To require that Federal forfeiture funds be used, in part, to clean up methamphetamine laboratories.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Federal Emergency

5 Meth Lab Cleanup Funding Act of 2004".

### 6 SEC. 2. FUNDING FROM TREASURY FORFEITURE FUND.

7 Chapter 97 of title 31, United States Code, is amend-8 ed—

9 (1) by redesignating section 9703 (as added by
10 Public Law 103-62) as section 9703A;

1	(2) by moving section 9703 (as added by Public
2	Law 102–393) so as to appear after section 9702;
3	and
4	(3) in section $9703(a)(1)$ , by adding at the end
5	the following:
6	"(K)(i) Payment to the designated State,
7	local, or tribal law enforcement, environmental,
8	or health entity for experts and consultants
9	needed to clean up any area formerly used as
10	a methamphetamine laboratory.
11	"(ii) If a methamphetamine laboratory is
12	located on private property, not more than 90
13	percent of the costs may be paid only if—
14	"(I) the property owner did not have
15	knowledge of the existence or operation of
16	such laboratory before the law enforcement
17	action to close it; or
18	"(II) the property owner notifies law
19	enforcement not later than 24 hours after
20	discovering the existence of such labora-
21	tory.".

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
