A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of the 230th Anniversary of the United States Marine Corps, and to support construction of the Marine Corps Heritage Center.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE. 3 4 This Act may be cited as the "Marine Corps 230th 5 Anniversary Commemorative Coin Act". 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS. 7 Congress finds that— 8 (1) November 10, 2005, marks the 230th anni-9 versary of the United States Marine Corps; 10 (2) the United States Marine Corps has, over 11 the course of its illustrious 230-year history, fought 12 gallantly in defense of the United States; 13 (3) the United States Marine Corps has, over 14 the course of its storied history, established itself as 15 the Nation's military leader in amphibious warfare, 16 and will continue in that role as the United States 17 faces the challenges of the 21st Century; 18 (4) the United States Marine Corps continues 19 to exemplify the warrior ethos that has made it a 20 fighting force of international repute; 21 (5) all Americans should commemorate the leg-22 acy of the United States Marine Corps so that the

	tecting the United States against its enemies;
3	(6) in 2001, Congress authorized the construc-
4	tion of the Marine Corps Heritage Center, the pur-
5	pose of which is to provide a multipurpose facility to
6	be used for historical displays for the public viewing,
7	curation, and storage of artifacts, research facilities,
8	classrooms, offices, and associated activities, con-
9	sistent with the mission of the Marine Corps;
10	(7) the Marine Corps Heritage Center is sched-
11	uled to open on November 10, 2005;

25 shall—

(1) weigh 26.73 grams;

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2 (2) have a diameter of 1.500 inches; and

3 (3) contain 90 percent silver and 10 percent4 copper.

5 (b) LEGAL TENDER.—The coins minted under this
6 Act shall be legal tender, as provided in section 5103 of
7 title 31, United States Code.

8 SEC. 4. SOURCES OF BULLION.

9 The Secretary shall obtain silver for minting coins 10 under this Act from all available sources, including stock-11 piles established under the Strategic and Critical Mate-12 rials Stock Piling Act.

13 SEC. 5. DESIGN OF COINS.

14 (a) DESIGN REQUIREMENTS.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The design of the coins
minted under this Act shall be emblematic of the
warrior ethos of the United States Marine Corps.

18 (2) DESIGNATION AND INSCRIPTIONS.—On
19 each coin minted under this Act, there shall be—

20 (A) a designation of the value of the coin;
21 (B) an inscription of the year "2005"; and
22 (C) inscriptions of the words "Liberty",
23 "In God We Trust", "United States of Amer24 ica", and "E Pluribus Unum".

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(b) SELECTION.—The design for the coins minted
 under this Act shall be—

3 (1) selected by the Secretary, after consultation
4 with the Marine Corps Historical Division and the
5 Commission of Fine Arts; and

6 (2) reviewed by the Citizens Commemorative7 Coin Advisory Committee.

8 SEC. 6. ISSUANCE OF COINS.

9 (a) QUALITY OF COINS.—Coins minted under this10 Act shall be issued in uncirculated and proof qualities.

(b) MINT FACILITY.—Only 1 facility of the United
States Mint may be used to strike any particular quality
of the coins minted under this Act.

(c) PERIOD FOR ISSUANCE.—The Secretary may
issue coins minted under this Act only during the 1-year
period beginning on January 1, 2005.

17 SEC. 7. SALE OF COINS.

(a) SALE PRICE.—The coins issued under this Act
shall be sold by the Secretary at a price equal to the sum
of—

21 (1) the face value of the coins;

(2) the surcharge provided in subsection (b)with respect to such coins; and

(3) the cost of designing and issuing the coins
 (including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery,
 overhead expenses, marketing, and shipping).

4 (b) SURCHARGES.—All sales of coins issued under
5 this Act shall include a surcharge of \$10 per coin.

6 (c) BULK SALES.—The Secretary shall make bulk
7 sales of coins issued under this Act at a reasonable dis8 count.

9 (d) Prepaid Orders.—

10 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall accept
11 prepaid orders for coins minted under this Act be12 fore the issuance of such coins.

13 (2) DISCOUNT.—Sale prices with respect to prepaid orders under paragraph (1) should be at a reasonable discount.

16 SEC. 8. DISTRIBUTION OF SURCHARGES.

17 (a) DISTRIBUTION.—Subject to section 5134(f) of title 31, United States Code, all surcharges received by 18 the Secretary from the sale of coins issued under this Act 19 20 shall be promptly paid by the Secretary to the Marine 21 Corps Heritage Foundation for the purposes of construc-22 tion of the Marine Corps Heritage Center, as authorized 23 by section 1 of Public Law 106–398 (114 Stat. 1654). 24 (b) AUDIT.—The Marine Corps Heritage Foundation 25 shall be subject to the audit requirements of section

1 5134(f)(2) of title 31, United States Code, with regard2 to the amounts received under subsection (a).

3 SEC. 9. FINANCIAL ASSURANCES.

(a) NO NET COST TO THE GOVERNMENT.—The Secretary shall take such actions as may be necessary to ensure that minting and issuing coins under this Act will
not result in any net cost to the United States Government.

9 (b) PAYMENT FOR COINS.—A coin shall not be issued
10 under this Act unless the Secretary has received—

11 (1) full payment for the coin;

12 (2) security satisfactory to the Secretary to in-13 demnify the United States for full payment; or

(3) a guarantee of full payment satisfactory to
the Secretary from a depository institution, the deposits of which are insured by the Federal Deposit
Insurance Corporation or the National Credit Union
Administration.

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
