A BILL

- To provide for additional responsibilities for the Chief Information Officer of the Department of Homeland Security relating to geospatial information.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. GEOSPATIAL INFORMATION.

4 (a) DEFINED TERM.—In this Act, the term 5 "geospatial information" means collecting, storing, re-

trieving, or disseminating graphical or digital data depict-1 ing natural or manmade physical features, phenomena or 2 boundaries of the earth and any information related there-3 4 to, including surveys, maps, charts, remote sensing data 5 and images and aerial photographic services, with services professionals 6 performed bv such $\frac{\partial}{\partial S}$ surveyors, 7 photogrammetrists, hydrographers, geodesists, cartog-8 raphers, and other such services of an architectural or en-9 gineering nature.

10 (b) COORDINATION OF GEOSPATIAL INFORMATION.— 11 The Chief Information Officer of the Department of 12 Homeland Security shall establish and carry out a pro-13 gram to provide for the efficient use of geospatial informa-14 tion, which shall include—

(1) providing such geospatial information as
may be necessary to implement the critical infrastructure protection programs designated pursuant
to section 213 of the Homeland Security Act of
2002 (Public Law 107-296); and

20 (2) providing leadership in meeting the require21 ments of, and populate the databases used by, those
22 responsible for planning, prevention, mitigation, as23 sessment and response to emergencies, critical infra24 structure and other functions of the Department of
25 Homeland Security, and to assure the interoper-

2	geospatial information among all users.
3	(c) Responsibilities. In carrying out subsection
4	(b), the responsibilities of the Chief Information Officer
5	shall include—
6	(1) managing the geospatial information needs
7	and activities of the Department of Homeland Secu-
8	rity;
9	(2) establishing such standards as are necessary
10	to assure the interoperability of geospatial informa-
11	tion pertaining to homeland security among all users
12	of such information within—
13	(A) the Department of Homeland Security;
14	(B) other agencies;
15	(C) State and local government; and
16	(D) the private sector;
17	(3) coordinating with and providing liaison to
18	the Federal Geographic Data Committee and ear-
19	rying out the responsibilities of the Department of
20	Homeland Security pursuant to Office of Manage-
21	ment and Budget Circular A–16 and Executive
22	Order 12906;
23	(4) providing grants—
24	(A) to fund the creation of data; and

1(B) to execute information sharing agree-2ments with State, local, and tribal governments;3and

4 (5) to the maximum extent possible, ensuring
5 that the Department of Homeland Security utilizes
6 commercial geospatial data and services available by
7 awarding contracts to entities in the private sector.
8 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

9 This Act may be cited as the "Homeland Security Geo10 graphic Information Act of 2004".

11 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

12 Congress finds that—

(1) geographic technologies and geographic data
improve government capabilities to detect, plan, prepare, and respond to disasters in order to save lives
and protect property;

(2) geographic data improves the ability of information technology applications and systems to enhance public security in a cost-effective manner; and
(3) geographic information preparedness in the
United States, and specifically in the Department of
Homeland Security, is insufficient because of—

23 (A) inadequate geographic data compat24 ibility;

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1	(B) insufficient geographic data sharing;
2	and
3	(C) technology interoperability barriers.
4	SEC. 3. HOMELAND SECURITY GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION.
5	Section 703 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6
6	U.S.C. 343) is amended—
7	(1) by inserting "(a) IN GENERAL.—" before
8	"The Chief Information"; and
9	(2) by adding at the end the following:
10	"(b) Geographic Information Functions.—
11	"(1) DEFINITION.—In this subsection, the term
12	'geographic information' means the information sys-
13	tems that involve locational data, such as maps or
14	other geospatial information resources.
15	"(2) Office of geospatial management.—
16	"(A) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Office of
17	Geospatial Management is established within the
18	Office of the Chief Information Officer.
19	"(B) GEOSPATIAL INFORMATION OFFICER.—
20	"(i) Appointment.—The Office of
21	Geospatial Management shall be adminis-
22	tered by the Geospatial Information Officer,
23	who shall be appointed by the Secretary
24	and serve under the direction of the Chief
25	Information Officer.

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1	"(ii) Functions.—The Geospatial In-
2	formation Officer shall assist the Chief In-
3	formation Officer in carrying out all func-
4	tions under this section and in coordinating
5	the geographic information needs of the De-
6	partment.
7	"(C) Coordination of geographic in-
8	FORMATION.—The Chief Information Officer
9	shall establish and carry out a program to pro-
10	vide for the efficient use of geographic informa-
11	tion, which shall include—
12	"(i) providing such geographic infor-
13	mation as may be necessary to implement
14	the critical infrastructure protection pro-
15	grams;
16	"(ii) providing leadership and coordi-
17	nation in meeting the geographic informa-
18	tion requirements of those responsible for
19	planning, prevention, mitigation, assess-
20	ment and response to emergencies, critical
21	infrastructure protection, and other func-
22	tions of the Department; and
23	"(iii) coordinating with users of geo-
24	graphic information within the Department

1	to assure interoperability and prevent un-
2	necessary duplication.
3	"(D) RESPONSIBILITIES.—In carrying out
4	this subsection, the responsibilities of the Chief
5	Information Officer shall include—
6	"(i) coordinating the geographic infor-
7	mation needs and activities of the Depart-
8	ment;
9	"(ii) implementing standards, as
10	adopted by the Director of the Office of
11	Management and Budget under the proc-
12	esses established under section 216 of the E -
13	Government Act of 2002 (44 U.S.C. 3501
14	note), to facilitate the interoperability of ge-
15	ographic information pertaining to home-
16	land security among all users of such infor-
17	mation within—
18	"(I) the Department;
19	"(II) State and local government;
20	and
21	"(III) the private sector;
22	"(iii) coordinating with the Federal
23	Geographic Data Committee and carrying
24	out the responsibilities of the Department
25	pursuant to Office of Management and

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1	Budget Circular A-16 and Executive Order
2	12906; and
3	"(iv) making recommendations to the
4	Secretary and the Executive Director of the
5	Office for State and Local Government Co-
6	ordination and Preparedness on awarding
7	grants to—
8	``(I) fund the creation of geo-
9	graphic data; and
10	"(II) execute information sharing
11	agreements regarding geographic data
12	with State, local, and tribal govern-
13	ments.
14	"(3) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—
15	There are authorized to be appropriated such sums as
16	may be necessary to carry out this subsection for each
17	fiscal year.".
