for projects to be funded under this section. Moneys shall be made available from the fund, without 6 7 further appropriation, effective October 15 of each cal-8 endar year, for the projects identified on the priority list, 9 unless prior to such date, legislation is enacted estab-10 lishing a different priority list.

(2) In preparing the list of projects to be funded
under this section, the Secretary of the Interior shall give
priority to projects that—

14 (A) are identified in the park unit's general15 management plan;

16 (B) are listed in the FCI;

17 (C) are identified by the Secretary of the Inte18 rior as necessary to prevent immediate damage to
19 the park unit's natural, cultural, or historic re20 sources, with priority given to projects with the most
21 significant benefit to conservation of resources or
22 visitor education; and

23 (D) are identified as necessary to promote pub-24 lic health and safety.

(c) OVERHEAD.—National Parks undertaking
 projects under this section may allocate up to 8 percent
 of the funds for such projects for oversight of such
 projects and other associated overhead responsibilities.

5 TITLE III—PROTECTING 6 NATURAL WONDERS

7 SEC. 301. NATURAL RESOURCE CHALLENGE.

8 (a) NATURAL RESOURCE PROTECTION.—Twenty
9 percent of the funds deposited into the Centennial Fund
10 shall be used to protect natural resources within the parks.

11 (b) PROJECT DESCRIPTION.—The Secretary of the 12 Interior shall prepare, as part of the annual budget pro-13 posal, a description of projects to be funded under this 14 section. Moneys shall be made available from the Centen-15 nial Fund, without further appropriation, effective Octo-16 ber 15 of each calendar year for activities that include 17 each of the following:

- 18 (1) Natural resource inventories.
- 19 (2) Monitoring efforts including air and water20 quality monitoring.
- 21 (3) Protection of native and endangered species22 and their habitats.
- 23 (4) Control of nonnative species.
- 24 (5) Resource planning.
- 25 (6) Increase collaboration with scientists.

(7) Authorized environmental restoration
 projects.

(8) Use of parks for learning.

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4 (9) Establishment of partnerships with nonpark
5 entities for the purpose of leveraging Federal funds
6 allocated to natural resource protection.

7 TITLE IV—PROTECTING 8 NATIONAL TREASURES

9 SEC. 401. CULTURAL RESOURCE CHALLENGE.

(a) CULTURAL RESOURCES.—Twenty percent of the
funds deposited into the Centennial Fund shall be used
to protect cultural resources within the national parks.

(b) PROJECT DESCRIPTION.—The Secretary of the
Interior shall prepare, as part of the annual budget proposal, a description of projects to be funded under this
section. Moneys shall be made available from the fund,
without further appropriation, effective October 15 of each
calendar year for activities that include each of the following:

20 (1) Cultural or historic resources not listed on21 the FCI.

22 (2) Documenting and preserving archaeological23 sites.

24 (3) Preserving collections and archives.

25 (4) Ethnographic activities.

(5) Evaluating and protecting cultural land scapes.

3 (6) Establishment of partnerships with non4 park entities for the purpose of leveraging Federal
5 funds allocated to cultural resource protection.

6 TITLE V—MEETING ANNUAL 7 OPERATING NEEDS

8 SEC. 501. PROGRESS ON ANNUAL APPROPRIATIONS.

9 (a) GAO REPORT.—The General Accounting Office annually shall submit to the Committee on Appropriations, 10 11 Committee on Government Reform, and Committee on Re-12 sources of the United States House of Representatives and to the Committee on Appropriations, Committee on Gov-13 14 ernment Affairs, and Committee on Energy and Natural 15 Resources of the United States Senate a report that de-16 scribes each of the following:

(1) The progress of Congress in eliminating the
annual operating fund deficit in the National Park
System, defined as in excess of \$600,000,000 based
on a fiscal year 2002 estimate of then-complete national park business plans, and projection of when
such deficit will be eliminated, based on funding levels and trends.

(2) A comparison of business plan estimates of
 national park needs versus actual funds appro priated to such parks.

4 (3) Any differences in the Park Service's busi5 ness plan methodology for the estimate in paragraph
6 (2) of this subsection compared to that used in fiscal
7 year 2003.

8 (4) Management improvement measures under-9 taken by individual park units and by the National 10 Park Service as a whole, including actual realized 11 savings and actual impact on visitor services and re-12 source protection.

(5) Adjustments in, and the total number of,
full-time equivalent and actual positions dedicated to
resource protection, visitor services, interpretation,
and other employment categories.

17 (6) Any adjustments made in service to the
18 public, including but not limited to adjustments to
19 visitor center hours and the number or quality of
20 ranger-led tours.

21 (7) Any changes in the Park Service's level of
22 effort due to partnership or other leveraged activi23 ties.

24 (8) Any new requirements and assessments25 placed on the parks for unbudgeted expenses, includ-

1	ing, but not limited to, homeland security, natural
2	disasters, and employee cost-of-living adjustments.
3	(9) An assessment of the accuracy and com-
4	pleteness of the Facility Condition Index described
5	in Title I of this Act, including adjustments made to
6	such Index on an annual basis.
7	(b) Business Plan Implementation Pilot (Dem-
8	ONSTRATION) PROGRAM.—In consultation with the Direc-
9	tor of the National Park Service, at least 60 percent of
10	the amounts provided under Titles II, III, and IV shall
11	be distributed to national parks that have completed com-
12	prehensive business plans under the Business Plan Initia-
13	tive of the National Park Service.
14	(c) Education and the National Parks.—The
15	Secretary of Education is hereby authorized to provide
16	grants to elementary and secondary schools to enter into
17	cooperative agreements with the National Park Service for
18	the purpose of distance learning and onsite education pro-
19	grams for the following purposes:
20	(1) Connecting students to the history of our
21	Nation through the national parks.
22	(2) Using the parks to facilitate scientific in-
23	struction.

24 (d) INTENT OF CONGRESS TO SUPPLEMENT ANNUAL25 APPROPRIATIONS FOR NATIONAL PARK SERVICE.—

- 1 Amounts made available by this Act are intended by the
- 2 Congress to supplement, and not detract from, annual ap-
- 3 propriations for the National Park Service.
