A BILL

- To amend the Small Business Act to expand and improve the assistance provided by Small Business Development Centers to Indian tribe members, Native Alaskans, and Native Hawaiians.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

- 4 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
- 5 (1) Approximately 60 percent of Indian tribe
 6 members and Native Alaskans live on or adjacent to

Indian lands, which suffer from an average unem ployment rate of 45 percent.

3 (2) Indian tribe members and Native Alaskans 4 own more than 197,000 businesses and generate 5 more than \$34,000,000,000 in revenues. The service 6 industry accounted for 17 percent of these busi-7 nesses (of which 40 percent were engaged in busi-8 ness and personal services) and 15.1 percent of their 9 total receipts. The next largest was the construction 10 industry (13.9 percent and 15.7 percent, respec-11 tively). The third largest was the retail trade indus-12 try (7.5 percent and 13.4 percent, respectively).

(3) The number of businesses owned by Indian
tribe members and Native Alaskans grew by 84 percent from 1992 to 1997, and their gross receipts
grew by 179 percent in that period. This is compared to all businesses which grew by 7 percent, and
their total gross receipts grew by 40 percent, in that
period.

(4) The Small Business Development Center
program is cost effective. Clients receiving long-term
counseling under the program in 1998 generated additional tax revenues of \$468,000,000, roughly 6
times the cost of the program to the Federal Government.

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1	(5) Using the existing infrastructure of the
2	Small Business Development Center program, small
3	businesses owned by Indian tribe members, Native
4	Alaskans, and Native Hawaiians receiving services
5	under the program will have a higher survival rate
6	than the average small business not receiving such
7	services.
8	(6) Business counseling and technical assist-
9	ance is critical on Indian lands where similar serv-
10	ices are scarce and expensive.
11	(7) Increased assistance through counseling
12	under the Small Business Development Center pro-
13	gram has been shown to reduce the default rate as-
14	sociated with lending programs of the Small Busi-
15	ness Administration.
16	(b) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this Act are as fol-
17	lows:
18	(1) To stimulate economies on Indian lands.
19	(2) To foster economic development on Indian
20	lands.
21	(3) To assist in the creation of new small busi-
22	nesses owned by Indian tribe members, Native Alas-
23	kans, and Native Hawaiians and expand existing
24	ones.

1	(4) To provide management, technical, and re-
2	search assistance to small businesses owned by In-
3	dian tribe members, Native Alaskans, and Native
4	Hawaiians.
5	(5) To seek the advice of local Tribal Councils
6	on where small business development assistance is
7	most needed.
8	(6) To ensure that Indian tribe members, Na-
9	tive Alaskans, and Native Hawaiians have full access
10	to existing business counseling and technical assist-
11	ance available through the Small Business Develop-
12	ment Center program.

10	term 'Indian tribe member' means a mem-
11	ber of an Indian tribe (other than a Native
12	Alaskan).
13	"(v) NATIVE ALASKAN.—The term
14	'Native Alaskan' has the meaning given
15	the term 'Native' in section 3(b) of the
16	Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (43
17	U.S.C. 1602(b)).
18	"(vi) NATIVE HAWAIIAN.—The term
19	'Native Hawaiian' means any individual
20	who is a descendant of the aboriginal peo-
21	ple, who prior to 1778, occupied and exer-
22	cised sovereignty in the area that now con-
23	stitutes the State of Hawaii.
24	"(H) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIA-
25	TIONS.—There is authorized to be appropriated

1	to carry out this paragraph \$7,000,000 for each
2	of fiscal years 2004 through 2006.
3	"(I) FUNDING LIMITATIONS.—
4	"(i) Nonapplicability of certain
5	LIMITATIONS.—Funding under this para-
6	graph shall be in addition to the dollar
7	program limitations specified in paragraph
8	(4).
9	"(ii) Limitation on use of
10	FUNDS.—The Administration may carry
11	out this paragraph only with amounts ap-
12	propriated in advance specifically to carry
13	out this paragraph.".
14	SEC. 3. STATE CONSULTATION WITH LOCAL TRIBAL COUN-
15	CILS.
16	Section 21(c) of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C.
17	648(c)) is amended by adding at the end the following:
18	"(9) Advice of local tribal counsels.—A
19	State receiving grants under this section shall re-
20	quest the advice of local Tribal Councils on how best
21	to provide assistance to Indian tribe members, Na-
22	tive Alaskans, and Native Hawaiians and where to
23	locate satellite centers to provide such assistance.".

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
