A BILL

To establish a capability and office to promote cooperation between entities of the United States and its allies in the global war on terrorism for the purpose of engaging in cooperative endeavors focused on the research, development, and commercialization of high-priority technologies intended to detect, prevent, respond to, recover from, and mitigate against acts of terrorism and other high consequence events and to address the homeland security needs of Federal, State, and local governments.

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- This Act may be cited as the "Promoting
- 3 Antiterrorism Capabilities Through International Co-
- 4 operation Act".

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5 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 6 The Congress finds the following:
- 7 (1) The development and implementation of 8 technology is critical to combating terrorism and 9 other high consequence events and implementing a 10 comprehensive homeland security strategy.
 - (2) The United States and its allies in the global war on terrorism share a common interest in facilitating research, development, testing, and evaluation of technologies that will aid in detecting, preventing, responding to, recovering from, and mitigating against acts of terrorism.
 - (3) Certain United States allies in the global war on terrorism, including Israel, the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, and Singapore have extensive experience with, and technological expertise in, homeland security.
 - (4) The United States and certain of its allies in the global war on terrorism have a history of successful collaboration in developing mutually beneficial technologies in the areas of defense, agriculture, and telecommunications.

"(B) PRIORITIES.—The Director shall be responsible for developing, in coordination with the Directorate of Science and Technology, the other components of the Department of Homeland Security, and other Federal agencies, strategic priorities for international cooperative activity.

"(C) Activities.—The Director shall facilitate the planning, development, and implementation of international cooperative activity to address the strategic priorities developed under subparagraph (B) through mechanisms the Under Secretary considers appropriate, including grants, cooperative agreements, or contracts to or with foreign public or private entities, governmental organizations, businesses, federally funded research and development centers, and universities.

1 "(D) IDENTIFICATION OF PARTNERS.—
2 The Director shall facilitate the matching of
3 United States entities engaged in homeland se4 curity research with non-United States entities
5 engaged in homeland security research so that
6 they may partner in homeland security research
7 activities.

- "(4) COORDINATION.—The Director shall ensure that the activities under this subsection are coordinated with those of other relevant research agencies, and may run projects jointly with other agencies.
- "(5) Conferences and workshops.—The Director, periodically, shall hold international homeland security technology workshops and conferences to improve contact among the international community of technology developers and to help establish direction for future technology goals.

"(c) Funding.—

"(1) Budget allocation.—Not less than 2.5 percent of the research, development, testing, and evaluation budget of the Directorate of Science and Technology for each fiscal year, not including management and administration amounts, shall be allocated for activities under this section.

- "(2) Equitability.—The Director shall ensure that funding and resources expended in international cooperative activity will be equitably matched by the foreign partner organization through direct funding or funding of complementary activities, or through provision of staff, facilities, material, or equipment.
- "(3) Foreign partners.—Partners shall include Israel, the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, Singapore, and other allies in the global war on terrorism, as appropriate. As part of the activities of the Office, and recognizing the importance of preparedness against threats to the Nation's agricultural and public health from exotic diseases, the Director shall work, in conjunction with the portfolio and program managers of the Directorate of Science and Technology, to facilitate development of information sharing and other types of cooperative mechanisms for situational awareness of the genomics and proteomics of exotic animal disease, including with nations in Africa.".
