A BILL

3 SECTION 1. WAIVER AUTHORITY.

4 (a) WAIVER AUTHORITY.—Notwithstanding any
5 other provision of law, if the President makes the deter6 mination described in subsection (b), the President may—
7 (1) exempt a proposed agreement for coopera8 tion with India (arranged pursuant to section 123 of

1	the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2153))
2	from the requirement in section $123(a)(2)$ of the
3	Atomic Energy Act of 1954, and such agreement for
4	cooperation shall be subject to the same congres-
5	sional review procedures under sections $123(b)$ and
6	123(d) of such Act as an agreement for cooperation
7	that has not been exempted from any requirement
8	contained in section 123(a) of such Act;
9	(2) waive the application of section 128 of the
10	Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2157) with
11	respect to India; and
12	(3) waive the application of any sanction under
13	section 129 of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42 $$
14	U.S.C. 2158) with respect to India.
15	(b) DETERMINATION.—The determination referred to
16	in subsection (a) is a determination by the President that
17	the following actions have occurred:
18	(1) India has provided the United States and
19	the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA)
20	with a credible plan to separate civil and military fa-
21	cilities, materials, and programs, and has filed a
22	declaration regarding its civil facilities with the
23	IAEA.
24	(2) An agreement has entered into force be-
25	tween India and the IAEA requiring the application

1 of safeguards in accordance with IAEA practices to 2 India's civil nuclear facilities as declared in the plan 3 described in paragraph (1). 4 (3) India and the IAEA are making satisfactory 5 progress toward implementing an Additional Pro-6 tocol that would apply to India's civil nuclear pro-7 gram. 8 (4) India is working with the United States for 9 the conclusion of a multilateral Fissile Material Cut-10 off Treaty. 11 (5) India is supporting international efforts to 12 prevent the spread of enrichment and reprocessing technology. 13 14 (6) India is ensuring that the necessary steps 15 are being taken to secure nuclear materials and 16 technology through the application of comprehensive 17 export control legislation and regulations, and 18 through harmonization and adherence to Missile 19 Technology Control Regime (MTCR) and Nuclear 20 Suppliers Group (NSG) guidelines.

(7) Supply to India by the United States under
an agreement for cooperation arranged pursuant to
section 123 of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 is
consistent with United States participation in the
Nuclear Suppliers Group.

(c) REPORT.—Any determination pursuant to sub section (b) shall be reported to the Committee on Foreign
 Relations of the Senate and the Committee on Inter national Relations of the House of Representatives, and
 such report shall describe the basis for the President's de termination.

7 (d) SUBSEQUENT DETERMINATION.—A determina8 tion under subsection (b) shall not be effective if the Presi9 dent determines that India has detonated a nuclear explo10 sive device after the date of enactment of this Act.

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
